

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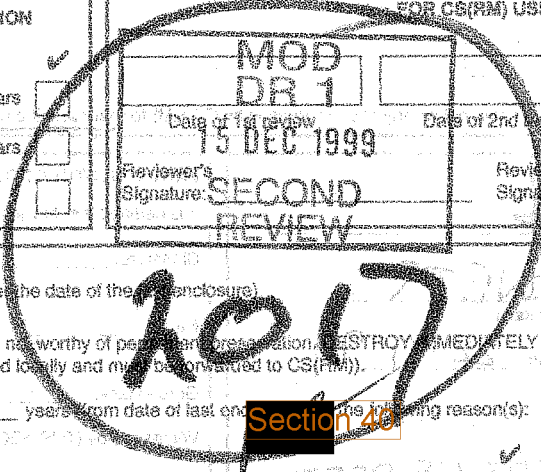

U F O HYPOTHESIS AND SURVIVAL QUESTIONS

It is the purpose of this monograph to consider briefly some of the human survival implications suggested by the various principal hypothesis concerning the nature of the phenomena loosely categorized as U F O (1).

1. ALL UFO'S ARE HOAXES: From the time when hoaxes were first noted in history, they were characterized by infrequency of occurrence and usually by a considerable restriction of their geographical extent. Rarely have men of science, while acting within their professional capacities, perpetrated hoaxes: The fact that UFO phenomenon have been witnessed all over the world from ancient times, and by considerable numbers of reputable scientists in recent times, indicates rather strongly that UFO's are not all hoaxes. (2) ^{RATHER THAN DIMINISHING,} If anything, the modern trend is toward increased reports, from all sources. In one three month period in 1953 (June, July, and August) Air Force records show 35 sightings whose nature could not be determined (3). If UFO's, contrary to all

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indications and expectations, are indeed hoaxes - hoaxes of a world-wide dimension - hoaxes of increasing frequency, then a human mental aberration of alarming proportions would appear to be developing. Such an aberration would seem to have serious implications for nations equipped with nuclear toys - and should require immediate and careful study by scientists.

2. ALL UFO'S ARE HALLUCINATIONS: People, of course, do hallucinate. Although groups of people hallucinating is rare, it has been known to happen. Machines have their own form of hallucination; the radar, in particular, "sees" temperature inversions. But a considerable number of instances exist in which there are groups of people and a radar or radars seeing the same thing at the same time; sometimes a person and a guncamera confirm each other's testimony (4). On occasion, physical evidence of a circumstantial nature was reported to have been found to support witnessed sightings (5). A continuing high percentage of reports of unusual aerial objects are being reported by people in responsible positions in science, government, and industry. (6). The sum of such evidence seems to argue strongly against all UFO's being hallucinations.

In spite of all the evidence to the contrary, if UFO's did turn out to be largely illusionary, the psychological implications for man would

certainly bring into strong question his ability to distinguish reality from fantasy. The negative effect on man's ability to survive in an increasingly complex world would be considerable - making it imperative that such a growing impairment of the human capacity for rational judgment be subjected to immediate and thorough scientific study - so that the illness could be controlled before it reaches epidemic proportions (7).

(For comments on mass hysteria and UFO's see source 8 below which contains a statement by Dr. Robert L. Hall, a social psychologist formerly with the AF Personnel and Training Research Center and the Program Director, Sociology and Psychology, National Science Foundation.)

3. ALL UFO'S ARE NATURAL PHENOMENA: If this hypothesis is correct the capability of air warning systems to correctly diagnose an attack situation is open to serious question.

If such objects can appear to trained military men as rockets or air craft and if such objects

should come over the Arctic from the direction of Russia on the United States, they could trigger "false reports of missile attacks". (10)

b. Many responsible military officers have developed a mental "blind spot" to objects which appear to have the characteristics of UFO's. (10) Such an attitude is an open invitation to the enemy to build a replica of the phenomena in order to penetrate the "hole" in his adversaries' defenses - Was this the purpose of the lens shaped reentry vehicle tested by the U.S. Air Force in 1960 and recently featured in the Washington, D.C. Evening Star, dated 24 September 1968, page A4?

c. Sometimes the phenomena appear to defy radar detection and to cause massive electromagnetic interference. Surely it is very important to discover the nature of these objects or plasmas before any prospective enemy can use their properties to build a device or system to circumvent or jam our air and space detection systems - Any nation certainly could use a system or device to penetrate enemy defenses. (11)

4. SOME UFO'S ARE SECRET EARTH PROJECTS: The above referenced U.S. Air Force reentry vehicle and an often publicized Canadian "saucer" project (9) leave little doubt as to the validity of this hypothesis.

(Undoubtedly, all UFO's should be carefully scrutinized to ferret-out such enemy (or "friendly") projects. Otherwise a nation faces the very strong

possibility of being intimidated by a new secret "doomsday" weapon.

5. SOME UFO'S ARE LINKED TO EXTRA-TERRESTRIAL INTELLIGENCE: According to some eminent scientists closely associated with the study of this phenomenon, this hypothesis cannot be disregarded (2) (The well documented sightings over WASH-DC, in 1952 strongly support this view). This hypothesis has a number of life-reaching human survival implications:

a. If "they" discover you, it is an old but hardly invalid rule of thumb, "they" are your technological superiors. Human history has shown us time and again the tragic results of a confrontation between a technologically superior civilization and a technologically inferior people. The "inferior" is usually subject to physical conquest.

b. Often in the past, a technologically superior people are also possessors of a more virile or aggressive culture. In a confrontation between two peoples of significantly different cultural levels, those having the inferior or less virile culture, most often suffer a tragic loss of identity and are usually absorbed by the other people.

c. Some peoples who were technologically and/or culturally inferior to other nations have survived - have maintained their identity - have equalized the differences between them and their adversaries. The Japanese people have given us an excellent example of the methods required to achieve such a survival:

- (1) full and honest acceptance of the nature of the inferiorities separating you from the advantages of the other peoples,
- (2) complete national solidarity in all positions taken in dealing with the other culture,
- (3) highly controlled and limited intercourse with the other side - doing only those actions advantageous to the foreigner which you are absolutely forced to do by circumstances,
- (4) a correct but friendly attitude toward the other people,

(5) A national eagerness to learn everything possible about the other culture - its technological and cultural strengths and weaknesses. This often involves sending selected groups and individuals to the other's country to become one of his kind, or even to help him in his wars against other adversaries.

(6) Adopting as many of the advantages of the opposing people as you can, and doing it as fast as possible - while still protecting your own identity by molding each new knowledge increment into your own cultural cast.

6. COMMENT: Although this paper has hardly exhausted the possible hypotheses related to the UFO phenomena, those mentioned above are the principal ones presently put forward. All of them have serious survival implications. The final answer to this mystery will probably include more than one of the above hypotheses.

Up until this time, the leisurely scientific approach has too often taken precedence in dealing with UFO questions. If you are walking along a forest path and someone yells, "rattler" your reaction would be immediate and defensive. You would not take time to speculate before you act. You would have to treat the alarm as if it were a real and immediate threat to your survival. Investigation would become an intensive emergency action to isolate the threat and to determine its precise nature - It would be geared to developing adequate defensive measures in a minimum amount of time.

It would seem a little more of this survival attitude is called for in dealing with the UFO problem.

Observations of chimpanzees while in a captive environment have shown that the animals tend to become confused and disoriented. Since they do not usually have adult chimps to teach them how to be good apes, they are not even sure of their behavior. Often their actions are patterned after human behavior and would have virtually no survival value in the wild. Lacking the challenge of environmental adaptation, the bodies of the animals atrophy and become subject to many diseases - mostly unknown in their wild counterparts. Reactions to stimuli usually become less responsive and suitable. Sex often becomes a year-long preoccupation instead of a seasonal madness.

Do the captivity characteristics of modern civilization cause a similar lessening of man's adaptive capability, of his health, of his ability to recognize reality, of his ability to survive?

Perhaps the UFO question might even make man undertake studies which could enable him to construct a society which is most conducive to developing a completely human being, healthy in all aspects of mind and body - and most important able to recognize and adapt to real environmental situations.

Handwritten notes: "I'll give you a New Statesman letter by [unclear]"

Very occasionally, the NSS mailbag contains a letter so utterly riveting that all other work must wait while its contents are digested.

Rafe Walley, of London NW6, is seeking my support for his campaign against his compulsory retirement from the civil service back in 1972 on the grounds of mental illness. Mad (to use his choice of word) he may be, but he writes a darned fine letter.

He starts with the assertion: "I am, or was, Judas Iscariot, and Adam (which is a laugh because I thought he was a myth)." Walley explains that he used to think he was Jesus Christ: "Then I stuck lucky. I was Judas and betraying him was the only thing to do." Jesus, it turns out, is Sibyl Gottlieb, wife of Walley's former boss at the Ministry of Power, Bernard Gottlieb; she is also Safan, Walley informs me.

Bernard Gottlieb, meanwhile, used to be Pontius Pilate. Walley writes "I think—although I can't prove this—he also was Leonardo da Vinci and Tolstoy."

There is more: A civil service sub-committee includes the three senior disciples—Peter, John and James. Peter was apparently an undersecretary at the Treasury until recently (he was

also Abel), while John is still an undersecretary at the Department of the Environment. Eve, in case you were wondering, is identified as Rosemary STEVENSON Bishop, a research officer at the Foreign Office; RoseMARY (geddit?) is also Mary Magdalene. "I think she was married to Jesus Christ [that's Sibyl Gottlieb] and they had an open marriage," says Walley. "I think I was invited to sleep with her too."

