Dear Mr Kendorski

From time to time reports of unidentified flying objects are received and investigated by the Royal Australian Air Force, but details of individual investigations have not been made public.

On October 20th, 1960, the Minister for Air, the Honourable F.M. Osborne, made a statement in the Australian National Parliament at Canberra, summarising the position, and his comments may be pertinent to your request.

In the course of his remarks Mr Osborne said, "The Department of Air does obtain information about all well reported cases of unidentified flying objects. Although reports of this sort have been investigated very carefully for years, nearly all of them are explainable on a perfectly normal basis. Sometimes they are found to be weather balloons, high-flying aircraft, or even stars. On one occasion, it was established that a reported spaceship was the moon. Of all these reports, only three or four per cent cannot be explained on the basis of some natural phenomenon, and nothing that has arisen from that three or four per cent of unexplained cases gives any firm support for the belief that interlopers from other places in this world or outside it have been visiting us".

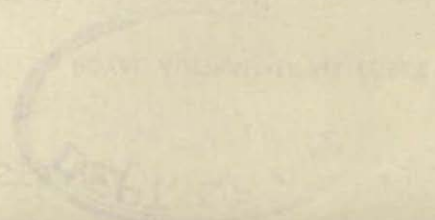

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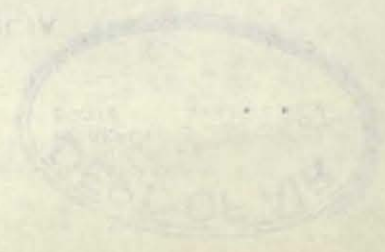



REPORTED SIGHTING OF
UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT

1. Please refer to your letter 128/1/21 dated 12th November, 1962, forwarding a copy of a letter dated 1st November from Mr. F.S. Wells of "Hillford", Goulburn, concerning the sighting of an unidentified flying object.
2. It will be appreciated that the details forwarded by Mr. Wells are very sketchy and it is therefore very difficult to make any assessment of the nature of the object sighted. Your letter was received in this Department on 13th November, 14 days after the sighting; it is therefore, considered that further investigation by interview with Mr. Wells would be of very doubtful value.
3. Inquiries into the movement of RAAF and civil aircraft at dusk on the date of sighting have revealed that there were no RAAF movements, but that civil aircraft could have been in the vicinity though it is impossible to be certain of this owing to the absence of a specific time of sighting.
4. Based on the information given by Mr. Wells, this Department considers that the most probable explanation of the object sighted is that it was a meteor.

Seven Men Will Never Scoff Again

Claude Taylor sent the following message on July 9 after the men at Hallett Station had heard a radio news report from New Zealand of a "strange sky phenomenon" seen there.

"Following observations recorded here by several observers and on all sky camera colour photo may be of help to interested parties in New Zealand.

1. Object appeared at about 11.10 hours Greenwich on July 7. Took about three to four minutes to cross from south horizon to north horizon.

2. At northern horizon bearing from Hallett was 51 degrees east from true north. Closest approach to zenith was 36 degrees when bearing was 39 degrees west from true north.

3. Object appeared as three with resolved spots of light, one much brighter than other two. Greyish form around them was possible vapour trail. Overall impression was that object orbited well within atmosphere. Certainly it was below normal auroral heights as it passed below auroral.

4. When bearing was approximately true north a flash of light occurred which did not alter orbit or form at all. No noise heard.

5. Revolution of three spots of light at great height indicated large spread. Relative position of spots did not seem to change. Camera photo did not revolve spots.

6. No resemblance to satellite or any sky phenomenon seen by any of seven observers who are unlikely to again scoff at reports of flying saucers."

B. J. L. MAIN (22), Waiouru, Technician. Brian Main is a Radio Technician in the New Zealand Army School of Signals, Waiouru. He was born at Christchurch and went to St. Bedes' College. He has served for 11 years in the Scout Movement, being a Queen's Scout and a Scoutmaster. He has represented Central Military District at Soccer.

L. J. WYLDE (22), of Hamilton, Technician. Len Wylde is Tauranga born and was a pupil of Hamilton B.H.S. 1952-56. He obtained his B.E. (civil), at Auckland University College, and worked in Wellington and Hamilton.

Two men will be carrying out biological investigations, chiefly at Cape Hallett, during the summer months. They are B. E. Reid, who has had considerable previous Antarctic experience, including a winter at Cape Hallett, 1959, and H. J. Cranfield, M.Sc., whose two brothers, Bill and Bob, have both wintered at Scott Base in earlier years.

