

Thank you for your reply to my recent letters concerning the tomado aircraft accident on Wednesday 9th. August 1988 and my manuscript "Irregularities in Radio Communication" Under normal circumstances your letter would be acceptable but here we are not dealing with the normal.

I do not believe that the head on mid air collision between two RAF Tornado aircraft on 9th August 1988 occurred and it will take a lot of convincing from high offices for me to think otherwise, but it does not matter what I think, I am just a member of the public (ten a penny and not many brains between us). The Ministry of Defence will not lose any sleep over it and neither will

What I have lost sleep over is the problem concerning Irregularities in Radio

Communication "and; if the MOD are genuine, they should also. My first complaint should have worried the MOD to the point of an immediate investigation because, if the MOD do not know of the device I have tried to describe, as they claim, then someone has infiltrated their defences.

I find this difficult to believe and can only come to the conclusion that they do know of the electromagnetic device that I am subjected to. If this is the case the MOD are supporting an illegal system as I have not given my consent to take part in this activity. What I have had to endure puts mary Shelley's "Frankenstein" in the shade and it is time the MOD put an end to it no matter how good their plans may have been at the beginning. They have failed to convince me of their honourable intentions.

Enclosed you will find a copy of my manuscript "Irregularities in Radio Communication," just in case you have not seen it before.

Dear Sir Craig,

I consider it necessary to make a complaint to the Royal Air Force concerning the increasing number of military current accidents involving RAF personnel. The collision of two Tornado aircraft on 9th. August 1988 has had a surprising effect on my studies and I regard the incident as unbelievable. Advanced aircraft such as the Tornado should never be flown without an equally advanced tracking system, especially in peacetime. Too much thought and energy is given to attack rather than to an effective defence.

My complaint is two-fold. Firstly it concerns

the death of Flt. Lt. John Walts on 9th. August 1988. How can the R.A.F. loose their best pilots in a manner, which seems to me, so casual? I have attended most of the Fighter Meets held at North Weald and have experienced the enthusiasm with which these air shows have been organised by Flt. Lt. Walts and his colleagues. They have done so much for RAF public relations through these shows yet they do not seem to be protected by a system within the RAF.

Secondly my complaint concerns a radio tracking system to which I have been introduced, and trained to understand, without my consent. I have tried to solve the problem by writing prominent people dealing with advanced technology hoping they would help me with my stand against "illegal research", but to no avail. At the same time I have tried to discover the real reason why scientists would want to use such a device. The device is extremely clever but also very frightening and could be used in many walks of life. As time passed () was introduced fully to the device in 1974) a pattern developed and I find myself studying possible uses in the military area though, as a civilian, always looking for ___?

peacetime applications. Recently my studies have taken me to areas covering Search and Rescue operations, test pilots and military pilots. Now I find what I believe to be the answer, the real reason the scientists have developed the device for — the hardling of advanced aircraft with an advanced tracking system, combined.

Somebody somewhere knows about the device I am subjected to. The RAF should be interested in it because it is the answer to piloting advanced aircraft, therefore I will be grateful if you would give this matter your utmost consideration to help me finalise what I regard as illegal research.

Thank you for your reply to my aircraft on 9th August 1988, and Fte Lt John Walts who was one of the personnel killed in the accident

The incident has has such a profound effect on my studies that I find it difficult to believe that it ever occured. Is it possible to send me more details on how the accident came about?

My studies concern irregularities in radio the use of radio communication to which I have been deliberately introduced they scientists unknown to me. The matter is difficult for me to prove though I have tried to describe its existence to prominent offices and personnel. So far no one has come forward to assist me with this serious development in electromagnetic technology.

A description of the device has been forwarded to Air Vice-Marshal P. Howard OBE, Institute of Aviation Medicine (IAM), Group Captain Section 40 University of Cambridge. These three professional men ignored my last letter to them. Details were also sent to Rt. Hon. G. Younger whose office claimed that they knew nothing of the device and, to my knowledge, «no inquiry has been made.

There must be a reason for scientists to introduce me to a highly sophisticated radio communication technique without my consent and so I have researched the problem to try and find the reason why. One possible application of the device is to help a pilot control supersonic aircraft and for Air Traffic Controllers to track these aircraft in low level flights at all times.

If the incident occurred on that Wednesday evening it seems to me that the RAF are using an archaic system with highly sophisticated aircraft. They are asking too much of their

pilots and seem to forget that man is a biological phenomenon not a machine. If the RAF is to fly highly sophisticated aircraft then they need a highly sophisticated tracking system. That system is the one I have been introduced to and have tried to describe to the RAF and the Ministry of Defence. If the RAF continue to ignore its existence they might as well consider disponding because recent records are beginning to prove that they are incapable of carrying out the job they are paid to do. I cannot believe the RAF to be that stupid.

I feel now is the time for me to lodge a complaint at the highest level possible within the RAF and I will be grateful if you could supply me with the name and address of a high ranking officer relevant to this problem. Thank you.

In the past I have made complaints to you on several occasions about the "illegal" use of a radio communication system but to no avail. I cannot understand why you refuse to recognise or investigate my complaint

when they system I have tried to describe will be used by the RAF in the future. If the RAF insist on flying piloted fighter aircraft, instead of using missiles, then they will have to use a system similar to the one I am subjected to or continue to loose aircraft at the present alarming rate.

Irregularities in Radio Communication.

Introduction.

mysterious happenings which can only occur with the use of an electromagnetic device. By using high technological equipment I have been deliberately introduced to a form of radio communication by which I am able to receive messages.

Permission has not been asked of me and, whether I like it or not, training has been given for me to understand the working of such a device. The device is quite remarkable, which could be lethal in the wrong hands, and is so advanced that only top scientists and highly skilled personnel could have developed this

invention in such a unique manner.

In 1969 I was first aware of unusual pressures on my body and particularly on my head. As time went by I began to feel sharp shocks which I immediately considered not to be natural and in 1974 the first voices were heard. My conclusion was that scientists were introducing me to ultra-modern electronics which I did not fully understand. Although I did try to explain to close friends and relatives I know they could not comprehend the situation so it was a matter for me to patiently gather relevant information to support my case. This has been a difficult task because majority of the material is classified and therefore unavailable.

In the interests of legalities I adopted a policy of making complaints: when suitable occasions arose. This policy has continued throughout and has intensified in the last three years. The reason is due to my studies of the device, and information on electronics being made more available to the general public which has given me

confidence in my theory. I have approached many professional people but, unfortunately, found that they did not want to help me personally.

Method.

The following details concerning the equipment used for conducting the telemetry research are purely speculative and a second opinion is required on the existence of the device, namely a Radio Frequency Laser.

a. Telemetry.

A transistor transmitter/receiver device placed on my person either in a tooth cavity or in the cartilage of my right knee. As well as receiving and transmitting conversations I am surrounded by a controlled electromagnetic field, possibly of a different frequency and more powerful. At the same time telemetry is being used to record my behaviour twenty four hours a day. Working under stress is of particular interest to the scientists involved.

b. Monitors

A transmitter and monitoring station

in Bahrain with approximately twelve scientists. This conclusion based on messages received.

c. Main electrical source.

It is believed that a communications satellite using solar power is responsible for the direct beaming of radio and electromagnetic waves on my person. This enables continued monitoring in telemetry which is unhindered by movement or atmospheric distortion.

d. Weather modification.

There is a possibility that on 9th. September 1984 the weather was modified at the Farnborough International Air Display in the form of cloud dispersal. The days weather was experienced personally and under suspicious curcumstances. The conclusion is unscientific but well calculated.

Conclusion.

Since 1969 the potential of the electromagnetic device has been demostrated and proven to be very versatile. The application of such a device will not

be discussed here because its legal status has yet to be solved.

As already mentioned there is an unusual lack of interest in the problem and no genuine help has been given. This immediately arouses suspicion. The easiest way to solve the problem is to have an x-ray to locate the transistors but I have no intention of approaching a doctor or dentist without third party support. The Ministry of Defence, on receiving information about irregularities in radio communication, should have solved the problem immediately if only in the interests of national security of the U.K.



Thank you for your recent letter to the Chief of the Air Staff concerning the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs). I have been asked to reply on his behalf.

I think you will find it helpful if I explain that whilst the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate some information about UFOs sightings, our sole concern is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, the MOD makes no attempt to investigate or identify whatever might have been seen.


The Ministry of Defence has no specialist department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full time. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports in the course of their duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations or general surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles to mention just a few.

Although it is not for me to comment on the American involvement, as we do not liaise with them on this subject. I would like to assure you that there is no question of attempting to cover up any incident, nor are we trying in any way to obscure the truth about UFOs from the general public.

Thank you for your letter of 31 August to the Chief of the Air Staff concerning the unusual concentric circles in a cornfield near Winchester that you saw, and photographed earlier this year. I have been asked to reply on his behalf, and as you might expect, I am the person that you spoke to when you first reported the occurrence.

As you may know, the Ministry of Defence's involvement with the subject of unexplained phenomena is minimal, in that our sole concern is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, the MOD makes no attempt to investigate or identify whatever might have been seen. I am sure you will appreciate , given that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries, that we do not have the resources to carry out any in depth scientific studies or surveys unless a clear threat to our security had been identified.

The circles which you observed seem to be a fairly common occurrence in the Hampshire / Wiltshire area, certainly I have come across them before, but I regret that I have no definite idea what might have caused them. I can say with certainty, however, that the phenomenon was not caused by military or civil helicopters. also do not consider that the circles present a threat to the defence of the United Kingdom. Nevertheless, I would like to thank you for the information and have pleasure in returning your slides.

Thank you for your recent letters to the Secretary of State and the Chief of the Air Staff concerning the tragic accident involving two Royal Air Force Tornado aircraft on Wednesday 9 August 1988. been asked to reply on their behalf.

From the evidence that is presently available it appears that the aircraft were involved in a head on mid air collision at approximately 720 feet and tragically all four aircrew were killed in the accident. At present it is too early to offer any explanation of the cause of the accident, although a Board of Inquiry has been convened and when its investigations are complete, the summary of its findings will be published. The work of the Board is still at an early stage and although it has not been established that the accident occurred as a result of any deficiency in the existing Low Flying System, the investigation has recommended a review of night low flying regulations to improve deconfliction.

We understand your concern about the safety of low flying, but would like to stress that low flying is not as dangerous as it appears and that safety is always our highest priority. Indeed, the RAF's accident rate has been steadily improving over the years, and the rate for 1987 was the best for over twenty years.

However, we are not complacent about safety and are therefore grateful for your suggestions on the use of radio communications systems to "track" low flying military aircraft. As you say, RAF Tornados are highly sophisticated aircraft but I would like to assure you that the pilots who are trained to fly them are extremely competent, professional and are well versed in the operation and handling of the aircraft.

Thank you for your letter of October 24th, in which you confirm that investigators for the MOD did not visit our witness as described in my letter of April 6th.

This therefore means then that either the witness is lying, or the men were posing as MOD representatives. As there was another witness to the visit, who in my opinion would not tell lies, then the conclusion must be with the latter explanation. Who were the men? Were they from a government department of which you are ignorant of? Just civilian investigators posing as MOD operatives? From somewhere else? What ever the explanation, they knew details about the case which at that time were only shared by a handful of people.

I don't know what you know about UFO scenarios, but there are many cases from around the world where civilian witnesses have been approached by men wearing business suits claiming to be government officials. They almost always have an intimate knowledge of the experience, and never check out.

One last thing. In your letter you say that 'your description of the MOD identity card. does not tally with our *present* design.' What exactly do you mean by this? Does it mean that the description tallies with a *previous* design? Clarification please, if possible.



Thank you for your letter of 5 September 1988 which asked for any information that we might have on an Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) sighting witnessed on 1 April 1980 in the East Midlands area.

