This letter is being written following my telephone report to Flt. Lt. Skuce of the following subject:-

I have recently been told, of a "flying object" incident, by Mr. and Mrs. [Redacted] Toronto, [Redacted]. The originator of the story is a Mr. [Redacted] who is a resident of the Huntsville area and a cottager on Hex Lake.

Mr. [Redacted] claims to have witnessed a "flying object" come "whooshing" over the treetops at Hex Lake and splash into the lake opposite his cottage. The object was described as being the size and shape of a rowboat. Mr. [Redacted] then rowed out to the point on the lake but did not find or see any debris. The incident apparently occurred about mid August this year. Hex Lake is located approximately one and a half miles north of Billie Bear Lodge, which is located on Bella Lake.

Possibly a report may have been given by someone else, who has heard the story or by Mr. [Redacted]. However, if you can determine that the above report sheds some light on some missing object or drone and a search may be conducted to recover the object, I would appreciate it if you would notify me at the above address. The reason for this is that I am a SCUBA diver and a member of the Graduate Underwater Club of the University of Toronto. Our club may be interested in joining in on an underwater search or conducting our own search.

Dear Sirs:

On Monday April 5, at approximately 8:32 P.M. while walking home with a friend, [REDACTED] we saw a shooting star or what we thought was one. After watching the object for about a minute we saw it travel almost of the distance of the entire clear sky. (The conditions that night were 99% ideal, for there were no clouds to be seen, and the 1/4 moon was just a glowing sliver in the heavens.)

(DESCRIPTION)

The glowing light approached in a southwesterly direction toward the northeast travelling about 5000 M.P.H. then seemed to approach another object overtake it and stop, directly in line with the other, and then the other move away leaving the first behind, this also happened to a third, and it took a sweep in a semi-circle toward the north and disappeared into, as it looked, the distance. It appeared to be a sort of relay race. When the third object started to move I noticed a fourth dip in from the east, execute a mock pass then also seemed to disappear, glowing red hot for a time. (Could have been a shooting star this time)

Enclosed you will find an illustrated drawing of their pattern.

Here where I live I am a student in high, and am in Grade 10, and am expecting to be a test pilot when I finish High School and University.

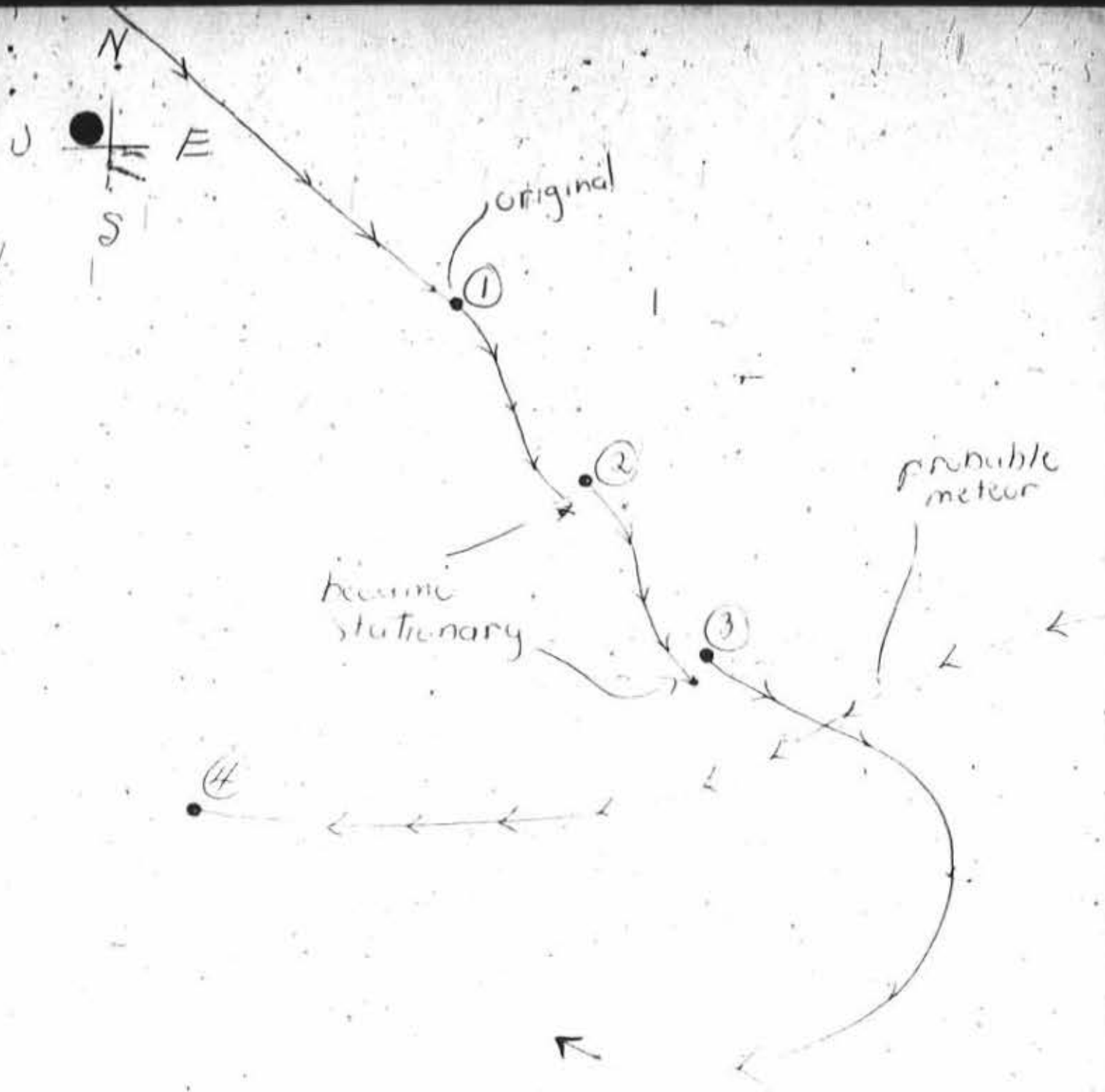



Dear Sir:

In response to your request that any witnesses who have seen a strange object in the sky my girlfriend and I have this to report:

The exact time of the first sighting was 1:15 a.m. on October 29, 1964. This sighting lasted for approximately 45 seconds and disappeared as if someone blew out a candle. This object's elevation can best be described by the attached drawing. The shape is also as shown on drawing. The colour of the object was a brilliant orange and did not move or glow.

The second time it appeared in the sky it had changed position (this occurred in about 90 seconds) but appeared as being crescent in shape with the orange colour fading into a yellow. The object appeared in this same location at about 4 or 5 different times and each time coming closer towards us, and as it came closer it got bigger in appearance. Again each time it remained anywhere from 30-45 seconds. With each appearance there was no movement or glow.

The third time it appeared in the sky it had again changed position and was very close to the apartment building (at least it gave that appearance) it was huge in appearance and still yellow in colour, it just hovered in this particular position for about 30 seconds. As strange as it may seem it almost seemed as if this object had followed my friend and I. After its appearance so close we closed the curtains.

