travelling south of west and then due west, at speed
about 60 MPH.

Twice last year we picked up discs between us and
the moon distance and speed unknown.

For your information we have here a first class
24" reflecting telescope and a great deal of appli-
ances. But unfortunately we were some distance from
our instruments at the time.

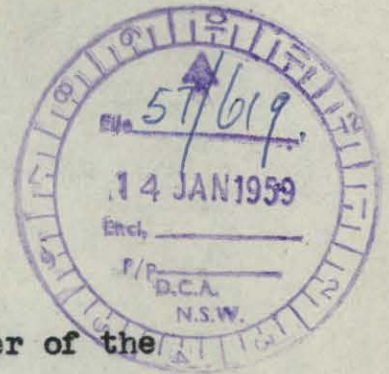

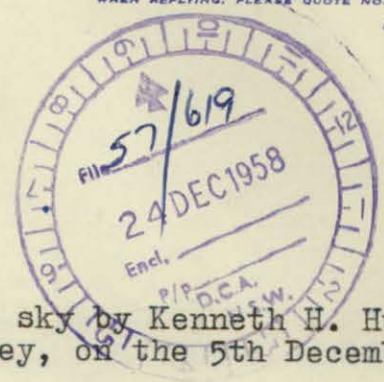

SUBJECT: Strange object seen by Kenneth H. Hudson of Glenrock via Kempsey on 5/12/58, thought to land near Kempsey.

REFERENCE: Attached statement and rough plan.

I have to report that at about 5 pm on the 5th December, 1958, Kenneth Hugh Hudson, of Glenrock Plains, via Kempsey, reported at this Station that he and his wife were standing near their car painting it at about 11 am on that date, when they heard a noise like a Jet aeroplane. Mrs. Hudson said to her husband, "Look at that thing", he looked in the direction she was pointing and saw a strange object about 3 feet long and about 2'6" in width travelling in a South-east direction at a very high speed.

When questioned about what he saw, he informed me that it would have come from a North-west direction and was coming down at about 45 degree angle towards the MacLeay River, and is believed by him to have landed in the river on the East side. When asked if he saw any splash of water he replied that he did not, but saw a great number of birds of different types fly from the river as though they had been startled by something, and that they flew from where he thought the object would land.

Mr. Hudson said that there was an embankment blocking their view of the river between their home and the river, but he felt sure that it would land in the river on the angle it was travelling.

To further questions, he stated that they were painting their car at the rear of the house when they heard the noise and his wife said to him, "Look at that thing going". He then looked up and saw a strange object about 3 feet long and 2 feet 6 inches wide travelling at high speed, it was making a noise like a Jet aeroplane and had disc objects on the end of the cross member which appeared at a glance like an axle. The discs were a dark colour and the inner part of the object was a lighter colour, he said that this colour could have been caused by the angle of the sun on it, but he felt sure that it was a metal and man-made object.

From inquiries made it was heard by at least two people from different angles and by myself at Frederickton but was only sighted by the Hudsons.

Perhaps under the circumstances this report and the attached Statement and rough plan could be forwarded to the Department of Aviation for their information and any action thought necessary by them.

Kenneth Hugh Hudson states:-

I am a married man and I reside with my wife and family on my farm at Glenrock, via Kempsey.

At about 11 am on Friday the 5th December, 1958, my wife and I were standing at the back of our home painting our car and my wife said to me "That sounds like another Jet going over," we both looked about to see if we could see it, when my wife said: "Look at that thing going", and at the same time, pointed towards something travelling at a very fast speed and making a noise just like a Jet plane. We saw the object for about 3 to 4 seconds, it then disappeared towards the river. We cannot see the river from where we were standing but it was coming down on about a 45 degree angle and appeared as though it would go into the river on the East side. There was a lot of birds in the river at the time and they all took to the air as though they had been frightened by something. I did not have time to get a good look at the shape and colour, but it looked about 3 feet long and about 2 feet 6 inches wide, on the end of the cross-piece were two disc shape objects about the size of a small dinner plate and a few inches of the cross-piece protruding past them. The disc shape things appeared to be a darkish colour and the inside a lighter colour. I would say that by the speed it was travelling it would have to be a metal object as I don't think any bird could travel that fast and live. I cannot remember seeing or hearing any other planes in the area at that time or before. The object came from a North-west direction and it was travelling faster than any Jet I have seen flying.

