INVESTIGATION OF UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

1. Whilst the investigation of unidentified flying objects (UFOs) is understandably a tedious task and one in which the investigator may frequently have little faith or interest, it is nevertheless necessary to obtain as comprehensive a record as possible of such occurrences.
2. The main RAAF object in investigating these sightings is to determine if Australian airspace has been violated. However, intense public interest in this matter means that our investigations have to be beyond security considerations if only to reassure some sections of the general public.
3. Some recent reports from units under this Command indicate that a little more effort would perhaps have determined the real cause of the sighting. Therefore, all units are to ensure that the appropriate report forms are completed as fully as possible.

The object was seen by my wife & 4 children also all of us being outside at the time watching what appeared to be a DABYNA's Aircraft making circuits of the airfield with headlights on. The object observed was RESTRICTED certainly not an aircraft as explained by the 'AIRPORT SPOKESMAN' in the local news. An estimate of its height could be obtained from the fact that during the sighting it disappeared momentarily through a cloud. If the object had not maintained a constant height I would explain it as a satellite burning up as it entered the atmosphere.

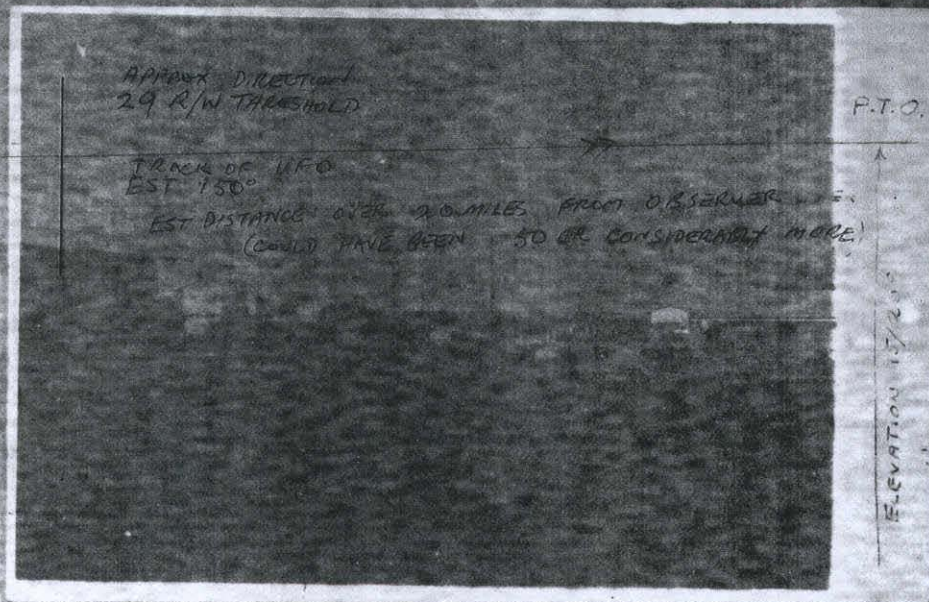

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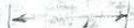

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THAT WAS A UFO SAYS FORMER TEST PILOT

A former test and wartime fighter pilot believes the light seen streaking across Territory skies on Sunday night came from a genuine unidentified flying object (UFO) — controlled and navigated.

He is Mr Richard Johnson, chief flying instructor with Darwin Aero Club, who saw the UFO over Darwin and categorically rejects all suggestions that it came from earth.

Mr Johnson said the UFO appeared on a bearing of 040 degrees (north-east) and continued on a heading of 160 degrees before being obscured by a bank of cirro-stratus cloud. In the 30 seconds it was visible, the UFO traversed an arc of 80 degrees.

It was slightly egg-shaped and was a "very bright, whitish orange". A long, waisted tail of pulsating bright and whitish orange trailed behind. It moved at apparently incredible speed. Mr Johnson watched it through binoculars strong

enough to see small craters on the moon. He said the waisted appearance of the tail probably was responsible for reports that the object was cigar-shaped. The egg-shaped part was relatively small when compared with the tail and

Speed estimate at 7200 knots

would have been almost invisible to the naked eye. Mr Johnson said: "I was becoming quite sceptical about these things, but since Sunday night I admit I am convinced. I wasn't even looking for anything. "From the appearance and behavior of the object I consider it was controlled and navigated. "I had a splendid view of it through my binoculars and even then the object was a great distance away. "I estimated it to be 30 miles — possibly further. "If the estimate is correct the UFO must have a minimum speed of 3600 knots to traverse an arc of 80 degrees in 30 seconds. "If it were 60 miles away (probably a more accurate estimate) it would have been travelling at something like 7200 knots.

in patchy cloud. An explanation that the light came from landing lights on an aircraft was, however, feasible — except that the only aircraft over Darwin with landing lights showing at the time was a DC-3. Mr Johnson said he saw the UFO and the DC-3 at the same time. There was no mistaking one for the other. The possibility of a much smaller object being close to earth could not be discounted. If this had been so, however, someone would have heard a noise and the RAAF airfield at Lee Point would have made a radar plotting.

Spaceship

"I may sound like science fiction, but my impression was that it could have been a spaceship, of quite fantastic dimensions and speed, passing thousands of miles from earth. "The object quite definitely was not an aircraft, satellite, meteorite or weather balloon. "Assume the object was way out in space and passing the earth. It would have been of immense size and travelling at the quite fantastic speed of (at 600 miles out over a 60-degree arc) of 70,000 miles an hour. "This is not at all impossible in the vacuum of space if some intelligent being has the power to accelerate to such speeds.

Power

Judging from the tail on this thing seen on Sunday night it had a lot of power. Mr Johnson said suggestions that the object was a Boeing 707 were not feasible. Sunday night's UFO made no sound. Yet the noise of a single-engine jet flying at high altitude above the clouds was clearly audible from the ground. It was hard to understand how the noise of a four-engine Boeing at climb power could be lost

Satellite

Mr Johnson also discounted the possibility that the object was a satellite. It had travelled from 15 to 20 degrees above the eastern horizon — an elevation much too low to reflect the sun's rays. Its high relative speed also ruled out the possibility. Mr Johnson said this was confirmed when the Echo-1 satellite was seen moving from east to west five minutes after he saw it. "It is known that unless one knows the size of an object it is impossible to judge its distance, and that without knowing its distance it is impossible to judge the size of an unknown object — particularly at night. "But I must believe what I saw.

East

"Sunday night's sighting of the UFO — as far as I am concerned — was a genuine UFO". Mr Ron Gibson and Mr Barry Morton, two of the three men whose report on the UFO began the controversy on Monday, today refuted the Boeing theory. Both said they were on the eastern side of the Stuart Highway at the (im) 20 mile east of Humpty Doo. The UFO was travelling and further east, but the Boeings would have passed them on the western side. "I saw a Boeing, are they a Boeing, but not a Boeing as the thing was travelling east at was a Boeing, and I

UFO SIGHTED HERE — "FANTASTIC SPEED"

Three well-known Darwin men have reported sighting a UFO (un-identified flying object or "flying saucer") in the Top End skies at 8 pm Sunday.

They described the object as "cigar-shaped trailing a white to pink flame and travelling at fantastic speed."

Mr. Ron Gibson of Attorney Generals Department and Messrs. Barry Morton and Jan Smith of Health Department made their sightings from near Mount Bunday.

Mr. Gibson later reported the sighting to RAAF Base Darwin.

He had no doubt the object was not an aircraft.

"It was travelling at tremendous speed," Mr. Gibson said.

He said it appeared to him to be cigar-shaped but was too far away to be really identified as to shape.

Flame

"It was trailing a white flame with occasional red glows but this turned pinkish when the object disappeared behind, or went into a cloud," Mr. Gibson said.

The object appeared to them to be travelling from north to south.

They heard no noise which may have indicated the object was a great dis-

tance away from them. Mr. Morton confirmed in detail Mr. Gibson's description.

He believed they had the object in sight for possibly a few seconds.

They had time to move around a tree to keep the thing in sight.

"Comet?"

Mr. Morton said he was sure it wasn't an aircraft and didn't have the usual trajectory of a comet or "shooting star".

From Pine Creek came a report from Mr. Peter

Drury who reported seeing a UFO at 8.03 p.m. Sunday night.