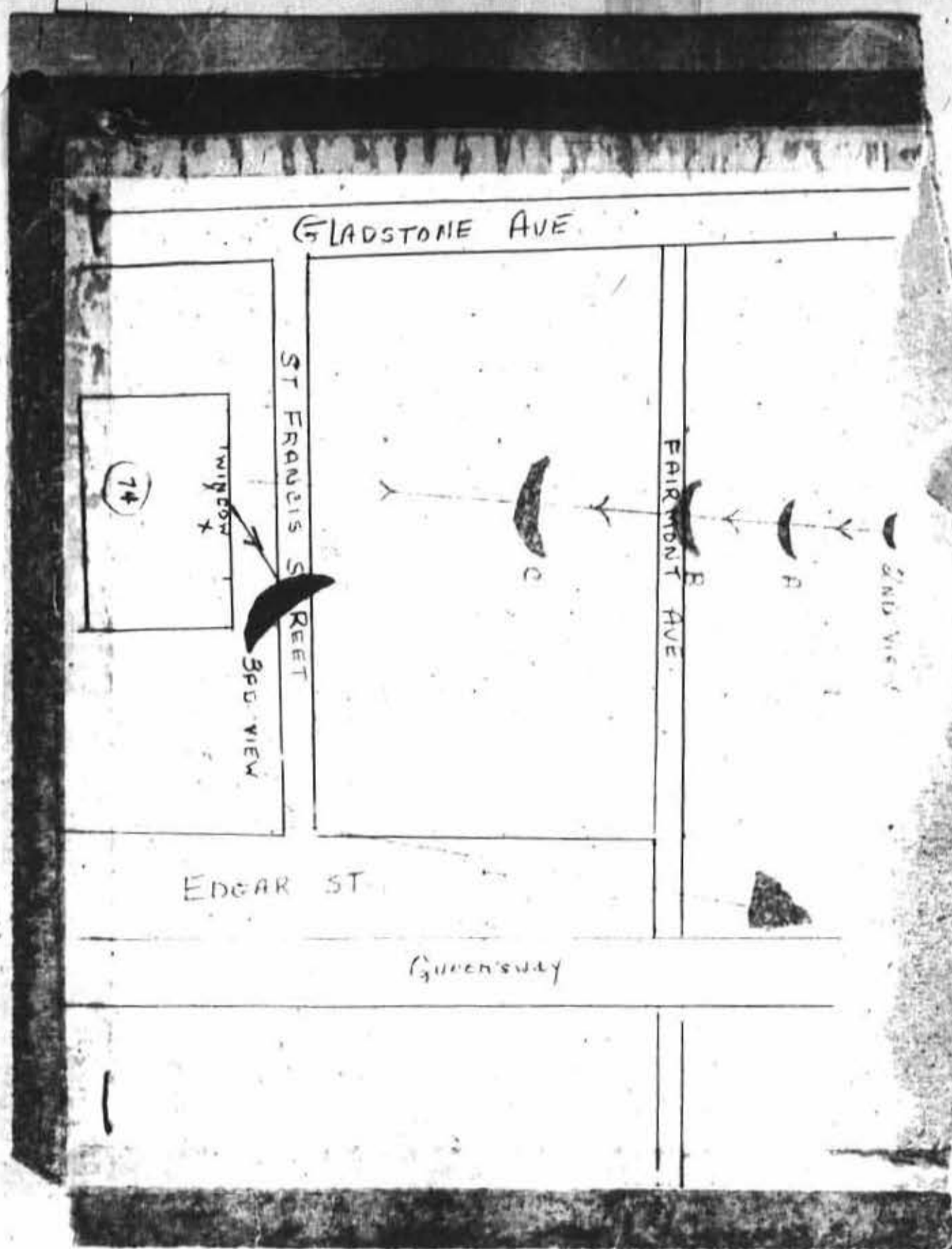
We sincerely hope that the sketch we have enclosed will help to give a clearer picture as to its position in relation to ours (which was on a street corner at first and then looking out a window). This object/s made no movement (other than appearing and then disappearing), had no halo, left no trail, sparkles and was at no time any other colour than orange or yellow.

If there is any other information that we might be able to provide we will be only too happy to help out if at all possible. Dear Mr. Henderson:

In your letter of 13 August, you inquired about Canadian policy governing unidentified flying objects (UFOs).

The procedure for the reporting and investigation of UFOs is similar to that applicable in the U.S. and defined in the Joint Army, Navy, Air Force Procedure, JANAP 146D. All reports of UFOs are passed to Air Defence Command where the information is correlated and, as required, further investigations are initiated. The original sighting reports and subsequent investigation results are normally not published. This practice has been adopted to protect persons who submit reports and frequently request to remain anonymous.

To date, investigation has revealed no incident of a UFO constituting a threat to national security. Most sightings can be explained by natural phenomena, such as meteorites or various cases of refracted and reflected light. There are some reports received which are quite obviously figments of imagination. Should there be any reason to suspect that an Object was substantive and posed a threat, Air Defence Command would immediately alert the appropriate departments of the government.

Gentlemen:

I would like to inquire about the reported tracking of an unidentified flying object/^{by} your GCA radar at Goose Bay, Labrador. The reported incident took place in the summer of 1948, although the exact date is not available to me. I do know however, that it occurred during an inspection visit by high-ranking officials of the Royal Canadian Air Force and the United States Air Force. The object was tracked simultaneously by USAF radar. The unknown was reported to have been traveling on a course taking it from NE to SW. It maintained a constant altitude of 60,000 at a calculated speed of 9,000 mph. The object was reported to have been viewed by both the radar operator and the inspection team.

What I would like to know is whether your office has any record of this incident, and if so, what your evaluation of the above-stated situation would be.

I appreciate your co-operation in this matter.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS.

With reference to the above subject, I am writing this letter to you in the hope that you may be able to furnish me with some information.

As you already know America has a UFO-investigating programme under the name Project Blue Book, so also has several other countries. 1 The following information is submitted in response to question 1,416 raised by Mr Finch:

- (a) Para 1. Canada co-operates with the United States for the investigation of reports of unidentified flying objects. If a report warrants investigation, the investigation is conducted by Air Defence Command. In the normal course of events NORAD Headquarters would receive a copy of the report. Such investigations are not entitled "Project Magnet" and, in fact, no codename is applied to reports of unidentified flying objects.
- (b) Para 2. "Project Magnet" was the brain child of the late Wilbert B Smith of the Department of Transport, a project which he carried on in his own time without Government financial support. Because the records of "Project Magnet" were never made available to the Department of National Defence, nothing is known about their equipment or personnel.
- (c) Para 3. Wilbert B Smith was employed in the Radio Regulations Division of the Department of Transport, and was the head of a UFO research project which he conducted as a personal undertaking.
- (d) Para 4. Files and data compiled under "Project Magnet" - if any - are not controlled by Department of National Defence, therefore, availability of such data to the general public cannot be stated.

1 Recorded below in the same order as the questions are answers to the queries raised in the subject letter:

- (a) JAWAP 146 has been implemented in Canada and the instructions therein detail the procedures for reporting on unidentified flying objects;
- (b) Reports of unidentified flying objects are not kept from the general public; however, investigations of such reports to date have classified the sightings as of either man-made objects of which we are aware, or of natural phenomena well known in scientific circles but unfamiliar to the general public. Nevertheless, we do not intentionally publicize any incident of an alleged sighting of an unknown flying object for two very good reasons:
 - (i) in many cases the person or persons involved in the sightings do not wish to have their identity revealed; and
 - (ii) each "incident" that has been reported in the press has immediately resulted in the reporting of a number of other "incidents" none of which has ever produced any significant results and all of which cost money to investigate;
- (c) normally reports of sightings from civilians come in by mail and by the time of receipt the object - if any - has long since disappeared and thus no attempt is made to intercept it. If a sighting was made by service personnel under circumstances where interception appeared feasible, the decision to take an interception would be made by the air defence controller for the area concerned;
- (d) The Department of National Defence considers as "serious business" any object or object which might threaten our national security. All reports of unidentified flying objects are investigated to the point where we are satisfied that they are natural phenomena or man-made objects. To date all that have been determined to be man-made objects have been assessed as posing no threat to national security;

- (c) Should the preliminary investigation of any report of an unidentified flying object indicate even a remote threat to national security, the Minister of National Defence would be informed immediately.

1 The accompanying letter is proposed as a reply to the seven questions concerning UFOs raised by Mr. [redacted], Thorburn, Nova Scotia. From a comparison of Mr. [redacted] letter with several others received over the past few years it seems apparent that Mr. [redacted] is a member of an organization known as the "National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena" (NICAP) with headquarters in Washington DC but with affiliated chapters in Canada. This organization is dedicated to the beliefs that "flying saucers" (in the more exotic sense) exist, that this fact is being concealed from the public by the USAF and the RCAF, and that its members are serving the public interest by attempting to expose this official censorship.

2 The proposed reply to Mr. [redacted] is quite lengthy and informative (though not specific) in the hope that it may discourage further inquiries from this particular source.

The following answers apply to the seven questions contained in your letter to me of April 22nd:

- (1) If by the term "flying saucer" you mean an object from outer space constructed and guided by other than human beings, there is no evidence which we assess as "reliable" to suggest the existence of such vehicles. Various types of "hovercraft" and other vehicles of an experimental nature which might be classified as "flying saucers" have been produced in the western world. In general the performance, and in some cases even the existence, of these vehicles is classified by the sponsor; this is normal with respect to any weapon or other vehicle of current or future military significance.

