1. On 8 July 1949, [REDACTED], Quarters 602-C, Gunter AFB, wife of [REDACTED], stated that she sighted flying saucers on 18 June 1949. [REDACTED] supplied the following details:

Place of observation	Approximately one mile from Montgomery, Alabama, city limits enroute to Gunter AFB, Alabama
Position of observer	In automobile while driving to Gunter AFB, Alabama
Other witnesses	None
Photographs or sketches of objects	None
Number of objects	20 to 25
Shape of objects	Saucerlike
Size	Appeared to be size of dinner plate
Color	Aluminum
Speed	Slower than airplane
Heading	No particular direction. Appeared to be bubbling up and down around and into large thunderhead
Maneuverability	Extremely maneuverable
Altitude	Over 500 feet. Operating in and out of thunderhead.
Sound	None
Exhaust	None
Position	Over Gunter AFB, Alabama, about two miles from observer

Sun was shining but there was a large thunderhead over Gunter AFB

2. [REDACTED] husband has been in the Air Force for over 7 years and she is thoroughly familiar with all types of aircraft. She has never seen anything of this type before. [REDACTED] told her husband of the incident immediately upon reaching home but told no one else for fear of ridicule. As far as she knows, no one else saw the saucers.

NOTE: [REDACTED] seemed a normal, mature woman.

3. On 11 July 1949, a check of the weather records at Maxwell AFB, Alabama, revealed the following information:

1530 weather 18 June 1949

15,000, clouds scattered, visibility 10 miles, wind calm.

1630 weather 18 June 1949

15,000, clouds scattered, visibility 10 miles, wind from North 6 knots.

1730 weather 18 June 1949

18,000, clouds scattered, visibility 10 miles, a few cirrus clouds, wind from West 4 knots.

1830 weather 18 June 1949

18,000, clouds scattered, visibility 10 miles, a few cirrus clouds, wind from West 4 knots.

1930 weather 18 June 1949

18,000, clouds scattered, visibility 10 miles, smoke layer, wind calm.

4. Four weather balloons were released from Maxwell AFB on 18 June 1949 at the following times: one at 0315, one at 0900, one at 1445, and one at 2134. No unusual conditions or phenomena were noticed.

NOTE: No weather facilities are available at Gunter AFB. Gunter AFB Operations calls Maxwell Weather Station for clearance data.