His report was endorsed by his wife and a neighbor who were driving up the highway 36 miles away at the time.

An RAAF spokesman said they had received no other reports.

They did not have an aircraft in the air at the time.

"DC3?"

Captain J. Hilder of MacRobertson Miller Airline reported that they

did have a DC-3 doing circuit work over Darwin airport at the time.

But the UFO sighters discount this as a possible explanation because of the speed of their object in the sky.

NT'S MYSTERY UFO NAMED AS BOEING 707

An airport official has come up with a new explanation about the mystery unidentified flying object seen over the Top End by scores of people on Sunday night.

A spokesman from the airport rang The News this morning to "clear the air." The "flying saucer," he said, was most likely a Boeing 707 jet to Sydney which he believed took off between 7:30 and 8 p.m.—shortly before the UFO sightings occurred.

He explained that the main landing lights on the jet are turned off to reserve power.

On this particular flight the starboard light had gone out as well but the port light had remained visible, he said.

He said the plane was flying above a cloud layer which acts as a sound barrier, keeping the noise of the jet engines above the clouds.

The sound could not be audible from the ground.

He said the port light, shining directly down on the cloud puffs, had probably produced the glowing effect people had reported.

Red glow

The "red glow" was most likely the anti-collision light which can only be seen from under the aircraft.

The "moving flame" had been the navigation light coupled with the exhaust from the jet motors or the light shining through the mirror-like clouds, he said.

The spokesman, who viewed the craft from the aerodrome, said the jet had proceeded to Sydney after flying over the city and then over the 21-mile air strip.

But — for those who like to speculate and would rather believe in flying saucers — here's a bit of fuel for the fire.

A woman rang The News later this morning to tell us she observed a similar strange sight three

weeks ago on a Sunday night. It seemed unlikely to her that the same conditions would occur to produce almost the same effect.

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STATEMENT MADE BY MR. J. LORD, MUNMALARY STATION,
SOUTH ALLIGATOR RIVER, NORTHERN TERRITORY

On the night of Saturday, 29th July, we were sitting having dinner at approximately 8.15 p.m. A friend of ours, Mr. Bill Murdoch, left the table and went for a walk in the garden. He had been outside for 5 to 10 minutes when he called out to ask us to come and look at a bright light. His wife, my wife and Mr. Danny Thomas of Darwin plus myself, went out into the garden and there in a due Westerly direction at an angle of sight of approximately 60° was a very bright pulsating white light with a circle of orange, which changed to spurts of red shooting out intermittently, approximately in the middle of the white light. The object was decending, would then pause and move both to the left and the right. Standing behind a 6" post at a distance of 6 to 8 feet, one had to move four to five paces in either direction to keep the object in view.

We observed the light for approximately 15 minutes and as it got to just above the 60 feet trees at the Western side of the airstrip, Mr. Thomas and I walked to the airstrip to see if we could get a better view. When the light was just at tree top level, the glow became so bright, without the pulsating characteristic, almost as though a very large light had been turned on, that the trees were well illuminated. The illumination covered an area of approximately 2,000 feet along the edge of the airstrip.

We both agreed that the object must be within a few miles of us and we therefore drove down through the timber for 3 miles to the edge of the black soil plain. It is a mile from the edge of the timber to the river where there is stunted mangrove trees and then a further 3 to 4 miles of plain before you reach high timber again. There was no sign of any light or object on the plain or in the timber.

The following night, Sunday 30th July, at approximately the same time, a white object with the same orange and shooting jets of red, was observed by my wife, Mr. and Mrs. Murdoch and our governess, Miss Judy Anson. This light was in the same position and decended in approximately the same direction. I myself did not see the light on the Sunday.

At approximately 11.0 p.m. on the Sunday night, Mr. Wally Wickshaver saw a small white light shoot up from approximately this same area and disappear in the sky.

Since then we have seen no further strange lights and although pilots were requested to keep a look out for any strange objects or areas of burnt ground, there was nothing to report.

On all occasions when the object was sighted the sky was clear and cloudless but the night was not brightly moonlit. The object definitely was not a star. There were no fires burning in the area or in any of the surrounding country. At this stage the country had not been burnt off.

NOTE BY STAFF OFFICER (INTELLIGENCE): After the first sighting, Mr. Lord called V.I.D. on the Sunday morning and asked for a check with the RAAF as to whether any aircraft activity in the area at time of the sighting. V.I.D. reported that RAAF had no knowledge of any aircraft in that vicinity at this time.

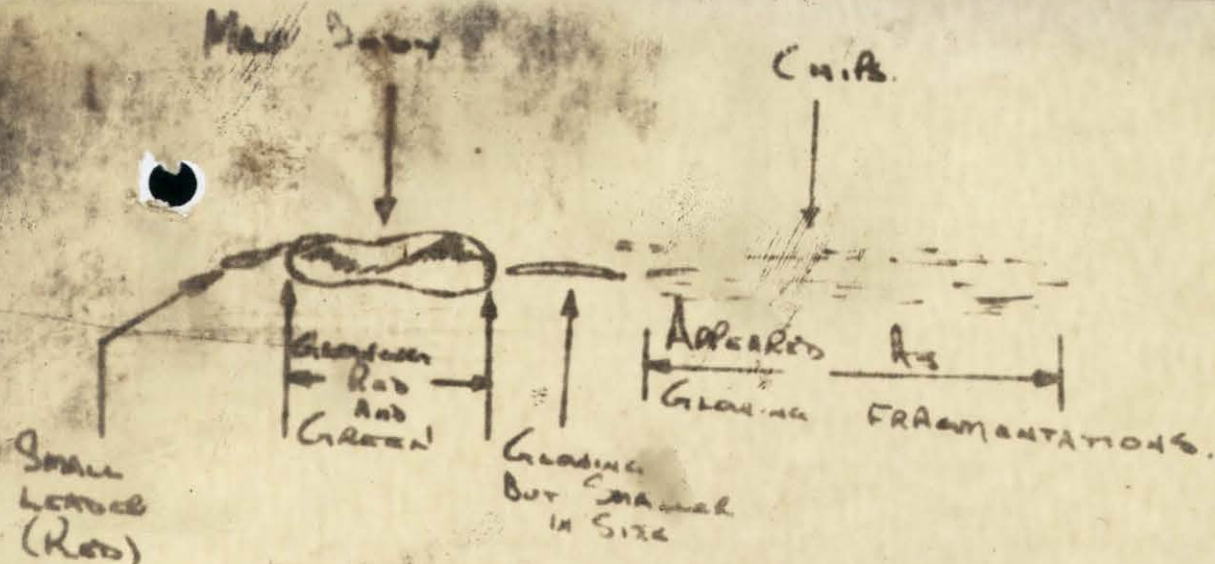

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT SIGHTING

At 0229 hours on Thursday May 25th 1967, Australian Central Time, an Unidentified Flying Object (U.F.O.) was sighted in the Southern Sky.

The object, which appears in the diagrammatic sketch above, was moving at great speed from the North-West to the South-East and at the low elevation estimated to be about 25 degrees.

The object was first sighted inside, from a hall-way passage, through opened, glass louvered windows and then observed from an opened kitchen door-way, which discounts any possibility of it being a reflection.

It was well established when first seen and the whole sighting was approximately 40 seconds.

Although this is my first sighting of such an object, it didn't follow the general pattern of varied flight movement, but rather a dead level path across the horizon, slowly breaking up and disintegrating which to me favours the idea that it may have been a rocket casing or some other man-made hardware.

The low trajectory ACROSS and PARALLEL to the horizon seems too great an angle for the entry of a meteorite.

The length of the object just can't be comprehended, but appeared very large.

It finally disintegrated into one small, red object and then disappeared.

A full moon was directly overhead, very high, but giving good surface visibility and 1/8 Cirrostratus was the observed cloud conditions to this spectacular sight.



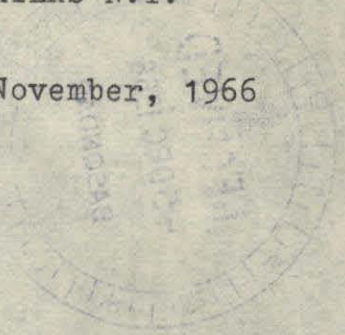

Tuesday, the 22nd. of November, 1966, at 0943 whilst doing my Balloon Flight I suddenly picked up an U. F. O. My balloon at 26.000 feet was close to the sun and impossible to follow any further.