- (2) Your government has no "policy of secrecy" about the existence or otherwise of "flying saucers". I believe this is evidenced by the fact that I have given you a full and frank answer to your question number 1. However, we do not intentionally publicize such incident of an alleged sighting of an "Unknown Flying Object" (UFO) for two very good reasons:
 - (a) in many cases the person or persons involved in the sightings do not wish to have their identity revealed, and
 - (b) each "incident" that has been reported in the press has immediately resulted in the reporting of a number of other "incidents" none of which has ever produced any significant results and all of which cost money to investigate.

.../2

- (3) No RCAF pilot has ever fired on a "flying saucer" or other UFO.
- (4) Any sightings that are reported to any agency of the Federal Government are passed to the RCAF.
- (5) All sightings reported to the RCAF are investigated.
- (6) We do not keep statistics on the total number of UFO sightings reported. You may be interested to know, however, that the number of "sightings" has decreased considerably since the public has become better educated concerning the existence and appearance of weather balloons and certain natural phenomena that normally are the cause of UFO reports.
- (7) All of the UFOs investigated to date have turned out to be either man-made objects of which we were aware or natural phenomena well known in scientific circles but unfamiliar to the general public.

Reference is made to your second letter dated 31 January, 1963 and the questions contained therein concerning Unidentified Flying Objects.

You asked for a reason for withholding information on strange flying objects. It was stated in the reply to your first letter that reports of sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects are not made public because the reports usually involve private correspondence from citizens, and investigation of the reports has brought no threats to national security to light to date. It is further emphasized that to publish private correspondence without just cause would be a violation of civil rights; and there is no need to make such information public when investigations have revealed that the sightings to date have been natural phenomena, shooting stars, etc., or man-made objects such as weather balloons, light shining on aircraft at sea, etc.

Additionally, you indicate that the Air Force should make "confirmed reports so as to prevent panic if flying saucers were to attempt to make a mass landing" and that "the public should be told that the operators of flying saucers may not be hostile and that other planets are definitely inhabited". Because the Air Force has no "confirmed reports" upon which to base such statements, obviously no such announcements can be made.

4 Reports of "Flying Saucers" vary directly with the amount of current publicity, indicating perhaps that many of the sightings are generated by lurid descriptions in the press and other publications. Because there has been little publicity lately concerning flying saucers, the number of reports being received is at a very low level.

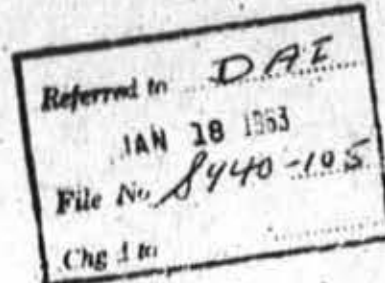

I refer to your letter of 28 December, 1962 and the interim reply of 8 January 1963. Replies have now been received from other government departments and answers to your queries are recorded below.

Herewith is a preliminary report on the Tatla Lake meteor.

Early reports indicated an eyewitness of an impact in the Niut Mountain range. A light aircraft search could be made only of the lower reaches of the mountain. First reports said the area was too high for the light plane. Later information from R.C.M.P. Sgt. Thompson (Prince George) was that the upper parts of the mountains were in cloud so no search was possible above 7000 feet. No burned area was actually observed although it had been reported to me that such an area had been seen. The light plane search was along a bearing supplied by the "eyewitness" from the settlement of Chesacut.

Through the efforts of Dr. Armell, a Dakota from our local Search and Rescue group at Sea Island was obtained. A crew of six including the C.O. of the base flew Dr. J.C. Savage and myself to Prince George where we talked with Sgt. Thompson. (Sgt. Thompson was with the original light plane search.) At this point (noon Friday, November 9th) it looked as if we could almost fly to the impact site, weather permitting.

About 2:20 p.m. P.S.T. that day our plane arrived in the Niut range region. Skies were rapidly clearing and only the summits of the highest peaks were shrouded.

A quick calculation using the bearing supplied by Sgt. Thompson and the local topographic map soon delineated the possible impact region. Because of local topographic features, this area must have been above 6000 feet. Contour flying was carried out until after 4:00 p.m. with little success. One oval-shaped burned area was spotted but on closer inspection no trees appeared to be knocked over and no crater was visible. Photographs were made of this spot, but I've not seen them yet.

On Sunday, November 11th, I was in Alexis Creek to talk with the R.C.M.P. there. It appears the "groundwork" of the search was so such thing although that is the way the R.C.M.P. reported it. The story as I now have it is as follows: Mr. [redacted] of Gwent was by his boy's side on the afternoon of November 2nd when he heard a loud boom. He turned and caught a glimpse of a shiny spot high in the sky. After watching this bright spot -- as bright as an arc welder -- for some 5 minutes, it went out quietly. This was reported and the hearing taken by the R.C.M.P.:

As Mr. [redacted] did not see the motor itself in flight, and since the mountain contains numerous glaciers Dr. Savage and I believe [redacted] saw only a glancing reflection from an ice patch. The day was bright and clear and the sun low. The distance while other reported could be accounted for in this manner. Mr. [redacted] was not at home so we were not able to talk with him directly.

I then went to Fella Lake to see Mrs. [redacted]. She reports the direction of flight opposite to that given by others. Mrs. [redacted] was quite unimpressed for two reasons, one being the direct result of a party which lasted late the wee hours Saturday night. The other reason did not come to light until some six hours later when I talked with R.C.M.P. Cpl. Humphreys at Alexis Creek. He has been under some pressure from "Big Brass" to gather this information and he was quite upset with the report of Mrs. [redacted]. Apparently he felt she was trying to cross him up with a false report so he required her to make a sworn statement and this really upset her. I tried to convince him in a gentle way that people often get confused when something as strange as a meteor appears and views from various angles sometimes seem to make no sense. I don't think I convinced him.

The R.C.M.P. from Alexis Creek found a tank of some sort during a search for a lost hunter north of Fattlayoko Lake. This tank was partially filled with aluminum strips and appears to be part of an apparatus used to drop "chaff" to confuse radar. This has him believing the firerail was really a missile under controlled flight. He grudgingly takes on the task of gathering information as an additional duty. I don't blame him for his attitude as it is hunting season and they have had one fatal shooting and numerous lost hunters to contend with.

We interviewed Mrs. [redacted] (10 miles west of Alexis Creek). Her story seems quite good. She had a good view through nearly 130°. At first sight the object appeared to her to be coming straight at her from E.N.E. The head-on view looked like a black or grey round body. As it passed to the north of her, she could see a cone shaped object "dripping fire".

There are several other witnesses which I shall try to contact in some way or other. I hope to find a reliable person to spend several days interviewing the area. This will relieve the R.C.M.P. of that job and should provide a better report.

In conclusion, I think a meteor passed just north of Alexis Creek on a nearly east-west path, but what happened after that is not known. If the body continued west of Klesna Klesna the task is all but impossible, because of the high mountains.

Report forms and instruction sheets were left with the R.C.M.P. and at the General Store-Post Office at Tatla Lake.

1 Attached for your information is a narrative report on the sequence of events concerning the reporting and investigation of an unidentified flying object sighted in the vicinity of Alexis Creek on 2 Nov 62.

2 Although there is every reason to suspect the object was a meteor, the possibility of space debris or long range missile can not be excluded until the wreckage of the object has been located and investigated. The unidentified object is considered to be of major scientific value, if not to the RCAF then undoubtedly to the National Research Council or the Geodetic Survey Branch.