The reason why I reported the matter is that it may be of some importance to the authorities, and the fact that an object like that coming down in a populated area as it would only be about one mile from the township of Kempsey where it appears to come down. I could not say any more about the shape and colour as I did not have time to work it out.

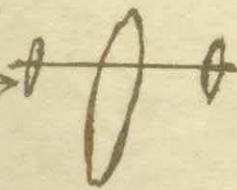

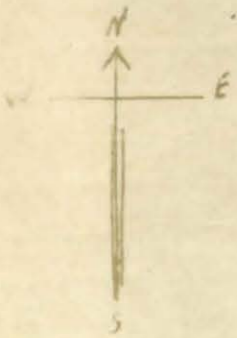

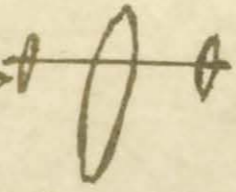

Dear Sir,

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter dated 17th January, 1958, in which you refer to an object which you saw pass over your property on that morning.

At first, it was thought that your explanation of a small cloud might have been the correct one but, on referring the matter to the Weather people at Mascot, it was ascertained that the upper winds on that day, up to 10,000 feet, in your area, were forecast as being easterly. In this case the object seen by you would not have moving into the east unless it was higher than, say, 10,000 feet, where the winds were anticipated as having been from approximately W.S.W.

The Weather officers could not agree, from your description, that the object would have been a small, vertical cloud.


On looking at the map, it was noted that there are mines and a quarry shown about 10 miles to the west of Kadungle. It was therefore thought that, if these are still in operation, the object could have been the smoke and dust from a shot drifting across your property. However if the winds were from an easterly direction as anticipated, this possibility is also cancelled.

This Department would have no knowledge of any R.A.A.F. aircraft which might have been flying in the vicinity, and, in fact, would have no information on civil aircraft because the area in that part of the State is uncontrolled so far as aircraft movements are concerned.

It is therefore regretted that we cannot satisfy your curiosity in this matter.

Dear Sir,

My curiosity has been aroused by an object which flew, or at least passed, over my property this morning at somewhere about 11 a.m. Travelling in an easterly direction, and it occurred to me that your Department may possibly be interested, or alternatively that you may be good enough to satisfy my curiosity by explaining what the object was.

The details are somewhat as follows. My wife, while working indoors, heard what she thought to be a jet plane flying at a great height, only perhaps a little louder than one would expect. On going outside to investigate she was startled to see what she described as a long thin silvery object, standing almost vertically, and moving slowly eastward. The height, from her description, would in my opinion be round about 3000 ft. or less.

Being alone at the time, and wishing to draw attention to the object, my wife phoned the Trundle telephone exchange and gave the direction in which it was moving, then walked about $\frac{1}{3}$ of a mile to where I was working. By this time, when I first saw the object, it had travelled a considerable distance and although I could still see it quite easily it was somewhat indistinct. My impression from the distance (as a guess I would say about three miles) would support my wife's description, though if it had not been moving I could have mistaken it for a small white strip of cloud standing vertically.

From the above it is obvious that the rate of travel was too slow for most aircraft, and the likelihood of a rocket cruising along as this object appeared to do, particularly in this locality, seems most unlikely to me.

Unfortunately my wife could not recall whether there was a jet of gas from the object, though she was sure of the noise coming from it, and was also sure there was no sign of a vapor trail, and I could vouch for this, as the visibility was quite good at the time.

As an object such as this usually leads to a lot of conjecture and argument I would be very obliged if you could enlighten me on the

matter, if within the scope of your Department.