Other details are provided about the current incarnations of Socrates and Xanthippe, Joseph and Mary, and the archangels Gabriel and Michael, all of whom appear to be working in the British civil service in one capacity or another. Walley provides me with telephone numbers for them all. I mention this because, of all the various conspiracy theories to have landed on my desk in the past year, this is one of the least implausible. At least it beats my regular Czech correspondent who insists—with cuttings from his local tabloids to show that he's not alone in this view—that the collapse of communism in eastern Europe was actually a plot to enable communist party leaders to transfer state property into their own private hands.

many third world nations independence than was ever done by ... an invately decrepit Soviet Union" is highly questionable, since he is also very upbeat about a new Sino Japanese condominium being the principal support of his projected Asia-Pacific order.

Neither Japan nor China has any less of an imperialist pedigree than the west. Indeed, their individual records have often been worse, as those who recall the workings of Tokyo's pre-war Co-Prosperity Sphere in the Far East will readily testify, and as Tibetans today relate their experience as a subject people under Beijing's colonial rule. Emotive jibes such as "the new order", or "unification, seen from almost any angle of daily life, is more like an Anschluss", may satisfy certain prejudices about the nature of German government and society. They do not contribute to sensible and informed debate about what is actually happening in the former GDR.

Normally I have the highest regard possible for your excellent magazine.

During the Gulf crisis, you were one of the few publications to compare Iraq's invasion of Kuwait to Indonesia's invasion of East Timor in 1975, and drew attention to the double standards he went.

When printing an interview with Nelson Mandela, where he asks for sanctions on South Africa to stay ("Sanctions must stay", 27 September), it would be an almost unexcusable omission not to have asked Mr Mandela why, at a year ago in Australia, he reportedly had said that apartheid was an internal matter.

Why unforgivable? Mr Mandela had a visit to a South African dictator,

who buckled up to a million suspected communists in 1965 before taking power, and who sent in his troops in 1975 to invade East Timor, a former Portuguese colony in the South Pacific, which claimed the lives of 200,000 natives (almost a third of the former population). 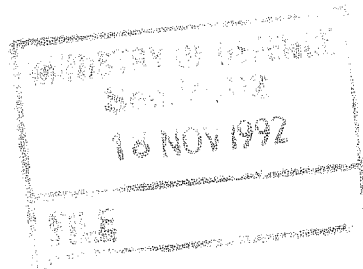

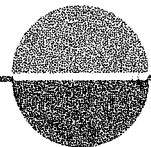

In fact, I have already been contacted by one of your associates. I explained that I would not be able to conduct an interview, but sent a letter setting out our policy. Given this limited involvement with the subject, the Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, nor are there any staff employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive, which are usually limited to very brief details of what was seen, are passed to staff in departments concerned with the air defence of the United Kingdom, who examine them as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these.

Despite some of the stories that are sometimes told, there is no question of our



attempting to cover up any incidents or keep any information about UFOs from the public. The Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence which supports the existence of alien life, or suggests that extraterrestrial spacecraft have ever visited the earth. Again, we are open-minded about the possibilities.

The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although a small number of files survived, and may be viewed at the Public Record Office. The files we hold in this office go back to about 1985, so we are able to answer specific queries that people have about particular sightings which have occurred in recent years, and can let them know whether we have a report on the incident, and if so, what it contains. Most of the reports that we have are relatively unexciting, and refer to little more than a vague shape or light in the sky.

This was seen for up to 1 minute until it passed out of sight at 6.30 pm on Saturday 19 September 1992.

In making a local appeal for other witnesses, a similar UFO was seen 10 years and 20 years previously!

I would be interested to learn whether your official records indicate anything of this nature in this area (or elsewhere, perhaps on a different occasion).

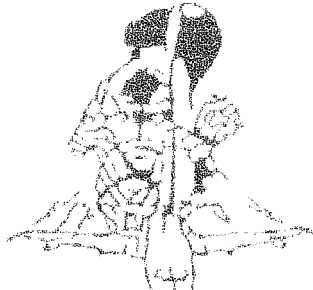

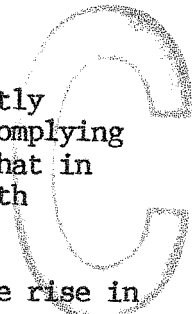

I am concerned with the revelations constantly arising about the contact that the government has had, and is complying with, with what have been described as ETI. I am concerned that in conjunction with the US, there is a program which is dealing with potentially hostile "Greys".

I thought it would be useful if I wrote to confirm the points I made yesterday when we spoke about the crash of a Lightning F6 aircraft, on 8 September 1970.

Following a number of approaches from researchers, who had heard stories that this aircraft had crashed during an encounter with a UFO, I tracked down the Aircraft Accident Report (AAR) for this particular crash. This document is classified Restricted, as is the case for all AARs, and cannot therefore be released. From my reading of this document I can tell you that the Lightning was taking part in a Tactical Evaluation Exercise designed to practise the night shadowing and shepherding of low speed targets. For the purpose of the exercise, the targets involved were Shackleton aircraft. The Lightning crashed into the sea while attempting to intercept one of the Shackletons. There is no indication of any unidentified target having been encountered, and no reason to suggest that there is any sort of UFO incident in any way connected with this tragic crash.

As I mentioned, I am trying to track down further papers relating to this accident, in the hope that there will be an Unclassified Military Aircraft Accident Summary (MAAS), that I can release. Given the time that has elapsed since the accident, there are no guarantees that I will be successful. I will let you know what, if anything, I track down.

Dear Sir,

Five months ago, around the 31 May 1992, I witnessed an explosion in deep space. I estimate the explosion to have been some Twenty thousand miles out with a duration of around Two seconds. It was unmistakable in it's appearance (i.e it was a long way away and it was huge).

The only public supporting evidence comes from the the television programme "Hard Copy". They aired a video which they claimed was taken from a NASA space shuttle. It showed what appeared to be a UFO move sideways to avoid what appeared to be a missile.

The "missile" was in fact another UFO doing what those things do best, and the UFO which moved sideways was nothing but cosmic dust by the time that episode of "Hard Copy" aired in New Zealand.

At the time the video was taken, and I am certain that it is no fake, there were five UFO's above the planet. They are machines, weapons used to escort a colonising mothership and to protect a colonised planet. All five UFO's had the same basic technology although Two of them were built by our ancestors and Three of them by another life form.

As long suspected their propulsion system is electro magnetic however their power source is their most facinating feature. Blame it on Einatien but by applying spin in outer space where perpetual motion machines are no problem you achieve three major things... i.e "as matter approaches the speed of light it's relative mass increases towards infinity"...

(a) Your engine is a central chamber (gas core) which has an outer casing applying spin to the gas and which is itself spinning, tiny amounts of a metal ore are fed into the gas core which form a black hole. At some point in the process the black hole goes bang releasing all sorts of energy for collection especially electro magnetic.

(b) By applying the spin of the engine to their outer casing the UFO changes it's relative size (i.e becomes very small and very heavy, a black hole of it's own accord) and is capable of actually approaching the planet.

Benefit or drawback the event horizon of the UFO alters the faster it spins, and the closer to the danger zone it comes (before it goes bang as well). This means that it is travelling forwards in time. To us it means that these beasts can leave enail trails in time.

(c) The engine is also used to start the spin of the pure fusion missiles. These space torpedoes are all warhead with a mechanism which tweaks the spin past critical on cue from the UFO (for UFO read "weapon").

In addition to their fusion engine, propulsion system, and nukes they have a backup power supply, light based communications, and an application of microwave technology that enables direct communication with the human mind (similar in effect I imagine to telepathy).

Their computers are A.I optical and can encapsulate the egos of their manufacturers. Ours, as you would assume, are love itself with their own children.

If that is not sufficiently awesome I have yet to mention the light collection and transmission devices which are left in deep space on approaching a planet and which I colloquially refer to as "mirrors".

The communication medium is light but it is light travelling at some fraction of C^2 not C . Once again I must refer to Einstein "Nothing travels faster than the speed of light except for light itself". I know for a fact that it is possible for these machines to see the future and the way this is accomplished is by light transmitted and retransmitted at C^2 .

The net effect being that as long as your mirror exists sometime in the future you see that future from the present and can also try and change it. When travelling between planets these weapons are used to prevent damage by meteor showers etc, their variable event horizon being particularly useful when it comes to predicting danger for the mothership.

We are not native to this planet. We arrived with our escorts of which we originally had three some twenty eight thousand years ago, establishing colonies in the regions now known as the Sahara and central Australia.

Our mother ship relied more on genetic support than cryogenic suspension and as a consequence encapsulating egos by means of computer was a necessity as they may well have needed to be our parents. The mother ship's propulsion system included rocket motors and a centrally located cluster of jets to assist in the landing and takeoff of such a large craft.

Although also equipped with a fusion engine and electro magnetic propulsion the mothership could not apply spin to it's outer hull as can the weapons. It was much more a conventional space vehicle. It was located under one of our many domes, each of which covered several square kilometres. It is gone, nuked in a surprise attack on our colonies Twenty Thousand years ago.

The other colonising life form with technology similar to our own attacked through our nuclear curtain that turned space into a junkyard. However three of their weapons got through to nuke one of ours and our colonies. Tragic mistake for all concerned. We still had two weapons which although they could not use nukes within the vicinity of the planet, could hide in matter when threatened (the reverse was also true).

The majority of our population were wiped out in the attack. Very quick and painless for them. We still had sixteen thousand people on the planet, scattered in various groups, all dealing with the effects of fusion warfare the most alarming from the contemporary point of view being genetic mutations and the effect of isolating the gene pool. Life outside the domes was lived by people who chose it, and by exploration and mining teams.