3 The failure of an appropriate government agency to undertake an immediate survey of the crash area has resulted in its temporary loss. If it is only a meteor then its value to the RCAF is questionable but if it is a missile or satellite debris we have erred in not conducting an immediate investigation.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECT
ALEXIS CREEK-2 NOV 62

- 1 On Friday night at 2210 hours 2 Nov Staff Sergeant Simons of the RCMP District Detachment advised this Unit that an unidentified flying object had been sighted in the vicinity of Alexis Creek.
- 2 The object was initially reported to Cpl W Huxley (RCMP Det Cdr Alexis Creek) by Mrs [redacted] who advised she had seen an airborne object, which looked like a large propane tank, silver in colour, travelling east to west at high speed. The object was travelling in a low angle trajectory and seemed to be disintegrating or burning. It disappeared behind a hill followed by a loud explosion. The occurrence took place about 1430 hours PST, 2 Nov.
- 3 This information was passed immediately to the Duty Battle Commander (C/C Christmas) at Spokane and the Duty Officer (SIR) at St. Hubert. The RCC Vancouver had previously been notified by the RCMP.
- 4 The RCMP continued with their investigation and on the basis of the information available, a signal report was initiated to higher authority (Our A010 3 Nov refers). The RCMP investigation revealed that the object had been sighted by several people whose independent observations substantiated the initial report. Some reports indicated the object had descended to a low altitude, levelled off and was travelling at high speed. A loud explosion was heard on its passage, and is assumed to be a sonic shock wave. The object was travelling on a vector of 215° magnetic and was first sighted 20 miles east of Alexis Creek. The visibility at the time was good with the cloud condition seven thousand scattered.
- 5 The RCC Vancouver were contacted. They declined to participate in any aerial search unless authorized by higher authority. Major Wiggins, CO of Station Puntzi, was then contacted and advised he would survey the area in their L20. Ground fog delayed their take-off and only a cursory search was conducted.
- 6 It was determined that no supersonic aircraft was in the area at the time. SPADETS confirmed to the best of their knowledge that no space debris had decayed in the suspect area. It was also determined that no major construction or blasting had taken place in the area on Friday. The loud explosion heard by the observers and witnesses was undoubtedly a sonic boom. Our signal A011 4 Nov released at 06.20Z confirmed the action taken to date.
- 7 The RCMP continued with their investigation and interrogation of witnesses. A Mr. [redacted] reported he had seen the object travelling east to west at a low altitude. In the vicinity of Tatlayoko Lake, he reported the object passed him, altered course to a southerly direction and crashed into Razorback Mountain. The object impacted around the 8 - 9000 foot level and he observed it burning for at least fifteen minutes. Razor back Mountain is in the Niut Range approximately 20 miles west of Tatlayoko Lake. The approximate position is $51^{\circ} 35' N$ latitude, $121^{\circ} 30' W$ longitude.
- 8 The information was relayed to Spokane Sector and S/L King of the RCC Vancouver was contacted. He advised he could not participate in any aerial search unless authorized by his Headquarters, and that the initial request had previously been declined. Dr. Flawson of the University of British Columbia had continually been informed on the progress of events. When contacted, he advised his department was extremely interested and would endeavour to get an aerial survey authorized by his Department.

9 The RCMP were advised that a survey of the area by the RCMP was not forthcoming and the use of their Beaver at Prince George was requested. They proceeded to Samsback Mountain, located the burnt out area on the mountain face but were unable to get good pictures due to adverse weather. No reply had been received to our ACh 6 Nov. The NASO branch (W/C Burgess) was contacted with the request that the matter be appraised by AFHQ and higher authority advised of their recommendations.

10 On Wednesday 7 Nov a press release on the incident was made by the RCMP. A copy of this release and the local press coverage is attached. Many queries were directed to this Station and the press in Vancouver were more sensational in their handling of the story.

11 On the 8 Nov AFHQ DAI 141 authorized CANAIRPAC to conduct an aerial survey of the suspect area. It is understood this investigation produced no concrete results as the area had been covered with a recent fall of snow.

12 On November 13 the RCMP advised they had picked up a piece of metal $37\frac{1}{2}$ " long, $13\frac{1}{2}$ " wide allegedly to have fallen or burnt off from the unidentified flying object.

13 The RCMP investigation continues.

1 Attached are two copies of "Project Second Storey" questionnaire in regard to an unidentified flying object sighting, which are being forwarded in accordance with instructions issued by DAI.

2 Also included for your information is a copy of a directive issued to Units of Air Defence Command which covers this subject in considerably greater detail. It is believed that certain essential elements are missing from the Project Second Storey questionnaire which should be included. Among these are:

- (a) Formation, if more than one.
- (b) Aerodynamic features.
- (c) Speed.
- (d) Manner of disappearance.
- (e) Manner of observation: Visual or electronic; speed, heading, altitude and type of aircraft if observed from air; optical equipment used. (The present form asks if glasses were worn, but does not request information on whether binoculars were used or if observation was made through window or windshield.)
- (f) Weather. Winds aloft should be added.
- (g) Any unusual meteorological activity.
- (h) Any correlation with radar sightings.
- (i) Existence of physical evidence, fragments, photos, etc.
- (j) Interception or identification action taken.
- (k) Results of air traffic checks.

3 Although this Command is not prepared to undertake scientific analysis of unidentified flying object reports, it does have primary interest in current reports on this subject, and it would be helpful if other Commands would submit an initial report on sightings in accordance with the outline included as Attachments one and two to our directive.

Sightings - Unidentified Flying Objects

- 1 This letter supersedes letter, this Headquarters, file S66-3-1(GpIO), dated 3 Nov 50, subject: Sightings - Unknown Flying Objects.
- 2 Reports on unidentified flying objects ("flying saucers") are being received at this Headquarters in numbers that indicate the need for a review of the policy of Air Defence Command on this subject and the establishment of a new standardized procedure for reporting. This instruction sets forth ADO responsibility and reporting procedure for information pertaining to unidentified flying objects. All incidents observed by ADO personnel or received at ADO units from military or civilian sources will be reported in accordance with this instruction. This letter is intended to serve as an interim measure pending publication of an ASI on this subject.
- 3 Unidentified flying objects, as used in this instruction, are defined as any airborne object which by performance, aerodynamic characteristics or unusual features, do not conform to any presently known aircraft or missile type.
- 4 One lesson learned from USLF studies on this subject is that the incidence of "sightings" of unidentified flying objects always increases tremendously immediately after any publicity has been given to any sightings or investigations, resulting in a flood of worthless reports from persons seeking personal publicity or merely "seeing things". We are most anxious, therefore, not to have any publicity given this subject. In answer to any inquiries by the press concerning the RCAF's assessment of any particular incident, or the existence of "flying saucers" generally, it should be stated that ALL unusual occurrences are investigated as a matter of routine, and that, as far as is known, no conclusions have been drawn from past investigations. Reports should not be solicited from the general public, but these instructions are not intended to preclude efforts to obtain detailed information from reputable observers of such phenomena.
- 5 Investigations are to be conducted by the Station or Unit Intelligence Officer or, in the event of his absence or non-availability, by a person designated by the Station Commander. The requirements for this information will be made known to persons likely to be in a position to observe unidentified flying objects and to render accurate reports, such as air crews and control tower personnel.


6 Information relating to unidentified flying objects will be reported without delay. Originators will select the priority appropriate for each incident in accordance with its apparent importance as intelligence. Reports will be concerned with a single incident. A preliminary report will be forwarded immediately by signal to C.N. INDEF COC/INTELLIGENCE, and will be confirmed and elaborated upon by a written report forwarded within three days, in duplicate, to the JOC, ADC Hq, Attn: CIO.

7 The symbol FLYOBRPT will appear at the beginning of the text of the signal and as the subject of follow-up reports to facilitate identification. Initial reports should not be classified unless inclusion of data required by the attached pro forma mandates a higher classification in the opinion of the originator.

8 Attachment 1 is an outline of the information required on a preliminary unidentified flying object report, and Attachment 2 is an example of such a report. Attachment 3 is an example of a written follow-up report. Written reports will expand on the points enumerated in the outline, and photographs, sketches and signed narrative statements of observers should be appended. Statements should be recorded in as great detail as possible with particular attention given to time, angles of observation and flight paths or locations. The angles of observations, locations, flight paths, etc., should be drawn on aeronautical charts or maps. Written reports should not be classified higher than "RESTRICTED" unless inclusion of data required by the attached pro forma mandates a higher classification in the opinion of the originator.

9 Attachment 4 is a questionnaire to be used in interviewing witnesses of incidents. It is designed for use in reports involving military or civilian witnesses and, when appropriate, may be mailed to witnesses for completion and return to the Station Intelligence Officer, after which it should be forwarded to this Headquarters. This form is intended as a guide and its use and submission by SIOs is not mandatory.