This object (see sketch) appeared where I left the balloon azimuth 280°, elevation 59.2°. I followed the object for approx. 2 (two) minutes then lost it. Immediately I took another reading azimuth 320°, elevation 27.9°. It seemed to be travelling at a tremendous speed. I guessed the height between 40-50000 feet, due to the object being slightly blurred by haze.

The dentist from the Mobile Clinic who was standing next to me looked in the indicated direction but could not see anything.

My first thoughts where this must be an aircraft, but the speed was too fast for an aircraft at this altitude. If an aircraft had been lower we would have heard the engines or jets, which neither of us did. On checking with Darwin Operation (D.C.A.) I was informed there was no aircraft in the area therefore I am reporting this as an U.F.O.

APPENDIX : Summary of Unidentified Aerial Sightings Reported to Department of Air from 1960.

The Term UFO and Some Objections to it

1. Unfortunately the term "unidentified flying object", or UFO for short, because of its widespread and indiscriminate use is generally regarded as just another word for "flying saucer". This is a rather ironic situation since the term was originally introduced to combat just such an eventuality, and so overcome the tendency automatically and haphazardly to relegate all unidentified sightings to the category of "flying saucers".
2. Even the term "unidentified flying object" is somewhat of a misnomer, and this probably is the underlying reason for its indiscriminate use. I believe it to be a misnomer on a number of counts. Firstly many sightings are not of material objects but of what the observer, in all good faith, believes to be material objects. Freak weather conditions, electrical storms and unusual light conditions can give rise to misleading impressions, especially when the observer is unused to them and the time of viewing is short. The eye is not alone in this respect. For instance Radar is far from infallible. Radar echoes from dense clouds and pockets of air are quite common and can give the erroneous impression that some material object has been detected.
3. Secondly it is our experience that, except in sightings of aircraft, the process of flying is rarely involved. Many sightings are of the planets or of meteors entering the earth's atmosphere, and, in one case, we received an excellent report from some 17 separate observers in the Central NORTHERN TERRITORY of the re-entry of the Russian Satellite Cosmos II into the earth's atmosphere.

4. One might even go a stage further and challenge the word "unidentified" on the grounds that the classification is a purely tentative one, since information not available to the observer generally provides an adequate identification of the sighting subsequently. It is our experience that more than 90% of all well reported sightings can be identified satisfactorily. The rest cannot be identified specifically, mainly because the observer's report of the sighting does not contain sufficient information to provide an identification, or in cases where it is considered that further investigation is unwarranted. An example of the latter is illustrated by the case of a woman who wrote in 1964, after reading a newspaper report of a UFO sighting, to tell us of sounds she had heard one night more than twelve months previously; she did not know what date it was she had heard the noises and, as she was too frightened to get out of bed, she did not see what was making the noise. Could the "object" be identified? Naturally it could not be.

5. Although it is difficult to conjure up a name which adequately describes these sightings I think a more appropriate term than "unidentified flying objects" would be "unidentified aerial sightings" - the sightings being "unidentified" only insofar as the observer is concerned. It could be defined as an observation which remains unexplained to the viewer at least long enough for him to report it. Although the term may still be inadequate in some respects I think it removes some of the misleading inferences which were apparent previously when using the term "unidentified flying object".

Assessment of Aerial Sightings

6. The assessment of reports of unidentified aerial sightings in AUSTRALIA and the TERRITORIES is the responsibility of the Department of Air at CANBERRA. There is no hidden implication in this allocation of responsibility. The Department is simply the most appropriate authority for the task, which is performed to determine whether or not a threat to the security of the nation is involved.

7. Much effort and time is devoted each year to the assessment of aerial sightings. Reports have been received from as far south as TASMANIA and as far north as NEW GUINEA. Immediately following a report the observer is usually contacted and requested to complete a detailed pro-forma covering all aspects of the sighting. If there is no immediate and obvious explanation for the sighting the observer may then be interviewed by a member of the RAAF so that his creditability may be assessed and in order to obtain useful additional information. The Department of Civil Aviation may then be contacted concerning civil aircraft movements in the area, while military aircraft movements and weather balloon flights are also checked, in case they may have been responsible for the sighting. Satellites are also responsible for a number of reports, basically because of public interest in satellites and the increasing number put into our skies. The movements of satellites and satellite debris are checked through the Department of Supply, which tabulates data on all satellites, regardless of country of origin. Because of the steadily increasing amount of traffic in our skies, and in space for that matter, (more than 500 pieces of satellite hardware are orbiting the earth at this minute), the task of identifying aerial sight-

ings is assuming substantial proportions. The Department of Air cannot be expected to issue an immediate explanation for sightings publicised in the press until all the information has been obtained and assessed. Consequently, some days will have elapsed before its publication could be expected and, then, only if it is deemed necessary.

8. Reporting Procedure. The procedure to be adopted when reporting an unidentified aerial sighting is to write a letter to the nearest RAAF base or, alternatively, to the nearest police station giving your name and address and as much of the following information as you may be able to recall :-

- (a) Date and time of the sighting;
- (b) Length of time sighting under observation;
- (c) Where the sighting took place;
- (d) Position of the sighting when first observed (e.g., overhead, coming from behind a hill, over the horizon etc.);
- (e) What was it that attracted your attention; (e.g. light, noise);
- (f) Did the sighting appear to be a light or a solid object;
- (g) What was its colour;
- (h) What was its apparent shape;
- (j) If more than one sighting was concurrently observed, how many were there and what was their formation;
- (k) Was any detail of the structure of the sighting observed;
- (l) Was any method of propulsion obvious;
- (m) Was there any sound (description, if any); and,
- (n) Your estimate of the object's height, speed and direction of flight.

9. Now this last item is very important and I would venture to say that unless you have some experience in estimating height and speed your impression of any object's height, speed and direction of flight could be completely erroneous. Why this is so becomes clear when one realises that any estimation of speed requires that we have some idea of an object's height and this, in turn, requires that we have some idea of the true size of the object.

10. If a sighting appears as a light or is so far away that we cannot discern any detail about it other than that it appears to be an object, then we have nothing against which to compare its size. Consequently our estimation of its size and our impression of its height and speed are likely to be in error. For

example, an aircraft flying overhead at 300 mph at a height of 5,000 ft. could easily give an observer the erroneous impression that he had sighted an object flying at 3,000 m.p.h., if he thought that the height was about 50,000 ft. Thistledown, less than one inch in diameter, which are blown up to 100 ft or so by the wind during our summer months, can appear as objects flying very high at fantastic speeds and capable of the most amazing manoeuvres, simply because their size is a matter of conjecture at the time. Similarly an aircraft flying directly away from the observer, particularly at night, could appear as a slowly descending or hovering object.

11. Since the size of the sighting, the direction of its flight and its distance from us is normally impossible to estimate accurately, it is better to make an estimate of the sighting's initial angle of elevations above the horizon, the angle through which it subsequently may appear to move and the time taken to do so.

The Identification of Aerial Sightings

12. Identified Sightings. With the information available from the aerial sighting report, an attempt is made to identify the sighting. In 9 out of 10 well reported cases this is usually possible. By far the greatest number of sightings have been attributed to astronomical phenomena, such as falling meteors or the view of a particular planet (such as Venus, Jupiter or Mars) which may have appeared unusual to the observer. Aircraft are responsible for the next highest percentage of sightings, while a variety of other causes, such as rockets of the firecrackers variety, weather balloons, satellite material and so on, combine to form the remainder. It is significant to note that our records show, both in 1963 and again in 1964, that the months during which the greatest number of aerial sightings were reported were also the months of greatest meteor activity. The months of July and August consistently bring in more sightings than any other month of the year.