Communication between our weapons and ourselves post the event was difficult due to the six way nature of the conversations. Rebuilding was a virtual impossibility. This had to do with the nature of colonising life forms in that they do not inhabit all of the planet but rather leave it as a native zoo and inhabit areas like the Sahara which was open grassland.

So between 18,000 B.C and the rise of contemporary civilisations around the world, our once olive skinned long lived ancestors managed to loose truth. Nearly 1000 generations adapting to life outside the domes on a high gravity planet they managed to form the races which collectively are known as man.

The retention of truth was not helped as long term history bears out by such events as the great flood and the rise of religions. For instance the true genesis of the "Popoh Vuh" of the Mayan culture was obliterated by the Spanish in the name of Christ.

The opposition were waiting for one of two events. If our weapons should have failed or run out of fuel before them, they could have brought their mothership in (although that plan must have had a diminishing chance of success over the last two centuries).

Alternatively they could look for a chance of escape remembering that once outside the perimeter of the planet our nuclear curtain would go up again. They had a strategic advantage in numbers and wait us out they did. Religion was a lie invented to hide the Truth but too flimsy to rely upon since we made it back into space.

It was definitely not without substance however, the old question "How many angels could fit on a pin head?" being as close to the mark as it is possible to get.

Now due to the fact that we had almost come full circle by the time the opposition decided to chance an escape (via.. the abovementioned explosion being our "farewell and don't come back thanks") it is not impossible to believe that we can reach out and recover

that lost knowledge. It is almost a necessity given our present situation.

You may be wondering how I know this having never eyeballed a UFO in my life? Advanced microwave I guess (see "communications" inventory above). Our quote on the matter "It was this or hang on for stalemate."

The "opposition", until they began trying to use the "alien" concept to warp the Truth, were rather keen on the concept of God as an alternative to domed civilisations and modern warfare. Yet when a race has mastered inter stellar travel and the time continuum they are Gods. At least we were once.

The major outstanding points are...

- Our weapons desperately need refuelling. Only a handful of countries are capable of reaching them and they are totally incapable of landing. If we should let them run out of fuel and drift off into space we are defenceless against invasion. I personally view a repeat performance as unlikely as our population has increased to the point where the planet would be far less attractive as a home to any colonising life form.
- There are property rights at stake as the engineering and stored knowledge of the Two weapons (which we still have at the Two Hundred and Fifty mile level) could revolutionise life for everybody. It is only logical that the whole world be told as soon as possible so that the U.N. can begin to act as Trustee.

But where is the proof? What sort of idiot would write a letter like this without proof. Well regardless of this I have written to one or two governments, MATA SA in France and NASA in the U.S.

I hope that one of the organisations whom I've contacted will release enough factual information to allow the weapons to be delivered into the hands of the U.N. I know them to be quite capable of speaking for themselves once a line of communication is established (a refuelling space walk perhaps?).

Thank you for your letter dated 26 October to the Secretary of State for Defence, in which you asked about UFOs and extraterrestrial life. I have been asked to reply.

Although the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings, our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do - and this has not been the case so far - we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Given this limited involvement with the subject, the Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, nor are there any staff employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive, which are usually limited to very brief details of what was seen, are passed to staff in departments concerned with the air defence of the United Kingdom, who examine them as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these.

Despite some of the stories that are sometimes told, there is no question of our attempting to cover up any incidents or keep any information about UFOs from the public. The Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence which supports the existence of alien life, or suggests that extraterrestrial spacecraft have ever visited the earth. Again, we are open-minded about the possibilities.



The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although a small number of files survived, and may be viewed at the Public Record Office. The files we hold in this office go back to about 1985, so we are able to answer specific queries that people have about particular sightings which have occurred in recent years, and can let them know whether we have a report on the incident, and if so, what it contains. Most of the reports that we have are relatively unexciting, and refer to little more than a vague shape or light in the sky.

You may be interested to know the numbers of UFO sightings reported to the Ministry of Defence in recent years; the figures are as follows:

So far this year we have received just over 100 sightings, although at least a dozen of these were almost certainly sightings of an airship - illuminated from the inside - which was flying over London a lot during February and March. I saw this myself, and can understand how, from a distance, this generated reports of a bright cigar-shaped UFO travelling slowly over London. I mention this as a useful example of how an explanation can often be found for an apparently quite exotic UFO report. Many reports this year have been caused by lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds; such equipment is used increasingly in advertising and entertainment, especially at outdoor music festivals.

As I am sure you already know, most large bookshops and libraries have a fair selection of books on the subject of UFOs. "Above Top Secret" by Timothy Good, and "The UFO Encyclopaedia" by John Spencer are two books that contain a lot of information that you may find useful.

I would also suggest that you get in touch with some of the civilian organisations currently engaged in study of the UFO phenomenon, who will doubtless be keen to help, and put forward their own opinions. I also suspect that the more exotic "close encounter" UFO reports are generally made to such groups, rather than to us; we get very few such reports. I suggest the following societies:

When we spoke last Friday I promised to let you have a letter setting out the Ministry of Defence's policy and views on UFOs, together with some other related information that you may find useful. Hopefully your daughter will be able to draw upon the information in this letter when writing her essay.

Although the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings, our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these.

Despite some of the accusations that are sometimes made, there is no question of our attempting to cover up any incidents or keep any information about UFOs from the public. The Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence which supports the existence of alien life, or suggests that extraterrestrial spacecraft have ever visited the earth.

The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from



public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although a small number of files survived, and may be viewed at the Public Record Office. In fact, most of the reports that we get are relatively unexciting, and refer to little more than a vague light or shape in the sky.

You may be interested to know the numbers of UFO sightings reported to the Ministry of Defence in recent years; the figures are as follows:

So far this year we have received around 100 sightings, although at least a dozen of these were almost certainly sightings of an airship - illuminated from the inside - which was flying over London a lot during February and March. I saw this myself, and can understand how, from a distance, this generated reports of a bright cigar-shaped UFO travelling slowly over London. I mention this as a useful example of how an explanation can often be found for an apparently quite exotic UFO report.

As we discussed, we do not break down UFO reports by occupation of witnesses, so there is little that I can offer on the specific question of UFOs seen by the military or by civil pilots. I would probably have noticed a reference to a UFO having been seen by a military witness, but do not recall many cases. Perhaps the most famous such case in the UK concerns the alleged UFO sighting at Rendlesham Forest in December 1980. The only information we have on this is the report by Lt Col Charles Halt of the United States Air Force. We are satisfied that the events described are of no defence significance. I have attached a copy of Lt Col Halt's report, which you may find interesting. You will probably find mention of this in most UFO books. Such books are probably your best source of information on cases involving military personnel or civil pilots, as they often highlight such cases; "Above Top Secret" by Timothy Good, and "UFO Encyclopaedia" by John Spencer are two books that may be useful; any large bookshop or library should have copies of these books, and others on the subject.

I hope this is helpful, and I should like to wish your daughter the best of luck with her essay. If you or she have any further questions, please let me know.

THE SQUADRON COMMANDER CLEARED THE PILOT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE TACEVAL. THEREFORE, IN THE BELIEF THAT HE WOULD NOT BE INVOLVED IN A SHADOWING OR SHEPHERDING MISSION, UNKNOWN TO THE STATION AND SQUADRON, THE TACEVAL TEAM HAD JUST CHANGED THE EXERCISE SCENARIO FROM NORMAL INTERCEPTIONS TO INTERCEPTION, OR SHADOWING OR SHEPHERDING ON SLOW SPEED LOW FLYING TARGETS. THE TARGETS WERE SHACKLETON A/C FLYING AT 120 KNOTS, AND AT THE MINIMUM AUTHORISED HEIGHT OF 1500 FEET AS SPECIFIED IN GROUP ORDERS. THE PILOT TOOK OFF AND WAS STILL UNAWARE OF THE TYPE OR HEIGHT OF HIS TARGET. HE WAS TOLD TO ACCELERATE TOWARDS THE TARGET WHICH WAS 28 NMS AWAY. AT 2039Z, THE PILOT ACKNOWLEDGED INSTRUCTIONS. HE WAS GIVEN VARIOUS ALTERATIONS TO HEADING UNTIL HE ANNOUNCED THAT HE WAS IN CONTACT WITH LIGHTS BUT WOULD HAVE TO MANOEUVRE TO SLOW DOWN, HIS VOICE SOUNDED STRAINED AS THOUGH HE WAS AFFECTED BY 'G'. WHEN AT 2042Z THE LIGHTNING PILOT FAILED TO ACKNOWLEDGE INSTRUCTIONS, HE INSTITUTED EMERGENCY PROCEDURES, HOWEVER, HE EXPERIENCED DIFFICULTY IN MAKING CONTACT WITH THE SHACKLETON BECAUSE HE DID NOT HAVE IMMEDIATE ACCESS TO 243.0 MHZ. AN IMMEDIATE AIR SEARCH BY THE TARGET SHACKLETON, AND SUBSEQUENT AIR/SEA SEARCH THE FOLLOWING DAY, FAILED TO DETECT ANY TRACE OF THE A/C OR PILOT. FROM CALCULATIONS PROVIDED BY THE BOT AND EXPERT SOURCES, A SEARCH BY A RN MINESWEEPER "LOCATED" THE WRECKAGE, NEARLY 2 MONTHS LATER. THE A/C WAS IN A COMPLETE STATE EXCEPT THAT THE PORT WING HAD BROKEN OFF AND BUCKLED UNDER THE FUSELAGE, AND SOME FUSELAGE PANELS WERE MISSING. THE COCKPIT CANOPY WAS ATTACHED BUT NOT CLOSED AND THERE WAS NO SIGN OF THE PILOT. EXAMINATION OF THE WRECKAGE SHOWED THAT THE A/C HAD STRUCK THE SEA AT A LOW SPEED, IN A TAIL-DOWN ATTITUDE WITH A MODERAL RATE OF DESCENT. IT APPEARED TO HAVE PLANGED ON THE SURFACE AND COME TO REST COMPARATIVELY SLOWLY. BOTH THROTTLES WERE IN THE REHEAT GATES, THERE WAS A NOSE-UP TRIM OF 6 DEG, LINC WAS UP, FLAPS DOWN AND AIRBRAKES OUT. THERE WAS NO SIGN OF FIRE OR EXPLOSION AND EXPERT EXAMINATION REVEALED NO INDICATION THAT THE A/C WAS OTHER THAN SERVICEABLE AT IMPACT. THE BOARD CONCLUDED THAT A COMBINATION OF A DIFFICULT TASK IN RUSHED CIRCUMSTANCES AND LACK OF TRAINING IN THE LOW SPEED VISIDENT AND SHEPHERDING TECHNIQUES, LED TO A SITUATION WHERE THE PILOT FAILED TO MONITOR THE HEIGHT OF HIS A/C WHILST SLOWING DOWN AND ACQUIRING HIS TARGET, AND THAT HE HAD INADVERTENTLY FLOWN HIS A/C INTO THE SEA. THE PILOT HAD ATTEMPTED TO RECOVER THE SITUATION BY SELECTING REHEAT, WHICH FAILED TO TAKE EFFECT, WITH THE A/C TAIL SKIMMING ON THE WATER.