10 In the event any actual or suspected items of material pertinent to any unidentified flying object incident comes into the possession of any JOC Unit, Station Intelligence Officers will safeguard the material to prevent any defacing or alteration which would reduce its value for technical analysis, and will notify C.N. INDEF COC/INTELLIGENCE. Shipping instructions or other special instructions will then be furnished by this Headquarters.

1 The following Unidentified Flying Object Report is submitted in accordance with letter, ADC HQ File: dated Feb 53.

1 An unidentified flying object of unknown size, described as a brilliant silver disc was observed by officers from this station. The object's speed was estimated at 500 knots as it travelled along the horizon. It changed from level flight to a steep climb and faded from view of the observers with no sound having been heard and no trail or exhaust having been noticed.

2 The object was first noticed at 1255 Atlantic Standard Time on 12 Mar 53 and was observed continuously for an estimated four minutes.

3 No optical or electronic aids were used in the observations, and the object was not picked up on radar. Observation was by the naked eye, through the glass of the control tower in one case, and through an aircraft canopy in another case.

4 One of the reporting officers was in the control tower at RCAF Station Chatham, and the other observer was in a Harvard aircraft flying at 1,000 feet above the ground in the traffic pattern approximately one mile due north of the tower. The object appeared due south of the tower and travelled from east to west parallel to the course of the Harvard. After approximately three minutes, it climbed abruptly at an estimated 60 degree angle, faded in brilliance, and was lost to view in the sun. The distance from the tower and the altitude of the object are unknown, but it was described as being just above the horizon.

5 Observers were F/O JP Jones, CFCO, RCAF Station Chatham (Four years in Flying Control Duties) and F/L RG Smith, No. 1 OTU, RCAF Station Chatham (nine years flying experience, 15 months as Flying Instructor at this station). Both observers are considered highly reliable and their reports, obtained separately, are in agreement on all main points.

6 Weather at 1300 AST was 7,000 foot scattered, high cirrus, surface wind 5-7 knots from the northeast, winds aloft: 010, 25 knots at 10,000; 350, 40 knots at 20,000; 350, 45 knots at 30,000.

8 Negatives and prints of two photographs taken by F/O Jones from the Control Tower are enclosed. The photos are being transmitted for further evaluation. However, it appears that nothing has shown up except for what seem to be reflections on Photo Number 2. F/O Jones states that he aimed the camera hastily and may have failed to get the object within the lens field of the camera.

9 No interception or identification action was taken at this station.

10 An Expeditor was the only traffic in the area other than the Harvard. The pilot had requested landing instructions and reported his position as fifteen miles southwest at 1259 .ST. F/O Jones described the position of the object he had in view and asked the Expeditor pilot if he had the object under observation. The pilot replied in the negative.

11 This office is unable to offer any opinion on this incident. It is reasonably certain that the object was not a conventional aircraft, and the possibility that it might be a weather balloon is ruled out by its speed and maneuvers.

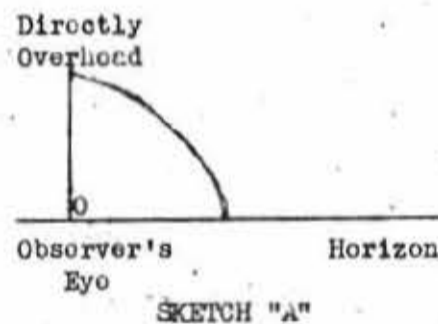

Dear Mr. Karashowsky:-

Thank you for your letter of 21 October, 1952. I am sorry if I did not write on return mail, but I have received your letter of October 24 and was working all days very long.

Excuse me if I write in the German language again.

(Translation from German)

From your letter I guess that you would like to have an interview with me; unfortunately I cannot remember if I asked you for one in my last letter, or anything like that. My writing to the Vice-Commodor originated out of my free will in which I pointed out that one should not fall into illusion and that an earnest approach to the project should begin. I chose this way and turned to differ in opinion, in the many articles published on the subject by the press, and I will do it again. You will ask why I am not coming, please excuse me, but for me time is money and as I intend to bring my family here in the spring of 1953, every cent has its value.

When I came to this country I offered my services to the different aircraft factories connected with the R.C.A.F., but there was no wish to use my knowledge. I was sympathized with, or offered the position of dish-washer. So I took to the shovel, and I have been working in this way in the gold mine. Now, after 13 months I work again as a mechanic though not in the aircraft factory, but on the building project. If I ever succeed I shall try to rebuild my life step by step until I will be able to realize my aim, namely the aircraft construction, which used to be the essence of my life. But for the time being, my knowledge of the English language is not very good, especially the grammar. I have here, satisfactory employment and I cannot grumble, although it is on the fringes of civilization. It is in short, about my person and my present position. Do not draw any conclusion out of it that I am asking you for something, or anything like that. I did not spend my life only sitting behind the drawing-desk, but I also learned to work with my hands, which over here in this country; is even profitable.

To conclude, may I say to you and once more expressly emphasize: do not think that I would like to rise myself by telling you all this, or make myself important. No, for all that the matter is much too serious and the situation much too strained to indulge in purposeless thinking or in fantasy. This thing requires, above

.../2

all quick thinking, so far, approach and work, work but less discussions, conferences, meetings, changes, and improvements, etc. Such proceedings shattered, then many plans and work-out-projects. The idea of a new construction was hardly out on paper or off the drawing-board, when it already required changes and alterations. It consumed a great deal of time, and finally a hitch developed, or was it already too late. So thereby, the Deutsche Luftwaffe collapsed and their research on this project came to an end. In some 4 months time it would have become ready for serial production. Thus, please remember this when you yourself worked on this project, and here is another small tip: do not play in the beginning with the work of putting the crew, in this kind of air-craft. The value of "G" will be too great to make it possible. The experiments in the Test chamber proved it, with which you are also familiar. We intended later to initiate the experiments with the crew in a pressurized cabin with the axially revolved and authoratively controlled chair (gyro-system or artificial horizon) which will authoratively maintain the position relative to flying, and thus diminish the effort of the drastic changes in the blood pressure volume. (Climbing, diving, etc.) The self contained cabin (with no plexiglass used) pictures transmitted to pilot on T.V. screen. Experiments proved that in this way the effect of changes in "G" on the pilot would be considerably reduced. For starting and landing the direct vision had been made possible. But all these devices had been thought out for the future use. Just at present, all effort had been concentrated on assembling this "bird" together. However, it was never possible to bring the research to its third stage. But why do I attempt to talk shop again. You have at your disposal a very good staff of professional workers, as well also, beyond doubt, my German colleagues, so you should succeed without my help.

My name has not yet any reports to justify my putting on with further work (on this line) here in this country. Thus I hope to reach my goal rather slowly and in this I will persist. I hope you do not try to apply any force to me as the Americans did in 1945 when they searched my flat and the house I was living in for some drawings or prints, and when none had been found they interrogated me for several weeks, day and night. What I am doing, I do out of my free will without the methods of the kind mentioned above. I hope I am in a free democratic land and I am conscious of breaking no law.

Perhaps I will have the honour and opportunity, after reaching my above mentioned goal, to see you and I remain with kind regards -

Light appeared in eastern sky near horizon and after quick flash disappeared for brief distance to appear in flash again and so proceeded by alternate flashes and darkness to cross the sky and disappear over the western horizon in what each party who has seen it has estimated to take altogether about half a minute to a minute from the time it appeared until it disappeared. They said no noise whatsoever accompanied light and that it was just like flash of a flashlight with no particular shape which could be described otherwise. It had no tail but strangely enough seemed to show something like sparks in front of it as it went. The color was like that of a bright white light rather than the yellow of a fading flashlight. There were various guesses as to how many times each party thought the light had flashed on but all said within five times when questioned separately.

They, the people who saw it joked about it being a flying saucer but did not seriously think that was what they had seen. One lady said she thought at first it was a firefly but as she was walking by herself considerable distance from the others this is without possibility.

All parties concerned give matching accounts of the phenomena though witnessed at different places.

I believe the sight should be reported to higher authorities as it does sound unusually like a flying saucer.