Before answering your query, I think it would be helpful if I explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom and they examine the reports in the course of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations or general surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles amongst many others.


Moving to your particular question, I regret that a search through our file has not revealed a report which corresponds to the details that you gave in your letter.

As far as general release of material on the subject is concerned, you may find it helpful to know that, although we are not able to release material "en blec" because of the limitations of the Public Records Act, we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently, ie within the last 3 years. We can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so, what it contains.

I received a popy of the narrative, regarding the UFO incident, sent to you by ________. As ______ said in his letter, thirty years tends to obscure the details of events. I had not discussed the event with anyone nor had any contact with since leaving Manston and for all practical purposes had forgotten it until our reunion in May. I recalled the event but, due to the other activities, we didn't have an opportunity to rehash the details.

My recollection of the night's events, except for the fact that we did chase UFO's that evening, varies somewhat from those in Section 40 narrative.

My recollection of the events of 20 May 1957 are briefly as follows:

I do not believe and I launched from an alert status. Normally the F-86D was scrambled as a single ship. More than one might be scrambled but not as a team.

As I recall, I was the flight leader and we were on a training flight making simulated attack runs on each other. While on this flight we were contacted by someone (probably Manston) and told to contact a GCI site. I believe it was the site in East Anglia just north of the Thames. Bawdsy?. They queried me about the weapons status of our aircraft. We were unarmed, as was the usual status on training flights, and I so advised. We were directed to land at RAF Bentwaters (the 512 Squadron, one of our 86 units was stationed there) where our aircraft were armed with live rockets.

We received a briefing of some sort while on the ground. I don't recall by whom but I believe it was by land line. I specifically recall being advised that more than one GCI site and multiple "unknowns" were involved and that the area extended into Scotland. I don't recall being advised of other RAF or USAF aircraft being involved, but it would seem probable that they were.

We then relaunched and contacted the designated GCI site. We must have stayed under one of the MET sector GCI sites as the B6D had a different attack profile (lead pollision) than the curve of pursuit used by the RAF and required different skills of the controller.

After launch we were vectored independently. Mormal procedure would have been to receive an initial heading and altitude along with the call sign and frequency of the GCI site to contact. I don't recall ever going above 10,000 but was sent to higher altitudes (this is probably where he remembers being in the lead). I was vectored on several of the unknowns and in spite of the ground clutter (the 86 radar wasn't very good at lower altitudes), I did get several pretty good returns but was unable to maintain radar contact long enough to get a "lock on". Information from the controller indicated the unknowns were changing speed and altitude quite frequently. Some of my runs were in the cloud and others in the clear. I don't recall how many attempts at radar and/or visual contact I made, but it was several.

One I remember quite well was at 3000 ft. I was told that the "bogey" was at angels 3 and at a very slow speed. I recall being told that the unknown was at 12 O'clock and I was closing. Perhaps because of the ground clutter I never got a postive radar contact on the unknown. At this point I believe I was in the vicinity of Norwich (or some other good sized town in East Anglia). As directed, I attempted to get a visual contact when I closed to less than 2 miles but was unable. If the unknown was lighted he must have blended with the ground lights. The bogey then either accelerated or descended and the controller lost him.

I don't recall whether we became low on fuel or the unknowns left the area; but at some point the controller rejoined us and we recovered at RAF Manston.

There was some debriefing, of which the details escape me. I do not recall being contacted one on one by anyone about keeping the details quiet. However, due to some of my later activities in the Air Force involving close kept operations, where I learned to blank out details in my mind, this lack of recall does not surprise me. I do recall was rather excited and talked about getting a lock on one of the unknowns, but I don't remember the details. I have no reason to believe it was not as recounted in his narrative.


I might add that during this same time frame (spring of 1957), while either standing cockpit alert or acting as runway control officer, on two occasions I saw some activity to the south of Manston which involved several lighted objects moving in strange ways. They were sometimes motionless and sometimes accelerating in various directions which did not appear to be consistent with either fixed wing aircraft or helicopters known to me at that

time. I reported these to control tower and/or MET mector but never requested nor received any explanation of what they were.

I know this is not a very exciting herrative but it is all I wan recall.

There was an RAF controller named Section 40 (sp?) who controlled 86's out of Bawdsy(?) during this time frame but I have no idea if he was on duty that particular night.



I am in receipt of your missive dated 10th November, 1988, in which you responsed to my missive dated 1 September, 1988.

You stated that I said that a small percentage remain unexplained. This is my conclusion has well as the official conclusion of the U.S.A.F. and the C.I.A. If you read the document enclosed within my letter dated 1 September you will see that is their conclusion. The document in question was classified "Secret security information."

Has for the Ministry's documents on UFOs I have a number of points I would like to put to you. Firstly the RAF still has UFO documents on the secret list is my conclusion. I await your reply. I can understand that you maybe short staffed, but the individuals who are behind this cover-up certainly aren't.





Dear Sir,

With reference to my previous communication, dated 26 August 1988 with regards to our organisations enquiries into alleged UFO sightings within the Midlands and North over the last year or so, I am sorry to say that I have recieved no achknowledgement or report onto the complaint.

The principal of my last letter centres around sightings of large triangular/wedge-shaped/delta-shaped objects with an assortment of lighting configurations and usually two large white 'headlights'. These objects, generally seen by witnesses at night, are silent (except for a low humming heard only when beneath the object) and often very low, appearing over populated areas.

One terrified a lone driver one early morning at Overseal, near Ashby-de-la-Zouch in Leicestershire in November 1986; another was seen very low by two police officers one evening, on 27 September 1985 at Long Clawson, near Melton Mowbray, Leics. Recently, a spate have occured in the Midlands and the North, including a family terrified by a very low flying object of the above description at Abbots Bromley on 22 September 1987. Recently again, around Stafford on 16-22 May this year many witnesses observed an object of the same description. The local MP. the Rt. Hon. William Cash, is now taking up the matter with the MoD.

A collegue from Sheffield, Section 40 has also contacted the CAA (at Manchester, I believe) is also investigating similar sightings in Yorkshire and more recently in Lancashire. A flap of the triangular objects occurred over Rotherham and Sheffield between 7.30 and 8.00pm on Tuesday 2 February 1988.

Both Section 40 and myself again wish to make an official complaint on behalf of the witnesses involved against low-flying exercises over populated areas such as Rotherham/Sheffield, Stafford and Ashby-de-la-Zouch. The danger of an accident is very high, particularly in darkness when the majority of the sightings have been reported. Acopy of Section 40 report and my own information has gone to the CAA at Manchester and to the Rt. Hon. William Cash MP, as well as to AS-2 at the Ministry of Defence.

We would be very grateful if you could acknowledge this letter and the contents within it as soon as possible and to make the appropriate proceedures to investigate these sightings of UFOs, which are, in our considered opinion, a cover-up for low-flying exercises over populated areas.

I look forward to hearing your reply and I thankyou in anticipation.



MIDLANDS UFO OCCURNENCES: TRACE CASE, STAFF'S 4AUG 1988

LANDING? WARWICKS, 25 JUL 1988

Dear Sir,

I wish to make enquiries regarding two recent UFO sightings that occurred in the Midlands in the hope of perhaps elucidating the true nature of the phneomena observed. If you could assist us in our enquiries by determining if any military involvement was present, and whether or not your team could help us solve the cases below, perhaps in termsof natural phenomena or man-made phenomena. The cases are listed below:-

1. LITTLE HAYWARD, NEAR RUGELEY, STAFFS.

This occurred around the 4 Aug 88 when a couple were returning home from Cannock at approx midnight. A 30-foot cloud of luminousity was observed across the road with a red pulasting light within it. The object moved ontop of a nearby hedge and then shot way. Later, the couple noticed that at the exact spot a section of the hedge had been damaged. Upon investingtion we noticed that no trye marks were present, no indivations of an accident and a nearby tree had also had its brabches damaged. No charring or scotch marks were present, and we determined that whatever the object was had uprooted part of the hedge and consequently the leaves on that section had died. The damage is still present today. It is situated by a gate (south), just by a minor cross roads that the A513 makes with a read to Little Hayward.

(Map reference: SK 004 207).

We also understand from the witnesses that after the case was reported in the local press, a couple of official persons in a white landrover appeared on the scene and were taking samples. Could you confirm if this was an MoD or other government agency who wre taking an interest in the site.

Does your department have any light to shed on this occurrence, where actual physical traces were left?

2. NEAR WARWICK,

Section 40 observed a round object with pulsating lights descend onto the road. We understand that the witnesses submitted a report to you (presumably via the police). We would be very grateful if you could assist us on this case (and vice versa?) as we do understand that files on specific cases are being released and a copy of the file on this acasewould be invaluable. Would you like us to give you some feedback on this one? Since we do know the witnesses names and addresses on this particular case and we have the witnesses approval, there should be no need to 'tensor' it.

I shall look forward to any assistance that you and your Department may gave to us and should you require any further information please do not hesitate to contact me.



UFO SIGHTINGS CURRENTLY UNDER INVESTIGATION BY BUFORA MIDLANDS

Dear Sir,

I write to you with reference to my previous communication of 26 August, of which yet no reply or acknowledgement has been forthcoming, although I do very much appreciate the work load that is commensurate with Whitehall functions.

I wish to bring to your attention yet again the prevailence of triangular/wedged.shaped/delta-shaped objects which first arrived in UK UFO data in 1977. These objects are large, slow moving with the ability to seemingly hover but also capable of fast acceleration, wide variety of lights, but often with two bright white 'headlights', and are silent except for low humming when beneath the object. In the last year or so these objects have become common, mainly in the North, Midlands and East Anglia, and recently there have been spates of sightings over Northamptonshire, Leicestershire, Staffordshire, Yorkshire, and Lancashire. In May of this year Stafford was inundated by many sightings of an object answering to the above description and the local MP, the Rt. Hon. William Cash, is now bringing this to the attention of your Under-Secretary (we are assisting Mr Cash with information). My collegue, Section 40 Section 40 is also making extensive enquiries into a flap of similar objects over Rotheram and Sheffield, the main date of activity being 2 February of this year.

We are all concerned about the use of aircraft (possibly Stealth or its varients) operating under the disguise of UFOs over populated areas, particularly in darkness. Although witnessess and the press discuss these sightings as UFOs we believe that they are aircraft testing exercises and as such are performing dangerous operations. If they are not RAF, then this surely brings into consideration the possibility of USAF operations. Again, if they are not NATO operations, then are we to suppose that Warsaw Pact forces are able to slip undetected and unchallenged into UK airspace ? If they are not, then are we to suppose that many witnesses are suffering delusions, or even that we are being watched over by some kind of extra-intellegence whilst the military authorities stand helplessly by ? The whole issue begs many questions and obviously answers.

I am sorry to present such a hefty dossier of reports and allegations but I have been charged into following up the Stafford flap (and other individual cases mentioned)*which all suggest, when taken into consideration with other occurrances elsewhere in the country, that low-flying operations over populated areas is going on, and that some of these may represent some new form of aircraft.

I look forward to your reply and I thank you in anticipation.

Thank you for your letter of 1 September about the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

I was sorry to read that despite the assurances given in my letter of 22 August you still feel that the Ministry of Defence is trying to obscure the truth about UFOs. As I mentioned then, we would suggest that rational and plausible explanations could probably be found for most unusual sightings, and although you say that a small percentage of incidents remain unsolved I think it would be fair to say that as far as the MOD is concerned, the majority of reports that we receive remain unexplained. This is because we do not investigate or feel there is a need to identify sightings unless a specific threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom had been identified.

You also mentioned that you had discovered a once classified Air Ministry file on UFOs in the Public Records Office; however I would like to confirm that the limited information that we now have on the subject is unclassified - as you would expect with sighting reports passed in by members of the general public.