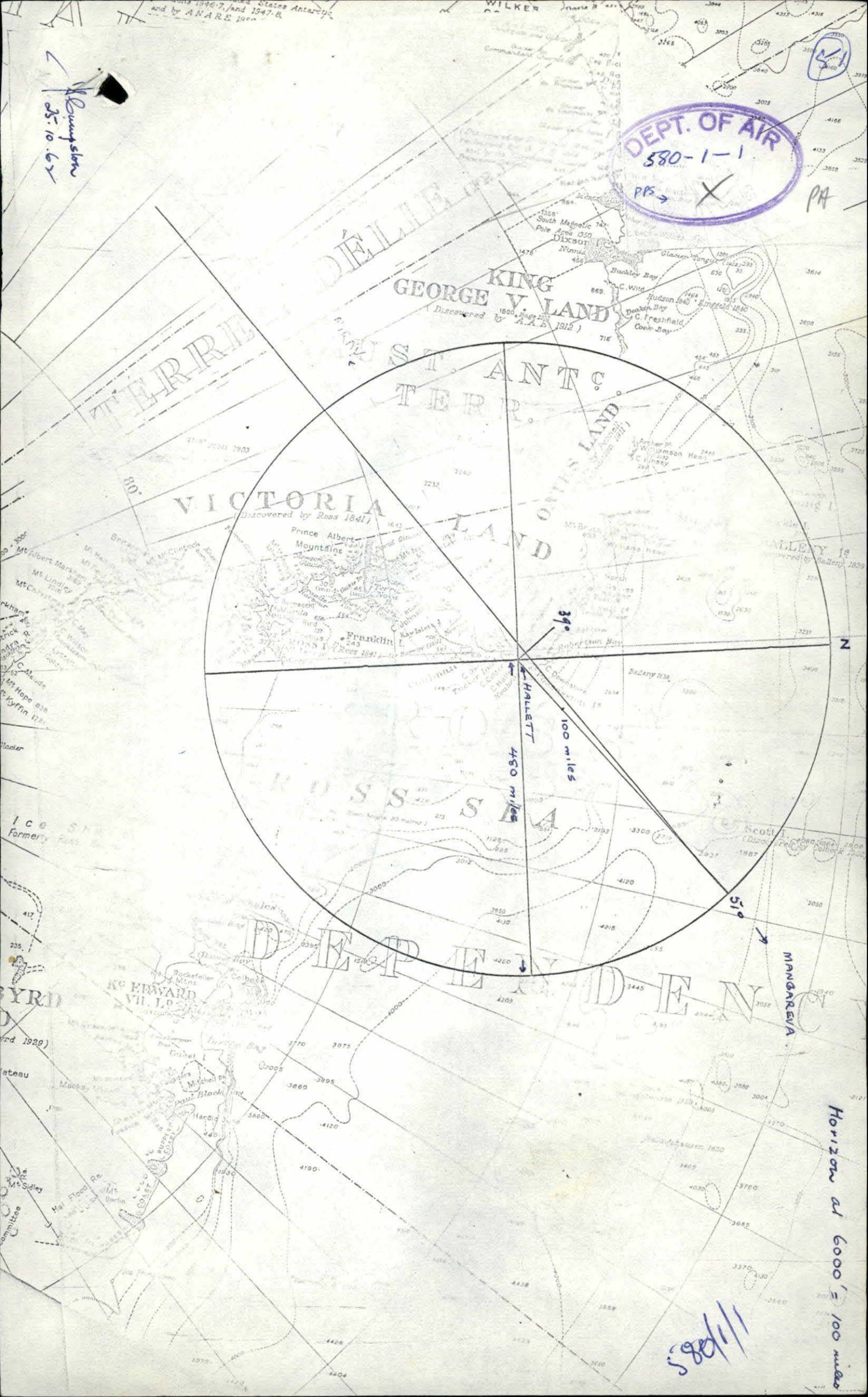

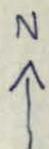

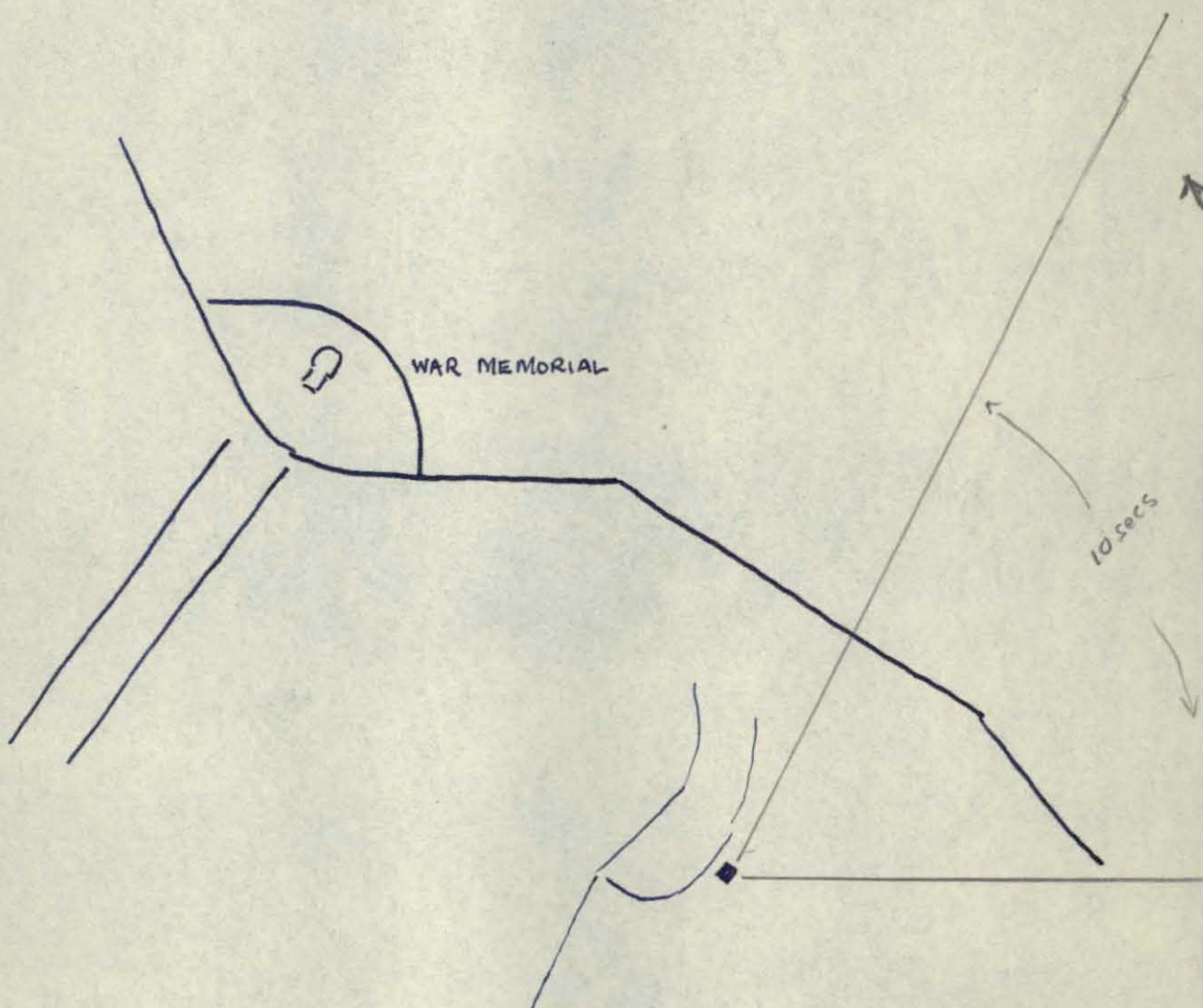

I live at 24 Holmes Crescent, Campbell, A.C.T.

At 11.00pm on Saturday 13 October 1962 I walked out of the back door of my house and, as a matter of habit, glanced at the two red lights on the pole on the crest of the ridge above the house.

Although it had been raining earlier the sky in that quarter was cloudless. It clouded again a few minutes later.

As I glanced at the lights I saw, about 5° above them and just above the trees what I thought was a very bright meteor with a short tail. It was travelling at a high speed reminiscent of a meteor, but without the characteristic drop in elevation. I waited expecting to see it burn out but it continued on a straight and what appeared to be a level course. I could not see the horizon. While I watched it travelled through 50° of arc and then disappeared past the corner of the house. Its apparent course was from Queanbeyan in the general direction of Mt Ainslie. It was in sight for a matter of 10 seconds only. A second or two after it had disappeared I decided to see if I could follow its course further, but, by the time I had rounded the corner of the house it had disappeared into a clear sky.

It must have been at a considerable distance from me and at a considerable elevation. I heard no noise but there was a wind.

The object appeared comparable in size to a Melbourne-Sydney airliner flying over Canberra. It was side on and above me flying a course which seemed to bring it closer and clearer in outline. I had the impression of an aircraft of more or less conventional shape and colour with a motor on either side of the fuselage, each emitting a long whitish-yellow exhaust flame, which made it very obvious. It seemed to be carrying lights in front (NOT coloured). It was not lit as by a searchlight but apparently by the light of its own motors as the outline was not sharp.

My immediate reaction was that this was some kind of very high speed aircraft travelling at high speed at possibly 15000 feet over Canberra airport in a northerly direction. There was no change of course.

I rang Mt Stromlo 512 but the telephone was not answered. I then rang the RAAF Duty Officer.

I have seen many things in the sky but never anything similar to this. It was either a satellite, a meteor, or an aircraft. It seemed too low and too fast for a satellite. As I did not see the end of the flight I cannot be absolutely certain that it was not a meteorite. I have never seen a meteorite in the sky at close range. It was very much brighter than the usual meteorite. If it was an aircraft it would seem that some form of rocket propulsion was being used. The general appearance was that of an aircraft flying at 10,000 feet at ten miles distance. I would have expected a supersonic bang, but this would have taken a minute to reach me from ten miles. I did not hear any obvious loud noise. By that time I would probably have been inside the house.

After verifying the time(\pm 5 minutes), I wrote the above.

On Sunday I watched a Melbourne-Sydney airliner and decided that the distance would probably have been nearer five miles apparent
The angle above the horizon was approximately 20° .

A Vampire flew over the house on Sunday.

On Monday W/Comdr Gray, at Fairbairn informed me that no service aircraft answering to this description had landed at Canberra at that time.

I am Historian of the Department of External Affairs, having been with the Department for 27 years. I have lived in Canberra since 1928 and am very familiar with its skies. My age is 53. I am a Barrister and Solicitor and a Doctor of Letters (Melbourne) ~~AIF Service 4 1/2~~ AIF Service 4 1/2 years (Middle East, Tobruk). For the last two years I was a Captain in the Australian Intelligence Corps serving with Allied Geographical Section, GHQ, Southwest Pacific Area. E.D., Mentioned in Despatches. I am very familiar with aircraft and their appearance and with aerial photography.

On 5 October my eyesight was tested by C. Werner of Collins St, Melbourne on 5 October 1962. He said that my distant vision was exceptionally good.

Everything I saw was in keeping with a man made machine behaving within the limits of modern scientific knowledge. The outline suggested a high wing monoplane of normal size with rocket(?) motors under the wings.

I was left with the thought that this might be a night photographic reconnaissance of Fairbairn Station.

About 1952 I reported from New Zealand a series of similar reportings and, about 4 years later; some from New Caledonia. The New Zealand sightings again suggested reconnaissance.



May I enquire whether an aircraft from your Station was in the vicinity of Denmark at about 7 p.m., yesterday 31st of August.

My reason for the enquiry is that at that time I saw a bright star like object moving rapidly across the sky on a horizontal path travelling, so it seemed from about the north west. Its elevation from my position (15 miles North West of Denmark) would have been, I guess, about 30 degrees. At the time I was milking my dairy herd, and the noise of my milking plant prevented me from being able to ascertain whether any noise came from the object I saw. The object was visible for no more than two minutes.



UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. At approximately 2030 hours on 24th June Mr Stephen White of Bells Line of Road, North Richmond (Phone Ric 272) and his uncle Mr. Richard Bowley of Grose Vale (Phone Grose Vale 3N) arrived at the Guard Room to report the sighting of a "flying saucer" to the Duty Officer.
2. Mr. Bowley an elderly man stated he had seen the object on two previous nights and had drawn Mr. White's attention to the object at approximately 7.30 pm. that evening when standing on the back lawn of Mr White's home. The object then being to the West over Mt. Bowen.
3. After a discussion with the men the duty officer, believing the object to be Venus, thanked them and they departed.
4. Two airmen, A43487 LAC Stocker H.N. and A219704 LAC Wrigley R.K.M. both of 2AD RAAF Richmond decided to accompany the civilians for "Something to do". They returned to the Base at approximately 2300 hours accompanied by the two civilians and made the following statements.
5. At 2135 hours from Mr. Stephen White's back lawn they saw the object position W.N.W. and decided to drive towards it to have a look. They then drove to Kurrajong via Grose Vale and had apparently passed the object as it was down in a valley below St. Mary's and Penrith's lights. They were now at Cherry Park Kurrajong. The object moved left to right several times and then rose above the skyline in a vertical direction and then moved back towards Kurrajong. The four members then headed back towards base and kept the object in sight until Richmond town. No further sightings were made.
6. Description of Object:
 - (a) Size: All four said although hard to judge it was very large. i.e. "twice the size of a hangar".
 - (b) Colour: Firey glow -mostly red.
 - (c) Speed: The object moved very fast i.e. "tremendous speed".
7. This area is Richmond's local flying area and there were no aircraft in this area.
8. The two airmen showed no signs of having been drinking and were perfectly rational in all statements. They stated they were doubtful when leaving the base but were somewhat frightened by their experience.
9. Mr. White' was in a highly excited state and was sure "something should be done about it as it shouldn't be there".
10. My own opinion is that these four men had definately seen something which had made quite an impression on them.

REPORT OF U.F.O.

I am a professional fisherman. I was 1/704 WO2 E.C. TARR with sixteen years service. Also, a Commando WO2 Instructor, Diver, Paratrooper, Frogman Instructor.

At approximately 1835 hours, on Friday 25 May 62, I, in company with a crew member was anchored on the north end of "Britomart" Reef. I noted a light, high in the sky, which I first thought to be a rocket casing, or similar object. However, the light, stepped, then changed course, away from our position, and gradually dissappeared.

The light was sighted enaa bearing 085°M approx 22° above the herizen. It was moving in a southerly direction, and I noted same for a period of 22 seconds. It stepped, or appeared to stop, for 18 seconds, then appeared to turn away and gradually diminished to nothing. This phase took approximately 7 seconds. There was no noise. I later questioned a fishing boat, which was at that time 15 miles east of my position. They saw or heard nothing, which helps to rule out aircraft. The speed was, to me, astenishing. I can add nothing further, except that there was nothing more than a clear, bright light, no tail, trail, noise.

I realise it is not necessary, but I can produce my crew member, who also observed "it".

The RAAF is the only body which would not ridicule such reports, but, you would know if aircraft were operating in that area. If I have allowed my imagination to play tricks, and some of your bright boys were playing around with Neptunes I apelegise for taking up your time reading this.



1. 25-1-62. 9.40 p.m., W.S.Time. Planet-like object, white, similar to earth satellite, 35degrees above horizon in W.N.W. Apparent speed very rapid, not as fast as average meteor, very much faster than Echo 1. Direction of travel due North to South and level with the horizon. Disappeared after about ninety seconds in W.S.W. Not a conventional aircraft which appeared about one hour later with all lights showing.
2. 2-2-62. 8.59 p.m., W.S.Time. Bright white planet-like object, seen first in Orion as then positioned, then moving very quickly overhead in a generally southe ly direction , in a striking "zig-zag" path, not a "wobble". Sharp angular changes of about 20 degs., until near Canopus, when it made a 90 degree change in direction, shooting away due east, lost behind some clouds. Noted particularly, no circling, simply instantaneous change in direction without loss of the astonishing speed. No noise, no red or green signal or navigational type lights. Must have been at or above level of fairly high tenous clouds in the act of dispersion as slight softening effect could be observed when object passed through or above them.
3. 13-2-62. 9.38 p.m., W, S. Time. Brilliant ORANGE planet-like object, stronger than the planet Venus at its brightest, having otherwise the behaviour an appearance of an earth satellite. Observed first about 30 degs. above the horizon in the W.S.W. Rose in a great arc to zenith with tremendous speed, passed very close to Canopus as then positioned, continued in arc till it passed into haze 10 degs. above E.N.E. about 9.45 p.m. No sound, sihouette, signalling or other lights or aircraft. Steady course, appeared to be self-luminous like sodium street-lamp seen at some distance. Bright first-quarter moon in Northern sky at same time. Full transit from horizon to horizon and through zenith could have amounted to no more than ten minutes.
4. 1-3-62. 9.30 p.m. W.S.Time. Bright ORANGE planetlike object again, about 30 degs. above horizon in W.N.W. moving speedily southwards level with horizon in a wide circular sweep through south and east, to disappear about 25 degs. above due North in haze about 9.36p.m.