Some of the possibilities that occurred to me were that a high flying aircraft may have been towing a target, or that an experimental rocket could have gone astray, but the slow speed would, I think, eliminate the former, apart from the fact that we should have heard or seen the aircraft, while a rocket would require a good fuel supply, as well as a remarkable control system to maintain such a flight.

However, I trust that my inquiry will not be a nuisance, and await your reply with interest.

Dear Sir,

I would be pleased if you could assist me in identifying a glow which I observed on the night of Wednesday June 12th at approximately 9.30 p.m.

At the time I was on a Western Terandah, with my back to the West & a blueish glow appeared, as if a flash of lightning had struck. The light was not in fact a flash but seemed to slowly spread & then was gone. There was no sound, the night was still, light high cloud, on further inspection no unusual features were noticed. Since the occurrence further evidence has come forward from a grazier 36 miles South of here & he saw what seemed to be a white flash at

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about the same time, he says between 9.30 & 10 p.m. Also 2 men working a tanking plant on that property say they heard two bangs in the night at that time & this was also heard by a rabbit in that vicinity. Our homestead is situated 5.7 miles from Wilcanua and 2 miles Sth. of the Barrier Highway.

I understand that a jet aircraft could be the explanation but as the light was apparently fairly low surely same sound would be heard?

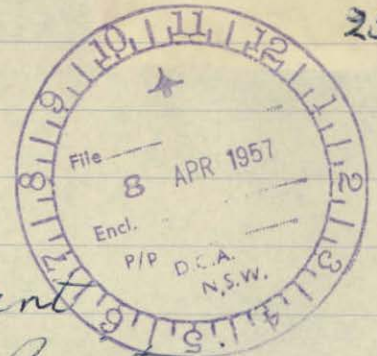

another plane flying over, I was trying to save my garden.
It was the terrific roar which first attracted
my attention, like about 4 jets.
I searched the sky for about 3 to 5 minutes & was
just giving up when very high in the sky
it came out well away above the clouds.

It appeared as a twelve foot column. (snow white), no dark object whatsoever was visible. & it left no trace of smoke or vapour: (nothing) just the tall white column in the clear blue (~~sky~~) very high in the sky above the clouds.

The nearest I can describe the terrific roar was like a huge flame coming out a chimney or a large oil pipe on fire, about as much noise as 4 jets would make.

I felt the need of witnesses & ran across the St, but the 2 neighbours were both out, I then ran back & called my next door neighbour Mrs Molloy, whom I knew to be resting as she was ill, but I just had to have someone see such a phenomenon.

We both stood & watched ^{it} disappear rather slowly, taking about $\frac{1}{4}$ of hr from the time I first heard it, to pass out of sight, in the distance.

It was apparently propelled from underneath up through some kind of flat object.

I feel sure it was a flying Saucer.

Has anyone else reported it?

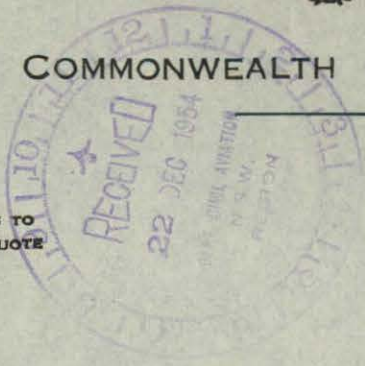

Reference your telegram NPS984 dated 8/11/54, and previous correspondence subject as above.

I have telephoned Mena Murtee Station, but was unable to speak to Mr. Keith Weston and Mrs. Weston, mother of Keith Weston spoke.

Mrs. Weston stated, "ask your Department to drop the matter, as it is a faked snapshot which was taken to have a joke with someone in Wilcannia and the matter has gone too far. Asked about the negatives Mrs. Weston again asked that the matter be dropped.

I telephoned Mr. Porter, Wilcannia, and Mr. Porter stated that he had heard that Keith Weston had admitted that the object was only a wheel cap suspended by cotton.

In view of the above I have taken no further action in the matter.



