INVESTIGATION OF UN-IDENTIFIED OBJECT

1. An alleged sighting of an unusual aerial object at Northmead NSW was reported to the Orderly Officer 2SD at 1905 hours, 10th July 1972.

2. As some doubt existed as to the authenticity of this sighting (see report attached), Flt Lt R.K. Brown of 2 Stores Depot sought the assistance of Parramatta Police to check out the address of the observer, and enquiries carried out by Police Sgt Reid revealed the following:-

- a. there is no street called Chamer in Northmead or in the Sydney area;
- b. Mr Kevenzikie is not listed on the Electoral Roll;
- c. no person named Kevenzikie has ever worked with the Prospect County Council.

3. As information revealed in the report has been found to be misleading, it would appear that the report was submitted as a hoax.

2. You may be interested in the investigation of reports in Australia, the United States and the United Kingdom and the following information provides a brief outline of the subject.

3. The investigation of reports of UFOs in Australia is carried out by the Royal Australian Air Force, Directorate of Air Force Intelligence, at the Department of Air in Canberra. A considerable amount of effort is spent in investigating each report and the majority of observers are interviewed by selected RAAF personnel.

4. Between 23 January 60 and 26 May 71, the RAAF received 572 UFO reports. Department of Air has assessed that 93 percent were explainable by present scientific knowledge. Six percent of the reports did not provide sufficient information to permit proper analysis and evaluation. One percent of the reports were attributed to unknown causes.

5. The United Kingdom Air Ministry has stated that on an average, 90 percent of the sightings it investigates are explained by causes ranging from meteorological balloons and meteors to aircraft lights. The other 10 percent probably remain unexplained because of lack of reliable information.

6. In 1966 the University of Colorado, under contract to the USAF, spent two years processing and investigating all American reports. Its findings have been published by Bantam Books as 'The Condon Report'. Its general conclusion is that 'nothing has come from the study of UFOs in the past 21 years that has added to scientific knowledge' and that 'further extensive study of UFOs probably cannot be justified in the expectation that science will be advanced thereby'. A panel of eminent scientists, chosen by the US National Academy of Sciences, has examined and endorsed the Condon Report.

7. The USAF 'Project Blue Book' investigation of unidentified aerial objects between 1953 and 1965 analysed 7,641 UFO reports. It concluded that:

- a. 80 percent of sightings were natural phenomena, hoaxes, birds or man-made objects;
- b. 17 percent of sightings provided insufficient data to permit thorough analysis and evaluation; and
- c. three percent were unidentified.

8. US and Soviet space exploration has found no evidence to support the theory of life on planets in our solar system. It seems that the Mariner series of space exploration to Mars has proved it a 'dead' planet. The only other source of extra-terrestrial life, then, would have to be in another 'solar system'. It would seem, therefore, that whilst it may be possible for extra-terrestrial life forms to visit Earth, it is improbable.



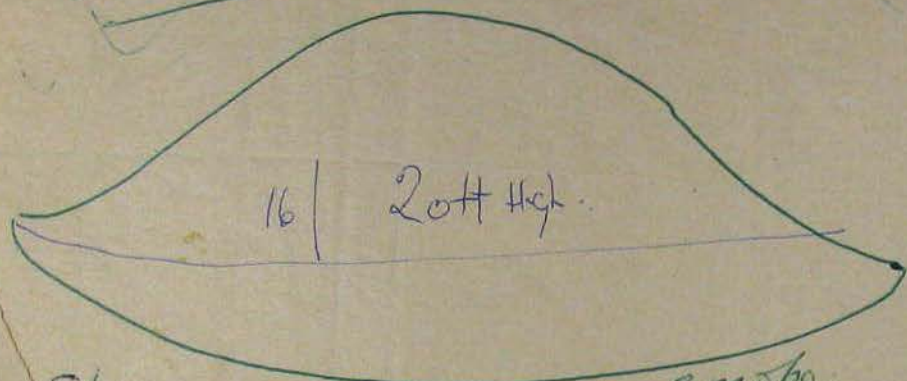

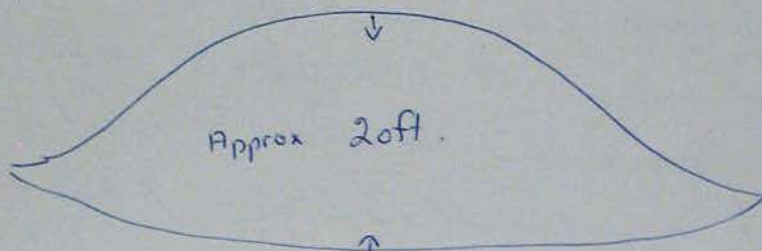

My wife & I were standing outside the front of our home talking to a Miss Engstrom

Then our neighbor, neighbor a Miss J. Stewart asked us to observe the bright object in the sky and asked us what it was. The object was about 1,000 ft. up and between two or three miles away, and lowering, it seemed as if the sun was being reflected from a mirror as it would get brighter and the dimmer, we observed this for some five minutes, then it started to move away, climbing to the North west, when the sun was not being reflected off it, as it started to climb away it was just a thin grey line and was out of sight at about 3,000 ft. and still climbing,

I then appeared as a bright object again there we had first observed it, I then went inside the house and got my camera and came out again and it was still there, I then observed it in the rear garden of the camera and waited until it was at its brightest and took a photo. Soon after it disappeared again in the same way as before. The incident possibly took 20 minutes.

I then went into the neighbours home and rang up the D.C.A. and asked them if there was anything to their knowledge flying in that area, and that is how everything happened.

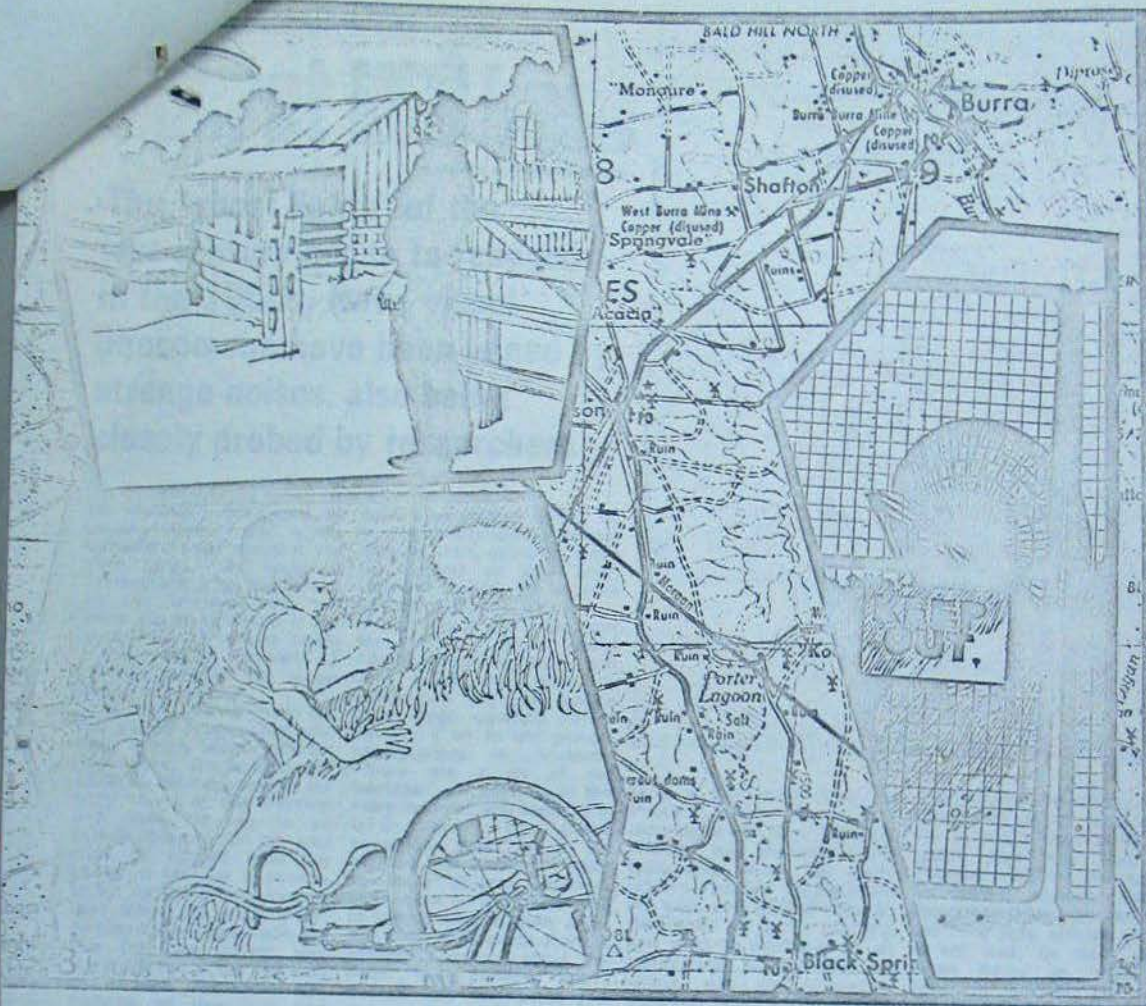

Incidents like these have become almost commonplace in the mid-north of South Australia, an area which many local residents have come to believe is being used as a base for flying saucers. For the past 12 years strange lights and objects have dominated skies where few aircraft ever fly.
In a climate of renewed world-wide interest — and belief — in unidentified flying objects, our ears ringing with theories of how "gods" came down from space in earth's dark past, a letter from a UFO researcher in South Australia

was enough to prompt photographer Barry Newberry and myself to spend a few days in a UFO area. We didn't see any UFOs ourselves, but we met plenty of people who had.
In the sleepy little town of Burra, 120 miles north of Adelaide, lives a man known to local residents as "The Spaceman." He claims to have made contact with alien visitors and to have been taken on a trip around the moon.
Few of the townspeople give much credence to what The Spaceman says but many have themselves seen unidentified flying objects.

were terribly hard to look at. The light hurt your eyes."

Later that same evening, Miss Ashton and a group of 10 others saw 14 saucer-shaped objects flashing across the sky in definite formation. They were visible long enough to be counted. On several other occasions she has seen pulsating red objects moving through the night sky. Many of her sightings have been confirmed by independent witnesses.

Miss Ashton took us to a group of long-abandoned copper mines four miles west of Clare where a local family regularly complains of hearing nocturnal noises, "like the sound of underground machinery." None of the mines show any sign of recent activity and at least one was inaccessible. The entrance was a vertical shaft about 12ft in diameter and of uncertain depth.

We also spoke to Mr Avian Pink, another UFO Research and Investigation representative, who collates reports of sightings from the area around his farm near Hilltown, 10 miles north of Clare. Mr Pink himself has seen red lights moving across the hills east of his property but more spectacular sightings have been made by his wife and his son, Gary.

On March 23, 1970, Mrs Pink was driving home from Clare about 10 pm when she saw a bright object circling the car. "It seemed long and rectangular," she said. "It was bright when close by, but faded to a faint yellow glow in

UFO base

One couple reputedly sold their farming property a few years ago because of continued spacecraft landings in their paddocks. A shearer tells of how another farm family heard an explosion and a "switching" noise one night about 10 years ago and found next day a ring of scorched stones not far from their homestead. The ring was about 40ft in diameter and the rocks had turned a "gunmetal" colour. The shearer has kept one of the stones to prove it.

The town of Clare, in a grape-growing district 25 miles from Burra, has become as well known for its UFOs as

for the wines it produces. Residents regularly see moving, pulsating red lights; three years ago two children saw, about dusk, a large glowing object land in a lucerne field near their home. Driving home one evening last year a farmer's wife was chased by a large yellow object which seemed to hover only a few feet above the car. She arrived home "badly shaken."