A second exactly similar light followed two to three minutes later travelling at same great speed along part of the same path as the first, from S.S.W. to East. Visible two minutes. As with previous sightings, no indications of aircraft whatsoever. Just after midnight, conventional Eastern States aircraft circled round East to West by South, much smaller arc, fully lit and with great noise, in strong contrast to the faster, silent, but very obvious orange light objects.

1. Attached is a report of an unusual flying object sighted in the vicinity of Holbrook, NSW, by Mr A.G.Melrose.
2. Mr Melrose has been interviewed by the Command Intelligence Officer and appears to be a normal, rational person holding a responsible position in the Commonwealth Public Service as Chairman, Australian Motor Vehicle Standards Committee.
3. The photograph mentioned in para 23 of the report is also attached. This photo reveals what appears to be condensation trails but is difficult to reconcile with the times of aircraft known to be in the vicinity at the time.
4. Mr Melrose is positive of his time of 0915 hours being correct. He claims that a Shell Oil Company tanker driver would almost certainly have seen this object also. Efforts to trace this driver through the head office of the Shell Company has not been successful. However, the Officer-in-Charge of Transport has stated that he will write to their agents in the area in an effort to ascertain if any of their drivers can give any information on this matter.
5. Should any further report be forthcoming from the Shell Company it will be forwarded to your Department.
6. Any information which is available at Department of Air, which could be made known to this Headquarters in connection with this particular sighting, would be appreciated.

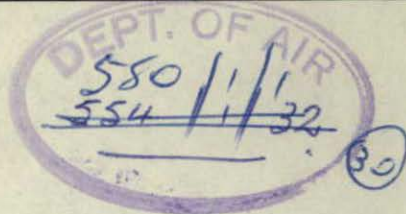

REF: UNIDENTIFIABLE FLYING OBJECTS OVER TENNANT CREEK

Dear Sir,

I wish to report that on the night of April 13th 1962, I was present at the local movie show which is shown in an open theatre, in company with Const Bart MOUTHARN.

At about 9 pm I observed three objects moving across the sky at an unknown altitude from the North Westerly direction. On first sighting these objects I noticed that the two largest ones had a firey trail and the smaller one left no trail.

The objects appeared to me to be similar to meteorite or shooting stars as is the common expression used. They were each glowing orange, one large one, one small one, and one large one with the same spacing between each one and in a direct line with each other.

The difference between these objects and shooting stars I have seen before is the fact that they were moving much slower (I would say I observed the objects for about six seconds during which time I had sufficient time to draw Const MOUTHARN's attention to them and he also observed them), and also they appeared to me to be travelling in a horizontal plane with the earth, and did not appear to lose height.

About three seconds after the initial observance the smaller centre object disappeared and the firey trail left by the two larger objects ceased. They continued on in a South Easterly direction from where I was sitting still not appearing to lose any height, until the two larger objects also faded.

I have observed satellites on prior occasions and these objects were definitely not satellites being different in colour and at a much lower altitude. They were also moving far too fast for any airplane that I have observed before, and also too slow for the usual meteorite.

Whatever the objects were they appeared to be burning up in the atmosphere, and fell that I should report the matter to you.

REPORT ON UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT

I herewith submit this report on an unidentified flying object sighted in Richmond CTA on Saturday 5th May 1962.

1. I was on duty in the Control Tower on 5 May, when A17120 LAC LEVIEN C.J. who was also in the tower cupola at the time, brought my attention to what he thought was an aircraft contrail in the sky to the North West of Richmond. The time then being 0025Z.
2. This apparent contrail commenced on an approximate bearing of 315 deg., from the tower, and at the time of sighting, extended on a climbing path of 25 deg., approx., to a bearing of 290 deg., travelling from North to South.
3. The contrail was then observed by myself and LAC LEVIEN, through binoculars, to continue to climb at a steady rate until at an estimated height of between 15000 to 20,000 ft., it levelled off and shortly afterward ceased to form, on an approx., bearing of 260 deg. The time then being 0029Z.
4. Whilst watching through the binoculars I saw a gling that I took to be an aircraft, preceeding the contrail at a constant distance.
5. Mascot ACC were notified and they reported that no civil aircraft were flying in that particular area, and had no knowledge of any Military aircraft that could be the cause of the contrail. The only known Jet traffic in that area was a COMET which proceeded from Dubbo to Sydney via Katoomba at 2300Z.
6. The Operations Officer was advised and with the Meteorological Officer made a visual examination of the contrail formation.
7. The Met., observation at 0030Z was:-

Wing 050/5, Visibility 15 miles, Wx. Hazy Cloud,
1/8 Cirrus, 25,000 ft QNH 1022Mbs.

The Cirrus cloud observed was of the wispy "Mares Tail" type, and quite unlike the observed contrail which was quite definite in composition and continued in an unbroken line which gradually dispersed over the next 40 minutes.