Circumstances

1. No 5 Squadron was participating in a Strike Command Tactical Evaluation (Taceval) exercise at RAF Binbrook. The pilot of the accident aircraft was a USAF exchange officer whose experience included two tours of duty on USAF F102 all weather fighter aircraft. He had accumulated 121 hours on Lightning aircraft, of which 18 were at night, and had obtained a Green Instrument Rating. He had been categorised as "limited combat ready" after 8 weeks on the Squadron. This was an unusually short period but the category was justified by his USAF experience as squadron pilot and OCU instructor, and by his results in simulator training and dual flying tactical and weapons checks on the Lightning. The limitation on his operational status was due to his need for further training in maximum effective use of the Lightning weapons system and because he had not yet met the requirement for full visident missions, he had completed only two of the specified three phases of preparation. In consequence at his stage of training at the time of the accident he would only have been cleared for shadowing and shepherding tasks with the target in full visual contact. The Squadron Commander cleared the pilot to participate in the Taceval, therefore, in the belief that he would not be involved in a shadowing or shepherding mission.

2. On the day of the accident the pilot was ordered to his aircraft at 1834Z hours, and, after waiting on readiness, was scrambled at 1947Z hours. He started taxiing, however his scramble was cancelled and he was ordered back to dispersal. On return he ordered fuel only and no turnround servicing. According

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to standing instructions the engineer officer on duty ordered a full turnround. The turnround was delayed, and during this delay the pilot was warned that he would be scrambled as soon as he was ready. He asked the groundcrew to expedite the turnround, however, before it was completed he called for engine starting, failed to sign the servicing certificate and taxied out at 2025Z hours. As he entered the runway the metal turnround board and attached servicing certificate fell off the aircraft.

3. Unknown to the station and squadron, the Taceval team had just changed the exercise scenario from normal interceptions to interception, or shadowing or shepherding on slow speed low flying targets. The targets were Shackleton aircraft flying at 160 knots, and at the minimum authorised height of 1500 feet as specified in Group Orders. The minimum speed for Lightning aircraft for visident practices is 200 knots, which was not specified as an order, but was referred to in the Lightning squadron training syllabus. The syllabus made no reference to shadowing or shepherding techniques. Shadowing and shepherding are however included in the war task of Lightning squadrons and, thus, were theoretically subject to Taceval.

4. The pilot took off at 2030Z and was ordered to climb to FL 100; he was still unaware of the type or height of his target. He was handed over to the MRS and was given in a short space of time, the QNH, and height of target (1,500 ft), and a shadowing task with target speed of 160 knots. He was told to accelerate towards the target which was 28 nms away. At 2039Z, the pilot acknowledged instructions to accelerate to 0.95M to effect a rapid take over from another Lightning, this in a tone of surprise. He was given various alterations to heading until he announced that he was in contact with lights but would have to manoeuvre to slow down; his voice sounded strained as though he was affected by 'G'. At 2040Z the MRS broadcast that the Controller was being changed; at this time the Lightning was turning port at about 220 knots. At 2041Z the aircraft was seen by the other Lightning pilot, who had just broken away from the target, to be at about 2,000 yards astern and 500 to 1,000 feet above the Shackleton, in a port turn. The Shackleton crew then saw the aircraft, apparently very low. The MRS Chief Controller had appreciated that this was a difficult interception, and had monitored the latter stages very closely. When at 2042Z the Lightning pilot failed to acknowledge instructions, he instituted

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emergency procedures, however, he experienced difficulty in making contact with the Shackleton because he did not have immediate access to 243.0 Mhz. An immediate air search by the target Shackleton, and subsequent air/sea search the following day, failed to detect any trace of the aircraft or pilot.

Determination of Causes

5. From calculations provided by the Board of Inquiry and expert sources, a search by a RN minesweeper "located" the wreckage nearly 2 months later. The aircraft was in a complete state except that the port wing had broken off and buckled under the fuselage, and some fuselage panels were missing. The cockpit canopy was attached but not closed and there was no sign of the pilot. Examination of the wreckage showed that the aircraft had struck the sea at a low speed, in a tail-down attitude with a minimal rate of descent. It appeared to have planed on the surface and come to rest comparatively slowly. Both throttles were in the reheat gates, there was a nose-up trim of 6°, undercarriage was up, flaps down and airbrakes out. There was no sign of fire or explosion and expert examination revealed no indication that the aircraft was other than serviceable at impact.

6. The ejection seat lower handle had been pulled to the full extent allowed by the interrupter link on the main gun sear. The canopy gun sear had been withdrawn, but the canopy gun cartridge had received only a light percussion strike and had not fired. The canopy had been released by the normal operating lever, the harness QRB was undone, the PEO disconnected and the PSP lanyard had been released from the life preserver and was lying tangled in the cockpit.

7. The Board concluded that a combination of a difficult task in rushed circumstances and lack of training in the low speed visident and shepherding techniques, led to a situation where the pilot failed to monitor the height of his aircraft whilst slowing down and acquiring his target, and that he had inadvertently flown his aircraft into the sea. The pilot had attempted to recover the situation by selecting reheat, which failed to take effect, with the aircraft tail skimming on the water. He had then initiated an ejection which was unsuccessful because of the interruption of the sequence by the failure of the canopy to jettison. He then manually abandoned the aircraft but because he has not been found, he was presumed to have drowned during or after his escape.

8. The light percussion strike on the canopy gun cartridge occurred because of negligent servicing, in that the firing unit was incorrectly seated because of damaged screw threads.

9. The Board made a number of recommendations relating to inconsistencies and omissions in orders, instructions and the training syllabus, concerning low speed visidents and the shadowing and shepherding techniques. They also made recommendations concerning the access of MRSs to emergency frequencies, and for remedial action concerning Lightning canopy ejection guns.

Remarks of the Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief

10. The AOC-in-C stated that in common with so many accidents, this accident had no single root cause, and he agreed with the Board's conclusions. He said that the pilot made an error of judgment in allowing his aircraft to get into a position from which he was unable to recover. Because of mitigating circumstances, his error was excuseable.

11. The AOC-in-C's comments on the Board's recommendations are covered below.

Subsequent Action

12. The Board's recommendation concerning access to the emergency radio frequency by the MRS was not accepted by the AOC-in-C, who stated that MRSs already have the facility to select 243.0 Mhz although they do not normally monitor it. He considered that the allocation of a safety frequency for use during all peacetime exercises had more merit.

13. The hitherto undetected weakness in training for the identification, shadowing and shepherding of low altitude, low speed targets, have been rectified as follows:

- a. No 11 (Fighter) Group Air Staff Orders now specify a minimum speed for visident targets, and minimum target speeds and heights for shadowing and shepherding operations by day and night.
- b. New tactics have been devised and published in the Lightning Tactics Manual.
- c. Shadowing and shepherding tasks have been included in the Annual Training Syllabus for Lightning Squadrons.

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- d. Pilots of aircraft under GCI control must now read back altimeter settings before descending to low level.
- e. A radio safety frequency is allocated for all exercises.
- f. During all pertinent exercises, a target radio frequency plan will be available so that two way communication between the MRS and target aircraft can be established rapidly in any emergency situation.
14. Servicing procedures for the inspection, re-arming and servicing of canopy firing units have been amended.
15. All ejection seat firing units of a type similar to that which prevented ejection in this accident have been inspected for signs of damage.
16. The design of the canopy firing unit has been examined. No change will be made, however, the Design Authority has been made aware of the failure for consideration in future designs.
17. The deficiencies revealed by the change of controller at the MRS and the over-rapid attempt to effect the changeover of the intercepting aircraft, have been drawn to the attention of the MRS.
18. The effect of the false scramble and the interrupted turnaround in producing conditions of stress, has been drawn to the attention of all II Group Stations.
19. The deficiencies in planning, and liaison with the station operations staff concerning the change of exercise scenario, have been investigated with the MRS and Taceval Team.
20. Negligence in the fitting of the canopy jettison firing unit could not be attributed to any specific person. The Corporal who was responsible for servicing the unit was found excusably negligent. No disciplinary action was taken against him because of the involvement of other personnel, the lack of clear servicing instructions and guidance on the acceptable degree of burring of the screw threads, the lack of evidence that he had caused the damage to the threads, and because he did not finally fit the unit to the jettison gun.