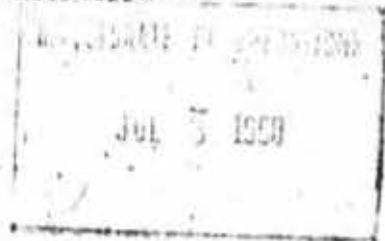

Unknown Flying Objects Sightings

- 1 Attached are three sighting reports of an unknown flying object sighted at Springhill NS on the 26th August 52.
- 2 These sightings were investigated by the SO-Int at MGHQ after being notified by Mr Dunlop a representative of the Arherst Sentinel-Dispatch.
- 3 These objects were originally sighted by children who called Mr [redacted] Mr [redacted] not believing his eyes called his wife his father-in-law and mother-in-law Mr and Mrs [redacted] He then called the RCMP but they were out so he then called the town police who at that time were special police hired for the period of the regular policemen's vacation.
- 4 In all the objects were sighted by eight children, and seven adults. Five of the adults were interviewed by F/L Gurney the remaining two having departed for the United States before F/L Gurney arrived at Springhill. The childrens statements were not too lucid so reports were not prepared on the basis of their sightings. Only one of the special policemen was interrogated extensively since the other one agreed with [redacted]
- 5 It is pointed out that Mr [redacted] was a very accurate and conscientious man. His report included bearings taken by a hand compass since he had had some experience in the army and knew that accurate details would be required. Mr [redacted] was rather vague and Mr [redacted] is known in the neighbourhood as being rather unstable.

A Report and Explanation of Unusual Activity
in the Trenton Area 20 Aug 52 - #3 AC & WU-

1 At approximately 0330Z, 20 Aug 52, an object of light
was sighted east of 3 AOSWU by personnel of the Control Tower
at RCAF Station Trenton. [redacted] the Duty Flying Control
Officer, called 3 AOSWU and asked if they had anything on the
scope to the east. Cpl [redacted], the Ops "B" advised that there
was something on a bearing of 080 degrees True at 16 miles (HQ5210)
at 0335Z.

2 At that time the information was passed along to 271 ADCC
and Command Control Centre. From the information mentioned in
para 1 it is apparent that the unidentified lighted object was
correlated with the return on the scope.

3 The personnel on duty at the Control Tower felt sure that
the lighted object had some weaving movement. The personnel at
3 AOSWU felt sure that the object in HQ5210 had a slight orbital
motion.

4 At 0505Z the Duty Met Observer took a theodolite reading
on the lighted object and obtained an azimuth of 089 degrees and
an altitude of 17.8 degrees.

5 Later on it became quite apparent that there was no
relationship between the two returns i.e. visual and radar. The
lighted object maintained its position relative to the stars
while the echo on the scope was motionless.

6 At 1035Z, after sunrise, the lighted object was still
visible at approximate meridian passage. The echo on the scope
was still observed in its original position plus some additional
A.P.'s, some of which appeared in the Rochester N.Y. area. The
appearance of these additional A.P.'s caused little concern as
it was taking the normal pattern for a temperature inversion in
this area.

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Several people who had seen the lighted object in this area were questioned and their observations and opinions are as follows: Mr. [redacted], Meteorologist, who was on duty, saw the lighted object at approximately 0400Z and stated that it did have an apparent weaving motion at a low observed altitude but that it was obviously a planet. The shimmering or weaving motion being attributed to an optical illusion created by atmospheric conditions. When questioned about the possibility of a temperature inversion to substantiate the reason for the A.P.'s, Mr Black said that there was a surface temperature inversion during the period in question.

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5 At approximately 0430-0500Z the Control Tower asked [redacted], which was on local night flying, to proceed to Belleville to see if the pilots could determine what the lighted object might be. The conclusion was that it was a star. Also the pilots of Dakota 444, Trenton C & R flight, were flying at approximately 0600Z and they said that they saw the same object and believed it to be a planet.

9 The observations on the lighted object and the computed movement of the planet Jupiter (taken from the Air Almanac and Volume "J" of A.N. Tables) for the same periods are presented below for comparison.

From the a/m facts it has been proved beyond reasonable doubt that the lighted object was the planet Jupiter and that the echo on the scope was Anomalous Propagation caused by a surface temperature inversion.

10 It is recommended that each ACAWU have a current volume of the Air Almanac and that appropriate volume of Air Navigation Tables to be able to prove or disprove future incidents of this nature with a minimum of delay. In this case considerable time was lost trying to locate these publications on Station Trenton. Although these publications are primarily for the use of navigators it is felt that there will always be someone at each unit who will be familiar with their use.

11 In summary the fact that reasonably accurate observations were made i.e. theodolite observations and visual meridian passage, made it a relatively simple problem to prove.

1 Attached is a copy of a reported sighting of an unknown flying object.

2 While the interrogator attempted to maintain an unbiased attitude, it became evident that the objects resembled jet aircraft in every respect except for the "parachute-like" shape. This was doubtless an illusion caused by the unfamiliarity of the observer with the swept back wing of the Sabre.

3. The noise "apparently" preceded the craft along. However the observer was dubious about this point.

4. General Impression. One initial statement was: "I just had a feeling they weren't aircraft - you know the sort of feeling you get".

Sir Stafford Gravely Ill

Sir Stafford Cripps ---gravely ill former chancellor of the exchequer ---has lapsed into unconsciousness.

His physician at Zurich, Switzerland, says that "Sir Stafford is slowly sinking and has now drifted into a state of deep and painless unconsciousness."

Lady Cripps is at her husband's bedside and the former labor minister's daughter ---Peggy--- is expected to arrive tomorrow.

Cripps who was the most brilliant member of the post war labor government will be 63 Thursday. He has been under treatment intermittently since November, 1950 for spinal tuberculosis and another "more and dangerous disease" which never has been identified publicly.

Lindsay firemen answered two calls during the weekend. Both calls were placed by the same resident and one concerned a stovepipe fire and the other a grassfire.

The north part belonging to the Trent Canal system (of the Dominion of Canada) and the south part is owned by the County of Victoria. could be repaired, possibly in not much more than a week's time. He adds that the time the bridge will be closed will be determined mainly by the availability of the steel for the necessary repairs.

When asked about the possibility of a new bridge being built, Mr. Wilford stated that the south half of the bridge was the responsibility of the County but the north half, or the swing section, was maintained by the Department of Transport. He said that for a new bridge to be built, it would necessitate the considerations of both the County Council and the Federal Government, arrangements, he said, which could not be made in any short space of time that would permit the bridge to remain closed while negotiations were underway. The county section of the bridge is 100 ft. long made up of 2 50-foot spans.

The bridge has buckled on the pedestrians' side within a few feet of the south end. There is a considerable drop there which begins gently near the centre of the travelled portion to become steeper at the east edge of the structure. Underneath the bridge it is seen that the bow rests on a bent cross piece where the "T" beams, running lengthwise, meet. The heavy rail between the sidewalk and the main part of the bridge has also been driven down. The extreme southern edge of the bridge appears to have been sprung loose of its moorings although it still rests on the pier. The plank floor has lifted about three inches all along the southern edge although no planks seem to have been punctured or broken. Some pedestrians still cross the bridge although they are not using the sidewalk which has dropped more than any other portion of the bridge.

2,000 Inmates Making Break For Freedom

State troopers have driven back rioting prisoners in Southern Michigan prison T Jack-on after firing over their heads. The convicts --- part of the 26-hundred who are defying orders to surrender ---tried to smash their way into the prison administration building. In retreating, the convicts seized 600 more hostages, bringing the total to 10. Earlier, they set fire to three buildings, but these fire went out. At Rahway, New Jersey, prison officials say they are very hopeful that 231 rebellious convicts at the state prison farm will give up today.

The witness of this spectacle had

ity. What he had seen was like

Getting back to the story of the
three mystery craft sighted over
the town on Sunday, it is repeated
that "there was no vapour trail in
their wake and the sound given off
at their approach in no way re-
sembled an airplane or jet plane."
The sound emitted was largely
noticeable preceding the craft's
approach and once overhead they
seemed to move swiftly and silent-
ly along, the noise diminishing rap-
idly. However, the fascination of
watching the craft may have taken
attention off the sound it was em-
itting somewhat.