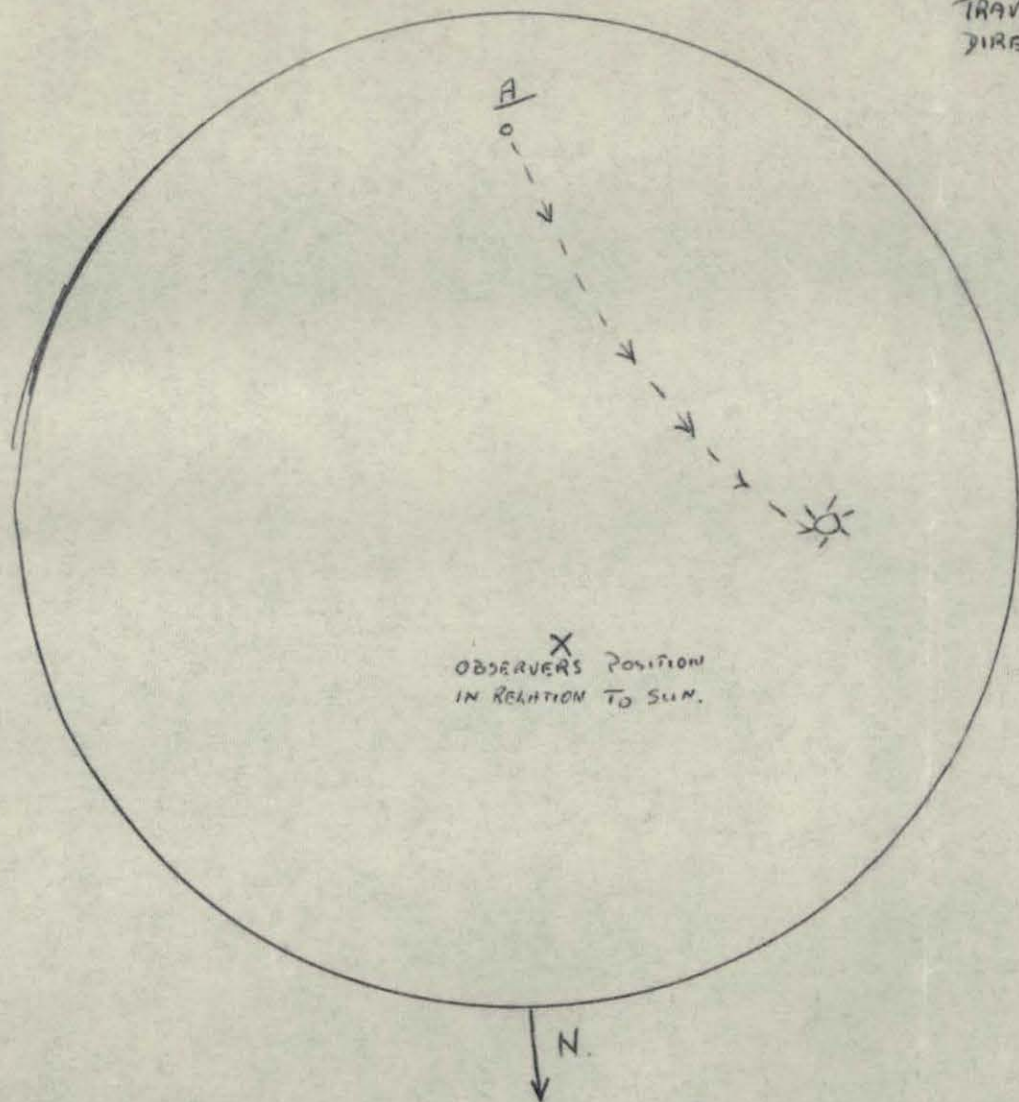

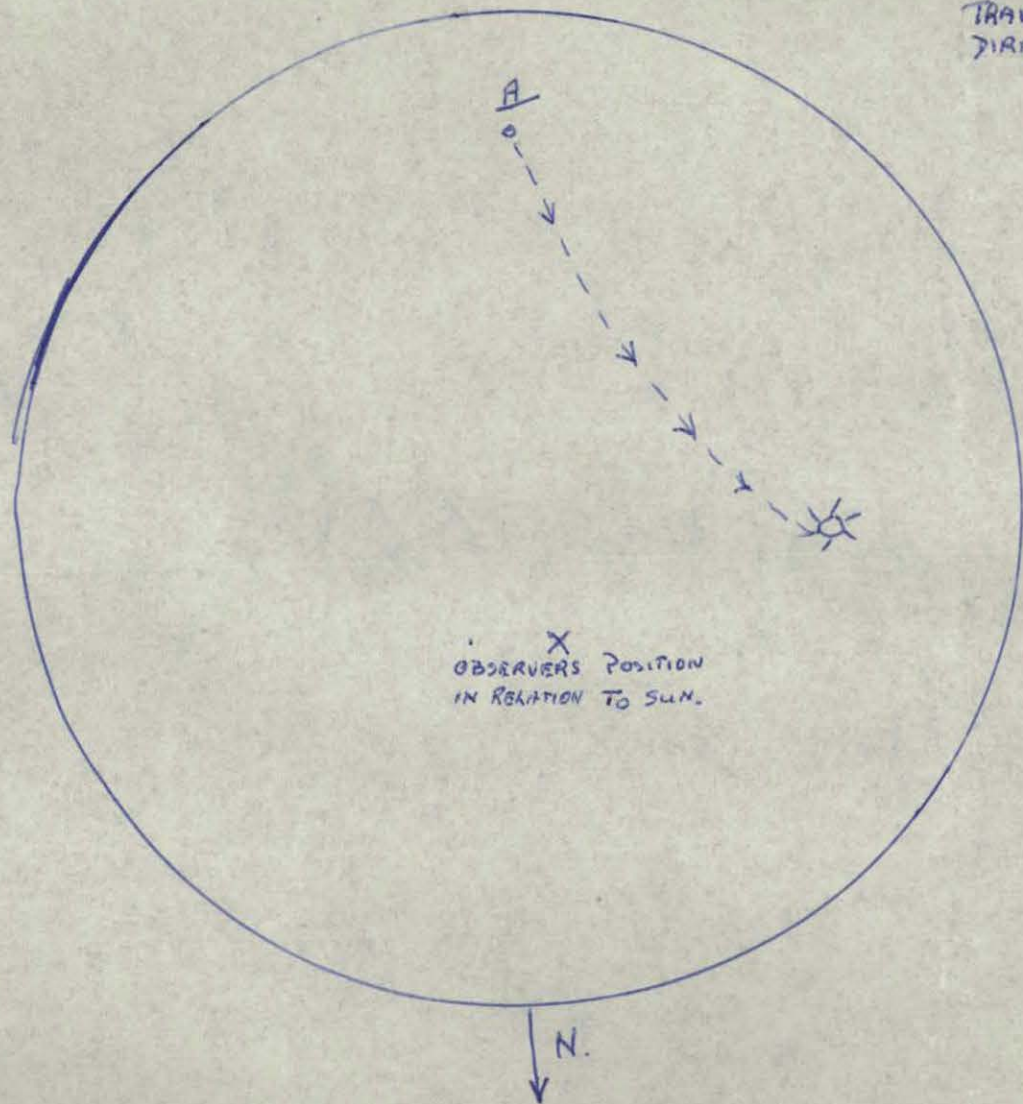

Dear General,

In confirmation of verbal report made to Major Lazarus when he called at above address on Monday last:-

- Report on Strange Object in Sky -

On 16th Jan at approx 8.45 pm I was standing on my verandah looking towards Mt Dandenong to see if the fire glow over the mountain had diminished following the rain which had fallen a little earlier, at least in Caulfield. A faint fire reflection was visible over Mt Dandenong, but much less vivid than on the previous night. The sky was still overcast but I have no idea of the height of the cloud cover.

Suddenly a very bright flash appeared in the sky directly above Mt Dandenong which I took to be a signal flare fired from the summit. Immediately, however I knew it was something else, as it was moving rapidly towards me travelling south-westerly in a straight line at great speed and definitely not losing height. If it continued on its course I estimate it would have crossed the coast between Sandringham and Black Rock, but it passed from my sight behind a tall shrub on the southern boundary of my garden. When nearest to my point of observation I estimate it was about 5 miles to the south east at an elevation of about 35°. As I observed it for approx 6 seconds it travelled about 25 miles and I roughly estimate its speed at 250 miles per minute. I heard no sound, but noted it was below the cloud cover as a reflected glow from the clouds appeared to move with and above it. The object was cigar-shaped and appeared to be about 15 ft. long excluding a nebulous reddish tail that trailed behind it of about the same length. This appeared to be composed of small red spots of light which I took to be small fragments of glowing material. The rear third of the solid body seemed to be cut away leaving a definite step in the under surface and from this on two occasions at about two seconds interval, there dropped in rapid succession two balls of fire about the size of a cricket ball. When they had fallen over what appeared to be about 3 feet they lengthened and then went out. When it was nearest my point of observation I fixed my attention on the nose of the object. Around the circumference of what I can best describe as some sort of cowl, about six or eight flames - broad at the base and giving off a very bright light, such as might be expected from acetylene gas flares were emitted. These were bent sharply backwards over the circumference of the object and extended back for about two feet where they tapered to points. These points were of greenish hue and danced and twisted to form what I can best describe as a fiery tossing mane around the front portion of the object. That, Sir, is the best description I can give of what I saw.

You will, of course have seen the newspaper report of very numerous sightings of some such object. I have seen those in the Herald & Sun of 17th Jan and most published descriptions tally substantially with what I have endeavoured to describe. Both accounts state that Mr W.G.A. Tregear of Pascoe Vale of the Victorian Astronomical Society (who did not himself, observe it) states that it was most probably a meteor. It is as well that the public should believe this explanation, but I know it was not a meteor, as, at no

point during its illuminated flight, was it affected by gravity, but was resisting gravity by some force giving it rapid forward flight. This must have been generated within the object or applied at its point of origin. My only explanation is that it was a guided missile of rocket type with a head designed to burst into flame at a given point in flight, and burn itself out after about six seconds, after which the rocket probably would continue unsighted on the same course until its propulsive power was expended; when it would fall to earth or sea.

At the time, there were few people about in Rosehill Ave. which is a very quiet street. Neighbours opposite were in their garden and on verandah and naturally saw nothing, as their backs were turned to the line of flight of the missile. My house is on a corner, and is bounded by three streets - "Rosehill" to the east, "Dunbar" to the south and "Mitchell Rd" on the west. The only adjoining house is on my northern boundary and consists of two flats - one fronting "Rosehill" and on "Mitchell Rd". The latter is occupied by an elderly widow whom I know well and who is most reliable. On the morning of 17th Jan I met her passing my front gate and this conversation followed:- "Did you see anything remarkable in the sky last night?" I asked. "Yes" - (She then described what she had seen and it agreed with my observation. "Where were you?" "Just going in my front gate" - "Well, it disappeared from my view behind this tree - I was watching it from the verandah, I wish I had seen where it went". "You would not have seen anything - from my viewpoint it went out before it had passed beyond Dunbar Ave". "Just went out?" "Yes, disappeared as if you had blown out a candle". "Did you see anything fall from it?". "No, not a trace - it just disappeared".

She then added, very significantly, I think - "Colonel, I saw exactly the same thing in exactly the same place early last November. It was not quite so bright, probably because it was not so dark. I had a very good view of it, as I had just turned the corner from Mitchell Rd. into Dunbar Ave., when it flashed across". "Did you see any report in the papers the next day?" "No, but it was near Guy Fawkes Day and the kids were already sending up rockets. I think it was on the evening of the 4th Nov. I thought at first it was a big rocket but then realised it could not have been a rocket, as it was neither going up or down, but travelling straight across the sky - just like the one last night - you wouldn't call that a rocket would you?". "Well, certainly not a toy one", I replied.



It is desired to send reports of our sightings and information overseas dealing with the subject of U.F.O'S in Australia, does your Department offer any objections?