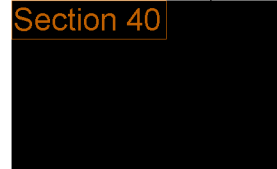

Thank you for your letter dated 18 October concerning the UFO report that you are currently investigating under the reference Section 40048.

I have checked our files, and can confirm that we do not have any reports that tie in with this case.

Although I appreciate that the lights were seen for a short period, I would think that the most likely explanation would be that the lights were caused by searchlights reflecting off the clouds. This could be because the searchlights were a long way away, and only briefly pointed in such a direction to have been seen by the witnesses. It could also mean that the searchlight were merely being tested, as opposed to being used at some event.

Whether or not searchlights were responsible for this particular sighting, it does seem as if the use of lasers and searchlights is on the increase, especially at music festivals and other large outdoor events. We are aware of many UFO sightings which have almost certainly been caused by such equipment. If BUFORA is not already doing so, it may be useful to make contact with those companies that operate or lease such equipment on a regular basis.

Section 40 and I were night-fishing on the south bank of the R. Ouse at the above-location - we were sitting together and facing due north. Simultaneously, our attention was drawn to two patches of quite bright light which seemed to suddenly appear just above a fairly large tree on the opposite river bank. The patches of light were both about 4 x diameter of the full-moon, roughly circular and almost touching each other. Before we had time to comment to each other, the lights appeared to accelerate across the sky, still retaining their relative positions at enormous speed.

When the lights first appeared, they were approx. NNE of us, and when they disappeared, were approx. SE of us; We estimated their elevation as between 50 - 60°. From the time we first noticed the lights until they had disappeared took about 3 - 4 seconds, although just after the 'event', we were aware of a solitary aircraft passing overhead which we could see through a small break in the cloud. This was very high up, travelling slowly in a NW to SE direction, and because of its distance from us, was making relatively little noise.

What made the lights so strange was the apparent lack of any associated sound, and their incredible speed and acceleration.

The obvious explanation seemed to be that two spotlights were being swept across the clouds from either above or below the clouds; but the more we analysed what we had seen, the harder it became to make this explanation fit.

Both of us often night-fish a stretch of river near Buckingham where we often see F111 aircraft returning after dark to Upper Heyford base. As, at this point, they are only a few miles from base, they usually are using their headlights,

Initially, one sees a bright patch of light approaching in the cloud with little or no associated sound. The light shows up the details and formation within the clouds; eventually, the aircraft noise becomes quite extreme.

We both agreed that our initial impression of the lights we saw was the same as that of the F111s - much cloud detail being visible and the brightness being very similar. We were both about to comment to each other that F111s, or some other aircraft, were approaching when the extraordinary acceleration took place - the lack of any associated sound made us immediately re-appraise our judgement.

Lights being shone from the cloud could have accounted for the lack of noise and the acceleration, but due to the haziness of the atmosphere, any beam of light sufficiently powerful to produce such coherent patches of light on the clouds would have been easily visible. I'm certain that the detail we were seeing of the cloud's internal structure couldn't have been visible with an upward shining light.

The distinct impression was either of one source emitting two lights or two other sources with a light each shining down onto the clouds moving incredibly fast and making no noise.

Another possibility would seem to be a stationary, silent source above the clouds sweeping two beams of light across the clouds - a balloon perhaps? It would seem unlikely at that time of night and somewhat dangerous.

Another feature that would seem to be at odds with the 'swept beams' idea was that throughout the sighting the size and shape of the light patches remained the same while they traversed between 100 - 120° of sky.

For the solitary aircraft mentioned to be the source of the lights seems impossible due to its height and distance: it would have to have used incredibly powerful lights, almost akin to laser beams, to have produced the same effect.

I hope this report is of some interest to you - I have previously reported to you of an 'event' I saw near Cranfield in 1974. Despite spending hundreds of hours night-fishing and having spent many years pursuing my interest in astronomy, this is the first 'unknown' I've witnessed since then.

Section 40 and I are at odds on two points of our observation: 1) **Section 40** thought the light patches were slightly elliptical, whereas I remain convinced that they were circular, 2) I thought the solitary aircraft was a jet - **Section 40** **Section 40** recalls it as being propellor-driven.

Although we couldn't be sure of the height of the cloud (it began to rain about 30 mins after the sighting, so it probably wasn't very high) we both felt sure that the distance the lights travelled in the time we saw them must have approached 2 - 3 miles at least; a possible speed of 3 600 mph.

and if the cloudbase is low, the effect can be quite eerie.

The relative position of the M.1. seems suspicious, but for the reasons already considered, any connection seems difficult to make.

We have night-fished this stretch of river many times and have never seen anything remotely similar.

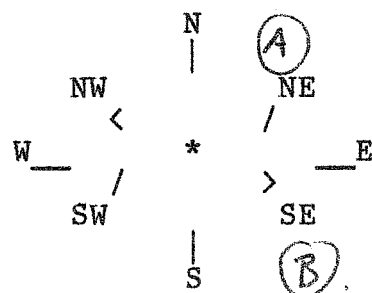

Thank you for your letter dated 12 October concerning UFOs. The CAA have passed your letter to me, as the Ministry of Defence acts as the focal point, at official level, for UFO sightings. I will set out the policy and views of the MOD, together with some other related information that you may find useful. Hopefully you will be able to draw upon the information in this letter when writing your essay.

Although the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings, our sole concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these.

Despite some of the accusations that are sometimes made, there is no question of our attempting to cover up any incidents or keep any information about UFOs from the public. The Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence which supports the existence of alien life, or suggests that extraterrestrial spacecraft have ever visited the earth.



The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although a small number of files survived, and may be viewed at the Public Record Office. In fact, most of the reports that we get are relatively unexciting, and refer to little more than a vague light or shape in the sky.

You may be interested to know the numbers of UFO sightings reported to the Ministry of Defence in recent years; the figures are as follows:

So far this year we have received around 100 sightings, although at least a dozen of these were almost certainly sightings of an airship - illuminated from the inside - which was flying over London a lot during February and March. I saw this myself, and can understand how, from a distance, this generated reports of a bright cigar-shaped UFO travelling slowly over London. I mention this as a useful example of how an explanation can often be found for an apparently quite exotic UFO report.

Thank you for your letter dated 15 October in which you asked if we had any material relating to an alleged UFO incident that occurred during 1970.

Regrettably, if we had received a UFO report, the appropriate file would by now have been archived, and sent to the Public Record Office, where it would be covered by the 30 year rule, and not be available for viewing until 30 years after the last action was taken. Although it does not help in this instance, you will wish to be aware that all UFO reports (even if they were made by pilots) should be submitted to this office. I have certainly not heard this story before, and have come across no references to any such incident.

While we do not have a UFO report, I have been able to trace information relating to the loss of the Lightning aircraft. The aircraft concerned was taking part in a Tactical Evaluation Exercise designed to practise the night shadowing and shepherding of low speed targets. For the purpose of the exercise, the targets involved were Shackleton aircraft. There is no indication of any UFO sighting having occurred, and no indication of any unusual or high speed contact.

Having been directed to you as one who deals with UFO reports I wonder if you can help with my enquiry.

My enquiry concerns a UFO sighted and tracked by the RAF during 1970. The details are as follows:

At 20.17 on the night of September 8th 1970 radar operators at Saxa Vord picked up an unidentified target travelling south west. Thinking this was an ordinary intrusion by Russian 'planes they scrambled two Lightnings from RAF Leuchars. As the 'planes were vectored onto the target in accelerated to approx 17,400 mph and vanished from the screen. Hardly the speed of anything flying at the time, I'm sure you will agree. Two F4 Phantoms were then scrambled from the USAF base at Keflavik in Iceland. These also failed to locate the target, despite having radar contact.

Eventually a Lightning was scrambled from RAF Binbrook in Lincolnshire and vectored onto the target by radar controllers at RAF Staxton Wold. The Lightning, number XS894, left Binbrook at 22.06 and managed a visual contact with the object, now off the Yorkshire coast. The Lightning pilot described the object as a UFO, being too bright to look at easily and of a conical shape. As he closed on the object it turned toward him and all radio contact was lost. The Lightning was later found on the sea bed of Flamborough Head.

As the details of time, place etc are so specific perhaps you could let me know anything else which exists on file about this case. If perhaps the information would be elsewhere as the UFO sighting was made by a pilot then perhaps you could forward me the name and address of the correct person to approach. I look forward to receiving your reply and hopefully further details about this fascinating, and obviously well-documented case.

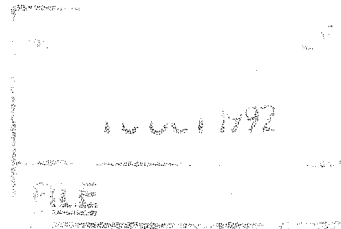

Thank you for your letter to the Ministry of Defence about UFOs. I have been asked to reply, and would like to apologise for the delay in so doing.

We are grateful to you for writing about your experience, although I should explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the main concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not Unidentified Flying Objects, as reported to us, present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects. I'm sure you will appreciate that defence funds are fully committed to the continuing security of the UK, within the NATO Alliance, against, first and foremost aggression from Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles and a host of other rare conjunctions.

I am not sure however that this will be of much comfort to you in explaining your own experience and I am sorry that we cannot be more helpful. I quite appreciate that some sightings where rational explanations are not readily available can be very disturbing and I wonder whether you might like to write to one of the major UFO societies in the UK. Thank you for your letter dated 8 October concerning your investigation of a UFO sighting that occurred on 19 July 1992, on the M3 motorway.