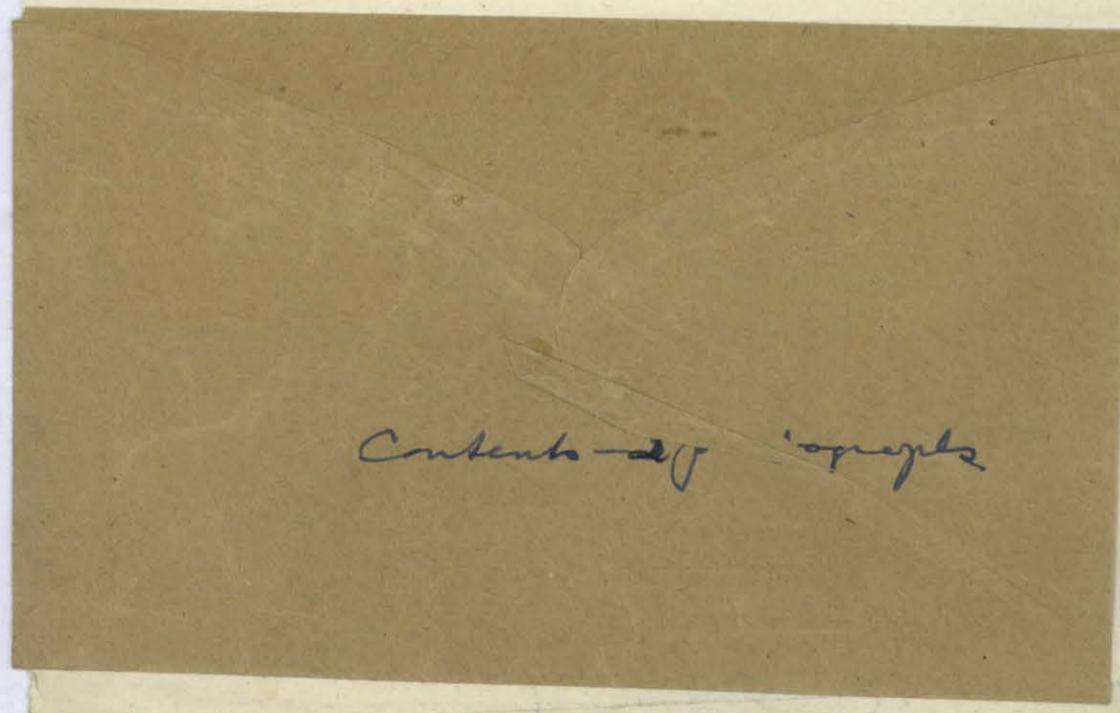

To Whom it May Concern

This is to certify that at approx. 10.20 pm on 28/7/54, I saw in the eastern sky, 10° Sth of E what could best be described as a meteor-like rocket object travelling vertically at a fantastic speed which would be impossible to estimate but which you may calculate when I supply all the known data.

The actual "object" (I think projectile would be a better word) was not seen any more than a rocket is seen when fired into the air at night. What I saw was a yellowish incandescent light which must have been generated by the colossal speed of the unknown object.

My attention was attracted to the eastern sky by a glow around me. (I was returning from a Parents and Citizens' meeting at the school). Looking

up I saw the brilliant light hanging in the air like a gigantic ribbon which became longer and narrower as it approached the upper atmosphere

At approx. 60° above the horizon the light gradually changed direction and formed a parabolical curve and ^{as a point of light} slowly vanished into infinity

Meanwhile the glow left behind diminished and gradually faded away leaving behind a wispy trail of vapour the entire length of the circuit

The object disappeared or rather the final infinitesimal point of light disappeared into outer space in about 7 seconds, but the wispy veil of vapour remained, gradually disintegrated and disappeared in about 6 minutes.

It was interesting to note that a passenger plane had just passed over Coff's Harbour aerodrome travelling N. Its speed and size appeared infinitesimal to the speed & size of the mysterious light.

Had the object been travelling in any other direction than upward I would have dismissed the phenomenon as an enormous meteor. I have seen hundreds of meteors falling (being a keen night fisherman for over 25 years) but I have never yet seen a meteor ^{travelling} fall upwards.