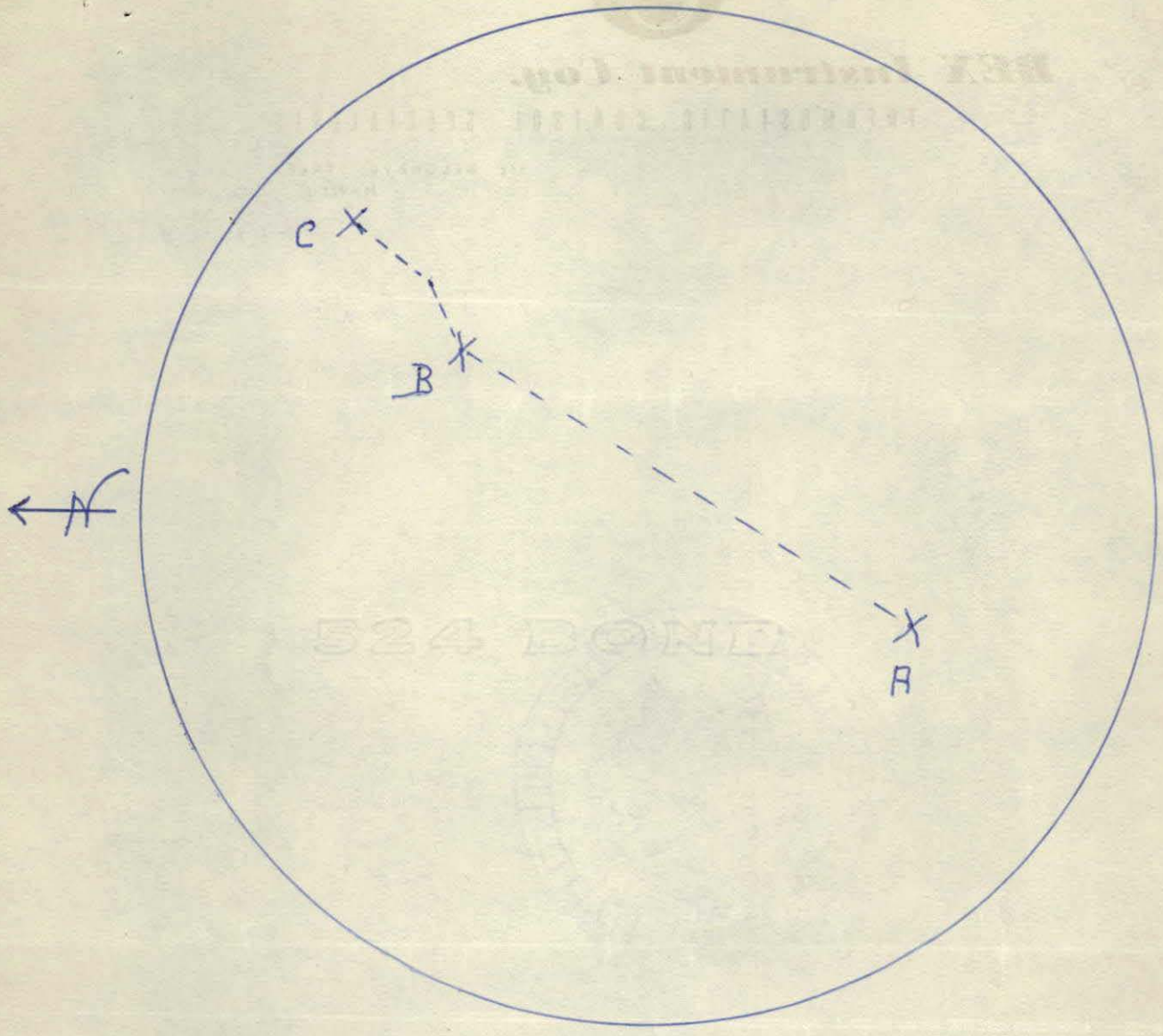

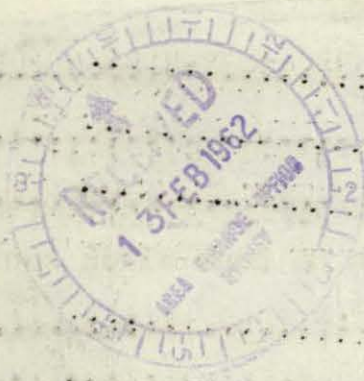

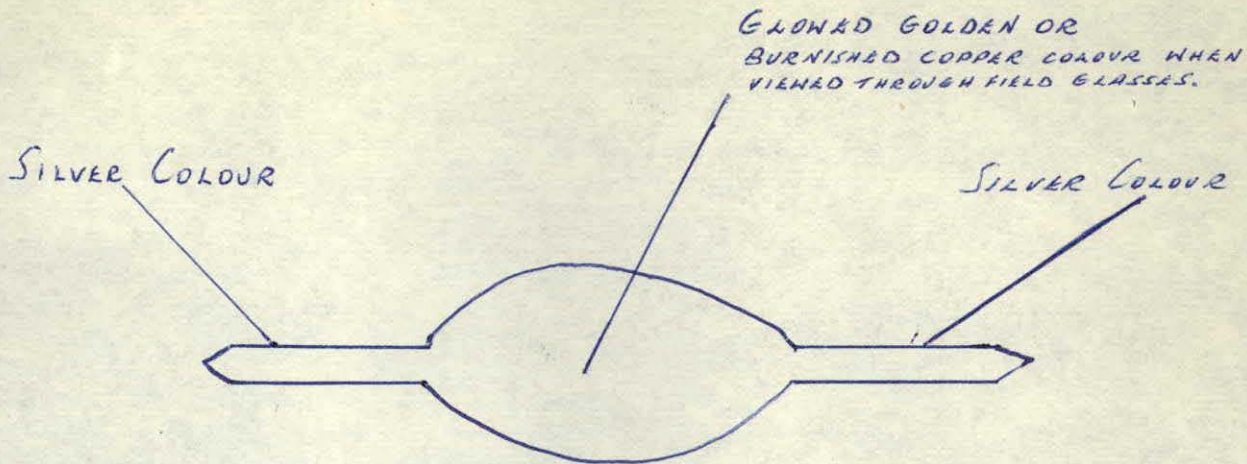

REPORT ON AERIAL OBJECT OBSERVED

1. It is advised, on the 8th January 1962, a pro-forma relating to a Report On Aerial Object Observed was received this Section from Mr. David Osborne MOORE, Instrument Maker, 15 Nargong Road, North Manly.
2. Mr. Moore was interviewed regarding the matter on the same date by the writer and A213055 Sgt Watson C.J., Service Policeman, of this Section. He verbally confirmed that which appeared on the attached form and details supplied on a rough sketch. It seems that on the morning of the 28th December 1961, the attention of Mr. Moore was drawn to an object in the sky which was emitting flashes of green and orange light.
3. The object was on a course heading North East to South West. It turned over the vicinity of Long Reef and headed in a new direction due North. Though it appeared spherical in shape Mr. Moore stated he could not make out any structural details. The object did not make any sound and though he could not make an estimate of speed declared it seemed far below the stalling rate of any aircraft. It travelled in a straight flight pattern at all times and was visible till he lost sight of it due to the glare of the early morning sun. He first sighted it at 0855 hours and lost contact at 0920 hours.
4. Mr. Moore was firm in his belief that the object was not an aircraft, or some type of optical illusion however he gave the impression of being fanatical on the subject. He was connected for a considerable period of time with an organisation known as Unidentified Flying Objects Investigation Centre, 180 North York St., Sydney. He has since ceased his association with them due to the fact that he considers he could carry out more practical and sincere observations alone. This he does at every available opportunity. He was also a member of Civilian Saucer Investigations, New Zealand.
5. The Commanding Officer of Control and Reporting Unit, RAAF Brookvale was contacted but stated the Unit was inoperative over the period in question as it was Christmas Stand-down. The Bureau of Meteorology stated that there are only rain recording centres in the area and the nearest weather station is situated at Mascot Airport. Inquiries were not conducted beyond this point.
6. Attached to this report are the pro-forma completed by Mr. Moore and a copy of a sketch by him concerning the sighting. Also attached is a sketch by the investigators detailing the area traversed by the alleged object.