What are these mysterious air-
craft? Where do they come from
and where do they go? Those are
questions which are stumping the
experts today. Only one thing emer-
ges clearly from the conglomera-
tion of reports: Too many of them
are seen by too many responsible
people for them to be figments of
the imagination.

Lad, 5, Probably Saved Own Life

Sutton, April 21 --(BUP)--
A five-year-old boy probably
saved his life by his own quick
thinking at Sutton, Ontario,
yesterday.

Little Brian Pugsley was
leaning over a bridge, looking
for fish in the Black River,
when he slipped and fell in.
But he quickly grabbed hold of a
floating log and kept his head
above water.

Joseph Latremouille was also
standing on the bank of the
river, and he saw the little boy
fall. He waded in and grabbed
Brian, bringing him safely to
the bank with no more harm
than a scare and a wetting.

Sutton police say the Black
River is only about three feet
deep at the point where Brian
fell in. But there is a wailpool
nearby, and they think the boy
would probably have drowned
if he had not kept himself a-
float by clutching the log.

London, Ontario April 21
(BUP)-- London airport officials
believe it was an unidentified air-
craft that left a vapor trail in the
sky yesterday as it streaked across
Western Ontario at an estimated
speed of more than one thousand
miles per hour.

The vapor trail behind what was
described as a "dark cylindrical ob-
ject" was first seen by Department
of Transport officials in Toronto.
It was then seen at London airport
and later from the Detroit airport
control tower.

The time between the Toronto
sighting and the appearance of
the trail north of Detroit was esti-
mated at 12 minutes. A report from
Goderich said the trail headed west
across Lake Huron.

The object was estimated to be
flying at about 30-thousand feet,
according to several aviation offic-
ials who saw the vapor trail.

Fighter aircraft from the city of
London squadron that were in the
air at the time were ordered to
intercept the object, but Mustang
pilots said they could not come
anywhere near it although they

Will Remain Closed For Repairs

Lindsay Street Bridge Sags Under Heavy Load

While speaking of the stores in the United States, he observed that every clerk, in every store, appeared to be so very pleased with any purchase made, no matter whether it were for \$10 or for five cents. He

The Lindsay Street bridge, which many residents have considered too small for the amount of traffic it has to bear, has been damaged and will be closed for repairs for some time. A transport, says Chief Constable Webster, is believed to have been the straw that forced part of the south span of the bridge down early Sunday evening.

The only witnesses to the accident appear to have been some boys at the locks who state that a tractor-trailer was crossing the bridge when it partially collapsed. So far, drivers have been hesitant about coming forth and claiming the honour of having piloted the vehicle across the bridge which is believed to have caused the breakdown. Immediately following its sudden drop on the east side at the south end, or County of Victoria section, traffic was rerouted and the bridge, says County Engineer Harold Wilford is very unsafe for motor vehicles.

Mr. Wilford states that the bridge, whose flooring was not punctured although the "I" beams underneath have given way, will be inspected this afternoon by an expert in such matters and the process of repairing it will begin immediately providing the proper materials can be obtained on such short notice. He says that he has at present not attempted to appraise the damage but added that it is expected that

nothing he had ever seen in the sky before. There was nothing frightening about the things he had seen but they were like no other flying thing he had ever witnessed.

Checking with Trenton Airport, it was learned that no aircraft were known to be over the Lindsay area.

The senior duty officer was interested enough to ask for a detailed report. This will be forwarded. He said the Air Force was definitely interested in assembling all available data on these mysterious craft.

Returning to the flower garden, another air spectacle was to be witnessed. This was what appeared to be a jet craft streaking across the sky from east to west. It was leaving a long vapour trail and this led one to believe it was an ordinary jet craft. However, this conclusion was somewhat upset this morning on reading that a high-speed craft leaving a "horizon to horizon" vapour trail had been sighted at Toronto and Windsor. 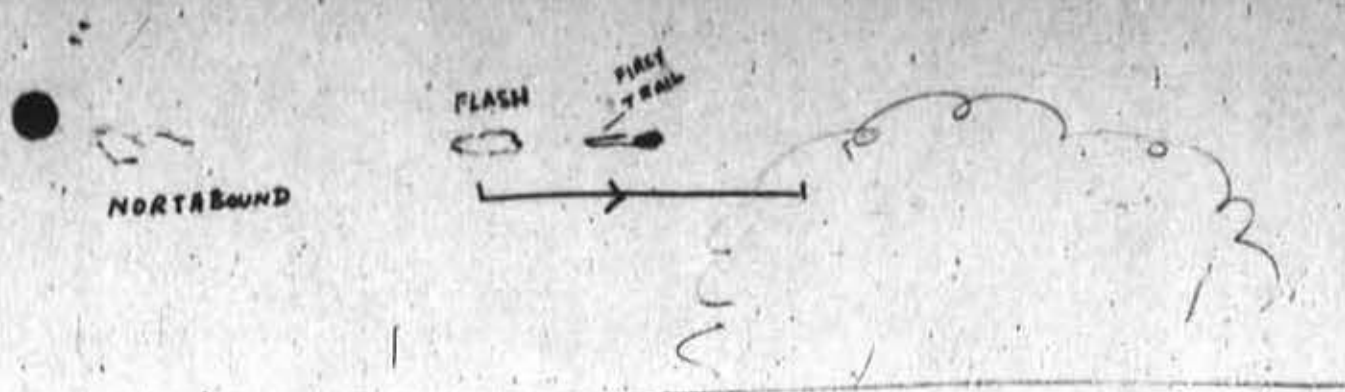

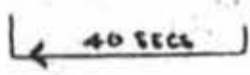

For the benefit of those who were not present at the general meeting held on April 22nd, the Chairman opened the meeting with a brief resume of discussions leading to the formation of this Committee and the terms of reference. He then tabled three books by Kehoe, Scully and Heard dealing with Flying Saucers sightings as worthy study as they give a fairly useful summary of the most important publically recorded sightings. These can be used in addition to newspaper reports.

S/L Bing tabled a report by the RCAF relative to the USAF project on Flying Saucers. This report is to be duplicated by the RCAF and copies passed to the Secretary for distribution to the Committee members.

The question of the security classification of the work of the committee was then discussed. It was agreed that CONFIDENTIAL was sufficient, but that members should be cleared to SECRET to facilitate any exchange of information from international sources.

The Chairman stated that it would probably be better to divorce this work from the questionable title of "Flying Saucers", and thought that some name entirely without meaning such as "Project Theta" should be adopted. The Committee agreed in principle to this suggestion, with the exception that the project name is not to be used during exchange of information of an international character. Such "exchanges" are to be effected through established channels only. There being no further suggestions acceptable, the name "Project Thets" was adopted, subject to investigation by the Secretary as to the validity of the use and possible duplication of the name.

The possibility of obtaining U.S. data on a reciprocal basis was considered desirable and the Secretary was instructed to have a formal approach to this effect made through the DRB Member in Washington.

Consideration was given to the interrogation form presently in use by the RCAF. After discussion, it was agreed that the form should immediately be revised with accompanying instructions for its use. The revised form (copy attached) was drawn up and copies are to be distributed by the Secretary prior to the next meeting. The preparation of the instructions was divided among the members as follows:

The Chairman opened the meeting with a brief reference to the more frequent occurrence of "Flying Saucer" sightings. The frequency and persistence of the sightings would tend to discount the theory of 'hallucinations'. This, coupled with an aroused public interest in these sightings, tended to call for a more active stand on the matter. At present the gathering of reports was rather haphazard and the reaction of the Services was passive. It is thought that a more active and intensive effort should be made to obtain these data on an organized basis, and all reports investigated and analysed. The objects of the meeting were then to determine if a more serious effort is justified and, if so, ways and means of implementing an organized effort. Organizations such as the Observer Corps might be enlisted for the job of sighting. If nothing else, this could serve as a useful training for the Corps. An examination of the theories might prove useful in giving a lead to the best locations for sighting. It was fortunate that proponents of the theories of terrestrial and extra-terrestrial origins were in contact with the D.R.B. and their data could be examined first hand.

The Air Force representatives then briefly outlined the work done by the USAF up to a year or so ago. As these efforts consistently resulted in 'nil returns' their project, in so far as the press and public were concerned at least, had been discontinued. Very recently, however, this investigation was re-opened, but is now classified.