The width of the light would be about $1\frac{1}{2}$ times the ~~width~~ ^{diameter} of the full moon as it appears in the sky. Length could only be estimated in degrees and of course the actual length would be governed by the distance it was remote from Boambell.

The light, clear cut as in the drawing commenced, as shown approx 25° above horizon continued for 15° where there was a break of about 5° , after the break the light gradually narrowed continued for a further 20° when it changed direction as mentioned earlier in this statement.

The pin point of light disappeared about 10° from the zenith.

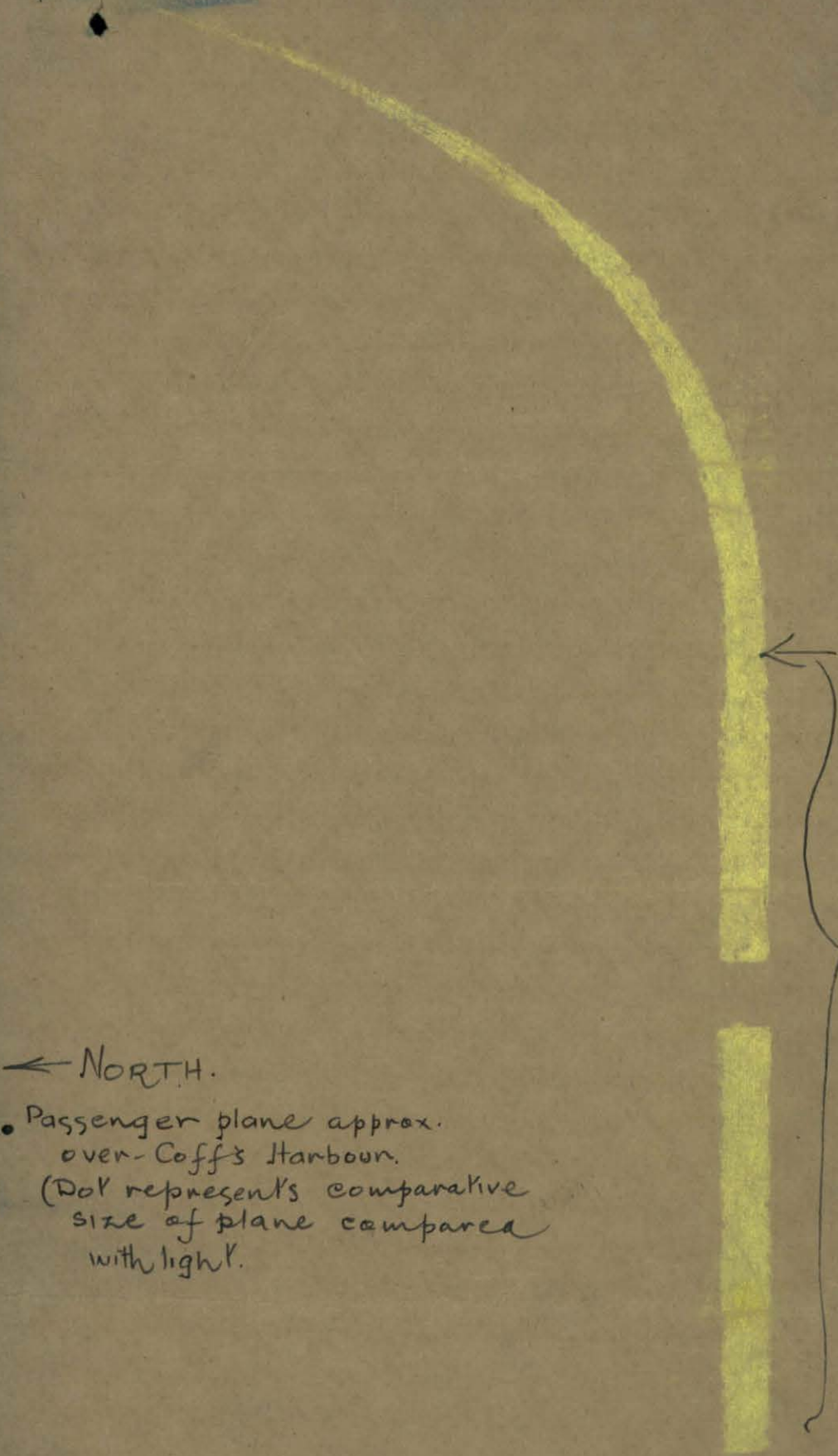

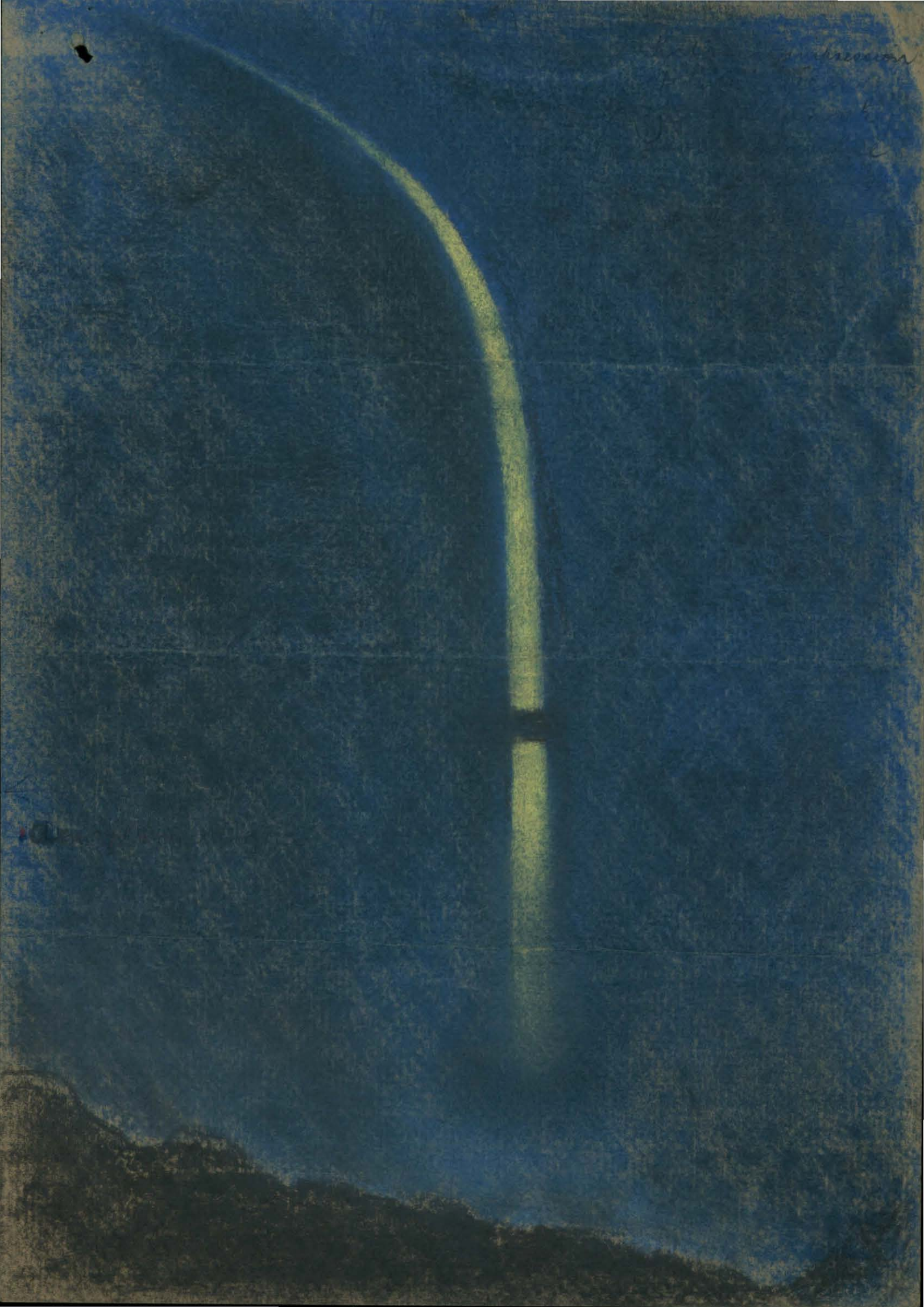

At approximately 3:45 p.m. on June 15th, my Mother and I saw a bright light in the sky in a northerly direction.