Moving now to your request for any information that we might have received concerning a sighting witnessed near RAF St Mawgan on 6 February 1987, I regret to say that having now had the opportunity to look through our file we were unable to find a report which corresponded to the details that you gave in your letter.

Lastly, as far as general assistance to the public is concerned, I think I should stress that we do not have the manpower or resources to carry out general surveys of old files and as I have mentioned before the subject of UFOs is only one of many tasks that I undertake as part of my total workload, and as such consumes only a small proportion of my time.

I am sorry that I cannot be more helpful.

Reports are not desired concerning surface craft or aircraft in normal passage, or known U.S. military or government vessels and aircraft.

CHAPTER III

MERINT REPORTS

SECTION I - GENERAL

301. INFORMATION TO BE REPORTED AND WHEN TO REPORT

Sightings within the scope of this chapter (as outlined in Article 102b., (4), (5), (6), (7) are to be reported as follows:

- Immediately (except when within territorial waters of other nations as prescribed by international law)
 - Guided Missiles
 - (b) Unidentified flying objects

(c) Submarines

 Formation of aircraft (which appear to be directed against the United States, its territories or possessions)

SECTION III - SECURITY

308. MILITARY AND CIVILIAN

a. All persons aware of the contents or existence of a MERINT report are governed by the Communications Act of 1934 and amendments thereto, and Espionage Laws. MERINT reports contain information affecting the National Defense of the United States within the meaning of the Espionage Laws, 18 U.S. Code, 793 and 794. The unauthorized transmission or revelation of the contents of MERINT reports in any manner is prohibited. PUNISHABLE BY \$10,000 FINE. AND TEN YEARS IN JAIL.

Military commands and activities in making local distribution of MERINT reports and in subsequent communications regarding the contents of any MERINT report shall handle such communications in accordance with current security regulations.

1. Purpose and Scope. This Regulation establishes procedures for reporting information and evidence pertaining to unidentified flying objects and sets forth the responsibility of Air Force activities in this regard. It applies to all Air Force activities.

2. Definitions:

- a. Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOB)—Relates to any airborne object which by performance, aerodynamic characteristics, or unusual features does not conform to any presently known aircraft or missile type, or which cannot be positively identified as a familiar object.
- b. Familiar Objects—Include balloons, astronomical bodies, birds, and so forth.
- 3. Objectives. Air Force interest in unidentified flying objects is twofold: First as a possible threat to the security of the United States and its forces, and secondly, to determine technical aspects involved.
- a. Air Defense. To date, the flying objects reported have imposed no threat to the security of the United States and its Possessions. However, the possibility that new air vehicles, hostile aircraft or missiles may first be regarded as flying objects by the initial observer is real. This requires that sightings be reported rapidly and as completely as information permits.
- b. Technical. Analysis thus far has failed to provide a satisfactory explanation for a number of sightings reported. The Air Force will continue to collect and analyze reports until all sightings can be satisfactorily explained, bearing in mind that:
 - (1) To measure scientific advances, the Air Force must be informed on experimentation and development of new air vehicles.

- (2) The possibility exists that an air vehicle of revolutionary configuration may be developed.
- (3) The reporting of all pertinent factors will have a direct bearing on the success of the technical analysis.

4. Responsibility:

- a. Reporting. Commanders of Air Force activities will report all information and evidence that may come to their attention, including that received from adjacent commands of the other services and from civilians.
- b. Investigation. Air Defense Command will conduct all field investigations within the ZI, to determine the identity of any UFOB.
- c. Analysis. The Air Technical Intelligence Center (ATIC), Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, will analyze and evaluate: All information and evidence reported within the ZI after the Air Defense Command has exhausted all efforts to identify the UFOB; and all information and evidence collected in oversea areas.
- d. Cooperation. All activities will cooperate with Air Defense Command representatives to insure the economical and prompt success of an investigation, including the furnishing of air and ground transportation, when feasible.
- 5. Guidance. The thoroughness and quality of a report or investigation into incidents of unidentified flying objects are limited only by the resourcefulness and imagination of the person responsible for preparing the report. Guidance set forth below is based on experience and has been found helpful in evaluating incidents:
- a. Theodolite measurements of changes of azimuth and elevation and angular size.
 - b. Interception, identification, or air search

action. These actions may be taken if appropriate and within the scope of existing air defense regulations.

- c. Contact with local aircraft control and warning (AC&W) units, ground observation corps (GOC) posts and filter centers, pilots and crews of aircraft aloft at the time and place of sighting whenever feasible, and any other persons or organizations which may have factual data bearing on the UFOB or may be able to offer corroborating evidence, electronic or otherwise.
- d. Consultation with military or civilian weather forecasters to obtain data on: Tracks of weather balloons released in the area, since these often are responsible for sightings; and any unusual meteorological activity which may have a bearing on the UFOB.
- e. Consultation with astronomers in the area to determine whether any astronomical body or phenomenon would account for or have a bearing on the observation.
- f. Contact with military and civilian tower operators, air operations offices, and so forth, to determine whether the sighting could be the result of misidentification of known aircraft.
- g. Contact with persons who might have knowledge of experimental aircraft of unusual configuration, rocket and guided missile firings, and so forth, in the area.
- 6. ZI Collection. The Air Defense Command has a direct interest in the facts pertaining to UFOB's reported within the ZI and has, in the 4602d Air Intelligence Service Squadron (AISS), the capability to investigate these reports. The 4602d AISS is composed of specialists trained for field collection and investigation of matters of air intelligence interest which occur within the ZI. This squadron is highly mobile and deployed \[\] throughout the ZI as follows: Flights are attached to air defense divisions, detachments are attached to each of the defense forces, and the squadron headquarters is located at Peterson Field, Colorado, adjacent to Headquarters, Air (Defense Command. Air Force activities, therefore, should establish and maintain liaison with the nearest element of this squadron. This can he accomplished by contacting the appropriate echelon of the Air Defense Command as outlined above.
- a. All Air Force activities are authorized to conduct such preliminary investigation as may be required for reporting purposes; however, investigations should not be carried beyond this point, unless such action is requested by the 4602d AISS.
 - b. On occasions-after initial reports are

submitted—additional data is required which can be developed more economically by the nearest Air Force activity, such as: narrative statements, sketches, marked maps, charts, and so forth. Under such circumstances, appropriate commanders will be contacted by the 4602d AISS.

- c. Direct communication between echelons of the 4602d AISS and Air Force activities is authorized.
- 7. Reporting. All information relating to UFOB's will be reported promptly. The method (electrical or written) and priority of dispatch will be selected in accordance with the apparent intelligence value of the information. In most instances, reports will be made by electrical means: Information over 24 hours old will be given a "deferred" precedence. Reports over 3 days old will be made by written report prepared on AF Form 112, Air Intelligence Information Report, and AF Form 112a, Supplement to AF Form 112.

a. Addressees:

- (1) Electrical Reports. All electrical reports will be multiple addressed to:
 - (a) Commander, Air Defense Command, Ent Air Force Base, Colorado Springs, Colorado.
 - (b) Nearest Air Division (Defense).
 (For ZI only.)
 - (c) Commander, Air Technical Intelligence Center, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.
 - (d) Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington 25, D. C.
- (2) Written Reports:
 - (a) Within the ZI, reports will be submitted direct to the Air Defense Command. Air Defense Command will reproduce the report and distribute it to interested ZI intelligence agencies. The original report together with notation of the distribution effected then will be forwarded to the Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington 25, D. C.
 - (b) Outside the ZI, reports will be submitted direct to Director of Intelligence, Headquarters USAF, Washington 25, D. C. as prescribed in "Intelligence Collection Instructions" (ICI), June 1954.
- b. Short Title. "UFOB" will appear at the beginning of the text of electrical messages and in the subject of written reports.
 - c. Negative Data. The word "negative"

in reply to any numbered item of the report format will indicate that all logical leads were developed without success. The phrase "not applicable" (N/A) will indicate that the question does not apply to the sighting being investigated.

- d. Report Format. Reports will include the following numbered items:
 - (1) Description of the object(s):
 - (a) Shape.
 - (b) Size compared to a known object (use one of the following terms: Head of a pin, pea, dime, nickel, quarter, half dollar, silver dollar, baseball, grapefruit, or basketball) held in the hand at about arms length.
 - (c) Color.
 - (d) Number.
 - (c) Formation, if more than one.
 - (f) Any discernible features or details.
 - (g) Tail, trail, or exhaust, including size of same compared to size of object(s).
 - (h) Sound. If heard, describe sound.
 - (i) Other pertinent or unusual features.
 - (2) Description of course of object(s):
 - (a) What first called the attention of observer(s) to the object(s)?
 - (b) Angle of elevation and azimuth of the object(s) when first observed.
 - (c) Angle of elevation and azimuth of object(s) upon disappearance.
 - (d) Description of flight path and maneuvers of object(s).
 - (e) Manner of disappearance of object(s).
 - (f) Length of time in sight.
 - (3) Manner of observation:
 - (a) Use one or any combination of the following items: Ground-visual, ground-electronic, air-electronic.
 (If electronic, specify type of radar.)
 - (b) Statement as to optical aids (telescopes, binoculars, and so forth) used and description thereof.
 - (c) If the sighting is made while airborne, give type aircraft, identification number, altitude, heading, speed, and home station.
 - (4) Time and date of sighting:
 - (a) Zulu time-date group of sighting.
 - (b) Light conditions (use one of the following terms): Night, day, dawn, dusk.

- (5) Locations of observer(s). Exact latitude and longitude of each observer, or Georef position, or position with reference to a known landmark.
- (6) Identifying information of all observer(s):
 - (a) Civilian—Name, age, mailing address, occupation.
 - (b) Military—Name, grade, organization, duty, and estimate of reliability.
- (7) Weather and winds-aloft conditions at time and place of sightings:
 - (a) Observer(s) account of weather conditions.
 - (b) Report from nearest AWS or U. S. Weather Bureau Office of wind direction and velocity in degrees and knots at surface, 6,000', 10,000', 16,000', 20,000', 30,000', 50,000', and 80,000', if available.
 - (c) Ceiling.
 - (d) Visibility.
 - (e) Amount of cloud cover.
 - (f) Thunderstorms in area and quadrant in which located.
- (8) Any other unusual activity or condition, meteorological, astronomical, or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.
- (9) Interception or identification action taken (such action may be taken whenever feasible, complying with existing air defense directives).
- (10) Location of any air traffic in the area at time of sighting.
- (11) Position title and comments of the preparing officer, including his preliminary analysis of the possible cause of the sighting(s).
- (12) Existence of physical evidence, such as materials and photographs.
- e. Security. Reports should be unclassified unless inclusion of data required by d above necessitates a higher classification.
- 8. Evidence. The existence of physical evidence (photographs or materiel) will be promptly reported.
 - a. Photographic:
 - (1) Visual. The negative and two prints will be forwarded, all original film, including wherever possible both prints and negatives, will be titled or otherwise properly identified as to place, time, and date of the incident

(see "Intelligence Collection Instructions" (ICI), June 1954).

- (2) Radar. Two copies of each print will be forwarded. Prints of radarscope photography will be titled in accordance with AFR 95-7 and forwarded in compliance with AFR 95-6.
- b. Materiel. Suspected or actual items of materiel which come into possession of any Air Force echelon will be safeguarded in such manner as to prevent any defacing or alteration which might reduce its value for intelligence examination and analysis.

9. Release of Facts. Headquarters USAF will release summaries of evaluated data which will inform the public on this subject. In response to local inquiries, it is permissible to inform news media representatives on UFOB's when the object is positively identified as a familiar object (see paragraph 2b), except that the following type of data warrants protection and should not be revealed: Names of principles, intercept and investigation procedures, and classified radar data. For those objects which are not explainable, only the fact that ATIC will analyze the data is worthly of release, due to the many unknowns involved.