Now many local folk are asking themselves: Is there something about the area which makes it ideal for UFO flight and perhaps refuelling. Will the saucers one day land openly and give up their

secrets? Will the "gods" return to earth?

On December 1 last year, Miss Joslyn Ashton was wakened in her bedroom on a farm at Sevenhill, a few miles south of Clare, by a strong yellow light shining through the window.

"It wasn't moonlight," she told us. "You know how moonlight will illuminate the whole room? Well this was a definite beam and, anyway, it was the wrong colour for moonlight."

She went to the window and saw through a group of trees in the garden a round whitish-yellow object which appeared to be about the size of a full

moon but was moving from east to west. She raced outside but the object had disappeared. Miss Ashton, now an area representative for the amateur research organisation, UFO Search and Investigation, has seen other unidentified objects, including groups of saucers, "flying in formation."

On May 20 last year, from a hill near her home she saw three saucer-shaped objects, one large and the other two about half the size of the first, hovering over a line of hills and illuminated by the setting sun. "They were a light pink," she said, "and an even lighter colour around the edges. They

the distance." Continuing its circling pattern the object followed the car almost to the Pink home. "At times it seemed only a few feet above the car," Mrs Pink said, "but there was no reflection in the windscreen. I arrived home feeling badly shaken. I certainly wouldn't like to go through it again."

Gary Pink, 12, is one of the few people in the area who claim to have seen a UFO on the ground. On October 29, 1970, he left the house in the early hours of the morning and made his way to an outside lavatory. On his way back he noticed from the corner of his eye a strange object on the ground near a barn about 150 yards away. Turning for a closer look, he saw that the object was "cigar-shaped, about 18ft long and 4ft high." The object was standing on four legs and appeared to be partly transparent. "I could see through the middle of it but not the sides," Gary said. "The middle was white but the

sides were yellow white." He watched the object for several minutes then, afraid to wake his parents at that hour, returned to bed. He is quite definite about what he saw.

Sightings in this area, says Mr Pink, are most concentrated in May and June, but he can't offer any explanation why. He weighs each report carefully before passing it on to the group's headquarters in Adelaide. "There are a lot of red herrings," he says, "and the more involved you become in UFO study, the more sceptical you have to become. But there have been so many objects reported, often seen by large numbers of people over a wide area, that there is no doubt there is something moving about the skies. They certainly aren't aircraft. The only plane you see around here is an occasional crop duster, and they only fly during the day."

The only report of a daylight UFO sighting comes from Mr Stuart Thomas, who has a



farm a few miles from Mr Pink's. About 9.30 one morning in late May, 1969, Mr Thomas was working in his wool shed when "for some unknown reason" he put down his tools and walked outside. He looked up at the sky and saw what he describes as an egg-shaped object with no wings, tail or propeller, travelling north at about 150 mph but making no sound.

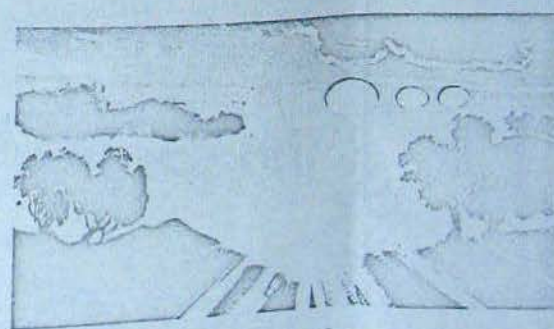
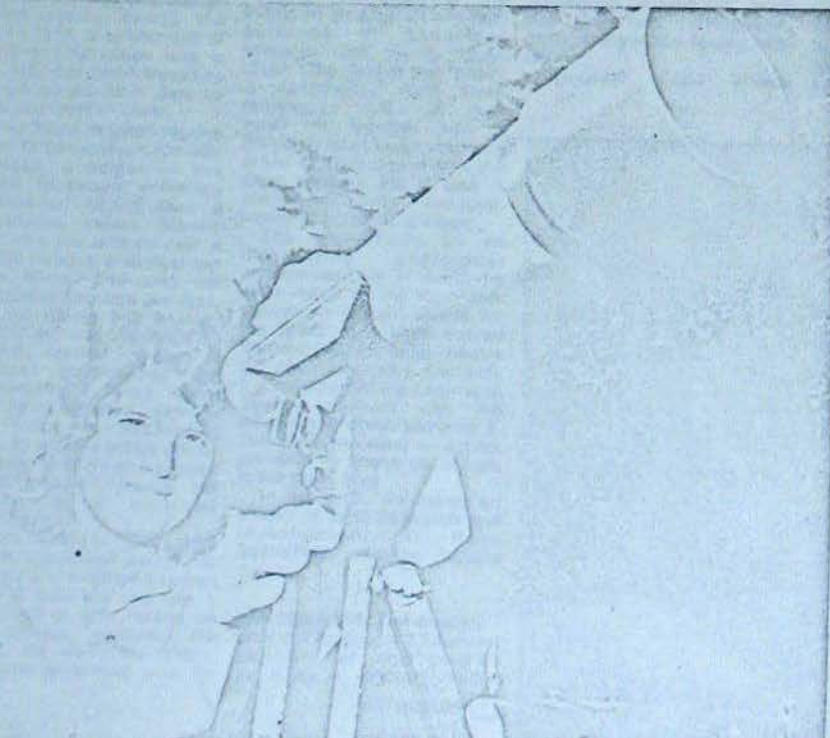
Mr Thomas said he "seemed to stiffen all over" as he watched the object. It appeared to be flying at about 2000ft and looked the size of

a four-seater helicopter. The lower part of the "egg" gave off a bright light while the upper part was dull. Mr Thomas watched the object for several minutes until it disappeared into the northern sky. The light emitted by the object was, he said, about three times as bright as reflected sunlight. He could not tell whether there were any windows or openings on the object because the glare was too great.

In November the year before, Deborah and Phillip Garrard, then aged 10 and 8, were playing in the road outside their farmhouse eight miles north-east of Clare. Dusk was approaching and the children were taking it in turns to ride a bicycle up and down the road, when Deborah looked towards the north-west and saw a "very bright, strange light" coming towards them. Three and a half years later, the brother and sister are still adamant about what they saw. The light was football-shaped and seemed

about 2ft long and 1ft deep. It did not appear solid, just a very bright light. It moved towards them and passed within 50 yards of where they were standing before landing in a paddock 300 yards from the house.

After landing, the light seemed to vanish. Phillip was in favour of running to the spot for a closer look but Deborah was "just a wee-bit" scared. Instead they went home to tell their mother what they had seen. Next day the children guided a small group of people, led by a local police constable, to the place where they had seen the light disappear. The paddock was heavily overgrown with the weed Salvation Jane, but in the spot the children indicated was a circular depression, about 5ft in diameter. It seemed something heavy had rested there and flattened the weeds, which were "tangled in a corkscrew fashion as if a giant top had been spinning on the spot." Other local residents report having seen a

had seen. He said the ball was about 8ft in diameter and gave out a "buzzing" sound. After about two minutes or so it lifted from the ground and rose vertically until it was out of sight.

A similar object startled a Clare farmer two years later as he was taking a walk one evening in May, 1969. The farmer, Mr Lionel Overton, had not long left his house when he saw a green glow coming from a creek bed 100 yards away. "Suddenly," he said, "a large green ball of light rose from the creek, paused at a height of about 60ft, then shot away to the east at tremendous speed."

Many of the lights or objects reported in the area are seen over, or travelling towards, one line of hills, the highest of which is known, because of its peculiar shape, as The Camel's Hump. Towards the peak of the hump, in an area strewn with outcrops of shapeless volcanic rock, is a "giant chair." The seat of the "chair" is constructed from three rectangular slabs of rock which fit together with a precision any mason might be proud of. Only one arm of the chair remains but it also is made of three separate, neatly-fitting slabs of stone.

The chair could be an interesting geological phenomenon, or it could be what many of the local folk believe — a giant throne for the "gods" who once walked the vast natural amphitheatre the chair overlooks. Certainly the structure of the chair is in marked contrast with the other rocks which surround it. There are two other — almost identical — chairs on hilltops in the same area.

In Adelaide, we asked an official of UFO Research and Investigation, Mr Keith Basterfield, what he thought

might be the explanation for the continued concentration of UFO sightings in this part of the State.

"There are copper mines centred around Burra and Clare," he explained, "and to the south-east is the only known vanadium mine in the State (vanadium is an element used in small quantities for strengthening steel.)"

"Also, six miles north-west of Burra there is a fairly large radio telescope designed for research into radio wave propagation from distant stellar objects.

"Apart from this, the area is farmland. The apparent lack of reason for the continued activity of UFOs in this area highlights our dismal, perhaps dangerous, lack of knowledge about the purpose behind these visits."

Visible UFOs, Mr Basterfield pointed out, were not the only unexplained phenomena in the State's mid-north.

"Unusual audio effects

have been noted for years," he said. "On February 21, 1964, two occupants of a house in Clare heard a noise, which sounded like a loud whirring, travelling at a fast rate across the heavens. The noise definitely came from the sky although there was no aircraft, thunderstorm or earthquake to account for it. Something similar happened to a family who owned a roadhouse on the outskirts of Clare at the time. At 2.30 am they became aware of an intense whirring noise which they said sounded like an object descending and coming nearer. But just as quickly as it started it stopped. The next morning they and their neighbours found all their clocks had stopped — at 2.30 am.

"These strange noises which seem to have no visible source may, of course, have nothing at all to do with the visible objects. But it is peculiar that they are heard on approximately the same dates as visible objects are reported.

"The area screams out for a proper scientific study but so far no one has shown any interest. Our amateur research group has spent more than 1,000 man hours in the area, interviewing witnesses and watching for the phenomena ourselves, hoping to get photographs and spectra analyses. But so far the only results have been sightings of some elusive and inexplicable lights on the ground and one Polaroid photograph which reveals nothing of scientific interest.

"But there is certainly something going on in South Australia's mid-north and, as many of the locals believe, a flying saucer base could be located there."

Another group of South Australian Ufologists, the Flying Saucer Research Society, is led by Mr Colin Norris, of Adelaide. Mr Norris describes himself as the "big wheel" of the organisation and claims to have had experiences which "may appear to be unbelievable."



INVESTIGATOR SUPPORTS LOCALS' THEORY

Ufologist Keith Basterfield says of SA's mid-north: "A saucer base is possible there."

"I saw my first UFO," he told us, "during World War II. I was in air crew and I saw this object over Geraldton, Western Australia, in 1942.

"Then, in 1959, I was sitting in my kitchen just after midnight when this sky quake, or implosion occurred. It seemed to be above the roof of my house and the ground shook, waking my neighbours. Next morning I spoke to them and they said it had frightened hell out of them. But, more important, there was this thing, a small object the size of a golf ball, which left my house about three minutes after that. It was outside the laundry. 5ft from my son's bedroom. He was very disturbed; he'd

bright light in the sky the same evening.

Sightings of strange lights in the South Australian mid-north go back as far as the 1800s. When farmers often saw "ghost lights" moving along roads and fence tops. At first they were taken for bicycle lamps, but people who saw them at closer range swore they were nothing but "floating white lights. In the early 1900s these reports died out but in the 1950s the "lights" began to reappear.

On December 23, 1955, two Burra residents were startled by a "dense red ball of fire about the size of a house" moving silently across the sky. In 1957, a similar ball of fire, this time green with a long tail, was seen travelling at high speed from east to west, just north of Clare.