13. Unidentified Sightings. The number of sightings which the Department is unable to identify from the information available has remained fairly consistently at around about two a year. Indeed, given sufficient time and effort, the number of unidentified sightings probably could be reduced further. One has to assess, however, whether the required additional time and effort is warranted. The Department of Air believes that there is, and always will be, a small number of sightings (due to high altitude phenomena, which are strange to the untrained eye) for which the available information will never be sufficient to enable an identification to be made. In other words it is just not possible to achieve a 100% record of successful identification. The ideal can be approached but not achieved, simple because the inaccuracies inherent in this type of work militate against its achievement. So much for experience in AUSTRALIA; what of the experience of overseas Air Forces such as for instance the USAF.

14. Experience in USA. Experience in the UNITED STATES runs parallel to our own. The Americans however handle many more reported sightings than we do, averaging from 400 to 600 each year. The analysis of all reported sightings in the USA has been the responsibility of the USAF Air Technical Intelligence Centre since investigations started in 1947. Since that time they have investigated some 9,000 reports.

15. In their effort to identify reported aerial sightings the Americans use automatic sorting and computing techniques, because

these methods provide the best way to handle such great amounts of data. The written reports are reduced to IMB punch-card abstracts by means of logically developed forms and standardised evaluation procedures. The evaluation of the reports, a crucial step in the preparation of the data for statistical treatment, consists of an appraisal of the reports, the subsequent classification of the sighting, with the emphasis on complete consistency and objectivity. This consistency and objectivity can be maintained right through the analysis since the computer is a machine and not a man.

16. A typical breakdown of American identification, before improved reporting and investigating procedures were introduced, would have been as follows:-

17. Reports classified under the heading of "insufficient information" are those for which an essential piece of information is missing. For example the omission of sighting time or location.

18. After the new procedure had been in operation for some 6 months, the percentage of sightings remaining unidentified was reduced to one third of the previous figures. The figures for this period then became:-

19. The effect of the new reporting and investigating procedures has continued to be marked, reducing the percentage of those unidentified to 1.6% and, on one occasion, to as low as 0.7%. The Americans, in fact, believe the percentage can be reduced even further.

20. Experience in UK. In the UNITED KINGDOM a somewhat similar picture presents itself. There, all reports of unidentified aerial sightings are processed through Defence Ministry Air Intelligence, and an average of 9 out of 10 sightings have been

identified. Astronomical phenomena and aircraft are once again the main reasons for sightings. The Defence Ministry is confident that with more reliable information and improved reporting procedures, the number unidentified could be substantially reduced. The Ministry shares the opinion with the Americans that the impossibility of devoting more time and money is the main factor preventing the achievement of a rational identification for every report.

Conclusions

21. I would like to repeat the main points I have made as I think they are important. Reports of unidentified aerial sightings have been assessed by the Department of Air for the past ten years or so. Nearly all of these sightings have been identified as either astronomical phenomena, aircraft, fireworks, balloons or satellite material re-entering the earth's atmosphere. Astronomical phenomena is responsible for the greatest number of sightings and it is significant that there is a noticeable relationship between the time of year when the greatest number of sightings are reported and the time when the greatest meteor activity is experienced. There tends to be an increase of reported sightings each year around about the main meteor stream dates, which it is hard to believe is purely coincidental, and conversely there are few reports during the principal gaps between dates of meteor activity.

22. Both in the UK and USA, analyses of reported sightings HAVE resulted in similar conclusions to our own. In the UNITED STATES, where some 9,000 sightings have been investigated over the past 18 years, scientific methods of data reduction have consistently demonstrated that there are no significant similarities between sightings which have not been identified. In fact improved reporting and evaluating procedures have markedly reduced the number of sightings falling into the "unidentified" category. Only the impossibility of providing an intensive effort and immense expense prohibits the expectation of a complete reduction of sightings, which currently remain unidentified and which now stands at around 2-3%.

23. The number of unidentified sightings each year in AUSTRALIA does not warrant such great effort or expense. Only where there is evidence that a threat to the security of the nation is involved (e.g. the possibility of foreign aircraft infringing our air space) would this attitude be reversed. The Department of Air believes that there always will be aerial sightings of high altitude phenomena which are strange to the untrained eye and that of these some will not be identified.

24. Finally, I would like to make it clear that the Department of Air never has denied the possibility that some form of life may exist on other planets in the universe. Just as we on earth are at the brink of our entry into space, it is not impossible that somewhere else in the universe (if intelligent life does exist out there), others have or are about to do the same. However, the Department has, so far, neither received nor discovered in AUSTRALIA any evidence to support the belief that the earth is being observed, visited or threatened by machines from other planets. Furthermore, there are no documents, files or dossiers held by the Department which prove the existence of "flying saucers".

25. For reasons already given, the Department will continue to assess all unidentified aerial sightings reported in AUSTRALIA and the TERRITORIES, and will continue to liaise with the UNITED STATES and UNITED KINGDOM on this matter.

26. Meanwhile and in conclusion, I have been asked to take this opportunity of expressing appreciation, on behalf of the Department of Air, to all those people who have taken the trouble to send reports to us. We believe they illustrate, quite conclusively, the alert and watchful attitude of the Australian public and that they demonstratethe high sense of civic responsibility which exists in our country.

1. Information has been obtained that a native employed at MANINGRIDA (134.15E 12.03S) by the Forrestry and Timber Bureau saw an object "as bright as a sun" fall straight to earth due south of MANINGRIDA at about 1000 hours on Monday 28th March 1966. It fell from a position about 30° above the horizon but no estimate could be given as to its distance. Mr Frazer has stated that the native (George NAMARABIL, about 26 years) was a good reliable type who could hardly be expected to invent such a story and who was definitely excited when reporting the incident a minute or so later.
2. It was ascertained from DCA that no aircraft had been lost in Arnhem Land. However, during these inquiries it was learnt that a pilot, Mr Warren Wilks of Arnhem Air Charter, flying from BORROLOOLA (136.19E 16.05S) had sighted a similar phenomenon.
3. Subsequently Mr Wilks advised that at either 24 minutes past 3 or 4 o'clock on Wednesday 30th March, when flying at 9,000' near the coast of the Gulf of Carpentaria and on a DARWIN heading, a brilliant object flashed almost vertically down in front of his aircraft, slightly to the north of his track. At first, because of its brilliance, he thought it came very much closer to him than it actually did. The object left a long plume or vapour trail which was still in evidence some 30-40 minutes later when he passed it near the centre of Arnhem Land. The plume by then had thickened and had started to dissipate. He believes that he witnessed a meteorite or the re-entry of a satellite or rocket motor.

292130IK Lt Cndr PIOCH contacted FI(S)O regarding a report of a UFO sighting at Maningrida. The relative information had not been ~~xxxxxxxxxxxx~~ obtained through Naval channels. Apparently the information had been passed to Mr Webber of Civil Defence who was stopped from passing it on to the Press by ASIO.

FI(S)O contacted Mr Webber the following morning but he could not add anything to that provided by Lt Comdr PIOCH. His information had been obtained from a ^{Wilfred} Mr Frazer who had returned from Maningrida where he worked for the Forrestry & Timber Bureau. This Bureau advised that Mr Frazer no longer worked with them and that the only forwarding address they had was care of the Commonwealth Bank. Mr Frazer was subsequently located at the Arafura Hostel but it wasn't till 310930IK that he could be contacted.

The story is that at approximately 1000 hours on Monday 28th March a native working under him at Maningrida excitedly told him that only a minute or so earlier he had seen an object as bright as a sun fall straight to earth due south of Maningrida. It fell from a position about 30° above horizon but no estimate could be given as to its distance. Mr Frazer said that the native (George NAMARABIL, about 26 years, married, 3 children) was a good reliable type who could hardly be expected to invent such a story, and he was definitely excited when relating the incident to Mr Frazer. The latter's reaction was that a crashing aircraft had been sighted but his efforts to get the authorities at Maningrida to radio Darwin were met with ridicule. He reported the matter to Civil Defence on his arrival in Darwin.

76 Squadron Observe unusual Phenomenon

On evening of 28th March the C.O. 76 Squadron advised that two of his pilots had observed an unusual phenomenon in the sky whilst camping at Muirella Park (approx 132°44E 12°47S) on 26/27 March. Plt Off Brian Fooks was awakened by a strong light shining through the trees at about 270400IK. This phenomenon gradually ~~rose~~ above the horizon and during the hour it was under observation moved to an elevation of about 40°. It was first sighted on a bearing of about 080°-090° and continued rising steadily in a westerly direction. During some of this period it was also observed by Plt Off J. Smith. The most interesting aspect of the phenomenon was its brightness and that this brightness continued to fade slowly then suddenly intensify to maximum brilliance.