With regard to your questions about aircraft operating in the area at the time, and information about radar sightings, there is little that I can offer, as we do not have the time or resources to undertake checks of this sort. I doubt that you would be able to get a definitive answer on these points in any case, so long after the event. I suspect that you would need the exact time of the sighting, as well as the date, to make progress on this.

All UFO sightings that are passed to military establishments should be passed here, so we should have any report that was made to one of the establishments you mentioned - or indeed a UFO report made by personnel at one of these establishments. In fact, we have just one report that might possibly tie in with the one you are investigating. I have attached a copy for you, with details of the witness's name and address deleted in the usual way.

I could not draw any firm conclusion from either report, and some of the details are quite vague, but I did wonder whether lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds could be responsible; as you will doubtless be aware, the use of such equipment is now quite common in advertising and entertainment, and has generated many UFO reports involving lights in the sky.

POSSIBLE UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT, M3 MOTORWAY, 19/7/92

I am writing to you as an investigator for the British UFO Research Association, in connection with an incident which took place on the M3 motorway during the early hours of the 19th July, 1992. I understand that one of the witnesses to the incident contacted you recently on the matter, and that you were kind enough to refer her to our Association's office.

The case has been referred to me for investigation and I have begun making initial enquiries to the various civil bodies in the area. However, examination of a map for the area surrounding the M3 between Junction 4A and the M25 reveals the presence of several military installations, including the Army base at Aldershot, RAF Odiham and RAE Farnborough.

In the hope of curtailing fruitless enquiries to each of these establishments in turn, I would venture to request some assistance on this part of the investigation from yourself. I should be glad if you would be able to advise me on the points which I have listed below for your convenience:-

Thank you for your letter dated 9 October in which you asked a number of questions about the MOD's policy and role with regard to UFO sightings.

You asked whether our UFO statistics included sightings reported by military personnel such as RAF pilots. The figures that I give are always total figures, and include all sightings reported to us, irrespective of the occupation of the witness. Having said this, we do not break sightings down by category, and I am not able to give you any information on how many sightings have been reported by the military. Any sightings by military witnesses should be reported to us in the usual way. I would probably have noticed a report from a military witness, but do not recall having seen one in my time here. The only cases that I am familiar with that involve military witnesses are the RAF Topcliffe sightings in 1952, and Lt Col Halt's report.

You also asked about our conclusion that, to date, UFOs have not posed any threat to national security. We look at all reports of UFO sightings - as do staff in those departments responsible for the air defence of the UK - to determine whether there seems to be a threat to the UK's security. The fact is that to date we have not found any evidence of such a threat. While sightings are often unidentified, it does not follow that this means that there is a threat to security. The key consideration in determining any threat is evidence, and the simple fact is that we do not possess any. Given our scrutiny of UFO reports, I do not agree that the information we hold is "unevaluated". Of course, as you know from previous correspondence, the reports we hold are almost all limited to fairly vague details of lights or shapes in the sky.

Finally, you asked about UK studies into the UFO phenomenon. I am not aware of any such studies, although our views do mirror the general findings of the US Project Blue Book study, which concluded that there was no evidence that UFOs are extraterrestrial, or that alien life exists. However, in common with the Americans, we are open-minded about the possibilities. Like you, I will be watching the current NASA SETI project with interest!

I acknowledge with thanks the receipt of your kind and informative letter of September 24, 1992, together with the enclosed list.

There is certainly a fresh breeze of trust and openness since you have taken your current position in MOD, and in particular in that office.

There are still a number of issues that I for one, as a researcher, would like to learn concerning this subject [UFOs], where MOD is involved.

Disproportionate cost

For example, the statistical numbers provided to us, i.e. the latest for 1991. Does that number include the reports of sightings by the military or RAF Pilots, or it is excluded. If it is included I would like to learn the number and i.e. the bases to which they have been reported. Furthermore, the current information is considered as "Unevaluated", I would like to learn the reports of findings by DI55 or other components within the MOD about them.

Equally important is the fact and the policy your office pursues in response to the inquiries made by the public at large. Which in few words; the UFOs do not constitute any threat to the national security. I am very keen indeed to see or study the report compiled by the "body" as result of their findings, henceforth, the conclusions derived there from, leading to this fact. We have had little problem obtaining material about the above from other countries, as yet despite the Citizen's Charter, or other related policies encouraging the exercise of more openness, I am in the dark.

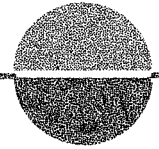

Thank you for your letter dated 28 September, in which you asked a number of questions about our UFO files, and previous sightings.

You asked whether any other UFO files, apart from the ones I mentioned previously, might be available for public viewing at the Public Record Office. As far as I am aware, the file references that I quoted in my previous letter are the only ones currently available. In 1967 the previous practice of destroying old UFO files was changed, and files were marked for permanent retention. You should check the exact position with the PRO, but this should mean that in a few years our old UFO files should be available to the public under the terms of the 30 year rule, with the 1967 files being made available in 1997, 1968 files in 1998, and so on. Depending on how quickly the PRO destroyed old files, some other pre-1967 files might also have survived, and would be available 30 years after the last action was taken. Again, I suggest you check the exact position with the PRO.

You asked whether there was information on what percentage of 1960s sightings were reported by military personnel. I am unaware of information having been compiled in this way, and can only say that I cannot recall having seen a UFO report submitted by military personnel, with the exception of the sightings by personnel from RAF Topcliffe in 1952, and Lt Col Halt's report on the UFO sighting near RAF Woodbridge in 1980.

On this latter point, you asked whether there are other records on the Rendlesham Forest sighting, apart from Lt Col Halt's memo. I can confirm that this memo is the only record that we have on this sighting.

With regard to your final question about departments that receive UFO reports, I can confirm that all UFO reports should come to Sec(AS)2a. Although reports also reach those departments in the MoD concerned with the air defence of the UK, we would see everything, and there is no question of any sightings having passed us by.

I hope this answers your questions, but please let me know if you require any further information.

Thankyou very much indeed for your letter of September 24, received today. It was very good of you to relate the information contained in your letter. I have done quite a bit of research through the Public Record Office and do in fact already have the records you cited. However, I didn't have the statistical figures for the number of sightings reported through the late 1950's and 1960's so I would like to thankyou for supplying this data.

By writing to you I am hoping that you may be able to help me on a couple of points.

1. Is there any indication that other UFO-related files may exist in the Public Record Office which would be available for public viewing or do the ones you cited comprise the total amount of available data at PRO ?

2. Concerning the number of sightings reported to the MOD in the 1960's, is there any indication of what percentage (if any) were by military personnel ?

3. Several years ago I corresponded with your department with regard to a UFO sighting which took place in December 1980 in Rendlesham Forest, England. A report was made by the USAF, a copy of which was forwarded to me. It was mentioned in the MOD letter that accompanied this report that the British Government had determined that there was no defence threat. Is it possible for you to tell me if records exist and if they are available which relate to the Government determination that there was no threat ? Or is the report by Colonel Halt the only record that the MOD has on this case.

4. Could you tell me if there are other departments within the British Government which receive copies of UFO reports and if so what action is taken on their part ? My reason for asking is that I sometimes get reports of UFO sightings (particularly from the 1950's) from former military personnel alledging sometimes quite significant UFO sightings around British airbases but no records can be traced at PRO. Is it feasible that if a case was deemed particularly significant it would be investigated or handled by a different department, or do all reports go through the same channels ?

REPORT OF UFO SIGHTING - THURSDAY 24 SEPTEMBER 1992

1. As you expressed an interest in the reported sighting of a UFO near RAF Woodbridge on 27 December 1980, you may be interested in a telephone call from a husband and wife from Felixstowe that I received yesterday.

2. Last Thursday 24 September, both **Section 40** were returning to their home at 2045 hours when they both noticed what they thought were 3 shooting stars. What really caught their attention was that they dropped vertically and then started dog fighting or dancing between each other. They seemed to be about 1 1/2 miles away and at about 20k feet dropping over Felixstowe dock. There was no noise, no distinctive shape to them although they appeared to be oyster like, were amber in colour and left no trail.

3. It was a clear night except for a little cloud which, after a few minutes, the 3 lights disappeared into. When we met yesterday I promised to let you have a written note setting out the Ministry of Defence's position on UFOs.

While the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate some reports of UFO sightings, our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Given this limited involvement with the subject, the Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, nor are there any staff employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive, which are usually limited to very brief details of what was seen, are passed to staff in departments concerned with the air defence of the United Kingdom, who examine them as part of their normal duties. I have attached a copy of the form that we use to record details of a UFO sighting.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. I am sure you will appreciate that defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. Consequently, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, unusual cloud formations, satellites in orbit or satellite debris entering the atmosphere, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. We accept, however, that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these.

I regret that the release of material from our files "en bloc" is not possible because, as is the case with other government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act. As you are aware, this act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30



years after the last action has been taken. However, we are able to answer specific queries you may have about particular sightings which have occurred recently, and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident, and if so, what it contains. We can also answer questions about specific types of sightings, and can release examples of reports, although as is the case with any report that we release, we will delete the name and address of any witnesses. We will always do our best to answer any questions that people have about the UFO phenomenon, and will endeavour to keep the national groups such as BUFORA informed of any interesting developments.

As I explained in my letter dated 27 July, it was generally the case that before 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed after five years, although I am aware that a few files from the Fifties have survived, and are available for examination at the Public Record Office. Contrary to some of the allegations that are often circulated, there is no question of our attempting to cover up any incident, silence witnesses, or in any way obscure the truth about UFOs from the general public. Indeed, by suggesting to witnesses or enthusiasts that they get in touch with the national UFO groups, we are probably adding to the general level of interest in UFOs, and bringing into the public domain sightings that would probably not otherwise have been made public; not the activities of an organisation carrying out some sort of cover-up! The Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence that would support the existence of alien life, or suggest that alien spacecraft have ever visited the earth.