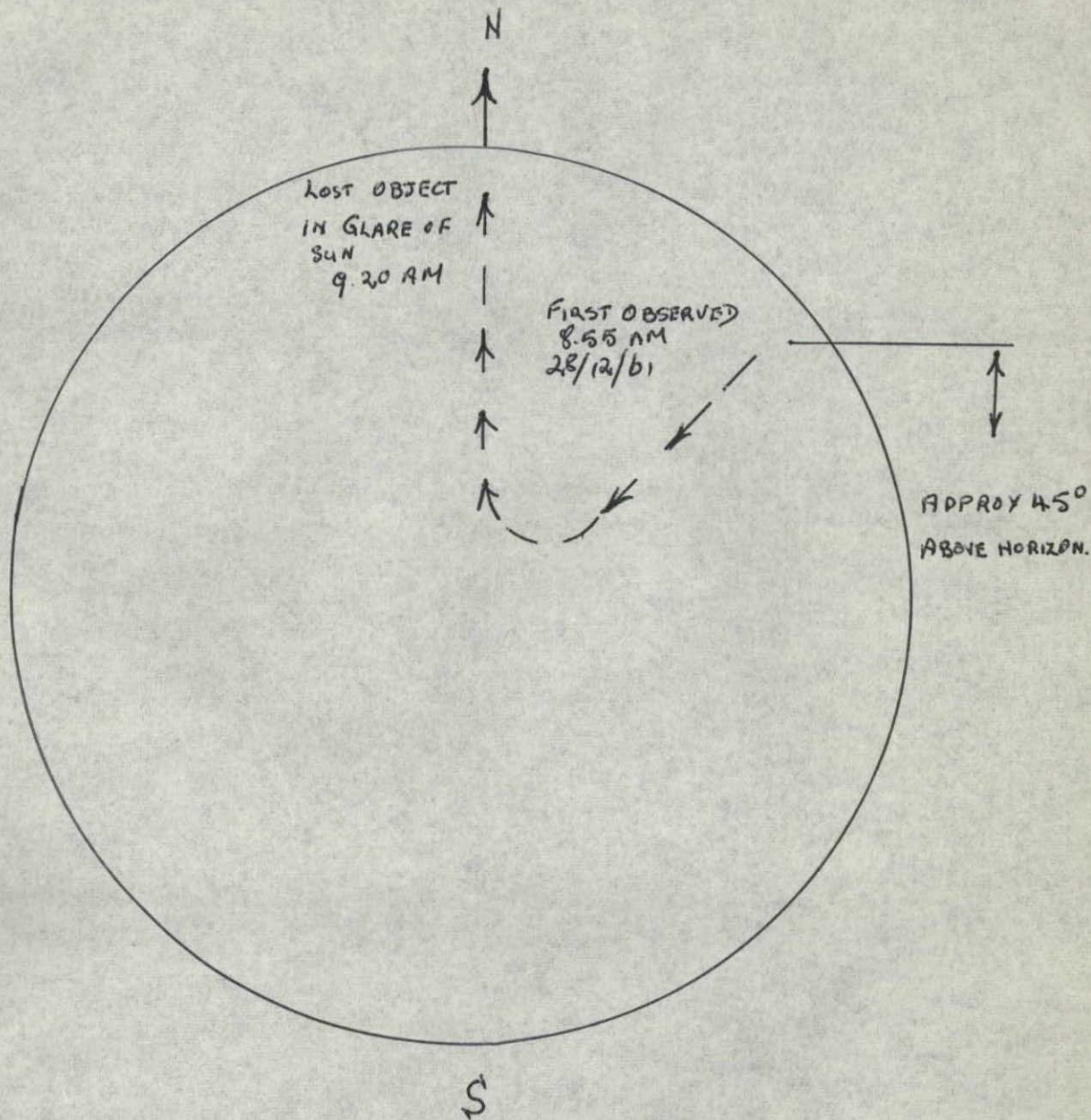

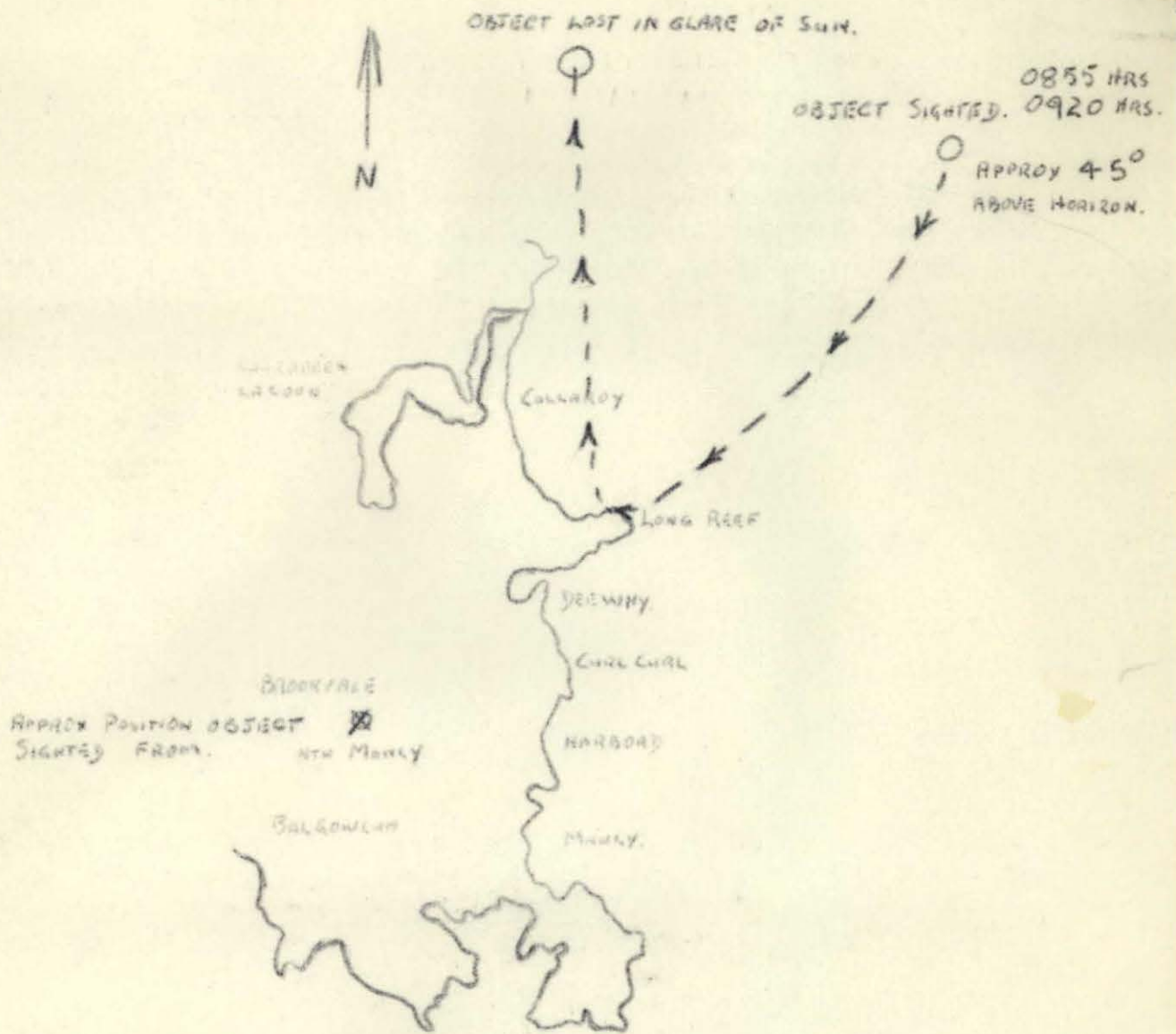

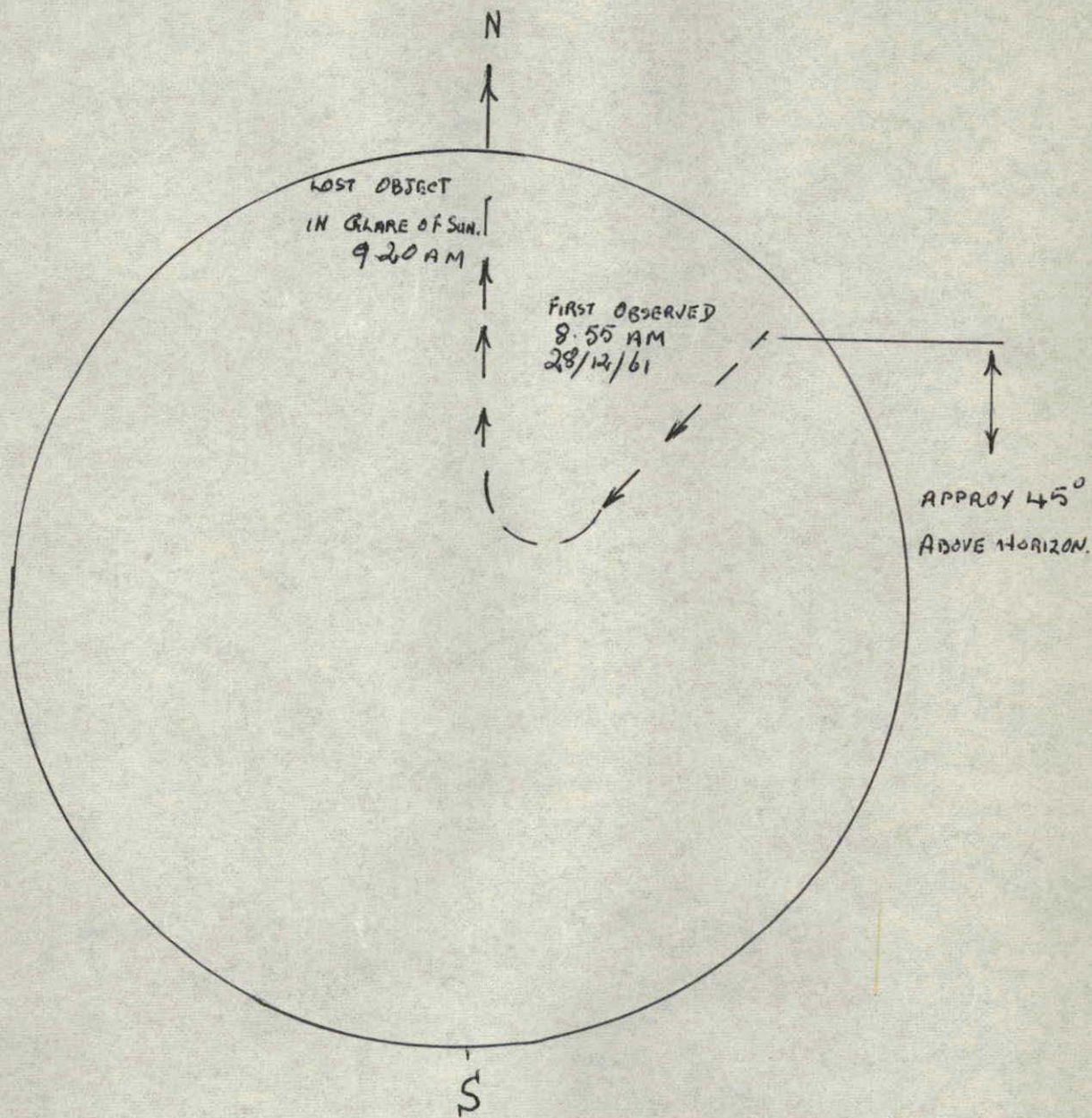

1. Herewith copies of the reports received from Civil Police at MEEKATHARRA. The reports add little to the information already to hand.
2. Mr SPIGEL the State Government Astronomer was interviewed and stated that there was no astronomical explanation for the apparent phenomena and it was not the usual characteristic of meteorites to travel in "trains", and when they did, noise and trails were mostly present.
3. The DCA official at MEEKATHARA reported no civil aircraft in the area and the RAAF were not operating over this territory.

States:-

I am a Shearing Contractor aged 37 years and am at present working at Mt. Hale Station which is situated about 70 miles west of Meekatharra.

My home address is 120 Princess Road, Claremont.

About 8.20 a.m. on the 5th August, 1961, Mr. John Lee-Steere of Mt. Hale Station came over to the shearing shed and asked me to have a look at two objects in the sky.

The objects were round in shape, bright silver, about 2 feet each in diameter, that is from ground level.

The objects appeared to be about 8 to 10,000 feet, possibly higher.

They were travelling at a fast speed and could be kept in sight for only about two minutes.

Their course appeared definite, no surface wind.

In all 12 objects were sighted, the last being about 9.15 a.m.

They appeared to be in pairs.

The objects gave off a white substance which took on various shapes whilst falling to the ground.

The white substance was followed and I managed to pick up some of the substance.

It was of snow white colour and appeared to be in a fine mesh. It crumbled very easily.

Apart from J. Lee-Steere the following persons saw the objects.

Rex McCausland, K. Bonshore, T. Sampey, D. Kennedy and Rick Donnelly.

The persons mentioned are shearers employed by me.

Some station hands also saw the objects.

I have to report that Edwin Charles PAYNE, Shearing Contractor of 120 Princess Road, Claremont, at present working at Mt. Hale Station, about 70 miles west of Meekatharra, called at the Police Station about 1 p.m. and reported that he and a number of other persons had seen 6 pairs of unusual objects in the sky that morning.

The objects were round in shape and appeared to be of bright silver metal, from ground level they appeared to be about 2 feet in diameter.

They had a definite course from North to South and travelling at a very fast speed.

Each pair of objects could be seen for about 2 minutes.

The first pair of objects were sighted about 8.20 a.m. and the last at about 9.15 a.m.

The objects appeared to be up between 8 and 10,000 feet high.

The objects gave off a white substance which was caught by Payne and Lee-Steere. The substance seemed like a fine mesh which crumbled very easily.

Mr. Payne stated that he would return to Mt. Hale and endeavour to find some of the white substance and preserve it by some means.

Dear Constable Coyle,

Regarding the U.F.O. sightings mentioned in my last letter I have heard on the A.B.C. News that the R.A.A.F. propose to investigate the case. If, and when they do so, and if you think it appropriate in all the circumstances at the time, would you be kind enough to bring to their notice my suggestions for a possible simple solution. You will appreciate, of course, that I have very little data to go on, but several points (if correctly reported) suggest the possibility of a rarely observed natural phenomena, and I feel that it may be helpful to put my observations forward now, rather than wait for further details.

First of all, the estimated height of 8,000 - 10,000 feet and the apparent speed of Sputnik I suggest to me that the observers could have been mistaken as to the height and velocity. It would seem to me, that although the objects appeared to be large and at a considerable height, they were possibly very small, quite close to the ground, and moving very slowly. Small, highly reflecting round objects, drifting along at about 200 ft. on a light breeze would have much the same appearance.

Secondly, it appears very unlikely that an object flying at the apparent reported speed would leave a trail of any kind, and even more unlikely that any such trail would drift DOWNWARDS intact from 10,000 ft. and yet be so transient as to disintegrate on touch.

Referring back to my first point, I have on a number of occasions observed a natural phenomena which seen in the correct light and direction, have the appearance of round, bright, high flying objects. On one occasion I confused one with the Planet Venus, at that time visible in daylight. Referring to my second point, this phenomena does display long trails which frequently drift to the ground. The phenomena I refer to are migrating spiders, sometimes called "balloon spiders". Their migrations appear to be fairly common, but very rarely observed, and owing to their being at the mercy of wind currents, they sometimes appear in the most unexpected places. They have been reported 600 miles out to sea, and last year appeared in the Central Highlands of Tasmania after probably coming from Western Victoria. Of course, it is not the spiders that are seen, but the balloon-like webs they spin, and if they have come long distances probably a number of webs will stick together. The appearance of such phenomena has been noted at various times down through the ages, and not being understood, has been given such names as "Virgin's Silk" falling from the skies. Assuming that my guess is correct, the webs could have come great distances. A check on recent wind circulation over the area would give a clue, especially if the air mass has come from an area where there is plenty of vegetation and rain has fallen recently. The spiders apparently have the habit of migrating soon after rain.

My experience has been that although large numbers of balloons and trailers may be passing overhead, only those in the correct light can be seen. I would guess that the observers were looking in a generally westerly direction, facing into the light breeze and of course with the sun at their backs, the objects would gradually become visible at about an angle of 30 degrees, and would disappear shortly after passing overhead. As the sun rose higher, they would all become invisible except when observed from a shadowed position.