Our first impression was that the sun was shining on something metallic. This impression was strengthened by the fact that the slightest cloud obscured it completely, it didn't shine through dimly as one would expect a light to do.

Lighting it against a mark on the window we discovered that it did not move at all in the time we watched it.

It "twinkled" and shimmered as a star, but it was larger and brighter than any star I have seen.

After about ten minutes observation a large mass of cloud hid it from view and we have not seen it since that time.

Dear Sir,

I have just read an article in the Daily Telegraph, which states that you wish reports on mysterious lights etc. over Sydney, so I am writing to you as to what I saw on Monday night the 14th June 1954 at approx. 7.45 and 8.00 P.M.

Between those times I was in Ernis Road, Milson Point, North Sydney, standing on the kerb of the footpath on the Western side, facing the Kirribilli Hotel, which would put me facing, I think, practically E.N.EAST., I looked up and saw a circular patch of light, which would never have made me take a second look, but for the fact that it was a peculiar shade of red that then changed to white and then faded.

near ~~ought~~ to it, also slightly to my left, and through the circle of light I saw the moon, which was shining through a small ^{aperture} ~~aperture~~ in a cloud bank pretty high up, and ~~the~~ the moon light was shining on a thin cloud layer very low down, which was moving pretty fast towards the sea.

Well, that's what I saw and forgot about, until the next day ~~is~~ the Paper published some reports on mysterious lights above Sydney, which now makes me wonder if the moon was really in the position I saw it, so I will leave ~~it~~ that to you.

You may have some information approx. winter last year, about "flying saucers" seen by men in North Sydney on a Sunday. The Daily Telegraph next day reported that two men, one in Northbridge and the other in St Leonards saw one, well my son, when five years old, drew my ~~etc~~ attention to it, as we were lying flat on our backs on the grass under a cloudless sky, when the youngster said "Look Daddy, a jet" and sure enough there was one

Tree.

which looked about a quarter of an inch across the wing span, being so high up, when it banked ~~to~~ the West, - it was flying in a southerly direction - anyway it swung off course and it shone like a diamond for a few seconds, looking like a "flying saucer" then it disappeared.

STRANGE LIGHTS

The R.A.A.F. Public Relations Officer has advised me to report to you a strange light that I, my wife and two sons saw last night.

I am chief reporter for the "Sun-Herald" newspaper and live at 24 Wilson St., Mareubra, which is on the northern slope of the headland that juts out from Lurline Bay.

At about 1825 hrs (6.25 pm) on 14 June '53 I was returning home with my family in my car - my wife sitting with me in the front and two boys (one 7 and one 5) in the back.

I was driving slowly down Wilson St. preparatory to turning into my gate, when ahead of us over the sea I saw a pair of lights moving slowly in a half circle parallel with the sea.

My wife saw the lights at the same time and drew the attention of the two boys.

I could not say whether the lights were coming towards us or moving away from us, but they they performed this horizontal arc and then disappeared. /

I immediately took it to be the twin landing lights on a plane, which disappeared from view as the plane turned seawards.

My wife said they "might be flares" and one of the boys immediately said "Are you going to ring the police?" (He remembered that once before I had rung the police about a boat apparently signalling at sea).

I told them they were not flares because I had seen flares and knew they would light the sky with a glow and fall slowly downwards.

I told them it was a plane with its landing lights on, but my wife said "It would hardly have its landing lights on over there."

We have all seen planes coming in to Mascot with landing lights on.

Two things left me a bit puzzled last night:

1. There was no sign of the red and green flashing lights that we usually see on planes at night;
2. There was no sign of any beam leading out from the lights at any time.