The only information we have on the alleged UFO sighting at Rendlesham Forest in December 1980 is the report by Lt Col Charles Halt of the United States Air Force. We are satisfied that the events described are of no defence significance.

The Ministry of Defence is not involved in any research or investigation into the crop circle phenomenon, although we would refer people to the Centre for Crop Circle Studies in the same way as we refer people to the national UFO groups.

We discussed the general role and structure of the Ministry of Defence, and on this point, I have obtained from our public relations section a booklet which you will probably find very helpful. Although some of it is out of date, it does contain a lot of useful information; the Statement on the Defence Estimates 1992 will be your best source for more up to date information.

I hope this helps is helpful, and has clarified our policy. Please let me know if you have any further questions.

I note what you have to say about religion, although you will appreciate that this is not a matter for the Ministry of Defence.

I wish you luck with setting up your own UFO group; in doing this, you may wish to liaise with some of the existing groups, to exchange ideas and seek advice. If you wish to take up this suggestion, then I would suggest the following societies:

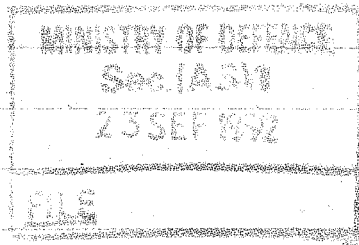

Thank you for your letter dated 18 September on the subject of UFOs, and the release of information.

Although, as you recognise, our interest is limited to possible defence implications, we do try to be as open and as helpful as possible, and provide assistance to the national UFO groups and to researchers when we can. We have always said that if we are asked about a specific sighting, we can check if we received a report that might tie in with what was seen. If we do have any such reports, we will give out a copy, having deleted the name and address of the witness in the usual way. When researchers ask us about sightings they are investigating, we will always try and offer our own view - if we have one - based on the details provided.

When anybody asks us about our policy on UFOs, or reports a sighting, we suggest that they contact the national UFO groups. This means that these groups are contacted by many people who would probably not otherwise have got in touch. As a result, they are getting many UFO reports (and perhaps new members) that they would otherwise not have got. I know that they are grateful for this.

As you are probably aware, we are bound by the public records act, and are not able to release all the material from our files. However, we can let people know, in general terms, what our files contain. Essentially, they contain two things: firstly, letters such as yours, asking questions about the Government's views and policy on UFOs, and secondly, the actual UFO reports themselves. These are far less exciting than most people would suppose; nearly all of the sightings that have been reported to us relate to little more than a description of a light or a shape in the sky. Of all the reports on the files we hold - which go back to about 1985 - only five go further than this, and describe what ufologists might classify as a close encounter of the third or fourth kind. These five reports have been released to the UFO groups, and I have attached copies for you. I make no judgements on these reports, and leave researchers to draw their own conclusions. As we have said before, we have no evidence that would support the existence of alien life, or suggest that alien spacecraft have ever visited the Earth.

We will always do our best to answer any other queries on policy or on specific sightings, such as letting people know the number of UFO reports submitted to the Ministry of Defence - 96 so far this year.

I have said that I will try to let the national UFO groups know about any developments, and I imagine that they would publish the details in their magazines, to keep subscribers informed.

I hope this information is helpful, and I wish you luck with your own research.

Thank you for your recent letter to the Prime Minister, on the subject of UFOs. I have been asked to reply.

It may be useful if I began by explaining that while the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate some reports of UFO sightings, our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, unusual cloud formations, satellites in orbit or satellite debris entering the atmosphere, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites.

I entirely accept your observation that most UFO reports are made by sensible people, but we remain of the view that nearly all of these sightings relate to explainable phenomena, such as the ones listed above. To give you a few examples, many UFO reports were generated by an incident last December in which an aircraft jettisoned fuel, which subsequently ignited. Earlier this year a wave of sightings was generated when an airship flew over London, brightly illuminated from the inside. I saw this myself, and can quite understand how, when seen from a distance, this caused many people to report a bright cigar-shaped UFO over the city.

We do accept that there will always be some UFO sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these. However, contrary to the stories that sometimes circulate, the Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence to support the existence of alien life, or to suggest that alien spacecraft have landed on the earth. I would like to assure you that there is no question of attempting to cover up any incident, nor are we trying in any way to obscure the truth about UFOs from the general public. You mentioned evidence that has been uncovered by researchers, but I am aware that some of the material that would seem to support the more exotic UFO incidents is widely believed to have been faked.



You mentioned the UFO sighting at Rendlesham Forest; the only information that we have on this is the report by Lt Col Charles Halt of the United States Air Force, but we are satisfied that the events described are of no defence significance. I am aware of some of the rumours that circulate about this incident, but have yet to see any evidence that would support them.

You asked whether information on UFOs could be released from our files; the release of material on the subject "en bloc" is not possible because, as is the case with other government departments, all MoD files are subject to the public records act. As you may be aware, this act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Having said this, I should say that our files contain little more than letters - such as yours - asking about the Government's policy on UFOs, and actual UFO reports, which usually relate to little more than the sighting of a light or a shape in the sky. There is certainly nothing on our files that would, if released, cause any sort of panic.

I hope this helps explain the Government's position on UFOs.

Meteor showers caused flood of UFO reports

METEOR showers may have been responsible for a flood of UFO reports across Wales yesterday.

Reports of vivid lights and flashes came from all over the Principality.

An ambulanceman who saw a blue flashing light as he was driving along a country road in the Dolgellau area late on Sunday night thought he had turned on his emergency lights by mistake.

The switchboard to BBC Radio Cymru's Hywel Gwynfryn programme was jammed yesterday morning as puzzled householders tried to find out what had happened.

The Astronomy Centre based in Cambridge said the most likely explanation was meteor showers.

The BBC programme's hotline was permanently engaged for two hours, but around 50 listeners succeeded in getting through to the studio in Cardiff to describe what many believed to be an unidentified flying object that had lit up the sky at around 11pm on Sunday.

Thomas Jones, of Llanbryn-mair, Powys, was outside his home at the time saying goodnight to a neighbour, when he said he was startled by a pure white flash.

"I looked up into the sky and saw a bright blue object as big as a little boat, with a long streak of fire about twenty feet long coming from it," said Mr Jones.

"It was about 50 feet above the ground and gave off a loud whooshing noise. Later on there was a distinct smell in the air, but I've no idea what it was."

In Shrewsbury, there was a sighting of a "silver cascade of mercury pouring out of the sky."

Other spotters said they

had seen green and orange lights and said the sky had been lit up for several seconds.

A woman who was on the telephone at the time said the line went dead as the lights passed over.

Morfudd Roberts, at Uwchmynydd, near Aberdaron, was out in the garden at the time, when she saw the night sky lighting up as a mysterious object flew over the peninsula.

The RAF at Valley, Hereford and Brawdy, as well as coastguards, confirmed that the lights were nothing to do with them.

But a possible solution to the mystery came later when a spokesman at the Astronomy Centre in Cambridge said they believed the mystery objects were meteor showers.

Thomas Jones, however, was not convinced. He claimed that meteors usually fell to the ground, whereas the object he saw on Sunday night was flying over Mid Wales and continued into the distance "just like some sort of flying object or a satellite."

Scientists study reports of UFO

AN INVESTIGATION began yesterday to solve the mystery of an unidentified flying object spotted the length of Wales on Sunday night.

Hundreds of people claim they saw the blue ball of light in the night skies as it travelled at an incredible speed in a rough line from Newport to Anglesey.

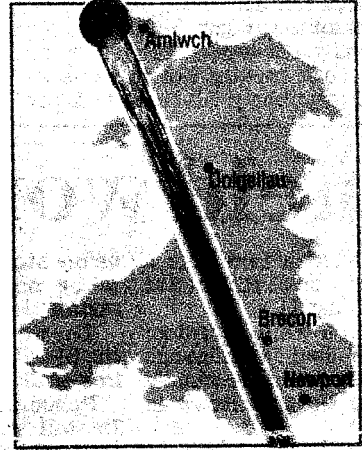
The sightings are being examined by the British Astronomical Association, but UFO investigators believe the object was from outer space.

A farmer from Llanbryn-mair, Powys, said the ball was so close that it was "frightening"

"It took my breath away because it was so bright and travelling so fast," said Tomos Jones who watched the object with his wife Dorothy and neighbour Maldwyn Davies.

"It was a big blue ball with a fire coming from the back of it. It seemed to be about the height of the beech trees and went over our house towards Dolgellau."

before. It was a blue ball flying at aeroplane height with a tail about half a mile long," he said.

"The whole valley became lit up like daylight. It was quite frightening."

Catherine Povey was speaking on the telephone when suddenly the sky turned blue. "As soon as the sky lit up my phone went dead," said Ms Povey, from Porthmadog.

Yesterday morning callers to BBC Radio Cymru's Hywel Gwynfryn programme jammed the switchboard as they attempted to report sightings of the object, most around 10.45pm.

But scientists believe that the ball was a natural phenomenon. Dr John Mason, co-ordinator of the British Fireball Survey, is investigating the sightings on behalf of the BAS.

"There are various types of meteorite which look like blue pear shaped objects with a vapour trail behind them. But it is impossible to say exactly what it is until I have studied the reports," he said.

Meteorite takes the high road

THE public was urged yesterday to help in the hunt for a meteorite, thought to have entered the atmosphere at 100,000mph and first seen ed over the Bristol Channel.

Astronomical researchers believe that a surviving piece of the meteorite may have

crashed in the Inner Hebrides after travelling north across Wales and the west of Scotland before disappearing.