Then more detailed reports began to be received. On July 19, 1969, a woman — she prefers to remain nameless — reported having seen a disc-shaped object passing north at a low altitude over a rubbish disposal area near her Clare home. She and her sister, who also saw the disc, said the object had a shiny metallic surface. As the UFO moved farther away it appeared cone-shaped and surrounded by small lights. The next reported sighting was made in September, 1969, by a Clare police officer who saw "a white disc-shaped object with an orange tail moving in a southerly direction."

From 1969 to 1987 UFO reports again died away until one morning a Hilltown farmer awoke at 2.30 am and saw a green ball of light resting on the ground opposite his house. He woke his family, who later confirmed what he

heard no noise, but there must have been a force field coming from the thing which caused his leg to flop around in bed. He couldn't control it and he yelled out to me, asking what was going on. Then the cat rushed out of the laundry with its hair sticking out on end. I might tell you that mine was too."

Mr. Norris claims to have been contacted by several people he believes were either aliens or at least in touch with life from outer space.

"In 1963 I met this person who gave certain instructions to me," he said. "He asked me did I realise there were UFOs coming towards our planet and that they had beings on board. He also wanted to know whether I'd had any experience with UFOs. This man was quite unusual. He gave me instructions not to talk about UFOs in the sense of sightings and so forth but to try and get the people on earth to have, as he put it, 'better manners'. He said there was a federation out in space and that when earth stopped its wars and the people behaved more kindly to one another and started using the planet a little more logically, when we learned to do all this, then we could join this space federation."

In 1968, Mr Norris met a mysterious benefactor, who, he believes, was sending coded messages into space with the help of a box-shaped device.

"This man was really quite an interesting personality," he said. "For instance, he didn't have any eyebrows. He was very concerned about my interest in UFOs and, I believe, still is to this day. He has helped me in many ways and I believe he will be giving me further help and instructions."

"I don't want to elaborate on what has happened because there are things that cannot be divulged at this time. He left Australia under the most mysterious circumstances. He literally disappeared."

Mr Norris claims this person, who he refers to as "our friend," helped him obtain equipment for his UFO research.

"He helped me acquire a powerful car which I need for my country trips. He also helped me get a new wardrobe of clothing and an

answering service on my telephone. These were also necessary for my UFO work. He also had a tape recorder which he subsequently arranged for me to have. On this machine he used to transmit a taped message, coded in numbers. Also he had these four antennae on the house he was renting and he had some most elaborate instruments and gadgets. He was reputed to have been able to send messages a million miles away. I also believe he could contact a very important department in America quite easily."

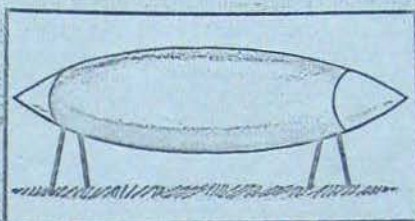
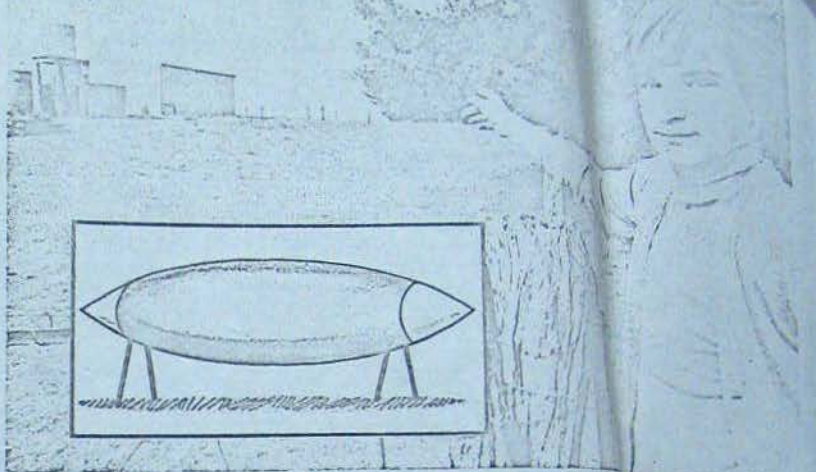
Mr Norris believes the aliens regard terrestrials as primitive beings and this explains their reluctance to make open contact. "I believe they think we are not worth bothering about," he said. "We don't give too much credit to other peoples' intelligence and they, in a polite way, would do the same. We can't talk their language at this time and, anyway, we're not nice people to know really. I think these people wouldn't want to know us."

Ufologists speculate that aliens are already living on Earth and have infiltrated terrestrial society, some reaching high positions in

scientific organisations and government. This has led many South Australian sky watchers to recall the mystery of an unidentified body found on Somerton Beach, Adelaide, in December, 1948.

The man's identity has never been established, nor has the cause of his death. The body was unmarked and had not been in the water. But doctors ruled out death by natural causes.

The man was found lying on his back against a sea wall. The legs were crossed and he appeared to have died while he was sleeping. A thorough

search revealed no clue to his name. The body was 4ft 11in in height and well-built. The eyes were hazel. Fingerprints showed the man had never been in the hands of the police.

The only clue found on the body was a scrap of paper torn from a book. It bore the words "Tamam Shud." Later police were handed the book from which the paper had been torn. A copy of the "Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam," the book had been thrown on to the back seat of a car parked at Glenelg, another beach suburb. The words on the scrap of paper matched the words torn from the book. Translated, they mean "the end" or "the finish."

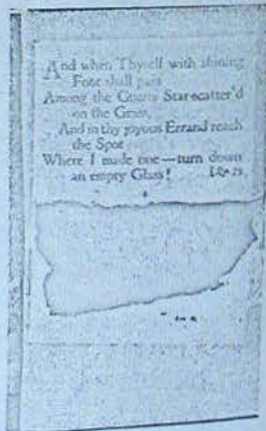
The mystery deepened when the book was found to contain a strange coded message which has defied all efforts by experts to decipher it. The code reads:
MRGOADABD
MTBIMPANETP
MLIABOAIACC
ITMTSAMSTGAB

Naval cipher experts in Melbourne worked on the code for weeks without success. Its meaning is still unknown.

Was the man a Russian spy? What is the meaning of the undecipherable code? What "unnatural" cause could have brought about the man's death without leaving a mark on the body or a trace of poison in his system? Or was he an alien, left to die by his fellow beings or abandoned when already dead?

These questions, all asked 24 years ago, are now being raised again. Many Ufologists are inclined to favour the spaceman solution. The body lies in an Adelaide cemetery. The headstone bears the words "Unknown Man."

The answer to this puzzle, like that of the UFOs, is still, as a witty commentator pointed out recently, "up in the air."

1. Your report on the sighting of an Unusual Flying Object (UFO) has been investigated and the object was . . . MOST PROBABLY BRISTOL . . . FREIGHTER . . . VH-579 . . . EN ROUTE LAUNCESTON TO ESSENDON . . . LIGHT SEEN WAS PROBABLY PORT NAV LIGHT AS AIRCRAFT PASSED THROUGH OR OVER PATCHES OF CLOUD.
2. You may be interested in the investigation of reports in Australia, the United States and the United Kingdom and the following information provides a brief outline of the subject.
3. The investigation of reports of UFOs in Australia is carried out by the Royal Australian Air Force, Directorate of Air Force Intelligence, at the Department of Air in Canberra. A considerable amount of effort is spent in investigating each report and the majority of observers are interviewed by selected RAAF personnel.
4. Between 23 January 60 and 26 May 71, the RAAF received 572 UFO reports. Department of Air has assessed that 93 percent were explainable by present scientific knowledge. Six percent of the reports did not provide sufficient information to permit proper analysis and evaluation. One percent of the reports were attributed to unknown causes.
5. The United Kingdom Air Ministry has stated that on an average, 90 percent of the sightings it investigates are explained by causes ranging from meteorological balloons and meteors to aircraft lights. The other 10 percent probably remain unexplained because of lack of reliable information.
6. In 1966 the University of Colorado, under contract to the USAF, spent two years processing and investigating all American reports. Its findings have been published by Bantam Books as 'The Condon Report'. Its general conclusion is that 'nothing has come from the study of UFOs in the past 21 years that has added to scientific knowledge' and that 'further extensive study of UFOs probably cannot be justified in the expectation that science will be advanced thereby'. A panel of eminent scientists, chosen by the US National Academy of Sciences, has examined and endorsed the Condon Report.

7. The USAF 'Project Blue Book' investigation of unidentified aerial objects between 1953 and 1965 analysed 7,641 UFO reports. It concluded that:

- a. 80 percent of sightings were natural phenomena, hoaxes, birds or man-made objects;
- b. 17 percent of sightings provided insufficient data to permit thorough analysis and evaluation; and
- c. three percent were unidentified.

8. US and Soviet space exploration has found no evidence to support the theory of life on planets in our solar system. It seems that the Mariner series of space exploration to Mars has proved it a 'dead' planet. The only other source of extra-terrestrial life, then, would have to be in another 'solar system'. It would seem, therefore, that whilst it may be possible for extra-terrestrial life forms to visit Earth, it is improbable.

COUNTER-INTELLIGENCE - UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS

Reference: A. Our 6/32/Air(10) of 24th May 1972

1. Further to paragraph 6 of Reference A., enclosed are copies of five colour slides depicting peculiar ground markings discovered on a farming property at Tooligie Hill, Eyre Peninsula, in late December 1971.
2. The matter first came to the notice of this Headquarters through the "Day by Day" column of "The Advertiser" on 27th January 1972. A copy of the relevant clipping is attached at "A". This Headquarters contacted Mr Jim Robbins, the author of the column, and explained the RAAF's responsibility to investigate unusual incidents of this nature. Mr Robbins gave an assurance to in future pass first-hand to this Headquarters information on UFO sightings. This Headquarters' OIC UFOs also contacted the Peter Powell referred to in the clipping and again received assurances of co-operation. Mr Powell stated that considerable interest in the Tooligie Hill "phenomenon" was being evinced by local UFO groups and added that a meeting of several of the groups, including the Australian Flying Saucer Research Society (of Colin Norris notoriety), was to be held that Sunday (30th January 1972). He promised to make known the RAAF position at the meeting. At this juncture it became apparent that a belated RAAF investigation of the "phenomenon" would attract unwanted publicity, and would in any case probably be paralleled by simultaneous investigations by civilian groups. The question of "co-operation" between the RAAF and local UFO groups would then be a matter for speculation and individual interpretation by the media. This Headquarters therefore deemed it prudent not to initiate an on-site investigation into the incident at the time.
3. On 28th February 1972 a letter was received from a Mr J.L. Miles, Secretary of the Murdinga Agricultural Bureau (Murdinga is about 10 miles north of Tooligie). A copy of this letter, which concerns the Tooligie Hill incident, and this Headquarters' reply, are appended as Attachments "B" and "C". Attachment "D" is a later letter from Mr Miles, also bearing on the topic.
4. Attachments "E" and "F" are two newspaper clippings from this Headquarters' files, dealing with a projected "safari" to Eyre Peninsula to investigate the "phenomenon". The airman referred to in para 3 of Attachment "F" was also mentioned in our AI082 DTG 090035ZMay72 to your Department.

On his return from leave he was again interviewed by OIC UFOs. The "safari" had taken soil samples and photographed the markings, and also interviewed a number of people in the district, but after a week on the site had not made any findings. Present on the Habner property at the same time were two members of the Australian Flying Saucer Research Society, who also fossicked without discovering the origin of the markings.