Contact with Naval Intell O revealed that a similar report of an oscillating light had been received from a ~~xxxx~~ naval observer at Oenpelli Mission which is roughly 30 miles to the north east of Muirella Park.

Consideration was given to the phenomenon being Venus and Plt Off Fooks obliged by carrying out another observation on the morning of 29th March at RAAF DARWIN. He believes that the phenomenon he saw on 27th March was probably Venus.

The apparent unusual brilliance of Venus on 27th March may have been due to the very clear atmospheric conditions and that there was no inhibiting glow from artificial light surrounding the camp area. Refraction of the light may have attributed to the varying intensity of brightness.

U.F.O. SIGHTING, 24th OCTOBER, 1965.

This is to confirm verbal information given you earlier.

At approximately 1903 hours on Sunday, 24th October, 1965 I saw what I took to be a heavy jet exhaust trail in the general direction of Mandorah. The sighting was made from No. 4 Blake Street, Darwin and would have been on a bearing of approximately 280 and at an elevation of about 15-20 degrees from the horizon. One end of the exhaust trail appeared to be moving away and climbing slightly.* The whole effect appeared as if a large aircraft of the size similar to a Vulcan had suddenly burnt off a considerable amount of fuel on "rich mixture". There was no noise associated with this sighting.

It would have taken me no more than 30 seconds to get my binoculars and yet by this time nothing was visible except the smoke trail, which, after a further 20 seconds or so had completely dissipated. At the time of sighting there were no low clouds of any description except for some, two or three miles to the East. Visibility at the time was good.

REPORT OF SIGHTING

1. The following information was received from a Mr Neilson whose address is C/- Surf Life Saving Association, Box 1565 GPO BRISBANE QLD.
2. When travelling by car from MT ISA to DARWIN, in the vicinity of ELLIOT, on Monday 5th July 1965 he saw an object in the sky at 1930 hours. Mr Neilson described the object as a bright white light in the sky which was visible until he lost it in clouds at approximately 1958 hours. He further stated that a small red light was on top of the bright light and that the light did not appear to be moving. He was travelling North and away from the object. The light appeared to be beamed down at an angle of 45° and appeared to be at a height of 400 feet although he could not really assess. There was no noise associated with the object.
3. Mr Neilson says that he could best describe what he saw as:-
 - (a) A plane coming in to land.
 - (b) A building with lights on but no lights between object and ground level.
 - (c) A single intense car light.
4. Mr Neilson further stated that on discussing this sighting with the people in DARWIN, he was told that the daughter of a local DARWIN Taxi driver had also sighted a similar object in the ELLIOT location. The sighting was reported to Inspector Porter of the NT Police Force.
5. No RAAF or known civil aircraft movements took place in the area during the period.

1. Recently I had my assistant, Major A. T. Finney, contact you regarding possible re-entry of a satellite within Northwestern Australia. You may recall prediction indicated center line of ground track ran from over northwestern tip of Australia to just northwest of Darwin. Predicted re-entry times were passed to you with a request that you alert your resources to be on the lookout for this re-entry. Based upon subsequent information supplied by Mr. Freeman, DOS, which he obtained from the OIC, Met Bureau, Carnarvon, satellite re-entry was observed. The timeliness and content of the information supplied has been of very significant value. It is the official opinion that the rocket body of this satellite may have fallen in the area between Carnarvon and Darwin. I would be most grateful if you would alert your resources to be on the lookout for any of the debris and to advise if by chance any debris should be discovered in the future. Though this possibility perhaps remote we would be most interested in securing any debris from this satellite. In order to minimize your administrative tasks involved in this effort I have taken the liberty of notifying AOC, RAAF Darwin, AOC Woomera, Department of Territories, Melbourne NASA representative and OIC, Met Bureau, Carnarvon of the contents of this letter. Additionally with this letter request these individuals advise me direct if any debris is discovered with information to you.

2. Again my sincere appreciation for your most helpful assistance on this project. Its successful conclusion could not have been realized without your cooperative effort.

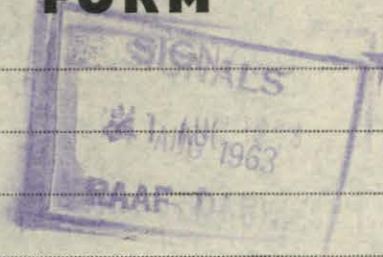

1. Further investigations have been carried out into the numerous reports of an unidentified flying object seen over a wide area of the Northern Territory on the night of 8th August 1963 at approximately 2000 hours.
2. Attached as appendices are a list of persons from Darwin and surrounds who claim to have seen the occurrence, an extract from the Northern Territory News and copies of individual reports and a copy of the DCA Log.
3. It is evident to the writer, who conducted interviews with most of the viewers, that all claim to have witnessed the same phenomenon. All see to agree on the general shape, brilliance, aerial affect and altitude of the object.

4. Neither No 2 CARU or Met radar were working at the time.
5. There was no known civil or military aircraft movement in the area at the time.
6. It is requested that if any explanation of the phenomenon can be offered for release to the public, then this Headquarters be notified accordingly.

EXTRACT FROM THE NORTHERN TERRITORY NEWS DATED 10th AUGUST 1963

"**Meteors or Martians? Mysterious Lights Startled Darwin.** Mysterious lights and an object in the sky startled dozens of Darwin people on Thursday night.

Sightings were made between 8.15 and 8.45 pm. People told of seeing 'reddish' or 'greenish' lights and a 'silvery object' which went overhead with a swishing noise. The RAAF said the lights were a 'meteor shower'.

But in Hobart convenor of the Unidentified Flying Objects Panel (Dr G.R. BREEKHURST) said 'We are not satisfied with the official explanation. We think there is more to it than a meteorite shower and we are studying reports from our Darwin observers'. "There is more in this than meets the eye. Similar sightings have been made recently in other parts of the world. All refer to the 'swishing noise'.

Reports poured into the News Office, the RAAF and the Meteorological Bureau on Thursday night and yesterday morning of the sightings of the lights in the sky over the lights in the sky afield.

One of the first reports came from a group of six people sitting on the verandah of the Darwin Golf Club. They were Mr and Mrs Eric Ford and Messrs Lionel Dennis, Ron Snowden, Tom Wise and Wally Dalton.

Over Harbour. About 8.15pm they saw a bright light crossing the sky from the general direction of West Point towards Fannie Bay beach. It remained visible for about ten or twelve seconds and was at a height of about twenty degrees from the horizon. Mrs Ford said that it looked like a comet but was reddish in colour, it moved slowly and as it crossed the shoreline it disappeared as if the light had gone out.

At Douglas Street Fannie Bay about the same time, eight year old Rhonda Hann drew the attention of her mother and a friend to the object. They described it as a silvery-black, at first changing to orange red and then to a bright green.

Sausage shape. It was at a height of about 40 degrees from the horizon and as it passed overhead they heard a loud swishing noise and the object disappeared.

These people went to a nearby public telephone to report the sighting and about 20 minutes later a neighbour, Mrs Wise, whose husband has seen the object from the Golf Club saw a similar light but travelling in the opposite direction.

She said that it was like two lights, one behind the other and shaped like a sausage. The lights glowed like oranges and disappeared behind a next door house.

From Noonamah, Mr Snowy Best also reported a sighting and a swishing noise as the object went overhead. Other reports came from nurses at the hospital and from Arafura hostel.

The RAAF received reports from Adelaide River and from Batchelor, some of them told of an explosion. A RAAF spokesman said that similar sightings were reported in Darwin about this time last year and the Air Force had sent details of the reports south. In reply they received a note which referred to 'an annually recurring shower of meteorites'. The shower usually occurred about 29th July or a little later, and was sometimes followed one or two nights later by another.

It appeared as if these showers had been occurring each year since about 1957. The report mentioned that the usual effect of the entry of a meteorite into the earths atmosphere was an explosion."

On the night of the 8th August 1963 at approximately 2020 hours whilst sitting at my home in Parap I observed a very bright object appear over my house travelling in a North to South direction.