In the discussions which followed, it was pointed out that precise and realistic details were lacking in all known reports. If observers such as the Rangers, watchers on ship board and the Observer Corps, which incidentally is really still in the paper organization stage, are to be enlisted some well planned guidance would be necessary. A small booklet illustrating typical celestial phenomena would result in more intelligent observation and eliminate many erroneous impressions. It was considered desirable to obtain information from U.S. interviews obtained under proper interrogation procedure, but to avoid the U.S. analysis of these

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interviews which was often unacceptable to some members of this Committee.

Mr. Smith briefly outlined the extra-terrestrial origin theory. A plot of the frequency and timing of sighting related to the opposition of the planet Mars to the earth was displayed. Sightings occur at approximately six week intervals, but the frequency is much higher during periods when the planets are nearing each other such as in the present month. The more reliable observations place these objects at heights - of 100 to 300 miles moving with velocities in the order of 1000 - 2000 mph. Terrestrial bodies making use of airfoils could not operate at these heights. Size and power limitations also negate earthy origins. The brilliance of sighting after sunset could be explained by reflections from the body at these altitudes of the sun's illumination, or in daylight by frictional heating or other magnetic heating effects. Considering the orbital velocities of the earth and Mars (18 and 15 miles per secon respectively) and their nearest positions (e.g. 52,000,000 miles on May 8th) with a continuous acceleration of 2 g for 3 or 4 days, these distances could be traversed.

Mr. Langley stated that no electronic reports had been received of flying saucers. It was generally agreed that no electromagnetic radiations had ever been found which could not be traced to terrestrial origin. If electronics are associated with these objects, their frequencies are outside the presently usable ranges. Mr. Smith then elaborated on the work of the ionosphere stations which had been asked to report any unusual findings, but with 'nil returns' to date.

The Chairman outlined in broad terms the theory of terrestrial origin, namely a new type of aircraft (presumably Russian) as expounded by Mr. Frost of the A.V. Roe Company. This theory had some discrepancies, but the aerodynamics were worth following as, even if of extra-terrestrial origin, the bodies would have to follow aerodynamic theory within the earth atmosphere. Also a new high speed aircraft design might be evolved. The theories outlined should give an impetus to the flying saucer investigations.

It was generally agreed that a more active investigation should be undertaken. The Chairman believed that the function of the D.R.B. should be mainly advisory as the collecting of reports could best be done by field organizations. The representatives of the Services agreed and will use their discretion in the choice of their more suitable sections to use for observers.

It was decided that a Committee should be formed to give a lead in this activity and to standardize procedures, etc. Accordingly the following were nominated and agreed to act: Dr. Millman (Chairman) G/C Edwards, Lt. Col. Webb, Cdr Pratt, F/L Bradley, and Mr. Oatway (Secretary) This committee was to prepare a brief of instructions for observers; examine interrogation procedures to get a consolidated and pertinent series of questions;

and to establish a standard method of recording and indexing for subsequent analysis.

Finally G/C Edwards suggested that the RCMP might prove to be a valuable addition as observers. This organization has the added advantage of having trained interrogators.

The Chairman thanked those present for attending and for their willingness to aid in these investigations.

That he was known to be a heavy drinker and held drinking parties at his residence quite often. He was also described as a bit of a headline seeker. The writer visited [redacted] on the 24 April 1962, and on arrival found [redacted] stretched out on his bed, fully clothed and under the unfluence of alcohol; The kitchen was littered with empty beer bottles and a number of full beer bottles observed in the bedroom. It was not possible to interrogate [redacted] in the condition in which he was found and was therefore interrogated on the 29 April 1962, on this date was found to be sober. The OPP interviewed [redacted] on 9 Oct. 1951, regarding sighting of strange aerial objects, and they did not place too great a value in [redacted] statement of observation, as he is well known by the local police and most of the complaints they receive from [redacted] are disregarded, or unfounded.

- 1 At 2254 hrs 1 Jan 52 while making ice at the rink in the P.M. area a "flying saucer" was sighted by the undersigned and [REDACTED]
- 2 Direction - Appeared in the northwest and proceeded to the southeast and disappeared. The direction altered slightly at times, zig-zagging and climbing and diving.
- 3 Height - The "saucer" appeared to be at a great height, probably outside the earth's atmosphere.
- 4 Speed - Supersonic. Elapsed time from sighting to disappearing being 8 minutes and 43 seconds. At times it seemed to slow down then dart away again.
- 5 Colour - Reddish orange - similar to a rocket burning, as compared to the blue white of the stars.
- 6 Sound - Nil - for several minutes after losing sight and none preceding the sighting (all flooding activity ceased to check the sound).
- 7 Weather - Clear and cold (plus 10°F). There was a low cloud bank to the south where sight of "saucer" was lost.

The targets "B" and "C" were most interesting targets similar to those seen at 5000 foot altitude. No reports were obtained for Target "B" and it is believed to be travelling at about the same speed according to observations.

Comments of Information Sources:

1. Information above is considered completely reliable and the GCA operators actually observed the radar returns.

2. The fact that the PFI scope was in the "warm-up" stage, and the possibility of erratic electronic currents caused by heating and expansion during this period must be considered in the fact that all targets appeared near the center of the scope and disappeared in the same area while the known target, the C-47, continued its course clear and its return returned.

Comments of the Reporting Officer:

1. The Director of Communications and Headquarters offered the following comments after the above information:

2. It is apparent that the targets appearing on the scope were true targets. Both operators are experienced radar operators and should immediately recognize "blips" caused by electronic disturbances.

3. It is estimated that if the "blips" were caused by the vibration of the antenna, they would have appeared in a definite course.

1 Occasional reports are received at this HQ concerning the sighting of unknown flying objects. The USAF investigated a large number of sightings (Project "Banner") and considered that such reports are the result of:

- (a) Misinterpretation of various conventional objects.
- (b) A mild form of mass hysteria or "war nerves".
- (c) Individuals who fabricate such reports to perpetrate a hoax or to seek publicity.

Though this evaluation seems reasonably conclusive it is still necessary to deal with any future reports in Canada on their own merits. It has therefore been decided that a standard method of reporting should be established. The attached pro forma has been produced for this purpose.

2 One lesson learned from the USAF study is that the incidence of "sightings" always increased tremendously immediately after any publicity was given to any sighting or investigation, resulting in a flood of worthless reports from people seeking personal publicity or merely "seeing things". We are most anxious, therefore, not to have any publicity given to this subject. Should you be questioned by the press concerning the RCAF's assessment of any particular incident, or the existence of "flying saucers" generally, they should be informed that ALL unusual occurrences are investigated as a matter of routine, and that as far as you know, nothing has been discovered to date by the RCAF to indicate that "flying saucers", as popularly conceived, exist. It is important also that these report forms should not be distributed

..... 2

any more widely than necessary; on write they should be held by the CO or his Adjutant.

3 The following points should be borne in mind in the completion of this pro forma and in the investigation of unknown flying objects generally:

- (a) Investigations are not to be invited nor is hearsay to be investigated. Investigations are only to be carried out when they are reported to the WCAP by a civilian or a serviceman who actually witnessed the incident.
- (b) Investigations should be conducted conscientiously and without bias by the investigator. In particular, care must be taken to avoid "suggesting" answers to persons being investigated.
- (c) The report forms are to be completed in triplicate with distribution as listed hereunder:
 - (i) AFHQ
 - (ii) GHQ
 - (iii) Unit copy.
- (d) The report forms are to be classified Confidential at all times both when uncompleted and completed.
- (e) Should an unknown flying object land on Canadian territory, a signal is to be immediately despatched to AFHQ Attn: AMAP/DAI.

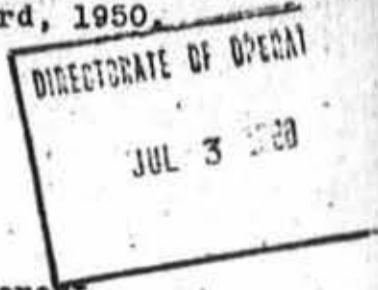

- 1 Reference your DFB 200-4-160 (DSI) 19 Apr 50, your draft preliminary questionnaire has been reviewed by this Directorate. Attached is a revised questionnaire submitted for your consideration.