5. The enclosed slides were sent to this Headquarters by Mrs Habner as the outcome of several telephone calls between her and OIC UFOs of this Headquarters. They were accompanied by a letter which reads, verbatim:

"I am sending you, as promised, some slides and information on the mark we found in our paddock on December 28th 1971. This mark was made in the middle of a wheat crop, with no tracks or marks leading in or out. The diameter of the rim-shape which is spun into the clay soil is approximately 7 feet. 2 feet from the outer edge of the mark the crop was laid flat in an anti-clockwise spinning motion, and in the centre, which measures 45 inches across, the crop was cut to a height of 9 inches.

The crop was also laid flat (anti-clockwise again) in a small crescent which joins onto one side of the mark. About 12 feet away from the main mark is the same shaped marking spun into the wheat straw, but not with as much force as the main mark. This mark was just on the top of the straw and not cut into the ground. We can only think that whatever tried to land here was put off because of a small mallee stump, and, wanting a smoother place to land, rose up and hovered over to finally land on the main "site".

One family in our district say they saw a strange light which would have been in that position. They saw this on Christmas Eve. We were away from home all that evening.


We have had approximately 200 visitors from surrounding districts to see it and they all wonder ~~what~~ could have made this mark.

The cut out circle is still there and will be until we plough it up for seeding. There are still markings of the spun down straw etc too, although they are not as clearly defined as they were when fresh.

I must close now to catch the mail. Trusting you will return these slides, as you promised, when you have taken duplicates if you think they are necessary."

Thankyou for your kind invitation to address an "open night" meeting on May 5th on the subject of UFO's.

As the authority in South Australia responsible for the investigation of UFO sightings, this Headquarters collects information from observers who report such sightings; after normal on-site investigation, the information is then passed to higher authority for scientific evaluation. This Headquarters has no authority to release information on individual UFO sightings to the general public; however, an individual may obtain some post-event "feedback", by writing to the Director of Public Relations at Department of Air in Canberra. A copy of the General Statement forwarded to the individual by Department of Air is attached for your information. Also attached is a summary of UFO sightings reported to Department of Air which you may find of interest.

A reference in paragraph one of your letter to a "landing" on the property of R.V. and R.B.A. Habner is noted. This incident was not reported, as it should have been, to a RAAF authority, hence this Headquarters has no official knowledge of it, nor, at this late stage, is an investigation feasible.

It is therefore with regret that we advise that it will not be possible to send an officer to address the meeting.

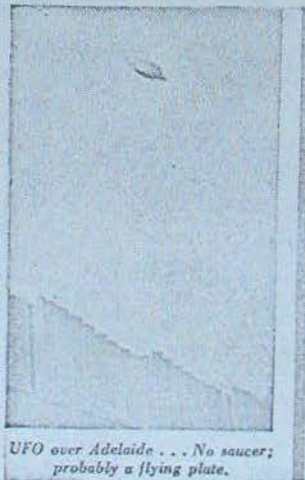

TEAM TO CHECK 'SAUCER LANDING'

A research team is investigating reports that a "flying saucer" landed on a farming property 90 miles north of Port Lincoln.

The two-man team, Mr. Ken Ianson and Mr. Trevor Mackereth, made an all-night dash from Adelaide to the site.

The investigation is centred on a mystery circular marking on the ground.

Flying Saucer Research Society public relations officer, Mr. Colin Norris, today described the markings as "about the size and shape of a large tractor tyre."

Mr. Norris said the team would carry out a variety of tests on the soil, check variations of the magnetic field, and take measurements, photographs, and sketches.

He appealed to people in the district—where unexplained sightings had recently been made—to give all co-operation possible in the investigation.

The team is expected to return to Adelaide later this week with soil and vegetation samples which would be put to further scientific test.

2. This morning I received a phone call from Mrs Habner of Tooligie Hill. She said that Messrs Ianson and Mackereth had arrived and were investigating the "phenomenon" on the Habner property. As might be expected, Mr Norris had arranged the usual publicity and the ABC, 5KA and the Advertiser, according to Mrs Habner, were on the scene or on tap. She said that she had not expected so much publicity and in any case it was Peter Powell who was supposed to be doing the investigating. His "safari" (see item 1, fol 1) is due to arrive on Saturday and she had tried to contact him without success to tell him that he had been pre-empted. I informed Mrs Habner that there was nothing the RAAF could do about the situation and offered my condolences. Mrs Habner seemed surprised that this HQ had not been informed officially of the "phenomenon" in the first instance as she had reported it to the police in the area.

3. ORWO this morning noticed a leave application submitted by Cpl Armstrong CLKSPLY of Catering Section. The address given on the application for a week's leave was c/- the Habner property. I interviewed Cpl Armstrong who said that he had answered an advertisement inserted in the local newspapers by Peter Powell for people to accompany him to Eyre Peninsula to investigate the finding. I briefed him on the "no-publicity" requirement and asked him to keep me informed of events.

1. I refer to this Headquarters' 6/32/Air(27) of 26th October 1970 and your 15/3/192244 of 4th November 1970. The result of this correspondence was a decision by you that any reports of UFO sightings received by the police would be relayed to the Officer-in-Charge of UFOs at this Base.
2. My attention has recently been drawn to newspaper reports concerning an incident which took place at Tooligie Hill, Eyre Peninsula, in December of last year. The first report ("The Advertiser", 27th January 1972, "Day by Day" column) referred to some burn marks found on the property of R.V. and R.B.A. Habner at Tooligie Hill, and later news items reported that Adelaide UFO "research" groups would investigate the marks. In the past two weeks two such groups have visited the Habner property and carried out their investigations.
3. A telephone conversation between my Officer-in-Charge of UFOs and Mrs Habner reveals that police authorities in the area were informed of the incident and indeed visited the Habner property prior to the "phenomenon" becoming public knowledge. Mrs Habner states that the police officer to whom she reported the burn marks was Inspector Adolf Sahlein (she is unsure of the spelling) from the Police Station at Lock. She expressed surprise at the RAAF not having been notified of the event.
4. I am sure you will agree that, as this Headquarters was not informed of the incident in the first instance, any post-event official RAAF investigation of the incident, with attendant publicity, would prove not only unfeasible but also embarrassing to some extent.
5. In view of the above, I would appreciate your once again bringing to the notice of your staff the necessity of referring all UFO reports to this Headquarters with the minimum of delay.

It appears that there was no actual sighting of a U.F.O. at Tooligie Hills in December last, and although the Inspector was aware of strange markings in a field, he did not consider there was sufficient evidence at that time to connect them with a U.F.O. Moreover, as there was already growth from the dislodged wheat heads, it seemed that some time must have elapsed since the disturbance.

The remainder of the Inspector's report speaks for itself and we are sorry that you have been hindered or embarrassed by the lack of an earlier report.

Although members generally are already aware of the necessity to report such matters for your information, a further instruction will be issued by a notice in the Police Gazette.

Late in December, 1971, I received a telephone call from either Mr. or Mrs. Habner of Tooligie Hills reporting that they had found a strange 'marking' in one of their fields of wheat, which they could not explain. There was definitely NO reporting of any sighting of an Unidentified Flying Object or any other phenomena in the sky.

Mr. Habner's property is some 60 to 70 miles from Port Lincoln. Owing to the expense, I did not think a visit was warranted.

Several days later, Mr. Habner spoke to me in Port Lincoln and suggested the possibility of the markings in his field of wheat being made by a 'Flying Saucer'. My own personal views on such matters are that they should always be treated with respect but at the same time most cautiously. However, because of Mr. Habner's insistence on the 'strangeness' of the markings, I informed the local press and a photographer travelled to Tooligie Hills on 1st January, 1972, and photographed the markings. A picture and story were included in the Port Lincoln Times on 13/1/72.

I recall Mr. Habner stating that a strange feature of the incident was that none of the straw or stubble showed any signs of charring or burnmarks. A further feature was that the wheat 'knocked' from the heads on to the ground had sprouted and commenced growing again, which indicated that the area had been disturbed at least three to four weeks prior to the discovery.

At this time Mr. Habner had notified the U.F.O. Research and Investigation Group of whom Mr. P.M. Powell is Director. Mr. Powell contacted the Port Lincoln Times on 6th January, 1972, requesting copies of photos taken, and I understand he has been in communication with the Port Lincoln Times and the Habners ever since.

At no time have I been aware that any 'Flying Object' was seen or heard. I did not treat this matter in the true light of an Unidentified Flying Object. News of the strange markings has been wide spread as Mr. Habner has been pestered with phone calls from all over Australia and also from the United Kingdom.

I feel this incident did not come within the scope of the usual sightings. For these reasons I took no further action in the matter.

'SAUCER' SEARCH AT WARRAGAMBA

Two Sydney men went to the Warragamba Dam area last night where they believe an unidentified flying object landed recently.

They were sent to a property opposite the Warragamba Lion Park to two samples of soil and vegetation from a flattened circular area of land about 33 feet in diameter.

"We assume it is probably one of the freshest UFO saucer nests discovered up to date," he said.

Two investigators who visited the site yesterday took soil samples to be analysed for radioactivity and deterioration of grass roots for sonic damage.



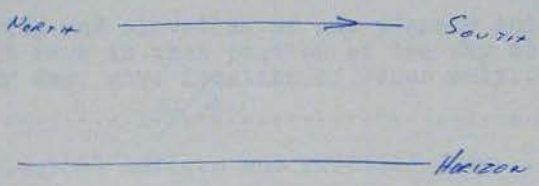

1. Enclosed is an UFO report forwarded to this Headquarters by "The Australian Flying Saucer Research Society - (Adelaide)", together with an accompanying letter from Mr John Burford which, inter alia, outlines recent moves to amalgamate the various UFO "research" societies in South Australia. Mr Burford is the "investigating co-ordinator" for the AFSRS.
2. As on many occasions in the past, the report arrived at this Headquarters too late to make an investigation possible without considerable embarrassment and possible adverse publicity. The various UFO societies in this State, while aware of the RAAF's responsibility to investigate UFO sightings in an official capacity, are nonetheless reluctant to pass on information on UFO sightings to the RAAF until they have "picked the bones clean". Every attempt has been made by this Headquarters to elicit the co-operation of local UFO organizations, and in particular the AFSRS, in an endeavour to gain some first-hand information on UFO sightings.
3. From conversations with Mr Burford and others, it would appear that RAAF policy on non-recognition of unofficial UFO groups and restrictions on release of information (eg, military aircraft movements) to them, are in no small way responsible for the lack of "co-operation" experienced by this Headquarters in the past. Mr Burford himself, however, unlike his fellow AFSRS member, Mr Colin Norris, seems interested in co-operating with the RAAF "with no strings attached" and to date has not attempted to make political capital or to gain favourable publicity for his organization by his dealings with this Headquarters.
4. Also enclosed for your information is a list of alleged sightings investigated by the AFSRS alone in 1971. It is significant that of the 112 sights, not one was reported to this Headquarters in the first instance. Indeed, it was only at the personal whim of Mr Norris that the RAAF received copies of investigations (without "findings") in the long term. It would appear that, in spite of sparse and rather patronising publicity by the mass media to the effect that the RAAF is the responsible UFO-reporting organization, and arrangements with the police to have any individual sighting a UFO contact this Headquarters, the public at large in this State remains either ignorant of the correct procedure, or chooses to contact the more glamorous - and credulous - "flying saucer" society.

Furthermore, we are not aware of any effort on a national scale by higher authority to inform the public of the RAAF position in this matter, which is very active in South Australia.

5. From the foregoing, it can be seen that, if the proposed amalgamation of UFO groups in this State comes to pass, and timely reports of UFO sightings are passed to this Headquarters as indicated by Mr Burford's remarks, the volume of work involved in investigating and processing such sightings will increase considerably. In fact, it is doubtful whether the Officer-in-Charge UFO's at this Headquarters (a secondary appointment) would be able to cope with such an increase, without significant and non-acceptable inroads being made into his primary role.