It was about the size and shape of a rugby football, with a tail effect about twice the length of the main cone. The centre glowed brightly and the trail emitted a bluish light.

It did not disappear over the horizon but faded out like a Magnesium flare.

It appeared to me to be at a height of approximately 15-20,000 feet.

Dear Sir,

I wish to report that on the night of April 13th, 1962, I was present at the local movie show which is shown in an open theatre, in company with Const. Bart MOUTHAN.

At about 9 pm. I observed three objects moving across the sky at an unknown altitude from the North Westerly direction. On first sighting these objects I noticed that the two largest ones had a firey trail and the smaller one left no trail.

The objects appeared to me to be similar to meteorite or shooting stars as is the common expression used. They were each glowing orange, one large one, one small one, and one large one with the same spacing between each one and in a direct line with each other.

The difference between these objects and shooting stars I have seen before is the fact that they were moving much slower (I would say I observed the objects for about six seconds during which time I had sufficient time to draw Const. MOUTHAN's attention to them and he also observed them), and also they appeared to me to be travelling in a horizontal plane with the earth, and did not appear to lose height.

About three seconds after the initial observance the smaller centre object disappeared and the firey trail left by the two larger objects ceased. They continued on in a South Easterly direction from where I was sitting still not appearing to lose any height, until the two larger objects also faded.

I have observed satellites on prior occasions and these objects were definitely not satellites being different in color and at a much lower altitude. They were also moving far too fast for any airplane that I have observed before, and also too slow for the usual meteorite.

Whatever the objects were they appeared to be burning up in the atmosphere, and feel that I should report the matter to you.

1. Further investigations has been carried out into the numerous reports of an unidentified flying object seen over a wide area of the Northern Territory on the night of 27th July, 1961 at approximately 2000 hours.
2. Attached as appendices are the copies of individual reports showing, where applicable, diagrammatic representation of the impressions gained by observers.
3. It will be noted that in the main diagrams made by observers are consistent. All observers seem to agree on the general shape, brilliance, size, trail effect, speed and apparent low altitudes of the object. Many of the observers claim to have made previous observations of satellite movements.
3. A satellite has been moving S to NE over Darwin each evening between 1800 and 2200 hours since approximately 25th July, 1961. Many observers when questioned about the comparison between the phenomenon of the 27th and the recurring satellite state categorically that there is no comparison in size, height or brilliance. The recurring satellite is described in Appendix "A" attached.
5. As most observers report the object as moving from West to East it was initially thought that the object must have been a satellite of considerable size and brilliance with an orbit very close to the earth. This would explain the general West-East movement as seen from Wyndham, Darwin and as far South as Alice Springs. However, the obvious speed of the object and the time variation between observations make this answer unlikely. Listed below are the reported times at major areas :-

6. Many observers were closely questioned regarding any possible noise, but all those questioned were quite adamant that they heard no noise at all. The only reference to noise is contained in Appendixes "H" and "P".


7. Attached as Appendix "B" is a newspaper account as appeared in the Northern Territory News on Saturday 29th July, 1961.

8. Neither No. 2 Control and Reporting Unit nor Meteorological radar was working at the time.

9. The only aircraft movement was the arrival of RAAF Hercules at Darwin which was in circuit at the time the object was sighted. Three of the groups of observers were watching the Hercules making its approach when the object appeared. There is therefore no possibility of confusion between aircraft movements. No other civil or military traffic were in areas from which reports were received at the time observations were made.

10. It is significant that several of the observers are very experienced in the aviation field. This applies particularly to Mr Mair a qualified pilot and aircraft engineer who has operated his own air service in the Territory for many years.

11. An intense amount of interest has been aroused as a result of radio and newspaper reports, and it is requested that if any explanation of the phenomenon can be offered for release to the public that this Headquarters be notified accordingly. It is believed that official explanations of unusual sightings helps maintain public confidence in the RAAF and is reassuring evidence that the effort of making reports is worthwhile.

REPORT OF RECURRING SATELLITE

1. An orbiting satellite has been observed over the Northern Territory since approx 25th July, 1961.
2. Definite observations were made by F.I. (S).O. on Friday 28th July between 2014 hours and 2035 hours and on Sunday 30th July 1961 between 1930 hours and 1945 hours.
3. The satellite was travelling in a line from SE to NW and appeared as a star of the first magnitudex. A smaller object was travelling approx 5° behind in the same course and apparently at the same speed. The latter was barely visible to the naked eye but could be clearly seen through a telescope.

EXTRACTS FROM THE NORTHERN TERRITORY NEWS
DATED SATURDAY, JULY 29, 1961

SPACE SHIP SEEN IN NT SKIES?

Many people are convinced they saw a "flying saucer" or new type of rocket-propelled aircraft over Darwin and other parts of the Territory on Thursday night.

The strange "space ship" glowing bluish and with a flaming white tail hurtled across the sky from the west at terrific speed, then turned south.

RAAF officers here confirmed late last night, that they were still checking reports but were unable to give an explanation.

After questioning a dozen or more people who sighted "the saucer" this is the account of what was seen between 7.55 and 8.40 p.m. on Thursday night.

A saucer-shaped glowing object appeared from a westerly or north-westerly direction over Darwin Harbour at about 7.55.

It glowed with a blueish light. A brilliant white tail flashed from the trailing end.

The saucer appeared to be flying at only about 1000 to 2000 feet.

'BUZZED' TRAIN

It moved in a wide circle across the harbour then moved in southwards.

A few minutes later the "saucer" practically "buzzed" a train travelling north from Larrimah to Darwin at the 285 mile.

Diesel train driver Doug Clarke said he suddenly caught sight of "a big ball of fire" coming in towards the train from behind them.

The train was travelling west at the time and Mr Clarke believes the "saucer" was moving in a northerly direction.

He shouted to his fireman George Fomin.

"It gave us quite a turn" Clarke said.

Fomin estimated the object's height at only about 1000 feet.

"NOT A COMET"

It appeared to be heading straight for the train at one stage.

"I've never seen anything like it, Clarke said. "I don't believe it was a comet. I don't know what it was".

Pretty Emma Parker of the Esplanade, Darwin, was among a group of people who saw the "saucer" when it appeared.

"We were all at the wharf when it appeared", Miss Parker said. "It was a big thing and travelling very fast with a long tail", she added.

Miss Parker's mother said she saw what looked to be windows or "panels" in the object.

She thought it was coming in "quite low".

Mr and Mrs Zdenek Hostalek also saw the "saucer" from the wharf.

"We watched it for probably thirty seconds", Mr Hostalak said, "and I believe it was manually controlled by the path it took".

Experienced Territory airman Doug Muir and Mr Lou deCoursey were among others who watched the strange object fly across Darwin.

Only ten minutes later it was seen over Tennant Creek.

INCREDIBLY FAST

Mr and Mrs Lou Pilgrim saw it from their home and Messrs Bruce Burton and Alan Murray spotted it while driving into Tennant Creek along the Peko road.

It is reported to have passed directly over the town at an incredibly fast speed about 8 p/m/ moving from west to east.

Mr Pilgrim who is employed by TAA, estimated the objects height over Tennant Creek as about 12,000 feet.

Then the "saucer" was sighted at Wonarah telegraph station 100 miles east of Tennant Creek on the Barkly Highway.

It then moved in a wide arc and headed towards the north-east.

The mystery deepened when Rev. Cozier of the United Church in Tennant Creek reported that native children at Warrabri Welfare settlement 180 miles south of Tennant had seen a similar object the previous night.

Authorities here are considering an idea the saucer was a new type of manned aircraft that actually circled Darwin at terrific speed and toured the skies around the Territories.

A number of people were on the watch for the object again tonight.

Reports received by the RAAF are being linked and logged. A full report will go to the Department of Air.