Foreword

Department of the Navy Washington, 25, D. C. JULY 1959

1. This pamphlet is designed to familiarize masters of merchant ships and fishing vessels and radio officers with the procedures for reporting vital intelligence sightings. The reports are desired for early warning in defense of the North American Continent, United States and Canadian Territories and Possessions. Timely receipt of reports of sightings will enable military forces to take prompt defensive or investigative action.

CIRVIS REPORTING PROCEDURES

I CIRVIS

Canadian-United States Communications Instructions for Peacetime Reporting Vital Intelligence Sightings which, in the opinion of the abserver, require very urgent defensive and/or investigative action by the United States and/or Canadian Armed Forces.

II WHO REPORTS

- Pilots of all U. S. and Canadian scheduled and non-scheduled air carriers and other civil aircraft.
- B. U. S. and Conadian military aircraft except when the purpose of CIRVIS is achieved by other reporting procedures established by the appropriate command headquarters.

III HOW AND WHEN TO REPORT

- A The procedures used by aircraft in calling the ground stations will be similar to those used when transmitting position reports except the call will be preceded by the word CIRVIS Ignational SUR VEES) spoken three 13t times to clear the frequency liest over all other communications, except DISTRESS, and URGENCY
- Should the instance occur, when the above procedure fails to clear the frequencyfies), the International Urgency Signal "XXX" transmitted three (3) times or "PAN" spoken three (3) times will be employed as an alternate signal.
- C. CIRVIS reports should be transmitted in plain language, as soon as possible, (FLASH precedence is authorized), to any available United States or Canadian military or civil air/ground communications facility.

IV WHAT TO REPORT

- A. Report immediately by radio
 - Hostile or unidentified single aircraft or formations of aircraft which appear to be directed against the United States, Canada or their forces.
 - 2. Missiles.
 - 1. Unidentified flying objects. —
 - 4. Hostile or unidentified group(s) of military surface vessels.
 - 5. Hostile or unidentified submarines.
 - Individual surface vessels, submarines, or aircraft of unconventional design, or engaged in suspicious activity or abserved in an unusual location or on a course which may be interpreted as constituting a threat to the United States, Canada, or their forces.
 - 7. Any unexplained or unusual activity which may indicate a possible attack against or through the United States or Canada, including the presence of any unidentified or suspicious ground parties in the Polar region or other remote or sparsely populated areas.
- B. Upon Landing:
 - Reports which for any reason could not be transmitted while airborne.
 - Unlisted airfields, facilities, weather stations or air navigation aids.
 - Post landing reports (to include as many photographs as are obtained).
- C. DO NOT REPORT craft or aircraft in normal passage or known U. S. or Canadian military or government vessels lincluding submarines) and aircraft.

V CONTENTS OF REPORTS

Airborne CIRVIS reports should contain the information detailed below, when appropriate, and in the order listed.

JANAP 146(E), CANADIAN - UNITED STATES COMMUNICATIONS INSTRUCTIONS FOR REPORTING VITAL INTELLIGENCE SIGNINGS, is an unclassified non-registered publication prepared under the direction of the Canadian Defence Staff and the Inited States Joint Chiefs of Staff for Canadian and United States Joint use.

102. Scope. -

- a. This publication is limited to the reporting of information of vital importance to the security of the United States of America and Canada and their forces, which in the opinion of the observer, requires very urgent defensive and/or investigative action by the US and/or Canadian Armed Forces.
- b. The procedures contained in this publication are provided for:
 - (1) US and Canadian civil and commercial aircraft.
 - (2) US and Canadian government and military aircraft other than those operating under separate reporting directives.
 - (3) US and Canadian merchant vessels operating under US and Canadian registry.
 - (4) US and Canadian government and military vessels other than those operating under separate reporting directives.
 - (5) Certain other US and Canadian vessels including fishing vessels.
 - (6) Military installations receiving reports from civilian or military land based or waterborne observers unless operating under separate reporting directives.
 - (7) Government and civilian agencies which may initiate reports on receipt of information from land-based, airborne or waterborne observers.

CHAPTER II

CIRVIS REPORTS

SECTION I - GENERAL

- 201. Information to be Reported and When to Report.



- B. U. S. and Canadian military aircraît except when the purpose of CIRVIS is achieved by other reporting procedures established by the appropriate command headquarters.

III HOW AND WHEN TO REPORT



Thank you for your letter concerning your request for information regarding UFOs.

We are sending you the information we have on Unidentified Flying Objects. Prior to 1968, all sightings of UFOs reported to Canadian Forces Headquarters were investigated by the Director of Operations. It has not been the practice to allow the ! general public to study these files.

Since the beginning of 1968, UFO reports received by the Canadian Forces are passed to the National Research Council. The branch exemines reports for scientific reasons warranting further investigation. The department of National Defence and other Federal Government agencies may be called upon to carry out these investigations for NRC.

Canadian Forces Headquarters has never made a public statement concerning UFOs, however, we endeavour to carry out our investigations with an open mind. We neither agree with nor deny the existence of UFOs. Investigations to date indicate that there is no evidence to suggest that UFOs present a threat to the world, however, certain reports suggest that they exhibit a unique scientific or advance technology that could possibly contribute to scientific or technical research.

It is hoped that the information is of interest to you. May we suggest that further enquiries be sent to the National Research Council, Montreal Road, Ottawa 7, Ontario.



On Friday the 30/9/88 some friends of mine, at different locations were looking towards the Rossendale area, from Great Harwood and also from Burnley, the time was exactly 7-15 pm when they noticed a bank of very bright lights at map reference long 84 by lat 25.


These lights appeared to be stationery for ten minutes, then they veered off to the right at very high speed towards Winter Hill.

They then just vanished; my friends' estimated their height to be between 800 ft and 1500 ft, now as you know, this area is on an air route and large aircraft don't usually fly at the kind of heights quoted above, so I wondered if MOD had any explanation.

It may be something or nothing, but half an hour earlier, prior to these sightings, at 6-45 pm, a women in the Clayton Le Moors area, looking north towards Pendle Hill, spotted a boomerang type craft with numerous points of lights all around its edges.

The object was moving north too south, to the above map reference, it would appear highly probable that these two incidents are connected, I would therefore be most grateful if you could offer any further evidence to support this probability.

I look forward to reading your comments on this matter.

Thank you for the copy of the letter to you from the Canadian Department of National Defense dated 24 October 1972 which outlined their policy on the phenomenon of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

With regard to the American orders that you mention, I regret that as they appear to be instructions for American and Canadian military personnel rather than for those serving in the Royal Air Force we do not seem to have come into contact with them before. Certainly, my colleagues in the Air Force Department have not heard of the orders that you are interested in and I regret that due to the long gap since they were issued, and because of limited resources, I cannot authorise what may well be a futile search through Ministry of Defence archives to see if we had received copies of them in the past.

As such I regret that we are unable to give a view except to reiterate that there are no restrictions on UK military discussing details of what they might have seen, unless of course it was thought to be a Soviet military aircraft or similar. I am sorry I cannot be more helpful.

It was the opinion of the Group that the UFO sighting reported in the Surrey Mirror on the 10th of March was almost certainly caused by Venus and Jupiter. Both of these planets were at the time very prominent in the evening sky with the closest approach occurring on the 6th of March (two days after the sightings), when the separation was 2 degrees and 2 seconds (the moon is approximately half a degree across). Because of the interest in the local newspapers and the reported radar contact the most interesting aspect of the case, it was decided that the Group would carry out a full investigation.

With the large amount of information we have collected from the local police, meterological offices and witnesses of the Phenomena a detailed report was prepared and sent to the Royal Greenwich Observatory for their analysis, with the data they have returned to us we can

now submit the Jollowing conclusions.

(1) The position of the two lights reported by witnesses corresponded exactly with the Fosition and the altitude above the horizon of Venus and Jupiter as confirmed by the Royal Greenich Observatory. (2) Statements from witnesses show that from the 4th of March to the 10th of March the position of the lights (reported as UFO's) moved from a horizontal to a vertical position, again this corresponds with the movement of the two planets, Jupiter dropped towards the horizon as the month passed while venus rises.

(3) Although several witnesses reported the sky as clear there was in for a considerable amount of fairly high stratocumulas cloud untill 2015, with a trace of cirrus cloud present for most of the evening. The wind was from the North West and fell to a speed of 05/06 knots by 1845, this moving cloud may well have caused the sudden appearance of the phenomena and also given the lights the illusion of movement, which would explain one statement (kindly provided by Reigate Police) that the objects appeared to move in the direction of Epsom (North West).

(4) There were no weather ballons in the vicinity of Reigate during the evening of the 4th March (The nearest at 1715 was over

Peacehaven, Sussex at a hight of 15,266 meters).

(5) The group received conformation from National Air Traffic Services, Gatwick Airport, that no report or entry concerning the UFO sighting on the 4th of March was filed in their daily

report (see Letter Ret 8 GAC 119/6).

(6) the group has also received conformation from the Ministry of Defence that no action has been taken to follow up the sighting of the 4th of March (as reported to them). Three reports were also received from the MOD which correspond

Mystery lights not a UFO says research team

AFTER THE excitement and uncertainty of last month's mystery UFO sightings in the borough, the truth is out.

Bright white lights witnested by several people between Dorking and Reigate were not alien-bearing spaceships but in fact the planets Venus and Jupiter.

The news comes after six weeks investigation by the Redhill and Reigate Phenomena Research Group following numerous sightings over the weekend of March 4 and 5.

Group spokesman Mr Norman Hatt said the position of the two lights reported by witnesses corresponded "exactly" with the position and altitude above the horizon of Venus and Jupiter, as confirmed by the Royal Greenwich Observatory.

The group report stated that evidence showed the lights moved from horizontal to vertical positions. corresponding with the movement of the two planets, Jupiter dropping gleaned from local police. towards the horizon as the month passed, while Venus rose.




Thank you for your letter of 18 July 1988 to RAF Brize Norton which has been passed to me for a reply. I am sorry that I have not been able to respond sooner.

You asked if we could provide an explanation for an unusual sighting witnessed over Indian Queens on Thursday 2 June 1988. I think it would be helpful if I first explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case, and was not the case in this instance, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify what might have been seen. And, although we are not able to say conclusively what the objects might have been, our experience has shown that aircraft, either singly or in a group, to be likely causes of a sighting of this nature.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigation or surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles, to mention just a few.





Thank you for your letter dated 7 September 1988 explaining your research into some reported Ur'O phenomena. In accordance with Royal Air Force policy I have forwarded the letter to the Ministry of Defence in London for investigation and reply.



I am doing some research on some reported UFO phenomena which was sighted by some USAF personnal while they were on duty. The incident is detailed in a memo/report dated 13-Jan-1981. I will enclose a copy of the document for your refferance.

There is a recognizable problem in my research into the sighting incident, that is the amount of time when the incident has occured to the present is beyond the normal time in which the USAF would have any documentation on file at their 513TH Combat Support Group at RAF Mildenhall. Also through Air Force manual 12-51, any relevant documentation would have been properly disposed of.

My research endeaver is presently on weither the USAF had mistakingly seen the Soviet Cosmos 749 on 25-December-1980 around 21.10 hrs approx on it's final break up heading toward Folkestone, Kent, ENGLAND and East Anglia. I must recognize the possibility that the sighting date on the memo/report might be wrong. If however the date is correct then there is some problem trying to determin what atmospheric phenomena might account for the miss interpetation for UFO phenomena. It is understood that your Radar Station might have picked up on Radar and reported the time of the radar track and direction and altitude and any visual sighting if any on both the Soviet Cosmos 749 reentry and break up and some correlating unknowns for the USAF visual sighting. Do you have any such documentation on this and was there a report filed with the MOD UFO report section. I have heard that after the sighting incident of 27-December-1980 0300 local time that a record of the madar track was pulled and retained as a precaution by your station in case of a plane crash situation. It might have been possible to study the radar tape to determin the flight path and where the suspect air craft had possibly crashed. From the description of the incident in the memo/report, it is possible then to interpet that a air craft might have crashelanded. There is a rumour that a group of USAR personnal did visit your station and request permission to examin the retrieved radar tape to determin what was supposed to have crashed into the Rendlesham Forrest.