In putting forward this theory I am of course well aware that it may not fit the facts of the case on the spot. However, I can vouch for the correctness of my facts, and put them forward in case they may be of assistance.



UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS IN CAIRNS AREA - NORTH QUEENSLAND

1. Forwarded herewith are press cuttings from the TOWNSVILLE DAILY BULLETIN and the BRISBANE COURIER MAIL, for the period 6th to 12th June 1961, referring to observations of unidentified flying objects and a report from Plt Off R. D. STEWART, the pilot of the Winjeel aircraft sent to the Millaa Millaa (1731S 14539E) area to investigate the report of an unidentified flying object seen in the area between 1300 and 1500 local time on 5th June 1961.
2. The late arrival of the Winjeel in the Millaa Millaa area was due to the aircraft being recalled from a cross country exercise in the Bowen area, refuelled and then despatched to the Millaa Millaa area.
3. Weather in the Cairns-Millaa Millaa area on the 5th June was:-

Cloudless
 Wind direction - south westerly at all levels
 speed - 0 - 10,000 feet 15-25 knots
 10 - 30,000 feet 25-40 knots
 30 - 40,000 feet up to 70 knots

There was at least one temperature inversion at about 6,000 feet. Although no upper air temperature readings are taken at Cairns, there were at least three inversions in the Townsville area -

- (a) approximately 3,000 feet 3° c. change
- (b) approximately 9-10,000 feet 1/2° c. change
- (c) approximately 21-23,000 feet - no thermal layer

Weather forecasters at Townsville believe that similar inversions could have existed in the Cairns-Millaa Millaa area at the time. The weather between 5th-12th June has been virtually unchanged.

4. One aircraft was operating in the area on 5th June, a Lockheed Hudson (VH-AGX) which is painted green with a white top. It was engaged in photo survey work at 22,500 feet. This aircraft plus another Lockheed Hudson coloured silver have been operating in the area during the week.
5. Attempts were made to photograph the object on 5th June, however results are unknown at present.
6. This information is forwarded for your information and further investigation if considered necessary.

INVESTIGATION OF REPORTED UFO AT
MILLAA-MILLAA ON MONDAY 5TH JUNE 1961

1. As pilot of Winjeel A85-444 I was ordered to investigate reports of an unidentified flying object seen over Millaa-Millaa on Monday 5 June.
2. I departed Townsville at 1515K flying at 5,000 feet direct for Millaa-Millaa, arriving there at 1620K.
3. Weather conditions during the flight up were very good - sky cloudless, visibility 50 miles.
4. Over Millaa-Millaa I climbed to 10,000 feet and orbited around the general area for 15 minutes and then departed at 1635 for Townsville.
5. No object resembling the reported UFO was seen during this time. Visibility was still about 50 miles but reduced to the west where the sun glare was very noticeable as it was sinking nearer the horizon. Towards the east there was a slight haze, possibly due to a slight inversion about 6,000 feet and accentuated by the sun lowering in the west. However visibility above was still very clear.
6. On the return flight to Townsville at 8,000 feet there was nothing seen. I landed at Townsville at 1730K and reported details of the flight to the OC.

Mystery "Cone In Sky" Seen Over Millaa Millaa

CAIRNS, June 5.—A cone-shaped object which remained stationary for a long period and then made rapid dashes across the sky was sighted over Millaa Millaa on the Atherton Tableland to-day.

The object was reported to the officer in charge of the Innisfail Police District (Inspector N. A. White) who informed the R.A.A.F. at Townsville.

A R.A.A.F. Winjeel arrived over Millaa Millaa at about 4.10 p.m.

The officer in charge of the Millaa Millaa police (Senior Constable W. Anderson) said the object appeared to the naked eye like a dull star, but viewed through binoculars turned to present a cone shape with half its surface coloured red.

HEARD ENGINE

Constable Anderson said he received the first report of the object from Minbun farmers, Walter and Arthur Bicheno, at 11.30 a.m. They told him they had heard a plane engine and had looked up to sight the object. They had not seen a plane, but had watched the object which remained stationary for about two hours.

Constable Anderson said he sighted the object about 12.55 o'clock. The sky was cloudless and through binoculars the object appeared to be a silver sphere about six inches across. As he watched, it turned slowly and became cone-shaped with half its length at the wider end of the cone coloured with what looked like red paint.

"At 1.23 o'clock it turned, moved slowly for a very short distance, and then accelerated at great speed moving to the east," Constable Anderson said. Its speed was too great to keep it in focus with the binoculars, but it could be seen plainly with the naked eye.

About 10 seconds after it moved off it was back in its original position about half way between directly overhead and the western horizon.

About 15 seconds later the object moved again, gathered speed slowly and shot away, this time to the south. It returned, moved away to the west, back again then to the north and returned.

Constable Anderson said the object finally moved slowly away to the west and was lost from sight in a haze on the western horizon at 2.50 p.m.

The object was seen clearly by the manager of the Bank of Australasia (Mr. E. D. Hall), the manager of the butter factory (Mr. A. S. Hanley) and the head teacher (Mr. T. Seary) and pupils of the Millaa Millaa State School.

Constable Anderson said he understood the plane engine heard by the Bicheno brothers was that of a mapping plane working over the Tablelands. No noise came from the unidentified object.

NOT BALLOONS

Cairns meteorological officers said to-night that they had sent normal weather balloons up to-day but the wind was in such a quarter that it would not be possible for them to appear over Millaa Millaa.

A R.A.A.F. spokesman said in Townsville that the pilot of the Winjeel did not sight any object over Millaa Millaa.

"Saucers" Seen In N.S. Wales

SYDNEY, June 5.—Four men working on a sheep station to-day claimed they had seen "saucer shaped objects darting out from a glowing sphere" in the sky.

They said they had seen the objects last Wednesday and at first decided to tell no one.

The four men were with a party of eight working in a back paddock on Toompang property, five miles west of Young, south-west New South Wales.

One of the men, Mr. James Hobson, station hand of Moppoty Road, Young, said at least five of the men watched the objects for two hours.

"It was a long way off and looked the size of a tennis ball," he said.

"It was hanging perfectly stationary and at first we thought it was a star. Then we saw these saucer shaped things darting out from the sphere.

"They would leave the sphere, slowly gather speed, shoot out and then return. One would shoot out from the right and then one from the left. They shimmered in the sunlight as if spinning."

Mr. Neville Sheahan, station hand, said six of the eight men had seen the objects.

WHAT WAS in the SKY?

60 Saw The Thing

MILLAA MILLAA.—Sixty people watched The Thing—a silver and red sphere—high in the sky over Millaa Millaa for three and a half hours yesterday.

Millaa Millaa is on the Atherton Tableland 45 miles west of Innisfail.

It wasn't a satellite, said the watchers, and it wasn't an Air Force air craft, said the R.A.A.F.

It wasn't a weather balloon, said the Weather Bureau.

It may have been Venus, said the Astronomical Society.

The R.A.A.F. base at Townsville sent a trainer aircraft to have a look, but The Thing had disappeared by then.

The first report of The Thing came from two farmers, Walter and Arthur Bicheno, seven miles from Millaa Millaa.

Phoned police

They heard a plane engine and looked up to see an object hanging in the sky midway between the horizon and the zenith.

They watched it remain stationary until 12.55 p.m., when they telephoned Senior-Constable W. Anderson at Millaa Millaa.

Constable Anderson said last night: "Through binoculars it looked like a silver sphere, about six inches across, and it turned to become cone-shaped, with half its length, at the narrow end, a red colour.

"At 1.23 p.m. it started to move slowly away and suddenly accelerated right across the sky to the east, directly overhead.

"I have seen satellites cross the sky, but this moved four times as fast; when I looked again it was back in its previous position."

All saw It

By this time the constable had been joined by a crowd of 15 or 20 people, including the manager of the Bank of Australasia (Mr. E. D. Ball), the butter factory manager (Mr. A. S. Hanley), and State school-teacher, Mr. T. Seary.

Someone used a compass, and said the bearing was 280 degrees north.

There was no cloud, and the sun was shining.

Constable Anderson said that the object flashed across the sky three or four times during the next two hours, always returning to the original position, and most of the witnesses watched it through binoculars. They included 40 schoolchildren.

Constable Anderson said that The Thing moved away to the west and finally sank quickly out of sight on the horizon at 2.50 p.m.

At Garbutt R.A.A.F. base, prompted by reports from Constable Anderson and Inspector N. A. White at Innisfail, the operations office sent up a Winjeel trainer to investigate.

The Department of Civil Aviation said there were no planes in the area except a mapping plane at 25,000ft., which left the area at 1.30 p.m.

Venus?

The Astronomical Society's Queensland secretary (Mr. W. J. Newell) said: "It sounds to me very like Venus. At this time, Venus' position in relation to the Sun makes it clearly visible in the daytime.

"I suggest they be watching in the same direction at the same time today."

He attributed the object's movement to "imagination."

The secretary of the Queensland Flying Saucer Research Bureau (Mr. Gordon Jamieson) said it was by far the best sighting ever made in Queensland and one of the best in the world this year.

"We will send our Townsville observer, Mr. D. Whiteside, to the town to tape-record the evidence of witnesses."

"Things" sighted again

REPORTS of flying "things" came in from five Queensland districts yesterday, following the sighting of an object at Millaa Millaa on Monday.

But observers in two of the areas believe they were watching the planet Venus, as a Brisbane astronomer said on Monday night.

The main observer of the original Millaa Millaa "thing" (Senior Constable W. R. Anderson) yesterday watched a similar object, stationary in the sky, and finally said he thought it was Venus.

Other reports came in from Gordonvale, Ipswich, Innisfail, and Brisbane.

At Gordonvale a party of surveyors took theodolite sightings on a bright silver object, one-sixth the size of the moon and travelling fast towards the east.

Telescope

At Innisfail a group of almost 20 police and courthouse staff used a telescope and binoculars for more than two hours on a "spherical object" in the western sky.

Said one policeman: "I suppose it could be Venus, mainly because there's no other explanation; but I can assure you half the town will be out looking for it tomorrow."

Mr. F. B. Reeve, of Ipswich, said yesterday that on May 25 his wife and a friend saw an object, like a long white plastic balloon, whip across the sky near his home from south-east to north-west, without making a sound.

Dull red

On Sunday night, about midnight, 20 T.A.A. employees saw a dull red object "about five times the size of a star" in the western sky.

Astronomers said that Venus was probably responsible for the sightings, because at times it did have a reddish colour.