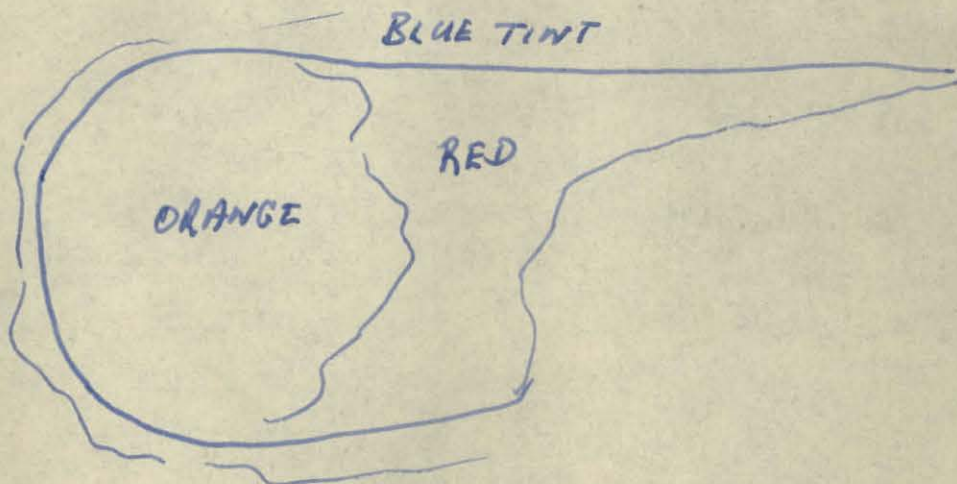
On the night of 27th July, 1961 at approx 1950 hours whilst standing on the tarmac adjacent to the refuelling pipe I observed a very bright object appear from the north-west heading in a southerly direction, veering slightly south-south east as it progressed past.

It appeared about 2 feet long and slightly oval in shape with the rear portion not completed. It glowed brilliantly being white around the front thence to a light blue - then amber blue then merging to a blue red with a streaking intermittent tail at the top of the rear.

I estimate the height at about 1000-1500 high and a speed of 150 mph. The distance the object appeared from me was about 1000 yards.

REPORT RELATED TO SIGHTING OF BRIGHTLY LIT OBJECT SEEN ON 27TH JULY 1961

To Whom it may Concern

Dear Sir,

Along with other people in Tennant Creek, I observed the movement of the brightly lit object travelling rapidly across the night sky.

At approximately 7.54 p.m. last night, I left the house to attend a meeting at 8 pm. Almost at the instant of walking outside, I noticed a large brightly shining object rising rapidly over the signal station hill to the west of the town. This was in the vicinity of the Tennant Creek airport. At first I thought it was an aircraft with its landing lights turned on. But then I realised that there was no sound, and the speed too great.

The object moved rapidly towards the east, following what would appear to be the take-off path of the west to East runway at the airport, but the speed was too great and the trajectory did not tally with the normal path of aircraft using the runway described.

As the object approached, it appeared to be much more intense in its light glow, and intermittently, short trails of sparks appeared to follow behind it. Soon after reaching its zenith, its brilliance began to fade rapidly. But dull intermittent spark trails were noted at this point. It faded completely in the vicinity of 1 O'clock high as indicated in attached diagrams.

At the time of viewing, I was standing near the corner of the car shed, and could make position comparisons in relation to that structure as it appeared against the sky line. The rising of the object could also be pinpointed by the rock formations over which it came.

Thus, today, I have taken approximate compass bearings, and estimated degrees of trajectory by use of a protractor. The noted bearings and degrees are as follows :-

1. Approx. rising point was a compass bearing of approx 284-5 degree.
2. Approx zenith of trajectory was 55 - 60 degrees.
3. The object moved west to east
rising at approx 7.55 pm and fading within approx 30 to 40 seconds at the point of fade.

My immediate reaction was to note the times, as I thought that it could be a satellite re-entering the upper atmosphere. I trust that this information will be of help.

Perhaps you may wish some check to be made on my readings etc. If so I would be pleased to assist. My estimates etc. were made on the basis of my position at the time and on the relationship of the object to fixed landmarks within the field of vision.

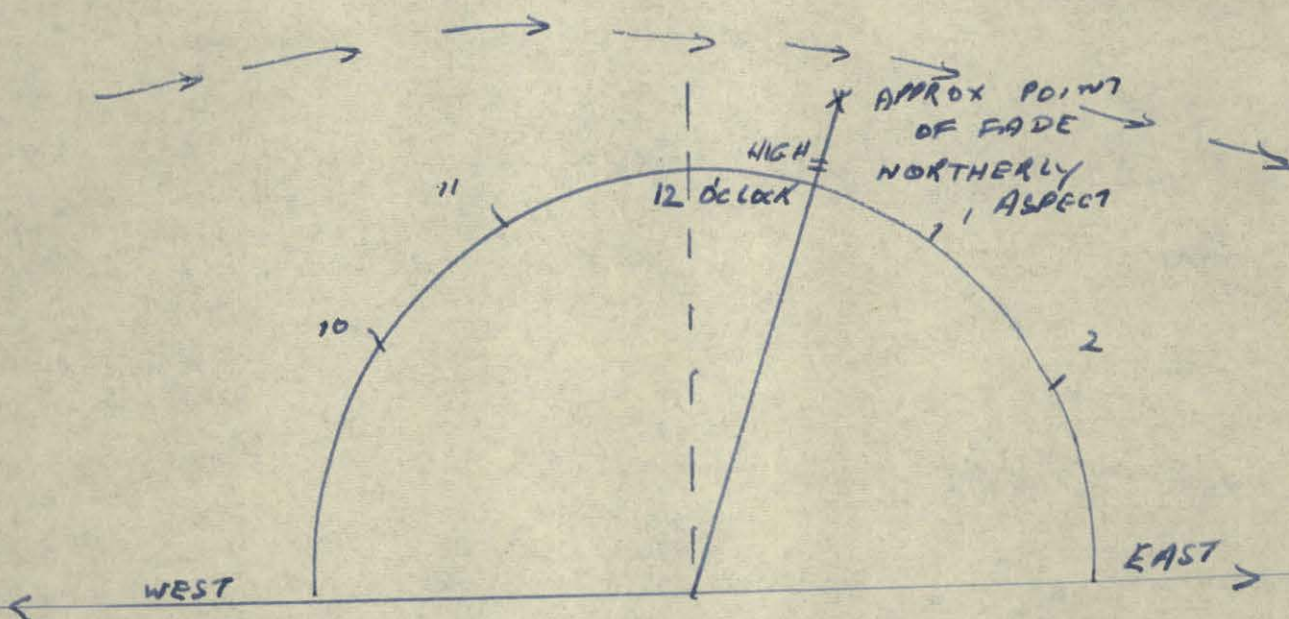

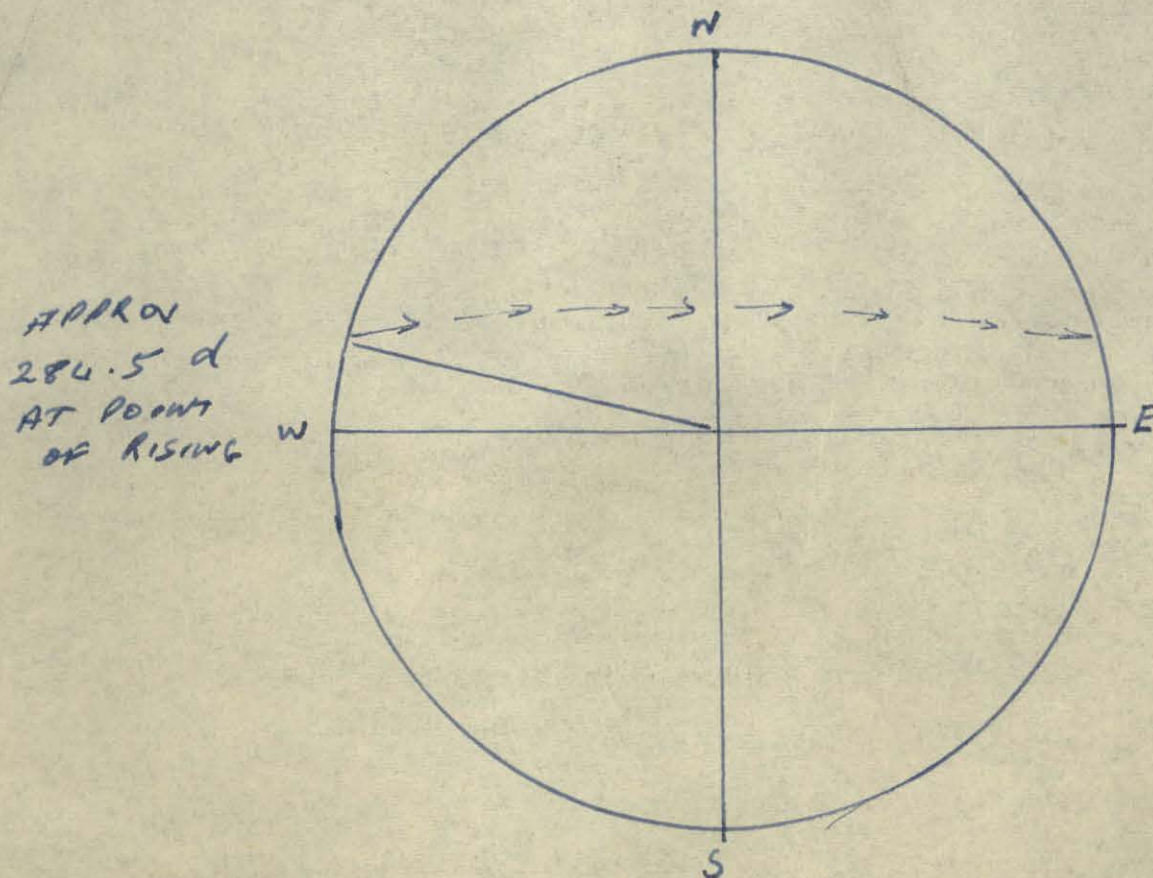
Perhaps the phenomena of last night was this same satellite on a much clearer trajectory and nearer course.