It is possible that some sort of radioactive debri did survive reentry, which may account for the radioactive reading in paragraph 2 of the memo/-report. I can not verify that a group of USAF personnal did excavate some area where a clean up was required to remove radioactiv debri from the Soviet Cosmos 749 Satellite. Were your dept personnal ever informed as to the situation pertaining to radio active debri having to be cleaned up by the USAF Aero Space recovery and Rescue Squadron, and removall of object thought to be from the Soviet Cosmos 749 Satellite by a USAF specialist team from a Disaster Preparation Team.

H I am asking about your procedure for making a report on a situation where UFO phenomena are sighted visually and on radar by on duty personnal at your station. Are there any instructions from RAF Central Command at the MOD in question as to instructions on exactly how to collect and file such documented information. And in particular on situations where British Citizens inquire when they visit your duty station, are there restrictions as to what you may or may not release to them in a written return reply. I have heard that there was conciderable media publicity pertaining to the 13-Jan-1981 memo/report. Did your dept as a policy not comment on the incident's in question or the memo/report as a matter of policy from the MOD. The then CO of your duty station must have been rather curious about speculation that some personnal at the 81ST TFW had witnessed some amazing UFO phenomena. Is there any documentation on weither there was any inquiry by dept personnal at this RAF duty station on the situation and what were they told as to the incident and documentation on the matter at Third Air Force at RAF Mildenhall.

I am investigating the problems which were encountered by the British authors of Sky Crash, Brenda Butler, Dot Street and Jenny Randles. It seems that they had put in conciderable effort in their inquiry, but have little to show for their reearch endeaver, when requesting documentation from specific USAF dept at the 81ST TFW and some other RAF stations. Did your dept recieve any specific order not to release specific information to them because of your Official Secrets Act. It would seem that their early claim of a sort of conspiracy of secrecy on the USAF/UFO sighting incident might have some valid claim, if not for the fact that there are strict regulations governing what you can release to them in a written reply. If a incident at a USAF base occure where a sighting of UFO phenomena by USAF personnal and your dept hears of the situation from the British RAF CO at the USAF base. Are there any restrictions on discussing the situation in a return reply to some British UFO research Association representive in this case Section 40 their director of investigations. If such a request or order to not comment were given to your dept. Who would have the higher authority to give such a order, has such a direct request ever occured recently or around 13 cJan-1981.

Here I am bringing to a close my letter of inquiry. I am not exactly sure on what regulations are there that prevent any disclosure of information on military sighting of UFO phenomena and in particular US Military duty stations. I am very appreciative of the opportunity to communicate on the subjects of interest in my letter of inquiry and will look for a return reply from your dept if possible. Thank you very much.

- 1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metalic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.
- 2. The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.
- 3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 100 off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

"We are currently in the biggest wave of UFO sightings in the last six years and we feel something is going to happen soon because everyone is becoming very uneasy about it all.

We have noticed the pattern of flights has changed with the craft hugging the terrain, possibly to avoid detection. But we have no idea what they represent or what their purpose is here on Earth.

The craft have remarkable agility. Some appear to be almost remotely controlled while others seem to be piloted."

Serious UFO followers like Mark admit that at least 90 per cent of so-called UFO sightings have perfectly normal explanations. And they have no time for people who claim to have been beamed up into alien spaceships.

Such abduction stories began in 1957 when a Brazilian farmworker claimed four men seized him and took him on to their craft where he was forced to make love to a white woman with oriental eyes and red hair. Since then many people claim to have been space-napped with their minds and bodies probed by

But Mark and his colleagues say such ludicrous stories simply give the whole subject of UFOs a bad name when there is a small, but significant, proportion of sight-ings which even officialdom admits cannot be explained.

An RAF spokesman said: "We have one secretary who as part of her normal duties deals with UFOs. She passes on reports to Air Staff Two. Checks are made to see if we have any aircraft in the area at the

We do not inform people of our findings because of a lack of facilities and personnel. But of facilities and personner, our we do not deny there are peculiar things in the sky which we cannot explain. My personal view is that we would be very silly not to concede that there could be life elsewhere where technology could







Thank you for your letter of 13 July 1988 which enclosed a copy of your letter of 6 April 1988.

I was concerned to read that 2 men apparently under the guise of being representatives of the Ministry of Defence visited your witness on 15 January this year. As I mentioned in my last letter, unless we judge that an Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) sighting presents a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom and this is not normally the case, we do not undertake investigations or seek to identify unusual sightings. As such we do not, nor do we have any need, to visit individuals to ask them for an account of their experience. I am not aware of any MOD representative carrying out such tasks and must deduce that they were not bona fide officials from the Ministry. In addition, you may find it helpful to know that your description of the MOD identity card which was used on the occasion does not tally with our present design. I hope that this sets the record straight.

Lastly, in response to your letter of 13 July 1988, where you asked for details of Government agencies which might have an interest in UFO research, I regret to say that I am not aware of any Government organisation, other than ourselves, which has an involvement with the subject.



Thank you for your recent letter to the Ministry of Defence about the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs). I am sorry that I have not been able to reply before now.

You asked for details of the numbers of sighting reports which we received over the ten year period 1977-1987. Although details are not readily to hand for 1977 $\scriptstyle\rm I$ am able to provide figures for the remaining years, which are as below. In addition we have received approximately 280 reports so far in 1988.

1978 - 750

1979 - 550

1980 - 350

1981 - 600 1982 - 250

1983 - 390

1984 - 215

1985 - 180

1986 - 1201987 - 150

You also mentioned the "Education Programme" on UFOs which apparently concerns itself with the gradual release of UFO information to the general public. I regret this is something that myself and my colleagues are unfamiliar with; certainly, we do not run such a programme here in the Ministry of Defence, not least because of our limited involvement with the UFO subject, for which our sole concern is to establish whether or not UFO sightings present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, we do not attempt to investigate or identify whatever might have been seen. Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomena nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. The information that we have on the subject is therefore limited, usually to brief details of the incidents passed onto us by those who witnessed them.

Although the concept of an "Education Programme", wherever it may have come from, is an interesting one, I think it would be helpful to say that that we in the MOD have yet to receive any positive evidence to suggest that "alien spacecraft or beings" have landed on the planet.

I hope that you will find this helpful.

Thank you for your letter of 5 July 1988 which has been passed to me for a reply.

I was concerned to read that you believe that the Ministry of Defence knows more about the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) than we are prepared to admit and would like to take this opportunity to assure you that this is not the case and that we are not trying in any way to obscure the truth about UFOs from the public.

On a more general note, I think it would be helpful if I explain that, whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify any objects or unusual aerial phenomena. As such, we have no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full-time. The sighting reports we receive, which are usually limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom and they examine the reports in the course of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations or surveys. Indeed, it is because of this limited involvement with the subject, that we do not, nor feel there is any need to exchange views with the US Government. In addition, I am sure that you will also appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.



Thank you for your letter of 17 September enquiring about information held by the Ministry of Defence on Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

Although I would like to confirm that the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, I think it would be useful to say that S4(Air) was disbanded some time ago and the responsibility for the co-ordination of information about UFOs has been passed to the Air Staff Secretariat – at the address at the top of this letter.

Having said that, you may find it helpful if I explain that our sole concern with the UFO phenomenon is to determine whether or not they present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the object seen. Similarly, since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. I am sure that you will also appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being the case we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

I regret that the release of any material on the subject "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments, all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may be aware, this Act states that official files should generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. However, we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains; but due to limited resources, I regret that I can not instigate general searches through our files.

On a more positive note, you may find it useful to know that the Public Records Office at Kew, Richmond, Surrey retains governmental files which are over thirty years old and as such they may be able to help you further, although I am aware that during the 'sixties' the MOD policy was to destroy UFO reports after five years on file, which may account for a dearth of reports for that period.

Thank you for your letter of 1 July 1988 to the Ministry of Defence (Air Force Department) about the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOC). This has been passed to me for a reply.

Taking the subject generally, I think it would be helpful if I first explain our current policy on UFOS. As in the past, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence of the United Kingdom is to determine whether of not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of our country. Unless we judge that they do and this is not usually the case, we do not make any attempt to investigate or identify the objects. Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake my indepth investigations. I am sure that you will appreciate that as a member of NATO, our defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK and its approaches against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified and as yet we have not received any positive evidence to suggest that alien spacecraft or life forms have landed on this planet.

Information that we have on the subject is limited largely to brief details of unusual sightings which have been passed onto us by those who witnessed them. This information, including details provided by pilots, both military and civilian, is considered to be "unclassified". There are no restrictions, therefore, on military personnel discussing details of what they might have seen unless of course it was thought to be a Soviet combat aircraft or similar.

You also asked about our policy on the release of material on the subject to the general public. Although you are correct in saying, that, in general, release of material "en bloc" is not possible until a period of 30 years has elapsed, this is not a policy directed specifically to our UFO files but rather a directive covering files from all UK government departments. The Public Records Act, as it is called, states that all official files should remain closed from public

viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. However, despite this, we are able to answer any <u>specific</u> queries individuals may have about <u>particular</u> incidents which have occurred <u>recently</u> and can let them know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains.

I hope that you will find this helpful.

You also asked if we had received any reports appertaining to a sighting reported in the Star newspaper in November 1987. I have now had the opportunity to look through our file and I regret that we do not have anything which relates to this particular sighting.

Lastly, in your letter of 25 April 1988 you enquired about a possible unidentified flying object which may have been examined by a British scientist in 1954 or 1955. As I am sure you will appreciate, with such limited detail it is difficult for us to establish to what particular event you might be referring to. Nevertheless, our Air Historical Branch does not possess anything at all which relates to an event of this kind. However, you may find it helpful if I explain that Governmental files which are over 30 years old are passed to the Public Records Office at Kew, Richmond, Surrey for retention. They may be able to assist you further with your enquiry.

Thank you for your letters of 22 February 1988 and 14 July 1988 which referred to an unusual incident witnessed by yourself and 3 colleagues in the Gulf on 19 February 1988.

First of all, I would like to say that I cannot give you a definitive explanation as to what you might have seen. It could, of course, have been an aircraft of worldly origin or alternatively a meteorite or a sat@(lite re-entering the earth's atmosphere. I regret that I cannot be more specific.

More generally I think it would be helpful if I explain that our sole interest in the subject of unidentified aerial phenomena is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the UK. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case, we do not attempt to identify or investigate the sightings. You will understand, therefore, that we do not see any need from the defence point of view to investigate a sighting seen in the Gulf, however interesting it might have been. I am sure that you will also appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Thank you for your recent letters to the Ministry of Defence asking for information on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

As I mentioned in my letter of 23 March 1988, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. The information we have on the subject is, therefore, largely limited to brief details of sightings passed on to us by those who witnessed them. However, because of the policy in force at the time I regret that sighting reports received up to 1968 have been destroyed and as a result I do not have any information on the sightings that you were interested in. Nevertheless, on a more general note, you may find it helpful to know that the Public Records Office at Kew, Richmond, Surrey retains Governmental files which are over 30 years old and it is possible that they may be able to help you with further enquiries about events prior to 1958.

Moving now to your request to purchase any investigation that the MOD might have carried out into the UFO phenomenon, I would like to remind you) because of our limited involvement, we do not carry out any studies or in depth investigations into the UFO subject and, therefore, we are unable to provide you with any for purchase.