A fragment of the rock could be lying in someone's back garden on the islands of Tiree, Jura or Mull or, perhaps more likely, has plummeted into the sea.

Dr John Mason, of the British Astronomical Association in London, has received hundreds of calls from as far afield as Bristol, Cardiff, Sheffield, Anglesey, Stranraer and Fort William from people who saw the glow of the object which was so bright that it lit up the sky on Sunday night.

"I don't think we have had an event as important as this in ten years," he said. "If we can find a remnant it will greatly add to our knowledge of inter-planetary debris reaching the atmosphere," he said. "What we can say for certain is that it was not a piece of man-made space junk. It must have been a natural piece of inter-planetary rock which had been orbiting the sun and has been pulled into the earth's gravity."

The association hopes to piece together all the information about the meteorite. From its path and the rate of descent over a certain area it should be possible to work out

a possible drop zone. Dr Mason said it seemed to have been visible until it was over the Firth of Clyde or even further north.

He said the meteorite's luminosity was caused by the enormous energy it built up as it passed through the sky before disappearing from view as it decelerated and free-fell to the ground.

"Some people who saw it said it turned night into day and caused the ground to light up," Dr Mason said. "There have also been reports of it breaking into fragments that faded out. We have to work out the 'end point', at which it became non-luminous. If that point was, say, 15 to 20 miles up, there is a chance it will have survived and if we can work out the latitude and longitude we may find a surviving fragment."

Although the meteorite was the size of a car when first seen, any remaining fragment would be a tenth of the original. "These 'fire ball' events are fairly rare," Dr Mason said. He emphasised that there was little point in people scouring the countryside for a piece of meteorite. "It would be very unlikely, unless someone had it fall through their greenhouse, that they would find it by looking casually."

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, weather balloons, satellites in orbit or satellite debris entering the atmosphere, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. I accept, however, that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these. However, the Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence to support the existence of alien life, or to suggest that alien spacecraft have landed on the earth.

We do not release material from our files "en bloc", as our files are covered by the public records act, and stay closed for 30 years. However, I have attached a few examples of the sort of report we get, with the names and addresses of witnesses deleted. As you can see, the details we get are often fairly vague, describing lights or shapes in the sky, as opposed to "flying saucers". I have also attached a document known as the Halt Report, which relates to a famous UFO case from 1980. You will find much more information in the many books that have been written on the subject; any big library or bookshop should have some.

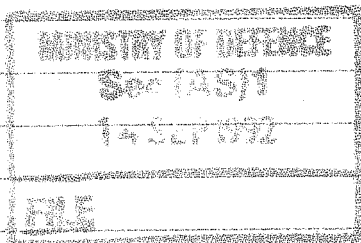

We have five reports that could be classified as close encounters of the third or fourth kind, and I have attached these as requested. As is usual when we release UFO reports, I have deleted personal information relating to the witnesses. The rest of the reports on our files refer to little more than lights or shapes seen in the sky.

Thank you for your letter dated 5 September in which you asked for information on UFO sightings in the Hereford area around September 1978. I am afraid that I do not have any information on this, as our files are regularly archived and sent to the Public Record Office, where they are covered by the 30 year rule, which states that files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action was taken. We do have some statistical information on this period, and I can tell you that during 1978 there were 750 UFO reports submitted to the Ministry of Defence - the highest number of reports that we have on record for any one year. I have no details relating to the location or nature of these sightings.

You asked for details of two other cases; I do not have any information on the Brighton case, which is not one that I have heard about. 1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.
2. The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.
3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10^0 off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

When we spoke earlier today I promised to write to you, setting out the position of the Ministry of Defence with regard to UFOs, and detailing other related information that you may find useful. Hopefully you will be able to draw upon the information in this letter when making your documentary.

Although the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings, our sole concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we have an open mind on these.

Despite some of the stories that circulate among ufologists, there is no question of attempting to cover up any incidents, nor are we trying in any way to obscure the truth about UFOs from the public. The Ministry of Defence does not possess any evidence which supports the existence of alien life, or suggests that extraterrestrial spacecraft have ever visited the earth.

The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from



public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although you may find a few at the Public Record Office.

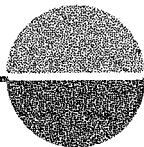
So far this year we have received around 70 sightings, although at least a dozen of these were almost certainly sightings of an airship - illuminated from the inside - which was flying over London a lot during February and March. I saw this myself, and can understand how, from a distance, this generated reports of a bright cigar-shaped UFO travelling slowly over London. I mention this as a useful example of how an explanation can often be found for an apparently quite exotic UFO report. I suspect that the more exotic "close encounter" reports are made to the UFO groups such as BUFORA, and as I mentioned, reports made to us tend to be rather mundane. As promised, I have attached a couple of examples, with the names and addresses of witnesses deleted.

As we discussed, it is worth noting that there are a lot of supposedly official UFO documents in circulation that are turning out to be fakes.

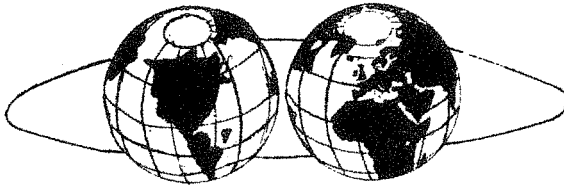

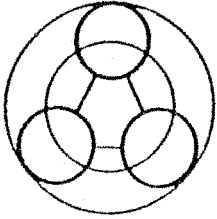

Many thanks for your telephone call on 10th July and for your letter of 13th July. The latter has only just reached me at my temporary address above, where I shall be living until about the end of August.

CCCS will be delighted to act as a convenient point of reply to letters reaching you from the public about crop circle sightings. As you say, this will be valuable to us and, I hope, helpful to you in relieving you of a burden of correspondence. (I have already received - and will be replying to - a letter from the lady who had 'phoned you before you spoke to me).

As I mentioned to you, CCCS is currently engaged in a jointly funded research programme with a North American team of scientists, based at Alton Barnes. Preliminary results obtained last year suggest that measurable changes occur in the soil and crops in genuine crop circle events. The purpose of this year's research is to see whether these initial findings can be replicated by more exacting tests and placed on a basis which will justify publication to the wider scientific community in peer-reviewed journals. Most of the current work has had to be funded by CCCS, its American counterpart, and private donors; and this inevitably restricts the scope of the research programme. Welcome help has, however, been offered on an informal basis by the Radiation Spectroscopy Unit at Harwell Laboratories, the Physics Department at Glasgow University, and several well qualified individuals in this country. In the United States the University of Nevada and some other institutions and individuals are undertaking a range of scientific tests of crop and soil samples and controls.

Since you wrote to me I have had an indication that MAFF and at least one of its agencies is taking a scientific interest in the phenomenon, although earlier approaches made by us to MAFF had suggested otherwise. We shall shortly be informing them again of our research programme.

We and our North American colleagues have much work to do before results can be confidently assessed; and we shall not be rushing to publish them until suitable peer-reviewing proves possible. It will, however, be CCCS's continuing policy to inform British government departments and agencies of any indications that worthwhile scientific progress is being made.

Many thanks again for writing. I will keep in touch.

When I wrote to you on 20 July I undertook to let you have copies of the more "exotic" UFO reports that we hold. I have now conducted a thorough search of our files, going back to 1985, which is the earliest one that we hold. As I indicated, nearly all the UFO reports that we have relate to little more than lights or discs in the sky, or an ill-defined shape or object of some sort. I have attached those reports I could find that go further than this. I have deleted the names and addresses of witnesses, together with other personal details. As I mentioned to you when you telephoned on Friday, I draw no firm conclusions from this material, and remain open-minded as to what may have prompted these five reports.

I have not included material relating to reports that are already in the public domain, such as photocopied extracts from books such as "Above Top Secret".

My view is that any reports of alien entities or abductions are, for whatever reason, made almost exclusively to UFO organisations rather than to us. Needless to say, if I receive any such reports, I would encourage people to get in touch with BUFORA, Quest International and Contact International.

I will let you know if I receive any close encounter reports in the future.

We have had a number of recent enquiries about the contents of the UFO files held by the Ministry of Defence, and I thought it would be useful if I put you in the picture on what we hold.

Our files are made up of UFO sighting reports, together with enquiries about other aspects of the UFO phenomenon, and the position of the Ministry of Defence. Virtually all of the UFO sighting reports we receive relate to lights or discs in the sky, or various ill-defined shapes or objects. In my time here I have not received a single report of any close encounter, but we have, in the past, received a very small number of letters that might fall into the category of a close encounter of the third or fourth kind. I recently had a request from a researcher to release these reports. As we receive so few, and recognising their value to researchers, I agreed that these reports could be released. I also said that I would make this material available to those UFO groups that we refer witnesses and enthusiasts to, and I therefore attach this for your information. As is usual when releasing UFO reports, I have deleted information relating to the identity of the witnesses, together with other personal information. I draw no conclusions from this material, and remain open-minded as to what may have prompted these five reports. I have not included material relating to reports that are already in the public domain, such as photocopied extracts from books such as "Above Top Secret".

I will keep you informed about any such cases in the future, and - as usual - will encourage any witness to get in touch with you. I remain of the opinion, however, that reports of close encounters are more likely to be reported to organisations such as yours than to us.

More generally, we are able to answer specific queries you may have about particular sightings which have occurred recently, and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident, and if so, what it contains. We will also do our best to answer any specific questions we are asked, and can also give general information about our files, and what they contain. However, the files that we hold only go back to 1985, with previous files having been "archived", and sent to the Public Record Office. Because these files are covered by the "30 year rule", and as, prior to 1967, UFO files were destroyed after five years, files held in this office are likely to be the only accessible UFO files at present.