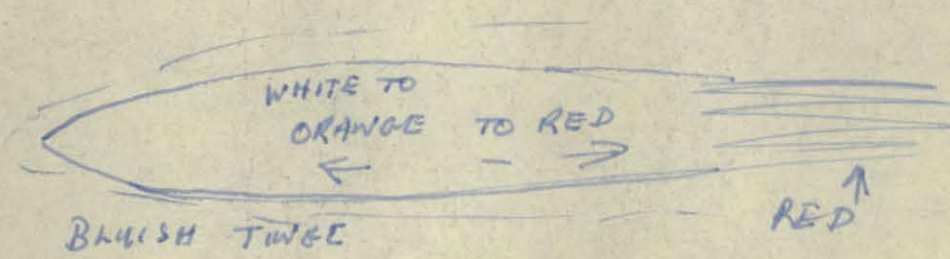

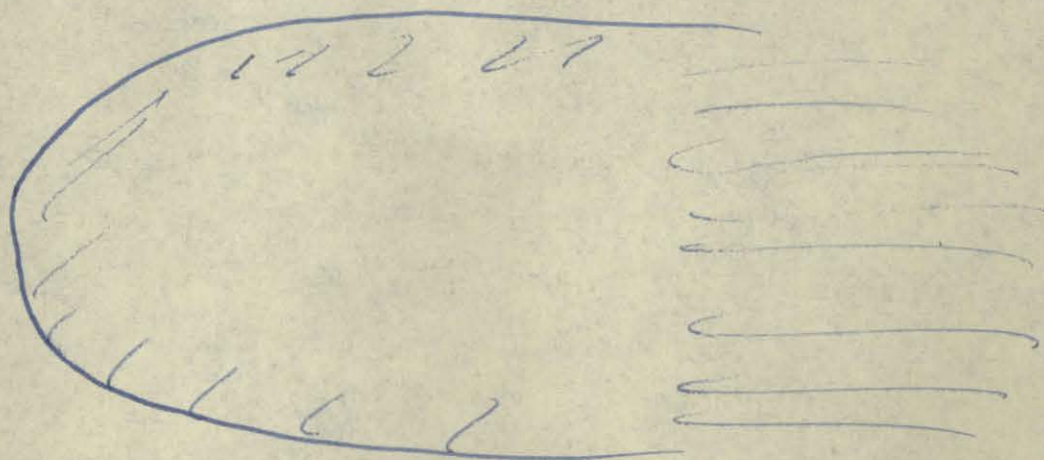

At 271020Z object appeared from bearing 300 degree and dissappeared toward bearing 130°, Object sighted by 300 natives and all mission staff including two priests, four brothers, and four nuns. Mission staff initially reported that object sighting was accompanied by loud noise which frightened natives.

Intelligence Officer interviewed mission staff at Port Keats on Saturday 29th July. Priest in charge stated that the object appeared as a bright star on the horizon at first then as it came closer it became larger and brighter and was clearly visible overhead, before fading again as it dissappeared/ The objects was visible for approx one minute from horizon to horizon. Mission staff do not place much reliance in the statement by natives that a loud noise was heard but consider that they were frightened by the strange sight and imaginations did the rest. Some elderly natives were asked if they had seen anything like it before and replied negatively.

The senior nun at Port Keats mission reported that a satellite had moved across the sky from SW to NE some fifteen minutes after the first sighting.

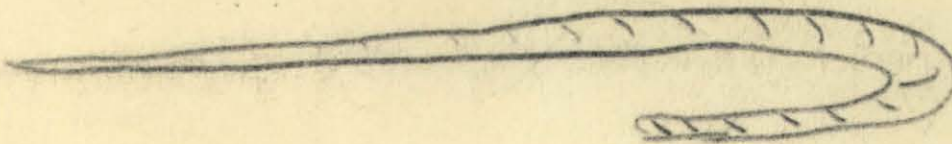
1. As requested by you Mr. Charles Neville Ker BELL, a pilot with Muir Aviation has been interviewed regarding the unusual sighting reported by him on the 8 Mar 61.
2. The observation occurred at approximately 080330Z on the 8 Mar 61 during a flight from Maningrida to Darwin. Shortly after take off Mr Bell noticed a distinctive cloud formation that appeared very much like the contrail of a jet aircraft. At that time he did not consider the sight very unusual believing it to be a Canberra aircraft in the area.
3. As the aircraft approached the cloud, Mr Bell noticed that each end of the distinctive formation ended abruptly. Also, whatever had made the trail had made a 180° right hand turn at what Mr Bell describes as "rate three turn or better" and followed a parallel path to its original for approximately one third the original distance, (see diagram attached).
4. The total time of observation was approximately forty (40) minutes and the unusual trail formation was in a clear blue sky at between 35-40,000 feet above light Cb with tops to 5,500 feet. No aircraft was visible and the cloud was completely formed when first observed. Total length of cloud was approximately 25 miles.
5. Mr. Bell joined the RAAF in 1942, carried his operational tour on Kittyhawk aircraft and then served on Test & Ferry. Mr. Bell was discharged in 1946 with the rank of Squadron Leader and has been engaged in civil flying since that date.
6. No further information is available.

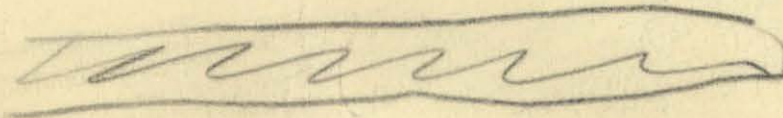

we wish to make a report on the sighting of a star like object as mentioned on the wireless by a Katherine Resident. We saw it first on Wednesday night, at five minutes to ten o'clock, ~~we~~ and after leaving that we were not the only ones to see this object, we decided to sit out and wait up till ten o'clock ^{last night}. It appeared again, twenty five minutes earlier, at half past nine. We watched it for about three minutes the first night, but had a longer view of it, about six minutes ^{last night}. We had thought the first time that it was a weather balloon although it was travelling rather fast, we thought it might have been rather windy up there at that time. The first evening it appeared near a group of pale stars, it started off rather jerkily. The stars seemed for a moment to be moving towards the north, and we thought we were "seeing things" but it was this object going in the opposite direction.

I saw a bright object disappear into the stars four years ago last May, in about the same position. My attention was drawn to the sky at that time because of the bright light which ^{shone} on one place. I looked up to see this great white object (like neon light) climb up on a slant and disappear. I reported

to the R.A.A.F. at the time, and of other odd phenomena. The family are going out into the garden to night to see if this object comes into view ^{again}. I will try and show you where we saw this small light.