Lastly, you asked about the unusual sighting witnessed in the vicinity of Rendlesham Forest, near Woodbridge, Suffolk in December 1980. I take it that you have seen a copy of Lt Col Charles Halt's report of the sighting; if not I attach a copy which I hope you will find useful. From it you will see that the witnesses described the object as being 3 metres wide and 2 metres high and that it illuminated the area with a bright white light. In view of its reported small size, it is considered highly unlikely that the object was a piloted vehicle. In addition, I think you will agree that it is highly improbable that any violation of UK airspace would be heralded by such a display of lights. I believe that it is equally unlikely that any reconnaissance or flying activity would be announced in this way. As such we are satisfied that the incident is of no defence significance.

Thank you for your letter of 22 June 1988 to the Commanding Officer of RAF Aldergrove about the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) which has been passed to me for a reply. I am sorry that I have not been able to respond before now.

We were grateful for your photographs of the sighting witnessed during the evening of 18 June 1988 and have passed them to our staff in the department which is responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom. They have studied them very carefully and have assured me that they could find absolutely nothing on them for you to worry about.

You mentioned that in the past you used to send your sighting reports to S4(Air) in the Ministry of Defence. This branch has been disbanded for some time now and the responsibility of co-ordinating and receiving UFO sighting reports has been passed to the Air Staff Secretariat — at the address at the top of this letter. I should also mention that whilst we do — act as the MOD's focal point for receipt of UFO reports, our sole interest in the subject is to determine whether or not UFO's present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations or general surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or a host of other things.

I attach copies of these reports for your information, although in line with our policy to maintain the privacy of the originators of the reports, their identifying details have been obscured. I am sorry that I have not been able to obtain better reproductions.

I regret that we can give no definitive answers to what might have been seen during that evening because unless we judge that a sighting presents a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects. However, because of the mention of green and red navigation lights in one of the reports we would suggest that the sighting is likely to have been an aircraft of some description. Indeed, in general, we believe that rational explanations are generally available for most sightings. Examples that spring to mind though not necessarily all for this particular case, include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lighting, unusual cloud formations, balloons, aircraft at unusual angles, to mention just a few.

Since our interest in the subject is limited to possible defence implications we do not undertake studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to carry our any indepth investigations or surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Thank you for your letter of 28 February 1988 concerning Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) which has been passed to me for a reply. I am sorry that I have not been able to write to you sooner.

I was very interested to read the points that you raised but was most concerned to see that you feel that we are in some way trying to obscure the truth about UFOs. Please allow me to reassure you that there is no question of the Ministry of Defence attempting to mislead the public or to threaten people to keep quiet about the subject. Indeed, I must stress that the MOD does not and has no need to, send out any officials to interview members of the general public about UFOs and am, therefore, rather puzzled to find out that we are thought to do

Taking the subject more generally, I hope you will find it helpful if I explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the sole concern of the MOD is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case, we make no attempt to investigate or identify the objects.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations or surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

The Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full-time. The information that we have on the subject is usually limited to brief details of sightings which have been passed on to us by those who witnessed them. They are then referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom and they examine the reports in the course of their normal duties.

Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or a host of other things.

Lastly, you asked about the unusual sighting seen in the vicinity of Rendlesham Forest, Suffolk in December 1980. The only information that we have in this incident is the report by Lieutenant Colonel Charles Halt of the United States Air Force and in case you have not seen it before, I attach a copy which I hope you will find of interest.

Once again, thank you for your letter and I hope that this reply allays your concern that the Ministry of Defence is being less than truthful about the UFO subject. As I mentioned earlier, our involvement with the subject is very limited and as such, we do not and more importantly, have no need to cover up the truth.

I hope that you will find this helpful.

Thank you for your recent letter about the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs), which I found very helpful and interesting.

I was also grateful for your kind offer of voluntary assistance, co-operation and collation of information on the UFO phenomenon. However, as a member of BUFORA, you probably already know (and at the risk of repeating it), that the MOD's involvement with the UFO subject is extremely limited, in that our sole concern of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that an unidentified sighting does represent a threat and this is not normally the case, the MOD does not attempt, as we feel there is no need, to identify or investigate the object or objects further. The sighting reports that we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom and they examine the reports during the course of their normal duties.

In essence, therefore, I am afraid that we see no need from a defence point of view to exchange data with an outside agency. Similarly, I feel that sponsorship of BUFORA would not further the needs of the department.

I am sorry to have to give you a disappointing reply but would like to wish you luck with your future endeavours.

You asked if we could provide an explanation for an unusual sighting witnessed over Indian Queens on Thursday 2 June 1988. I think it would be helpful if I first explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case and was not the case in this instance, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify what might have been seen. And, although we are not able to say conclusively what the object or objects might have been, our experience has shown that aircraft, either singly or in a group, to be likely causes of a sighting of this nature.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigation or surveys. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological ballons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles, to mention just a few.

Dear Sir,

On the night of the 12th of September 1988 I was leaving the Prince of Orange Inn situated on Carr House Road, Shelf, Halifax. I do not drink as a rule and therefore I feel the need to take this opportunity to stress the fact that I had not consumed any alcohol on this night. As I walked towards my car which was parked in the patrons car park to the rear of the building I saw a bright, sharply defined white ball of light approaching slowly from the north west. I initially assumed that this was an aircraft though I was puzzled by the lack of identification lights which should have been clearly discernible if the aircraft had been as close as the light had suggested.

I lost interest at the time, assuming it to be a helicopter with a peculiar internal cockpit illumination configuration and proceeded to unlock my car door. Just as I was about to get in, there was a lull in the traffic noise from the A629 which behind me at this time and I realised that there was apparently no noise emanating from the area of the sky occupied by object and I therefore concluded that any noise being produced by the object was either not reaching me or that the object in silent flight which I know to be highly unlikely. It was this above everything else which has led me to conclude that I may have seen something peculiar. Though this feeling may simply be due to my own misidentification of some form of aircraft should be most grateful if you could help me in my attempts identify and therefore solve this event which has, reason, baffled me. I am especially interested in the pertinent details of any one-off flight plans which may have been filed for that night as I have checked that area of the sky at that time on successive Mondays since the sighting and have seen nothing similar. I have also checked the times and flight paths of a few of the major commercial air routes and found that of them were in agreement with the time and flight path of object I saw.

The cases of three corroborating witnesses were cited in the Bradford Telegraph & Argus on Saturday 17th September 1988 and this had led me to conclude that the light did actually exist and was not simply a figment of an hallucination or of my own imagination. My health that night was perfect as it generally is and I am not prone to bouts of hallucination nor do I consider

Flight path: Took approximately two minutes to cross a seventy degree arc of sky in what appeared to be a flat trajectory and moved in a south easterly direction from the north western sky. No apparent or major variations in speed and no deviation from straight flight path in direction of Huddersfield. Cannot estimate altitude or speed as the sky that night held no reference points such as clouds. Azimuth appeared be around fifty degrees but I could not take a measurement as I had no equipment with me. The object was eclipsed by the pub building. As I was late for an appointment I did not have time to go to the front of the building which faces south and see where the object eventually went.

My professional occupation is in the capacity of a senior Insurance Claim Negotiator and I have considerable experience as an amateur astronomer and therefore would not be prone to misidentification of aircraft unless they were viewed under very strange conditions.

I thank you for any help you may be able to give me which would aid me in resolving this baffling situation.

I was concerned to read that you have reason to believe that the Ministry of Defence is covering up the truth about UFOs and would like to reassure you that the MOD does not try in any way to mislead the general public nor do we attempt to obscure the truth about UFOs. Indeed, we have yet to receive any positive evidence to suggest that alien spacecraft or beings have landed on our planet.

On a more general note I think it would be helpful if I explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify any objects or unusual aerial phenomena . The information that we have on the subject is largely limited to brief details of sightings as passed on to us by those who witnessed them. The reports are then referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom and they examine the reports in the course of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications and because we have no department appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, we do not carry out any studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we undertake any indepth investigations. I am sure that you will appreciate the defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the United Kingdom against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being the case, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations unless a clear threat to the security of the United Kingdom had been identified.

Turning now to your question about the release of information on UFOs I regret that the release of material "en bloc" is not possible because, like other government departments, all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may be aware, this Act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. However, we are able to answer

any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains. In addition, you may find it helpful to know that the Public Records Office in Kew, Surrey retain Government files which are over 30 years old and it is possible that they may be able to assist if you have any particular queries.






Thank you for your letter of 9 August 1988 which asked for details on the sighting witnessed at Rendlesham Forest near Woodbridge, Suffolk on 27 December 1980.

The only information that we have on this incident is the report by the Deputy Base Commander of RAF Woodbridge, Lieutenant Colonel Charles Halt, USAF. In case you have not seen it before, I attach a copy of the report which may be of interest to you. As you will see from Colonel Halt's narrative the witnesses described the object as being approximately 3 metres long and 2 metres high. In view of this small size it was and still is, considered highly unlikely to have been a piloted vehicle. However, because we do not attempt to establish the identity of unusual sightings, unless there are obvious implications on the security and defence of the United Kingdom, I regret that I do not know what was witnessed at Rendlesham Forest. Nevertheless, I can confirm that there is absolutely no evidence to suggest that anything, including Stealth aircraft, had landed or crashed there. I would also like to assure you that the MOD is in no manner trying to cover up any UFO incident nor are we trying to in any way, to obscure the truth about UFOs from the general public.

NOTIFICATION OF LOW-FLYING INCIDENTS OVER NON-DESIGNATED AREAS

As the Regional Investigations Co-ordinator for the British UFO Research Association (BUFORA), I am currently responsible for the investigations of a spate of UFO sightings reported throughout the Midlamds in the last few months.

The majority of the UNKNOWN, that have been investigated seem to conform to a particular type (known in oir UFO data since 1977), effectively that of a delta-winged or manta-ray shaped object. Such characteristics that have neen described by witnesses regarding this type include a silent motion (a low humming sound has on accasion been heard by witnesses clode to the objects); a slow movement, although the object seems to have the capability of making rapid movements and narrow turns; very low in flight; and two powerful white headlights, and often a wide assortments of colourful lighting, of a strob rype.

A brief selection of such reports include:-OVERSEAL, ASHBY-DE-LA-ZOUCH, LEIGESTERSHIRE

November 1986. A man driving home early in the morning was terrified by a huge manta-ray shaped object with two white heaflights and a red light on the underneath. It flew across his path and then shot rapidly away, showing its large underneath that appeared to consist of piping and jointing.

LONG CLAWSON, MELTON MOWBRAY, LEICESTERSHIRE

27 Sept 1985. Two polive officers on duty observed a large structure cpmposed of four white lights in a delta-shaped patter with a red light beneath. It flew silently (humming sound reported overhead) and low. Official report produced.

ABBOTS BROMLEY, STAFFORDSHIRE

22 Sept 1987. Family of four terrified by slow-moving and silent manta-ray object with a vast array of powerful colourful lights.

FERNWOOD, STAFFORD

16 May 1988. $S_{
m e}$ veral independent reports of triangular -shaped objects around 22.00 hrs.

Much local media coverage. BUFORA supplied data on the possibility of objects being secret experimental aircraft. Bright searchlights emploed by objects. Stafford MP, Bill Cash, currently involved in investigation.

A spate of recent sightings has also occurred in Yorkshire, currently under investigation by the Independent UFO Network (IUN). Again, diamond-shaped objects, employing bright lights and silent movements reported from Barnsley area on 10 Feb and 20 April 1988.