6. You can expect a comprehensive report based on exterior sources, and some most interesting colour slides, of a peculiar ground phenomena in the Eyre Peninsula under separate cover shortly. This incident has provoked widespread interest sparked by repetitive mass-media references.

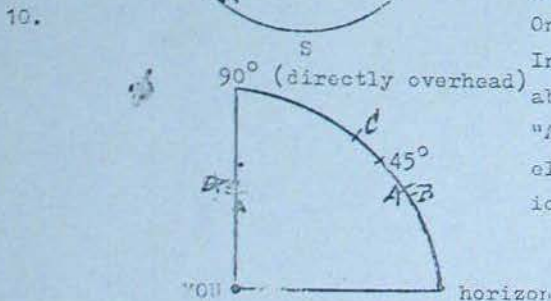

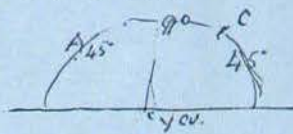

PERSONAL ACCOUNT

14. In your own words, Please describe the incident as it happened.

Since my ^{observation} on the 7th March, 1972. I have had plenty of time to think about it but the fact remains I saw something I am unable to explain with what I knowledge I have as a lay man of present day technology. I noted the time of 9.18 p.m. at the end of my observation. I first noticed the object in the sky by the two lights red & green and for a second thought it was a plane except that its lights did not flash as the do. Then I was struck with surprise at the total absence of noise of motors. Traffic noise level was very low. There was no wind to blow the noise away. The observation only lasted 20-30 seconds as the object was travelling fast. I could not make out a circular shape of pale green colour as if reflected city lights. The "cabin" appeared circular and was lighted dimly but clearly. It could have been protruding at the bottom or it may have been flush with the body. It was too distant to see if there were occupants. Two lights (green & red) were mounted either above or within the cabin and burned steadily (they did not flash as with planes). These lights were close together. The object turned right sharply and then left sharply and gathered even more speed and climbed fast at an angle of about 45°. The lights winked out completely, first a green circular light climbing and then the red disappeared still climbing. I have since thought of about the lights winking out and this could have been caused by them being obscured from my vision by the an angle of the climbing object because at the moment of climb the circular shape changed to a disc like appearance just before it disappeared into the night sky.

Sequence of events; Mr. Barratt is licensee of the Birkenhead Tavern. At 8pm the hotel closes and for some time after this the books are balanced etc. Having closed this particular night, Mr. Barratt went out the back of the building (the western side) and burned some rubbish (he believes there may have been a fire ban that day). There were no lights on in his immediate vicinity except for one inside a door around a corner of the building. He happened to glimpse a moving light to the south--about 190°, I estimate, from fairly precise indications by the witness, referring to a conveniently positioned crane jib, not there at the time of sighting--and at 30° elevation (again, my estimation from his indications). He first thought of a satellite, but, seeing the red and green lights, next thought of a plane. However, he noticed the lights were not flashing and were closer together than a plane's wingtip lights would seem, so he followed the object with his eye. The witness' long sight is normal, but he wears glasses for closer use, and just to be on the safe side he put them on.

There was, he said, a definite reflection from ground light sources as if there was a shiny body attached to the lights. By now, he could see that this was something unusual, to him, so he continued watching, and as the object reached a position a few degrees (5°?) east of north, and again about 30° elev., it banked swiftly right (east) then left (west), seeming to tilt (i.e. a swift "swinging" motion) as it did so, then ~~it~~ sped up and away at a 30° est. angle.

The object's speed was steady until it reached a bearing of about 280-290°, then it sped up, just before the banking maneuver. It diminished in apparent size and was lost to him. He noticed that conditions at the time were very similar to those at the time of interview; traffic was sparse, making little noise (an aircraft such as fly in and out of Parafield would be audible), there was no cloud, although some haze towards ground level (less than 20°), numerous stars, and, unlike at the time of the interview, no wind--smoke from nearby chimneys rose vertically.

Description of object;

First noted as lights (one red, one green, distinct but close together), an area around the lights seemed to reflect ground lights. There was no distinct boundary of the object--witness compared commercial aircraft at night, when the lights and general shape are visible, but not the wing boundaries. From a general vague shape rather than a clearly defined outline, he said the object appeared to be twice the apparent size of a full moon, at least. However, his comparison to the distance between two adjoining house chimneys a couple of hundred yards to the north indicated a size of about 2°, i.e. 4x full moon. He was quite definite about the large size. The lights "had depth"--the description of a "cabin" is derived from this. He said there was no reflection as from perspex or glass, but the lights seemed recessed; this is the only way he could describe them. He just felt they were not flush with the surface of the object. The object changed from a round shape to a disc-profile just after the banking maneuver; the lights vanished as if hidden by the tilting body (again the suggestion that they were recessed) and all that could be seen was the ground light reflection from the object, as it diminished.

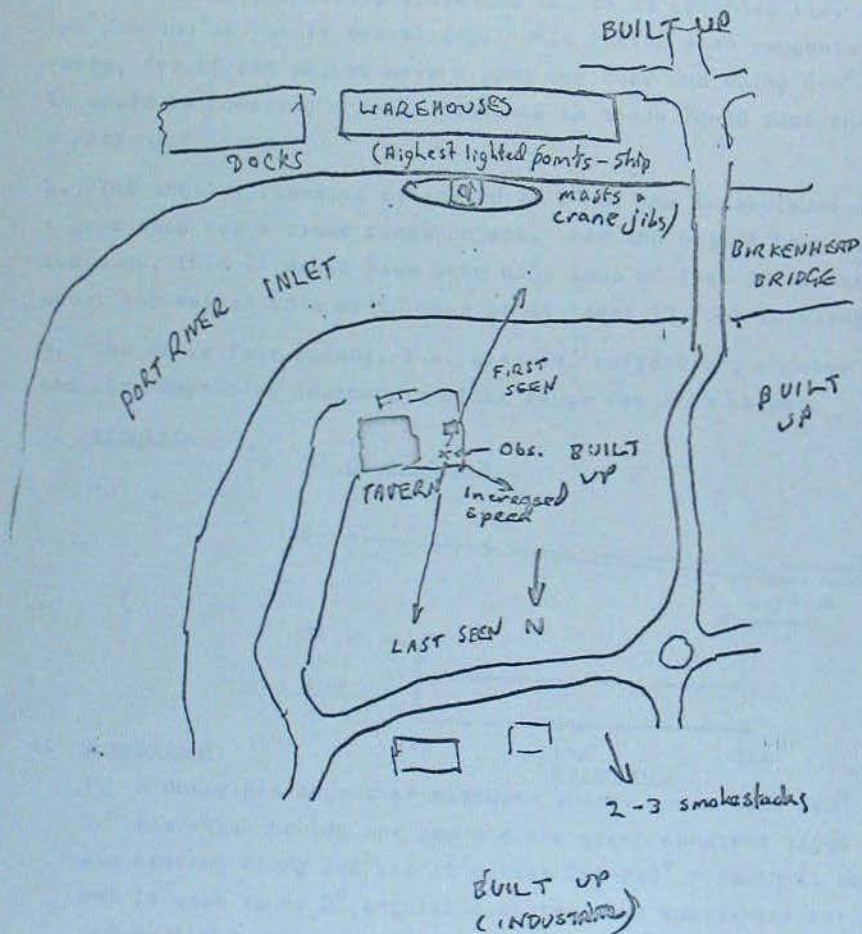
Witness;

Aged 52 (see report form); wears glasses for near vision (lights less than about 100 yds. away slightly blurred) but long vision good. He was in army (AIF) where he says he learned how to observe (familiar with types of optical illusions because of training), and in my opinion is a reliable and thorough witness. He is well-informed regarding, as I said, observational illusions and still cannot offer any explanation for his sighting. He did not attempt to interpret the sightings in terms of "aliens", and was in fact dubious about reporting it. He thought of the RAAF but was uncertain as to how to report to them, and considered that UFO's were crank material until, since the sighting, he has found out a little more through P. Powell and myself. He reads some science-fiction, and this also caused him a little embarrassment as he felt that this admission would lower the worth of his observations in some way. At first he told only his wife and daughter, and told them not to repeat the story; however, it nagged at him, and he is curious to hear if anyone else

saw the object or if any explanations present themselves. I informed him that "a metallic object with red and green lights had been seen on the 4th from Brighton road" after the interview, and we discussed UFOs in general. His knowledge of them was very vague, only a few press items and the fact that there had been an air force study somewhere. He had not seen any UFO books. He wishes his identity withheld (do not publish name of witness or of hotel-just area), but consents to publication of the other details.

ROUGH MAP OF AREA

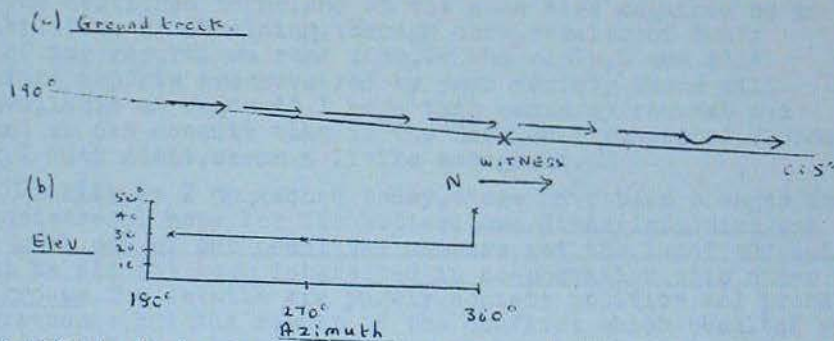

1. As the witness put on his glasses to focus short range objects, (e.g. 100m) and described the object with them on then this suggests that the object was around 100m or so away, otherwise the object in short range glasses would have been blurred had it been a lot further away. The apparent reflection of ground light sources also supports this close range idea.
2. The angular velocity is approximately 180° in 20-30 seconds, this means ~~either~~ between $6-9^\circ$ per second. For comparison, the Russian booster rocket of 11.2.72 travelled 70° in 25 seconds, i.e. about 3° /sec. $6-9^\circ$ /second is really travelling. This factor also suggests a close range, for if the object were a long way away and doing $6-9^\circ$ /sec then it would be covering a large distance in those 20-30 secs and hence at a very high speed.
3. The angular diameter estimated as 2° by the interviewer also makes a good case for a close range object. Had the object been at a mile or two away, then it would have been many tens of feet in diameter. At about 100 metres this would make it at least 10 foot in diameter.
4. The above four points, i.e. glasses, reflection, angular velocity and size appear to indicate a close range for this object.

6. Summation:

1. A noiseless object of circular shape, comes from 190° azimuth, 30° elevation having one red and one green constant light on it, its bearing being 360° . As it passes $280-290^\circ$ azimuth it accelerates and is seen to be 2° angular diameter, and apparently reflecting ground light sources. It continues to 005° azimuth, 30° elevation where it banks swiftly east then west and climbs, to be lost to sight at 005° azimuth, 50° elevation at an average angular velocity of $6-9^\circ$ /second.
2. From the details given the object does not appear to have been: (a) a meteor, (b) a balloon, (c) a satellite, or (d) an aircraft.

7. Conclusion:

On the details given I am unable to offer a rational explanation, comments welcome.

Dear Sir,

As arranged by phone today, I am enclosing a photostat of a report of an unusual aerial sighting from Birkenhead on 7.3.72. I regret the delay in sending this report, but the civilian group for which I carried out the interview did not have any arrangement for sending reports through you to the Department of Air, and I only recently contacted the witness and obtained his consent to send you the report. He would appreciate the results of any official investigation, although I appreciate at this late stage this will not be a particularly easy task.