We saw the lights for only about half a minute, but they were quite distinct.

From where we were, the lights appeared to be over the sea about half a mile out from South Head and at a height of between 500ft. and 1000ft.

There was nothing mysterious or eerie about them.

They appeared to be normal reddish-white lights, and ~~fairly~~ bright.

The lights appeared to be about as far apart as would be the meters on the wing of a plane at that distance from me.

They gradually converged towards each other as they were disappearing - just as though the machine that carried them was turning in the arc- and disappeared as though no longer visible because the machine had changed course.

The lights could have been much farther away than they seemed to be, but I doubt this.

I have seen meteors, falling stars, the Aurora Australis and similar phenomena and can definitely say it was none of these.

The thing seemed to be so naturally the lights of a plane, though there was no suggestion of the outline of a plane.

I was quite satisfied that it was a plane- though puzzled by the lack of the blinking green light- that I thought no more of it.

I would not have reported this because of its natural likeness to the possibility of a normal plane, only the R.A.A.F. Public Relations Officer has assured me that no plane can fly at night without being "tabbed" by the authorities.

This morning before speaking to him, I was quite satisfied that it was a plane showing unusual lights or playing a joke.

It moved through the air at what seemed the same speed as a plane on that altitude.

I should add that it could not possibly have been the headlights of a car. At the time we saw it we were only 100 yards from the sea cliff; the lights were definitely over the sea and higher than would be the lights of Ben Buckler or South Head from there.

After driving the car in I again looked at the sky, but saw no sign of any lights or objects.

At Mascot at night I have seen many planes coming in, and have seen many over Mareubra at night.

On giving this further thought, I realise that I have never seen any lights in the sky just like this twin pair of lights last night.

INSTRUCTIONS TO BE OBSERVED IN THE COMPILATION
AND USE OF FILES.

1. Before opening a new file, care must be taken to see that a file dealing with the subject is not already in existence. New File Covers must be completed with details for which space is provided.
2. A new file is to be marked "Part 1" and when it has grown to the capacity of the cover a new part is to be opened.
3. Minute sheets are to be attached to the left hand inside of the cover and enclosures to the right hand side.
4. Minute Sheets are to be used for internal administrative action—only long memorandum or papers prepared within the Department being filed as enclosures. Inwards and outwards correspondence is to be filed as enclosures. Enclosures are to be given the same number as the minute referring to them without regard to the previous enclosure number. When an enclosure consists of only one document, its number will be followed by the letter "A". When two or more different letters or papers form one enclosure, each part will bear the same enclosure number but will be distinguished by letters "A", "B", "C", &c.
5. Minute No. 1 is to be on the printed side of the Minute Sheet and is to face the cover on the minute side of the file.
6. Correspondence on subjects on which files already exist must not be made on loose Minute Sheets—the file must be obtained and action taken thereon.
7. Minutes must be added in numerical order and both sides of the Minute Sheets are to be used.
8. "Notes of Action" taken may be entered on the Minute Sheets, otherwise unaddressed minutes are not to be made.
9. Minutes may be noted by Officers placing their initials over the reference to them at the Minute Head, and such words as "Agree" and "Concur" may be used to obviate separate minutes by individual addressees. An Officer's initials so placed will indicate concurrence with the minute where such is called for, otherwise that the minute has been noted.
10. In columns marked 1, 2 and 3 on the cover will be indicated (1) the persons to whom the file is to be passed, (2) the number of the minute or enclosure to which attention is drawn, and (3) the date it is passed out by the person referred to at (1).
11. When the person indicated in column 1 has taken the necessary action on the file, he (or his representative in the case of senior officers) will place his initials in column 4, indicating that the necessary action has been taken. He will then indicate on the next line, if not already indicated, to whom the file is to pass—completing column 2 at the same time.
12. Files are to be passed from one Division to another through the Registry (unless transit slips are sent to Registry) which is responsible for keeping a record of file movements.
13. Directors and Officers using files are responsible for expeditious action on them and for their immediate return to Registry.

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