Our investigations, supported by avaition sources in the UK and USA, suggest that the objects represent a secret aircraft - Stealth. We are of the opinion that the F-19 fighte, and very likely its sister, the B-2 bomber, are operating in this country. There is more than a shadow of a doubt that more advanced experimental aircraft and dirigibles are being tested over populated areas throughout the UK, mainly, it would seem, in the counties of Leicestershire, Derbyshire, "taffordshire, Cambridgeshire, Yorkshire and Northamptonshire. Although we must maintain the security aspect of these aircraft and their missions, we do believe that the British public deserves to know what is flying around UK airspace, particularly so when such flights are operating at very low altitudes Also, many of these witnesses are terrified by the sudden and strange appearance of these objects, and since they employ very collourful lighting comfigurations (in our opinion to look like "UFOS", or something "alien" to suggest to potential witnesses that the object is not aterrestrial craft under control by UK/USA authorities) people the belief that what they saw was "other worldly". When they report such incidents, it is more than likely that they will be informed by the authorities that the object was not an aircraft and does not present a threat to UK airspace, and by extreme UFO buffs as a "UFO" or "flying saucer".

As this matter appears serious, as evident by an MP taking the matter up, we hope that you will respond seriously to our request to investigate these sightings as not merely a "UFO report" but as an incident of low-flying and dangerous aircraft manoevres over populated areas. If these incidents are not caused by Stealth or similar advanced aircraft or dirigibles, can we have an investigation into these incidents as a serious intrusion of UK airspace by unknown, and possibly hostile, foreign bodies? For too long the authorities have been ignoring such reports merely because they have been described as UFOs. If we forget the connotations with aliens(for which there is little evidence at present), and concentrate on the unidentified aspect, then perhaps we can have a serio us investigation into such incursions over populated areas which are frightening witnesses.

I shall be happy to supply further information and to assist you further in your enquirie into the matters raised above. Thanking you in anticipation.

Thank you for your letter dated 22 August, 1988.

Firstly, I would like to comment (if I may) to the explanations you bosed, for the sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects.

I have some U.S. Government documents on UFOs. I have only obtained them recently. This was from them Central Intelligence Agency, and the National Security Agency. Of course these have nothing to do with the Royal Air Force, except exchange of Intelligence. But one document (enclosed) says; "Sightings of unexplained objects at great altitudes and travelling at high speeds in the vicinity of major U.S. defense installations are of such nature that they are not attributable to natural phenomena or known types of area vehicles." Also it says: "At this time, the reports of incidents convince us that there is something going on that must have immediate attention." As you will see from the enclosed document, this document was written by H Chadwell, Assistant Director Scientific Intelligence. The memo itself was classified: Secret Security Information. At that time the C.I.A. were saying UFOs were rubbish, and a waste of time. But right from the biginning there has been a cover-up.

I do know that this has nothing to do with the RAF, but since our close relationship, with the American government it makes one think that the Ministry isn't telling all it known.

In the Public Records Office, in Kew London, I found a formally top secret Air Ministry document which relates to "sighting of unidentified flying object". I think this proves that the Ministry had (and still has) secret documents on unidentified flying objects.

A close friend of mine, who lives in south London told me that a person named Downing, who was in the RAF with the rank of Air Chief Marshall, was quoted as saying the following: "... More than 10,000 sightings have been reported, the majority of which cannot be accounted for by any "scientific explanation"...i.e. balloons, ball lighting, aircraft lighting, mateorlogical balloons, nor aircraft at unusual angles.. I am convinced that they are not manufactured by any nation on earth."

I have documents to prove what I am saying (read the enclosed document)

I don't seem to be able to find any documents released in 1977?

In your letter you said that you are able to ensuer any queries which have occurred recently..... 2....

. what do you mean , or what time span is recently, a year, two years?

Since I do not known what time period is involved, I shall not give you setails of some incidents that I have. But could you let me know what report, or rather what the report containss, on the following incident.

A UFO sighting occurred six miles from town of Newquay, Cornwall. The sighting occurred on 6, Feb., 1987. Not very far away is St.Mawgan AFB. It seems that the object landed, or crash.or it may have only come close to the ground. During the sighting the object changed its colour. It was last seen travelling in direction of grass bank mear a railway junction. Investigators found an area of "combustion" damage and tree limbs snapped off. Media sayings incident is "too hot to bandle", and published nothing. I would like to have the report of this.also any reports of UFO sightings in Telford.XX

I understand that you are short staffed, but I don't think it will be too much trouble for you to find any sightings around my area. After all your files are organized aren't they? If so then they should be easy to find. Oh, the sightings in Telfored is for the period of this year. Any up to date sightings are welcome i.e. May. June, or July, August, 1888. Since these are very recent, they should easyly be on hand.

If you could send me a copy of Col-Halt's report of 1981, then surely you should be able to send me reports of sightings, that happened in 1988.

I await your reply. Please reply as soon as possible.

Unidentified Flying Objects SUBJECT

- 1. On 20 August, the DCI, after a briefing by OSI on the above subject, directed the preparation of an MSCID for submission to the Council stating the need for investigation and directing agencies concerned to cooperate in such investigations.
- 2. In attempting to draft such a directive and the supporting staff atudies, it became apparent to DD/I, Acting AD/SI and AD/IC that the problem was largely a research and development problem, and it was decided by DD/I to attempt to initiate action through FADB. A conference was held between DI/USAF, Chairman of FADB, DD/I, Acting AD/SI and AD/EC at which time it was decided that Dr. Whitman, Chairman of ESTE, would investigate the possibility of undertaking research and development studies through Air Force agencies.
- 3. On approximately 6 Hovember, we were advised by Chairman, FADE, that inquiries in the Air Stoff did not disclose "undue concern" over this natter, but that it had been referred to the Air Defense Command for consideration. No further word has been received from IMDB.
- 4. Recent reports reaching CIA indicated that further action was desirable and emother briefing by the cognizant A-2 and ATIC personnel was held on 25 November. At this time, the reports of incidents convince us that there is something going on that must have immediate attention. The details of some of these incidents have been discussed by AD/SI with DECF. Sightings of unexplained objects at great altitudes and travelling at high speeds in the vicinity of major U.S. defense installations are of such mature that they are not attributable to natural phenomena or known types of aerial vehicles.
- 5. GSI is proceeding to the establishment of a consulting group of sufficient competence and stature to review this matter and convince the responsible authorities in the community that immediate research and development on this subject must be undertaken. This can be done expeditiously under the actis of CHIIS.



UNSCRUPULOUS ACTIVITIES OF CERTAIN LOCAL CIVILIAN UFO GROUPS

Whilst I do appreciate the work load that is upon you in the course of your duties as head of an MOD section (and the large number of enquiries that are placed upon you as the clearing house for UFO reports), I feel that it is imperative that you be informed of the activities of certain civilian UFO groups.

As the Regional Investigations Co-ordinator of the Midlands for the UK's main UFO research organisation - the Britisth UFO Research Association (BUFORA), I am responsible for the investigation and reporting of UFO sightings throughout the Midlands, and in promoting a good image of BUFORA and ufology in general, to the public and the media, as well as the scientific bodies who may be interested in our data and to the Ministry of Defence.

Increasingly, for the past year the Midlands has seen the establishment of groups purportedly "investigating" UFO sightings but who are, nevertheless, creating a bad name for ufology, misrepresenting the public, and in fostering a misplaced image of the Ministry of Defence.

I feel that it is my duty to make you aware of the activity of these groups /individuals for two reasons: to distance ourselves from the activities and attitudes of these egocentric people and their totally unscientific, wholly subjective and extreme methods and ideas, and two, to present you with the information to handle such groups in the future.

Section 40 then very scientic and sensible. Since it split up iy has been taken over by Section 40 noted for his contact with the notorious SUNDAY SPORT. He has an excellent

publicity machine and much contact with the press and police whose reputation as a man of extreme and childsh views they have to realise. He has castigated serious UFO researchers and the MOD and believes that we are undergoing a mass of UFO alien invasions. He has the potential of speading much ill- conceived views and, perhaps, panic. He has set himself up as the Midlands only UFO investigator and served to co-operate with no-one. A serious aspect to this particular individuals is that he has set himself up as being sponsored by British Aerospace (see one of his local newspaper articles attached).

Enquiries to this effect with him produced nothing but lies and when we approached BAe they investigated and found out that they did not sponsor him. (see attached). When section 40 was approached on this he responded with threats (see attached).

The issue warrants no further womenet by myself, suffice to say that this man is making the public and press believe that he is being sponsored by BAe and, by proxy, is suggesting that the UFO phenomenon (and himself) is subject to official recognition and financials sponsorshap.

I hope that the above is of interst to you and that you may care to follow some, or all of it, up in the appropriate manner. I shall be more than happy to co-opertate with you on any aspect of the UFO phenomenon and to exchange data. Perhaps the MOD could agree with a sponsorship deal with BUFORA, us supplying you with quality data and subject matter. As an individual, however, I shall be happy to work with you in any sphere.

- 1. Introduction. Wg Cdr Section 40 R.A.F. (Ret'd) was driving with his wife near Winchester and noticed unusual ringmarks in a cornfield below the hilltop road. The ringmarks were so strange that he stopped the car, walked back to the hilltop where the marks were clearly visible, and took photographs. The occurrence was reported by telephone to Ministry of Defence Whitehall on 12 July 1988 and the staff officer concerned with unidentified flying objects asked that when available the photographs should be sent there for study. Two photgraphs, which have only now been processed as colour slides, are enclosed.
- 2. Date and Time. The ringmarks were noticed and photographed on 9 July 1988 at 1630 hours.
- 3. Weather. The afternoon was clear and sunny with a fresh SW'ly wind, after a rainy morning with cloudbase on the hills.
- 4. Location. The ringmarks were observed from the A 272 road which runs around a curved escarpment near Winchester, between Telegraph Hill and Cheesefoot Head as marked on the 1/50,000 Ordnance Survey Map. The ringmarks were at point SU 529281. This point lies at 350 ft a.s.l. which is two hundred feet lower than the escarpment road. The land around the ringmarks was covered with growing corn which was crushed by the imprint of the marks.
- 5. <u>Description</u>. The photgraphs illustrate the following features:
 - (a) The ringmarks comprised two concentric circles each one metre in width, the outer having an estimated diameter of thirty metres and the inner having an estimated diameter of twentyfive metres. Within the inner circle the cornfield was flattened over a circular area with an estimated diameter of twenty metres. Overall the marks therefore had the appearance of a roundel with a large centre and two thin concentric rings.
 - (b) The concentric rings were noted as being very sharply defined and although only one metre wide the cornstalks in that one metre were completely destroyed while those immediately alongside were untouched. All the concentric edges gave the appearance of having been cut precisely and mechanically.
 - (c) The inner circular area was noted as being crushed evenly over its entire area. The edges of this crushed area were sharply defined as were the concentric rings.

(d) There were no tracks of any sort leading through the standing corn to or from the ringmarks. There was no diffused disturbance of the standing corn such as might have been caused by downwash from a helicopter's rotor blades. There were no indications of a flight path sloping down through the standing corn towards the ringmarks. There was no sight of any flying machine either on the ground or in the air which might have been consistent with the ringmarks.

6. Inference. The following deductions are offered:

- (a) The ring marks were not consistent with any machine used on the ground or with any flying machine deriving lift from the air (viz., aeroplane, helicopter or airship).
- (b) The ringmarks were so clearly defined that details of their configuration could have been precisely measured. There can be little doubt that they were created by vertical downward pressure from a very large mechanical device.
- (c) The mechanical device was assessed as being one with a large flat circular base twenty metres in diameter and with concentric rings developing a lift reaction. This lift reaction destroyed the standing corn in two narrow swathes forming concentric circles with diameters of twentyfive metres and thirty metres respectively.
- (d) The ringmarks were assessed as being the landing imprint of the mechanical device suggested above.
- (e) The reason for the landing imprint appearing on this site is not apparent.
- (f) There was no evidence of any hostile activity in connection with the ringmarks.
- (g) The site of the ringmarks is only twenty n. miles from AAEE Boscombe Down and the marks might possibly have been made by an unconventional flying machine associated with activities at AAEE.
- 7. Conclusion. The ringmarks represented the landing imprint of a large flying machine descending vertically but without any air reaction. The marks were not consistent with present U.K. technology and constituted an unidentified phenomenon. No hostile activity was indicated. However the presence of the marks requires further investigation.