The gentleman concerned is proprietor of the "Birkenhead Tavern" and can easily be contacted if necessary. He requests his name be kept from any sort of publication, which I think is reasonable because of his position. I found him a very solid citizen, hardly the type I would suspect of a hoax, and although human error may enter into his sighting, I feel he would be as good an observer as we could hope for in civilian life, especially if, as he claims, he received some training in the army (communications, I believe) in observation. He is a very friendly type and keen to find out what exactly he saw, so if you find it necessary to contact him you should have no problems regarding co-operation.

I wrote to the Department of Air, Russell Offices for the UFO data you mentioned to me, and at the same time enquired as to the possibilities of obtaining, through them, results of their checking of any reports we send them. In the reply, I was told "...if future reports are required by your society these will be made available on request!" I hope this means my request was granted, and we can consult them in the fashion I suggested, although the reply, I must admit, seems a little ambiguous.

Finally, as I mentioned today, there have been changes in the UFO societies, I hope for the better. Some dissatisfaction was expressed with one of our committee members, not the least complaint being that he did not seem interested in co-operation with other civilian groups. The details are purely society politics and probably of no consequence, but the result of the conflict which resulted was the formation, not of a breakaway group as has happened in the past in such situations, but an amalgamation. Keith Basterfield, ex-head of the now defunct APRG (now amalgamated with UPORI under that name) was asked to head an investigations group consisting of investigators from the AFORS and elsewhere, and I, for one, have great faith in his capabilities as an unbiased researcher. (In fact, I think he doubts that there is any great mystery in UFOs). As I also mentioned, from now on we hope to start an investigator training scheme, and of course, we have made arrangements for all reports to be pooled and investigations to be carried out through this group. There will, of course, be something of a lapse before things get under way properly as there is a great deal to be done to re-shape civilian research in this field into something better than half-hearted interviews and cultist meetings, which was largely the case up until recently.

This will probably have one significant effect on you. While the AFORS made a practice of sending you reports, the others concerned in the amalgamation were awaiting a written arrangement from you before they did this. Some debate is expected, and I hope that you will continue to receive not only AFORS but all reports; I certainly think this is a good idea. But anyhow, you will no doubt hear more of this, and I think you will find that if such arrangements

are made they will be of a higher quality report than you have been receiving in the past.

In closing, let me thank you for the time you have given me in a matter which I realise is only a part of your job. I hope such friendly relations can be maintained with the newly-formed group, and you will of course be informed of what develops as soon as the whole plan solidifies.

UFOs have their good and bad years



Did a flying saucer land here? The "nest" was found near Tully, northern Queensland.

THE only substantial reason I can offer for writing about flying saucers is that when I was in Canberra the other day I bumped into my friend Arthur.

After a few beers and prawns at his golf club, Arthur, who works for the RAAF, became ufological. He occasionally gets that way, and I honestly doubt that the beer and prawns had much to do with it.

Ufologists are people

who are interested in flying saucers, otherwise known as UFO (short for unidentified flying objects).

The RAAF has a UFO section which checks flying saucer reports from all over Australia.

Now, I have never been particularly interested in ufology. Space bores me. I'm one of those reactionaries who cannot understand why on Earth anyone should want to land on the Moon.

But for those among us who believe that flying saucers and other odds-and-ends from outer space are keeping an eye (perhaps set cy-

clopsically in the middle of their foreheads) on us, I have comforting news.

The RAAF takes flying saucer reports seriously and has no intention of abandoning its UFO checking system.

This persistence keeps us, depending on your point of view, way behind or way in front of our Great and Powerful Friend.

In December, 1969, the U.S. Air Force closed down its UFO-watching department, known as Project Blue Book. This followed complaints from scientists that the department's continued existence could not be justified in terms of expense or national security.

Project Blue Book had a life of 21 years. It checked 12,518 reported sightings, including some of the more interesting ones from Australia, and spent millions of dollars.

Arthur explained the reason for the RAAF's persistence: "Our UFO checking doesn't cost much. We're responsible for the air defence of Australia, and so any reports of unusual happenings in our air space are of interest to us.

"We certainly never rubbish any reports of flying saucers.

"On the other hand," he added, licking a few prawn crumbs from his fingers, "I wouldn't like you to get the impression that our interest suggests, at this stage, that we give credence to any 'little green men' theories.

"We're just open-minded." Indeed, some UFO

sightings have been made by RAAF men, pilots flying commercial airliners and Civil Aviation officials.

The RAAF has not added up all the reports it has checked since it went ufological in 1959. There have been — again depending on your point of view — good years and bad years.

In 1966, for example, 59 sightings were reported; in 1970 a mere 37.

The first UFO sighting over Australia was probably in 1893, though, with the lapse of time and the loss of documentation, no one seems to know where it was or how it was described.

The RAAF has a note that some Yorkshire monks sighted a "large, round, silver thing like a disc" in 1290. You can bet that caused quite a flap in the cloisters.

Some ufologists consider the Old Testament records the first UFO sighting. It is mentioned in the first chapter of Ezekiel, where the prophet has quite a bit to say about four winged-four-headed cherubim that seemed to be rushing about in wind and fire on a wheeled vehicle.

His description is not notably precise. Perhaps it lost something in the King James translation.

If you think you have seen a UFO, go to the nearest police station, which will arrange for you to fill in a form for forwarding to the Air Department in Canberra.

As an encouragement to greater precision than Ezekiel showed, this form lists 31 questions for you to answer.

If you are a conscientious form-filler-in and want to answer all the questions, it helps if you have noted the angle of elevation and the compass angle bearing of the UFO. But all that is

realistically expected of you is that you give the time and place of the happening, describe the size, shape and color of the UFO and say how long it hung around.

If the police think you are drunk they may not be very helpful, I gather.

This strikes me as a serious flaw in the system. Anyone who did see what was in fact a flying saucer at close range would probably be shocked into giving a fair imitation of drunkenness.

Most UFO reports have been given a satisfactory explanation. The fact that a few — around three per cent — cannot be explained in terms of Earthly phenomena is the main reason that many sane, intelligent people believe in flying saucers.

Satisfactory explanations produced by the RAAF for many sightings include stray weather balloons, car lights reflected on cloud, Venus glimpsed through a haze, bits of junk from disintegrating American and Russian space probes, comets and meteorites.

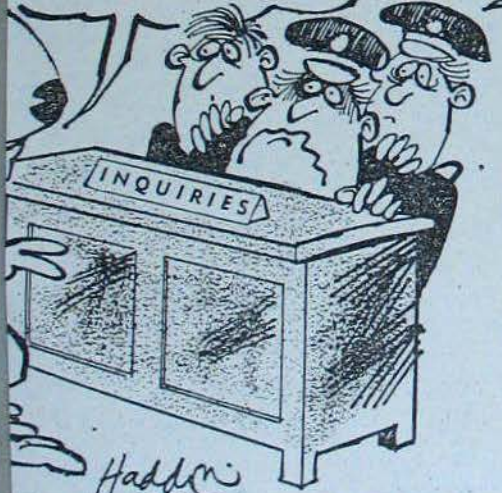
Two of my favorite reports and explanations are: —

● In Cabramatta, NSW, on April 29, 1970, a man was alarmed by "loud whooshing noises passing over his house." Explanation: a nearby fireworks display.

● On October 28, 1970, a report from Binalong Bay, Tasmania, terrifyingly described an "aircraft-shaped object with two small wing projections." This turned out to be ... an aircraft, a Qantas trainer.

4. Between 23 January 60 and 26 May 71, the RAAF received 572 UFO reports. Department of Air has assessed that 93 percent were explainable by present scientific knowledge. Six percent of the reports did not provide sufficient information to permit proper analysis and evaluation. One percent of the reports were attributed to unknown causes.

5. The United Kingdom Air Ministry has stated that on an average, 90 percent of the sightings it investigates are explained by causes ranging from meteorological balloons and meteors to aircraft lights. The other 10 percent probably remain unexplained because of lack of reliable information.

6. In 1966 the University of Colorado, under contract to the USAF, spent two years processing and investigating all American reports. Its findings have been published by Bantam Books as 'The Condon Report'. Its general conclusion is that 'nothing has come from the study of UFOs in the past 21 years that has added to scientific knowledge' and that 'further extensive study of UFOs probably cannot be justified in the expectation that science will be advanced thereby'. A panel of eminent scientists, chosen by the US National Academy of Sciences, has examined and endorsed the Condon Report.

7. The USAF 'Project Blue Book' investigation of unidentified aerial objects between 1953 and 1965 analysed 7,641 UFO reports. It concluded that:

- a. 80 percent of sightings were natural phenomena, hoaxes, birds or man-made objects;
- b. 17 percent of sightings provided insufficient data to permit thorough analysis and evaluation; and
- c. three percent were unidentified.

8. US and Soviet space exploration has found no evidence to support the theory of life on planets in our solar system. It seems that the Mariner series of space exploration to Mars has proved it a 'dead' planet. The only other source of extra-terrestrial life, then, would have to be in another 'solar system'. It would seem, therefore, that whilst it may be possible for extra-terrestrial life forms to visit Earth, it is improbable.

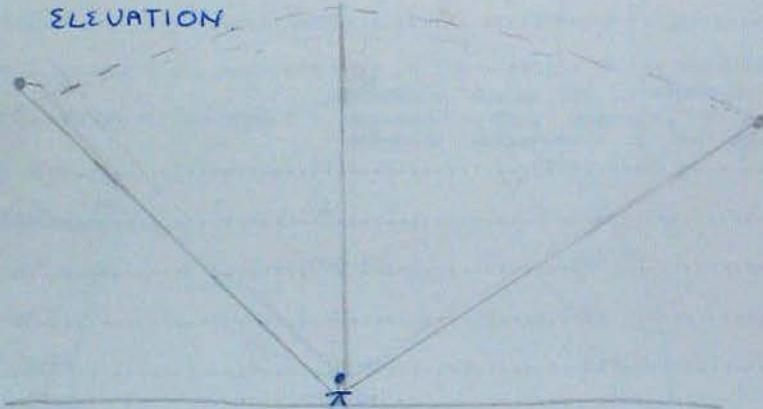

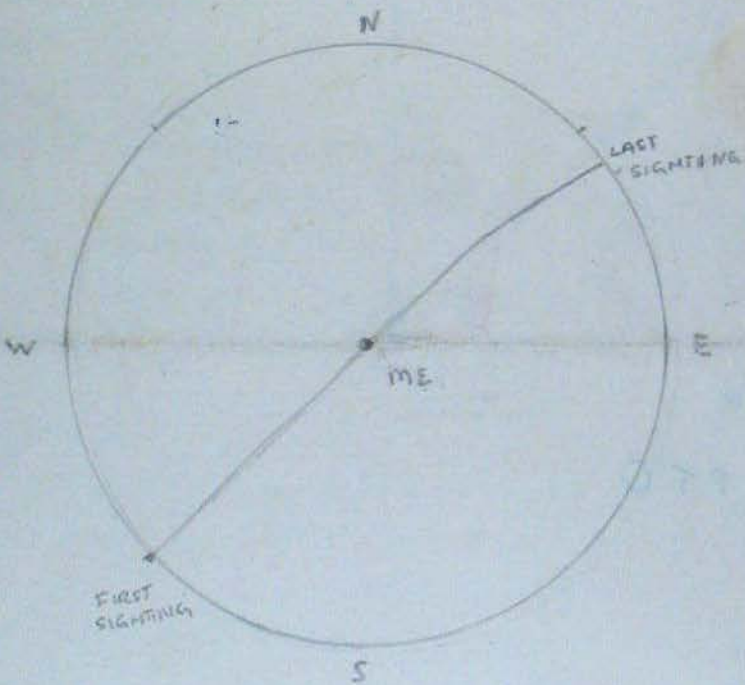

2. As can be ascertained from the amplifying letter, which is enclosed, the object was sighted slightly north of west, low on the horizon relative to the viewer's position. The observer was driving quite fast in a south-westerly direction and was positioned due west of Mount White on the Road Mareeba-Dimbulah.