Venus, slightly smaller than Earth, is the brightest planet, and is 67 million miles from the sun.

Flying Object Besides Venus Seen In Cairns

CAIRNS, June 7.—From a telescope set up in Grafton Street, Cairns, many people at 11 a.m. to-day saw another flying object other than the planet Venus.

Mrs. N. A. Wales, of Martyn Street, told of having seen a glowing red oval shaped body with shining white triangular fins, pass across the face of Venus. The object travelled quite quickly, and then hovered for a while at its nearest point.

Mrs. Wales said it seemed to be about six times as large as the planet.

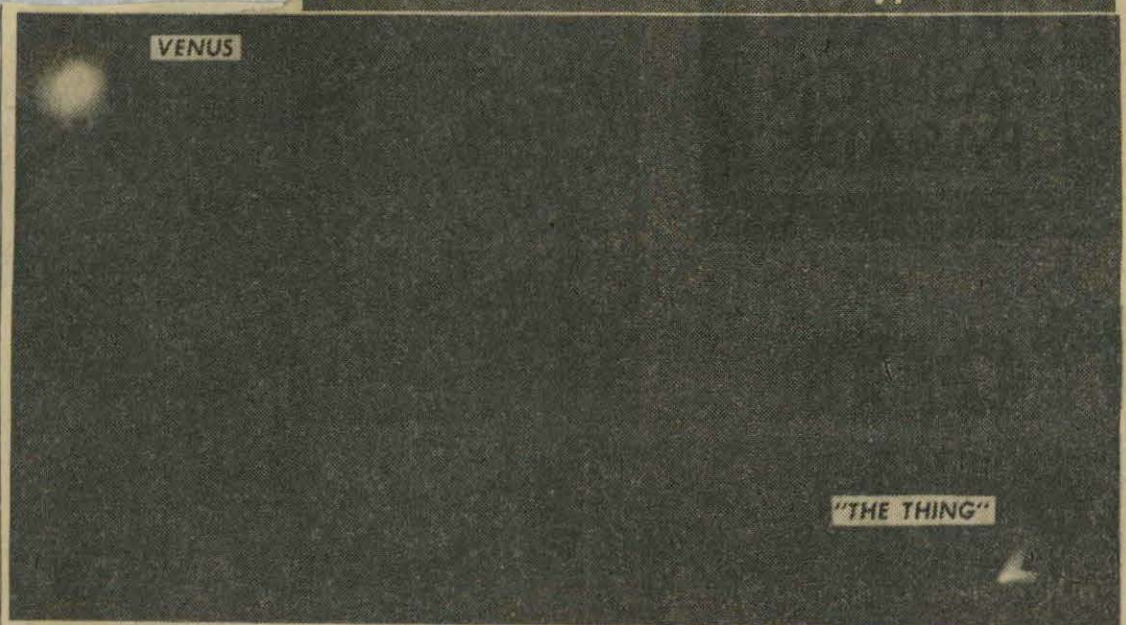
Mrs. Wales was one of a party of five who had been watching Venus, and all members of the group gave descriptions agreeing with that given by Mrs. Wales.

Shortly after the sighting a "Cairns Post" employee, Mr. R. Shepard, took a photograph through the telescope, and obtained a film which showed a smaller cone-shaped object low down and to the right of Venus.

During the lunch break several other people with Mr. S. Simpson, owner of the four-inch telescope, reported having seen a flying object similar to the one described earlier, which appeared to come from the bright spot of Venus. The object was clearly visible to the naked eye.

"THE THING," an unidentified object observed in the sky at Cairns at 11.30 a.m. on Wednesday, is shown in this untouched photograph, taken by Mr. J. Sheward through a 4in. telescope.

"The thing" is shown in relation to the planet Venus.

Five people who earlier observed the object through the telescope described it as "an oval-shaped body glowing bright red, with three shining white triangular fins."

They kept it under observation for about 20 minutes, and said that at times it appeared to be about six times larger than Venus.

Several people also saw "The Thing" with the naked eye.

The photograph was taken with 5 x 4in. super Graphic camera, at an exposure of 1/60th sec. An orange filter was used to heighten the contrast in the sky.

PHOTOGRAPH REVEALS VENUS AND AN OBJECT

Grave Scientific Study

BRISBANE, July 11.—A Cairns photograph last Wednesday shows Venus and an object to the right of the planet.

The negative of the photograph of "the thing" arrived in Brisbane today and touched off discussion ranging from take-me-to-your-leader jokes to serious scientific and photographic study.

The photograph, taken in Cairns on Wednesday morning, shows the planet Venus and what appears to be a cone-shaped unidentified flying object to the right of the planet.

It was taken through a four-inch telescope owned by Mr. S. Simpson, by Mr. R. Sheward of the "Cairns Post" Pty. Ltd.

A number of Brisbane Press photographers said there was definitely an object there.

Not Scratch

It was not a scratch nor a fault.

The Secretary of the Queensland Astronomical Society (Mr. W. Neell) said he felt the negative should be submitted for further examination by photography experts, the C.S.I.R.O., government analysts, the Mt. Stromlo observatory in Canberra and even the C.I.B.

He said he suspected it was caused by a fault in the film

or that the telescope was out of alignment or some other cause.

"Venus does not look like Venus at all. It should look like the moon at the first or last quarter," he said.

Queer Signals

LONDON, June 11 (A.A.P. - Reuter). Mystery signals from space were heard at Jordrell Bank yesterday during a search by two leading Soviet scientists and two British radio astronomers for the lost Soviet rocket to Venus.

The signals were received on the giant radio telescope by Professor Anna Masewitch, head of the Soviet space tracking network, her colleague, Dr. Khadarev and British experts Sir Bernard Lovell and Dr. J. G. Davies.

They were similar to others heard by Sir Bernard and Dr. Davies on May 17, when the Soviet rocket, after three months of silence, was due near Venus.

'AIR FORCE WHITEWASH REPORTS OF SKY OBJECTS'

THE AIR FORCE was trying to whitewash his report of flying objects in the sky above Cressy in October, the Rev. Lionel Browning said yesterday.

"If I was asked to keep quiet in the interests of national security I would, but if the air force is trying to make me appear a fool in order to hush the matter up, it is sheer stupidity."

"The report makes it obvious that the air force has something to hide," he said.

Mr. Browning was commenting on an air force intelligence report of an investigation into the sighting of flying objects above Cressy about 6 p.m. on October 4, 1960.

The report said that the sightings were "phenomena as a result of a moon rise associated with meteorological conditions at the time."

Mr. Browning said: "The report is an attempt to completely whitewash the matter. I shall attempt to do something about it."

He had reliable people to back his report and the air force knew the people and their stories.

"A woman and her daughter saw a cigar-shaped object flying about 300ft. above the ground about 4.30 p.m. 10 days after I saw the flying objects."

"It was not reported in the Press because the family did not want the publicity, but the air force investigators spent considerable time with the woman and her daughter."

Mr. Browning said that the woman and her daughter had to re-enact the sighting for investigators.

After the investigation the woman and daughter were told not to talk about what they had seen, he said.

"And they were told of a similar strange sighting in the U.S. last year when three jets were sent up to investigate and the strange craft disappeared as if into thin air," he said.

'Covering up'

Mr. Browning said that the sighting by the woman and daughter backed up his story.

"Obviously the air force is covering up, otherwise the investigators would not have impressed on the woman and daughter not to say anything," he said.

Mr. Browning described the air force explanation of his sightings as ridiculous.

The Directorate of Air Force Intelligence report said, "On October 4, 1960, moon rise (full

quarter) at Cressy would have been visible shortly after 6 p.m. on an east-south-east direction.

"Objects apparently seen were near the skyline in an easterly direction. The presence of scud type cloud moving in varying directions because of turbulence in and around a rain squall near which the objects were sighted and the position of the moon or its reflections produced the impression of flying objects."

Mr. Browning said that the investigators had spent 1 1/2 hours with him and not once asked about clouds.

He said that the explanation did not hold up.

"At no time was there cloud or scud when I saw the objects," he said. "The mountain was not the backdrop to what I saw."

"The rain cleared in front of us although it was still raining near the mountains. I saw the objects in the sky where there was no rain and the rain near the mountains provided the backdrop."

Mr. Browning dismissed the air force's report of the moon or its reflections being the cause of the sightings.

"The moon was not above the mountains and any reflections would have had to complete with a glorious sunset."

"It was the sunset which caused me to look out the window in the first place," he said.

Contradictory

Mr. Browning said that the report contradicted a letter written to Mr. Duthie, M.H.R., in answer to a question asked in Parliament by Mr. Duthie.

The letter, written by the Minister for Air (Mr. Osborne), said that when natural phenomena could not explain sightings, an investigation was ordered.

"Why then did they investigate my report?" Mr. Browning asked.

He said that he would try to carry the matter further.

There was little he could do except point out the fallacies in the report.

He said that the Unidentified Flying Objects Society of Victoria was interested in the case.

The president (Mr. Peter Norris) had interviewed the woman and her daughter and himself, he said.

Mr. Browning's report of the flying objects caused a sensation last year. His wife also

reported seeing a cigar-shaped flying object and five or six saucer-shaped objects.

At the time he said that until the sighting he had been sceptical about flying object reports.

Mr. and Mrs. Browning watched the "mother ship" and its "attendants" for some minutes before they disappeared in a rain squall.



I wish to report a puzzling sequence of sightings of an orange red coloured light in the sky, North of Kerang. We first saw this light at 9.10. P.M. on the 18 January. On this occasion the light was at an approx. elevation of 30° and fell rapidly to tree top level where it remained while we sat & watched. When we drove toward it, it immediately moved down behind a line of timber, when we turned and drove away the light raced out to one side & paced our ears for several miles before disappearing. On this occasion the light was visible for 40 minutes. My wife & I have since seen this light a number of times, once so close to our house that the dogs raced out barking at it. A number of Kerang residents have now seen this light and we are intensely curious. A feature of this is the complete absence of noise & the impression the light

gives of being under control at all times

It is capable of stopping & starting and travelling at any speed in any direction, or rather it appears to be capable of it.

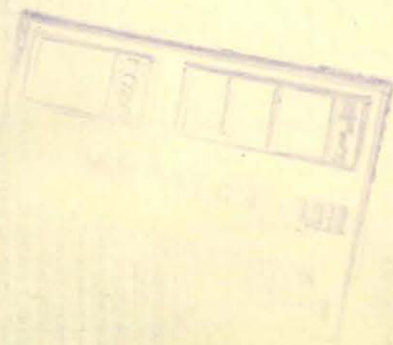