3. Investigations into the incident have revealed the following facts:

- a. at the time of the sighting 2045K, Venus would have been on a relative bearing of about 285° from the viewer's position, with an altitude of 10° . These figures were derived from the current Almanac, which further indicated that at this time the planet would be at its brightest;
- b. the local wind at the time was south-east at 40 knots; and
- c. there was heavy broken cloud in the area.

4. The conclusions drawn are:

- a. the object seen was Venus;
- b. the strong wind blowing broken clouds would have given the object apparent movement; and
- c. the clouds at times partially obscuring the object would have made the light diffused, slightly changing in colour and larger than it actually was, as well as completely rendering impossible any accurate judging of distance.

Dear Sir,

On the night of Saturday 25th March, I was travelling along the Harare - Simbala road to a bar-b-que at Simbala. Our party of five was in two cars. I was in the first one.

Approximately miles from Harare my attention was caught by a bright light in the sky to my right. The light appeared to be just above tree top level on the hill. This hill appears on a map I have as Mt. White. The light at first seemed to be stationary.

A friend in the second car was watching almost continuously from this point on, except when trees blocked his vision. He said it suddenly lowered behind the hill and his vision was then blocked by some roadside trees. When he could see again, the light was again up above the hill, but then moved at a speed easily seen even from a moving car (50 mph). It was moving away to westward.

The driver of his car then stopped and when we noticed the absence of his lights behind us we also stopped and he then came on up to us. As he alighted from the car he said he had seen this strange light, and I replied that I had also seen a strange looking light but had not taken a lot of notice of it. We then all stood on the road and watched the light which was now almost straight up the road and hovering. This part of the road was straight for about a mile heading slightly south of west. According to my map I would say the point at which we stopped would be about $15^{\circ} 14' S$, $17^{\circ} 8' E$. We were looking west 5 - 10° north of west from this point. We were watching the light in relation to a couple of thick & distinct trees directly below the light. It was between a quarter and half minutes to nine when we stopped. As we watched, the light moved very slowly downwards and to the right, to say about two or three degrees.

I have a one of the "Queensland Two Mile Series",
and covers the area from $145^{\circ} E$ to $145^{\circ} 45' E$ and $16^{\circ} 25' S$
to $17^{\circ} 15' S$ and includes the parishes of Daymar, Marx,
and Woodhinson. The light was first sighted from approximately
 $145^{\circ} 16' 30" E$, $17^{\circ} 7' 25" S$, and it was about $30^{\circ} N$ of W
from this point.

I hope that this report is adequate for your purposes
and might some time be useful to you in other investigations
of a similar nature. If I can be of any further assistance to
you please let me know.

Thompson St., runs app N by NNE while Sutherland St., runs app W to E. The object was first sighted when we approached the junction of the two streets, on the ocean front (I was driving). The object appeared at first to be a thin, narrow, dark brown cloud (distinguishable because other clouds in the sky were white and at a higher altitude). At this point also, it was an entity and appeared to be stationary. As we turned east into Sutherland St., we observed that the object was following a parallel course but several miles out to sea. It then separated, one part dipping towards the sea, the other part remaining above and this took on the appearance of a smoke trail. The lower part then rose, as if in an attempt to gain height, joined with the upper part and then dipped straight down behind the horizon.

Because of the speed of the object (and it maintained level flight until the last few seconds) I discounted the possibility that it was a helicopter or even a civil light aircraft.

Both the police and DCA advised me after I had reported it to them that no reports of civil aircraft in the vicinity had been received. Because of this and because of its speed I have come to the conclusion (and, I emphasize that this is pure conjecture) that the object may have been a small jet-engined military or naval aircraft of either Australian or of foreign origin.

Again, I emphasize that this last is conjecture on my part.

6. In 1966 the University of Colorado, under contract to the USAF, spent two years processing and investigating all American reports. Its findings have been published by Bantam Books as 'The Condon Report'. Its general conclusion is that 'nothing has come from the study of UFOs in the past 21 years that has added to scientific knowledge' and that 'further extensive study of UFOs probably cannot be justified in the expectation that science will be advanced thereby'. A panel of eminent scientists, chosen by the US National Academy of Sciences, has examined and endorsed the Condon Report.

7. The USAF 'Project Blue Book' investigation of unidentified aerial objects between 1953 and 1965 analysed 7,641 UFO reports. It concluded that:

- a. 80 percent of sightings were natural phenomena, hoaxes, birds or man-made objects;
- b. 17 percent of sightings provided insufficient data to permit thorough analysis and evaluation; and
- c. three percent were unidentified.

8. US and Soviet space exploration has found no evidence to support the theory of life on planets in our solar system. It seems that the Mariner series of space exploration to Mars has proved it a 'dead' planet. The only other source of extra-terrestrial life, then, would have to be in another 'solar system'. It would seem, therefore, that whilst it may be possible for extra-terrestrial life forms to visit Earth, it is improbable.

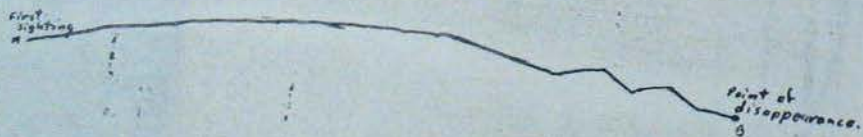
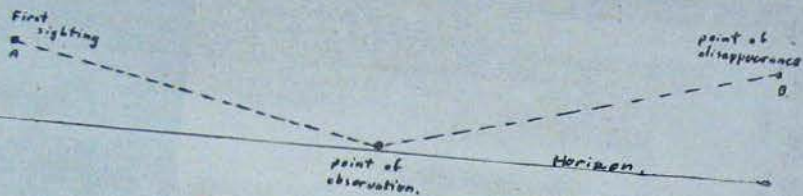

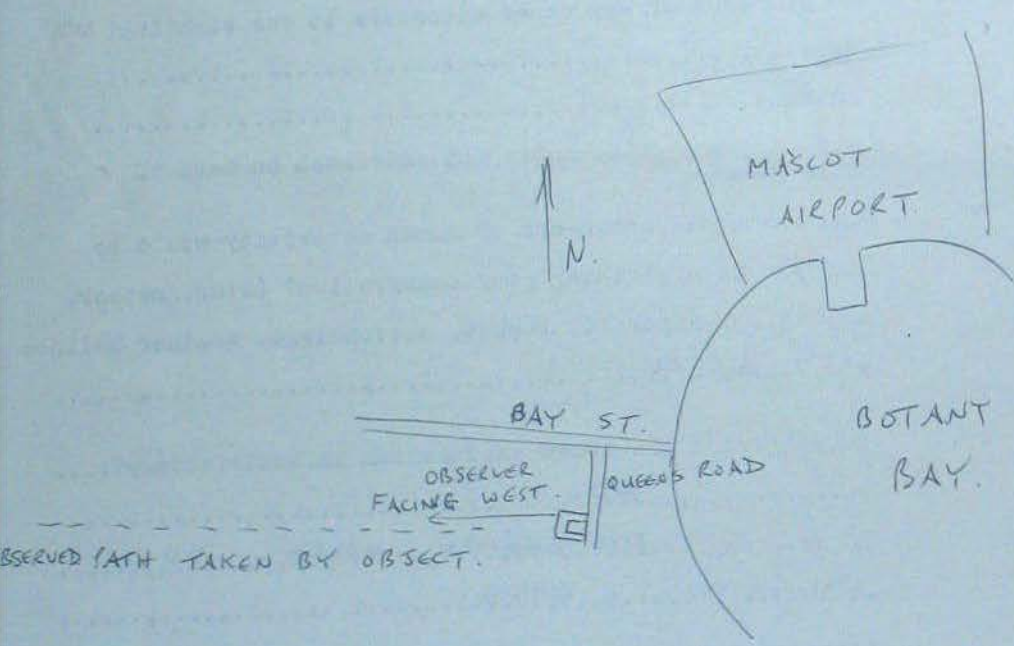

This light was seen three nights in succession. The first two nights, following a similar pattern appearing west south west of my home and moving up and down, and from side to side gradually moving away in a south westerley direction, with an exception that on the second night we saw a pale red or pink light at the bottom of the larger bright light.

On the third night the light hovered more or less in the same area for about twenty minutes. During this time I was able to borrow a pair of binoculars which gave us a clearer view of the object which seemed crystal shaped with a long narrow shadow on the right hand side reaching nearly to the centre of the light. The shadow later moved more to the top of the light but, still on the right hand side.

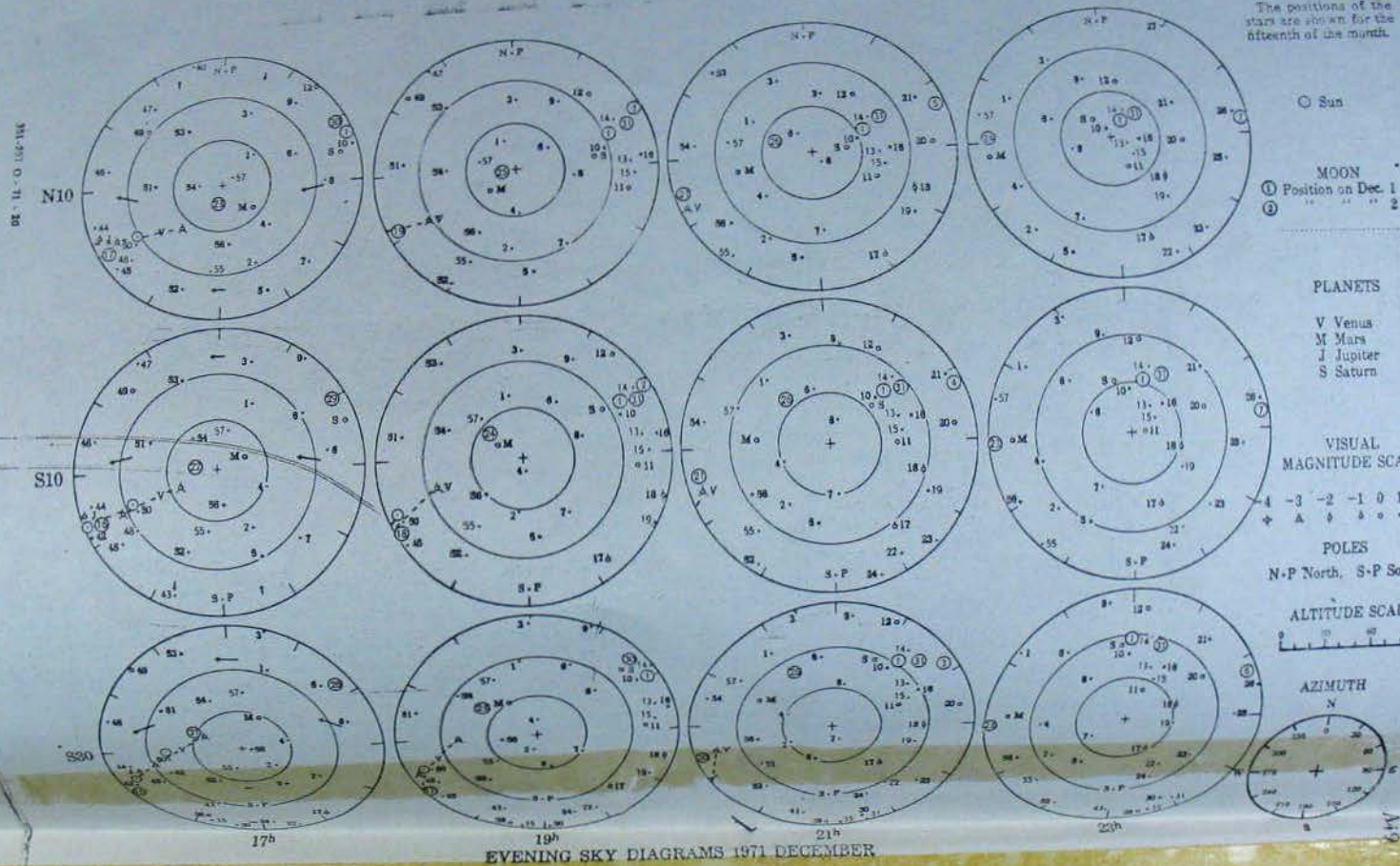
At intervals only, a smaller round light appeared from behind the larger light on the bottom left hand corner, moving away from and then returning towards the larger light, sometimes disappearing completely behind the larger light, moving much faster than the larger light.

This smaller light was a bright pink in colour and the size of the smaller light was like a ping-pong ball beside a foot-ball in comparison with the larger light.

After about twenty minutes, the larger yellow light moved away in a similar pattern as the two previous nights, leaving no trace of the smaller pink light.

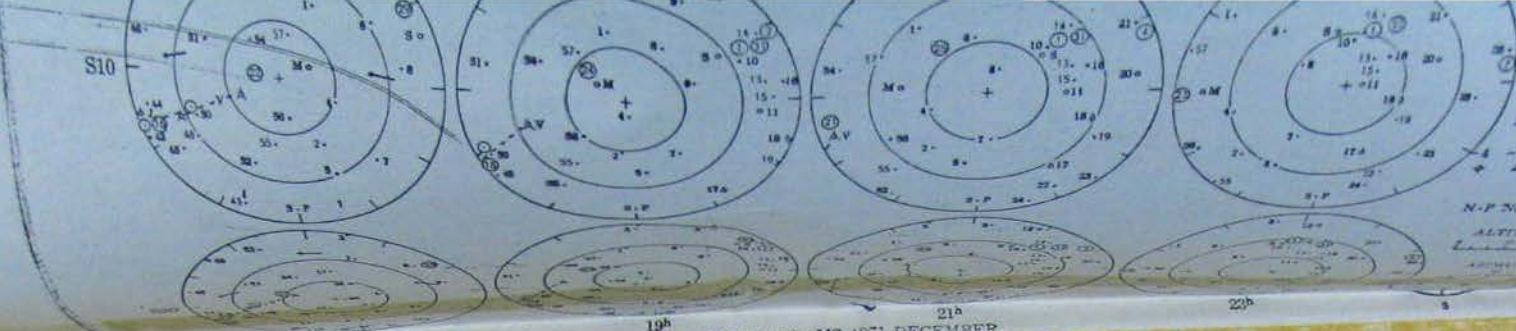

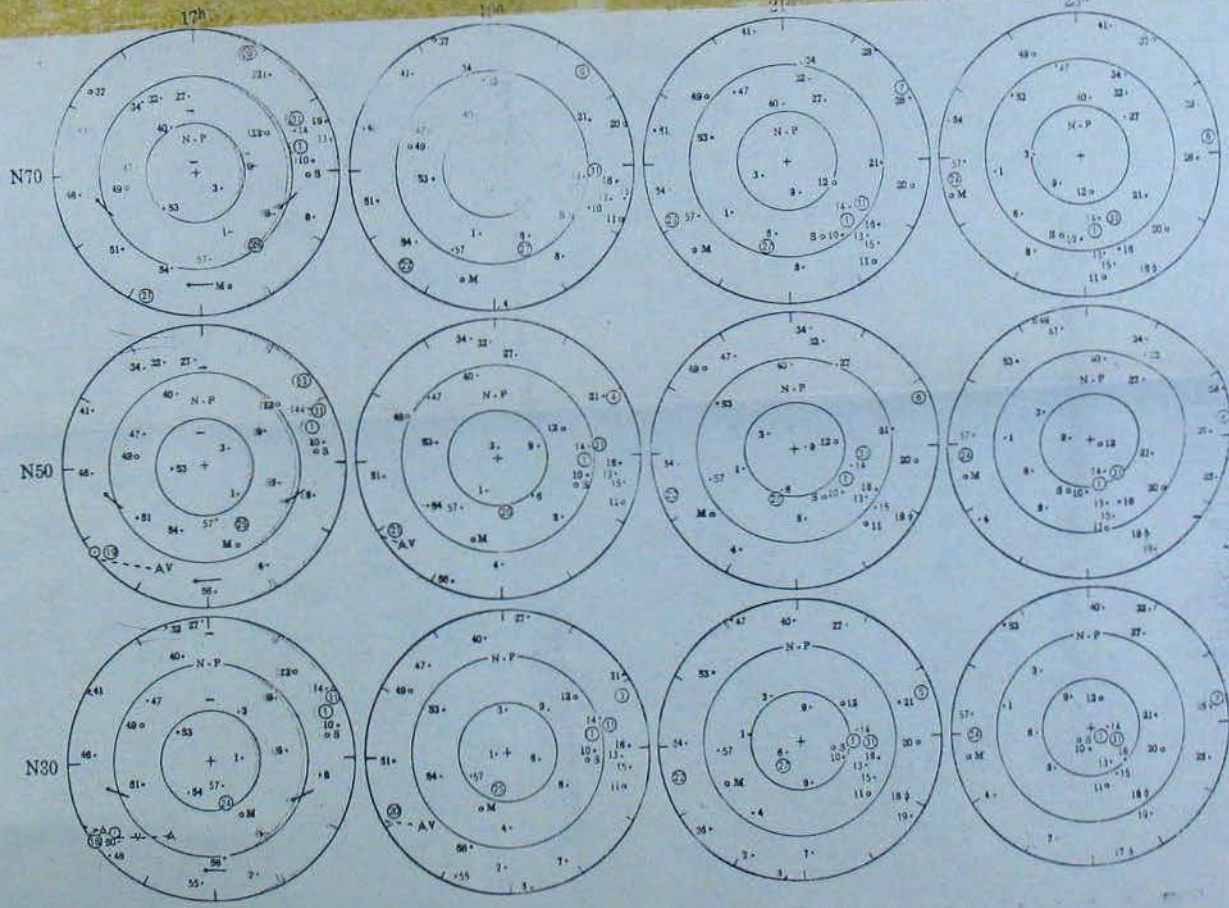

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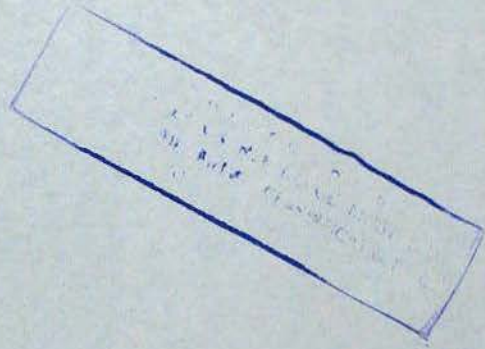

9 (d) Angle of elevation was estimated with a protractor and ruler from memory (on receipt of this report form on 11/2/72) Compass angle bearing was estimated from a road map of the area.

18/19 Object was first observed when almost over road in front of house, it was visible until it disappeared from view, in the distance. It is difficult to state any speed except to say that it moved ^{much} faster than a plane (which I have observed descending to land at Tullamore from the disaster area - i.e. penny overhead) P.T.O.

From first sighting to disappearance took approximately half a minute. The object seemed at a great height. That is, at least as high as a jet or a commercial jet plane. However, you will appreciate that at night, and with the absence of any sound, speed and height are difficult to estimate by an untrained observer.

The object did not ascend or descend, but kept to a straight path at a constant speed.

I have observed satellites passing at night, and in comparison, the object appeared lower, due to its size, and moved much faster.

22.

Because of its speed, object appeared to leave a short trail of light, though I consider the trail to be an illusion. I am quite certain that I did not see any vapour, or emission in the nature of a sky-rocket (firework) trail.

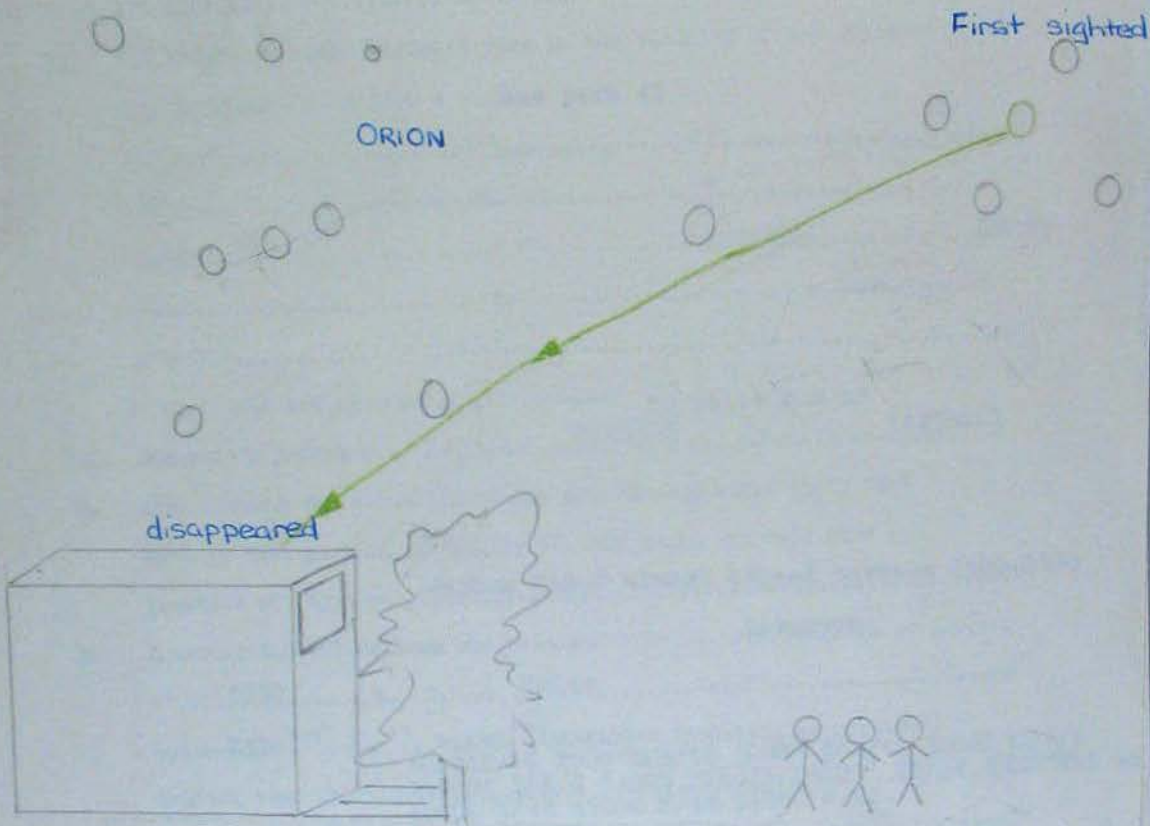