Thank you for your reply to my letter concerning the collision of two Tornado aircraft on 9th. August 1988, and Ft Lt John Walts who was one of the personnel killed in the accident.

The incident has has such a profound effect on my studies that I find it difficult to believe that it ever occured. Is it possible to send me more details on how the accident came about?

My studies concern irregularities in radio the use of radio communication to which I have been deliberately introduced they scientists unknown to me. The matter is difficult for me to prove though I have tried to describe its existence to prominent offices and personnel. So far no one has come forward to assist me with this serious development in electromagnetic technology.

A description of the device has been forwarded to Air Vice-Marshal P. Howard OBE, Institute of Aviation Medicine (IAM), Group Captain Section 40 IAM and Professor Cambridge. These three professional men ignored my last letter to them. Details were also sent to Rt. Hon G. Younger whose office claimed that they knew nothing of the device and, to my knowledge, now inquiry has been made.


There must be a reson for scientists to introduce me to a highly sophisticated radio communication technique without my consent and so I have researched the problem to try and find the reason why. One possible application of the device is to help a pilot control supersonic aircraft and for Air Traffic Controllers to track these aircraft in low level flights at all times.

If the incident occurred on that Wednesday evening it seems to me that the RAF are using an archaic system with highly sophisticated aircraft. They are asking too much of their

pilots and seem to forget that man is a biological phenomenon not a machine. If the RAF is to fly highly sophisticated aircraft then they need a highly sophisticated tracking system. That system is the one I have been introduced to and have tried to describe to the RAF and the Ministry of Defence. If the RAF continue to ignore its existence they might as well consider disponding because recent records are beginning to prove that they are incapable of carrying out the job they are paid to do. I cannot believe the RAF to be that stupid.

I feel now is the time for me to lodge a complaint at the highest level possible within the RAF and I will be grateful if you could supply me with the name and address of a high ranking officer relevant to this problem. Thank you.



Thank you for your recent letter about an incident reported in your local paper involving an MOD Civil Servant working at Shoeburyness New Ranges. I am afraid that we, as the MOD branch who deal with UFO reports, are unable to give you permission to enter Shoeburyness Ranges, as you request. We have, however, copied your letter to Section 40 who is free to contact you, should he wish to discuss his experiences further.

Finally I might add that we have received no other reports of this particular incident, nor do we have any suggestions as to what it might have been although the majority of sightings can be related to some totally natural phenomenon. Examples that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights or aircraft at unusual angles.

I hope that this is helpful.



UFO SIGHTINGS CURTENTLY UNDER INVESTIGATION BY MIDLANDS UFO GROUPS

As the Regional Investigations Co-ordinator (Midlands) for the British UFO Research Association (BUFORA), I am currently responsible for the investigations of a spate of UFO sightings reported throughout the Midlands in the last few months.

The majority of the UNKNOWNS (the rest explained through natural phenomena and misidentifications of aircraft, satellites, etc) collated so far seem to conform to a particular
type, effectively that of a delta- winged or manta-ray shaped object. Such characterist
ics as have been obtained from witnesses include a silent movement (a low humming sound
has on accasions been reported) and two very powerful white 'headlights', and an assortment of colourful lighting on its body.

A brief selection of such reports follow:-

OVERSEAL, ASHBY-DE-LA-ZOUCH, LEICS. November 1986. A man driving home early one morning terrified by huge manta-ray shaped object that flew extremely low and silently over car. Underneath was an array pf pipes and jointing and a red light. Two bright front headlights.

LONG CLAWSON, MELTON MOWBRAY, LEICS. 27 Sept 1985. Two police officers on duty observed large structure with 4 white lights in shape of delta flyyslowly and silently over them.

Official report produced.

ABBOTS BROMLEY, STAFFS. 22 Sept 1987. Family of 4 terrified by slow-moving and silent manta-ray object with a vast array of colourful lights. (Europ 10.20 pm)

FERNWOOD, STAFFORD 16 May 1988 Several independent reports of triangular-shaped ibjects around 22.00 hrs. Much local media coverage with data supplied by BUFORA on possibility of sightings being Stealth aircraft. Bright searchlights employed by objects. Stafford MP, Bill Cash, currently involved in investigations.

A spate of sightings have also occur ed over Yorkshire, currently under investigating by sister group, the INDEPENDENT UFO NETWORK (IUN). Again, diamond-shaped objects have been reported from BARNSLEY on 10 FEB 1988 and on 20 APRIL 1988.

Ourvinvestigations have suggested that what is being observed by witnesses conforms to possible experimental technology, and our suspicions are on the Stealth americal (F-19, and possibly its sister, the B-2 bomber), or even more advanced experimental designs. (see photostat of an artists impression based on eye-witness accounts). Although we must maintain the security aspect of these aircraft and the missions that they are indertaking, I do believe that the public have a certain right to know alittle of what is flying in UK airspace, particularly so when such aircraft is being tested/on active service in populated areas. The potential of an accident is always there and it is risking suck an accident when these objects are witnessed flying very low. Also, many witnesses have been terrified of their encounters with these objects, even more so when they are perceived to represent "extraterrestrial alien sopaceships" because of the cultural and emotional climate that links in with ETs.

Some of our sources do indicate that either, or both, RAF Alconbury and Mildenhall are host to these aircraft, probably being transported by Galaxy C-5Bs. Perhaps you could, through your offices, be able to help us in our enquiries into these UFO reports and suggest possible explantions, and to comment on the Stealth link that these reports seem to suggest. Are Stealth aircraft operating in the UK? If so, are there any safety regulations that they must observe when they operate over populated areas? Why are the Stealth displaying lighting configurations to make them look suspiciously like "UFOs"?. If they are not Stealth, can we have a full MOD investigation into the illegal and threatening entry of foreign objects into UK airspace?

As it would seem like a serious matter , as evident by a local MP taking the matter into his own hands, we are contacting the Civilian Aviation Authority as well in our request to report such hazardous and frightening low-flying incidents. On behalf of BUFORA, NUFON and IUN organisations, and the witnesses of these encounters, I wish to formally issue a complaint into low-flying incidents as detailed above and to request the MOD to investigate them, with a view to clarifying such low-flying activities and, in the relevent cases, to prevent illegal and possible foreign objects entering UK airspawe, and threatening the security integrity thereof.

I shall be happy to supply you with further data on the above and I hope to be able to co-operate with you on this and indeed any UFO -related matter in the future.

home on 9 May 1987. I am sorry not to have been able to reply sooner.

I regret to say that neither RAF Coningsby or ourselves have been able to find any record of the telephone call $\frac{\text{Section 40}}{\text{Made shortly after the incident so our enquiries have had to be based on the contents of your letter.}$

As far as date and time are concerned I can confirm that we have received no other reports of unidentified flying objects that tally with your own. Given your description, we have also checked whether the object could have been a missile or something fallen from a military aircraft but the RAF are unaware of having lost any practice rockets, missiles or other similar equipment from any of our aircraft in this area.

Personally, I am tempted to wonder whether it could have been some form of remotely controlled model, and am sorry not to be able to be more helpful.



Thank you for your recent letter which asked for any information about Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

I think you may find it helpful if I explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects seen.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations or general surveys. I'm sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Nonetheless it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Some that spring to mind include satellite debris reentering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles and a host of other things.

I regret that the release of any material on the subject "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may be aware, this Act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. However, we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains.

I hope that this is helpful.

As part of Skyscan you are probably aware that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, we do not attempt to investigate or identify whatever might have been seen.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. I'm sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Turning to your enquiry about Section 40 sighting, I regret that a look through our files has revealed that we did not receive a report which corresponds to the details given in your letter. However, I can confirm that the object seen was most definitely not a refuelling hose, as these trail only a short distance from the aircraft and Section 40 would have undoubtedly seen the aircraft as well. Another possibility could have been a Canberra target tug, but again I regret that the descriptions do not tally.




I am writing in the hope that you will be able to assist me or at least pass my query to the appropriate people.

My query concerns what appeared to me to be a flying object, the like of which

I had never seen before!

The date was 26/7/88, I was driving on the A12 just north of Golchester in an approx easterly direction at a few minutes before 5pm. From quite some distance I could see an object in the sky, which appeared stationary and although it booked a bit strange, I assumed to be a kite. His basic shape been something like:

I gave it a few glances and I realised that as it was now relatively quite near I should be able to see a string attached to it, but I couldn't. It occurred to me that the string might be broken and it was just diffing, but it didn't seem to be I watched the object and quite quickly it became clear what form it was as it came relatively closer. I illustrate it below:



The main body appeared to be a dark disc of roughly the proportions above. The lower parts appeared to be long dangling legs, quite thick,

and although I've illustrated six, I'm not sure of the number. They had a noticable inward curve.

As I was driving I had to hope glancing back onto the road but I had quite a few seconds good book at it. I booked closer for Ruther features and there appeared to be a yellow glaw from the rectangular cutouts/recesses on the main body (see sketch). This looked rather like an interior light shining through a window, although not too bright - alternatively it may have been the sun reflecting off it, but as there appeared no glow on the body itself and it was not too bright I don't think it was not too bright I don't think it was shining.

shining. The above is what I plainly saw, before it disappeared from view above the car. As there was no where

to safely stop I continued driving and ofter a while I could see the object at a distance through the back window. Before it passed over the car it gave the appearance it was moving quite Past, but not excessively and it appeared to be in direction of movement, Its direction I would guess was roughly east to west. Size was difficult to judge, at a guess 30 to 60 Reet dia and Plying quite low - it might however have been much larger and higher. There was no visible means of support and no visible means of propulsion. I noticed no noise, but as I was inside the car it may not have necessarily

One of the reasons I didn't stop besides lack of place to stop and the fact I had had a good look at it anyway was

I was sure other people must have seen it as well, and even if there was a reasonable explanation for it other people would have wondered what it was. To this end I listered to the local TV and radio, but there was nothing.

I realise that this letter is of a strange nature but I assure you this is a fair account of what I saw. I would appreciate any help that could

Dear Sir,

We have received information from our investigator in Cornwall, that a large illuminated flying craft flew very low over houses at Indian Queens N.Cornwall at ol00 on 2nd of June 1988. It awoke and startled residents, who reported the incident to the police, and local RAF stations.

The report we have is of a large triangular shaped craft with alternate red and yellow fixed lights along the edges of the triangle, but with a dark opaque interior. (See drawing below.) It sounded like a Jumbo Jet, but moved with the speed of a Lightning fighter, passing over at 100-200 feet in 5-8 seconds. The stations at Culdrose and St Mawgan reported they had nothing airborne at this hour, and the size impression given was of a very large craft not used by the above stations.

We would welcome your comments on the identity of this object, and if the arrangement of lights corresponds to any type of larger aircraft flying

Thank you for your letter of 28 June which enclosed a copy of an investigation report of a sighting witnessed during the evening of 18 June. You asked for our comments.

I think it would be helpful if I first explain that whilst we do receive and coordinate some information about Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) sightings, the sole concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects.

We have no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full time. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, I regret that we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Some that spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft, to mention just a few.

Moving on to the sighting witnessed on 18 June, I can confirm that we received rather a large number of reports for that evening from the London area. Although some of the descriptions of the object do not correlate exactly it is clear that something was seen, and from the description given, it could possibly have been a meteor burning up in the atmosphere. Although we have not positively identified the object, I can confirm that we do not consider the sightings to be a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom.

I have pleasure in enclosing copies of the reports that we received which appear to correspond to the details given in your letter but in line with our policy to maintain the privacy of those who send them in I have obscured their names and addresses.

Finally, although we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently, I regret that the release of any material on the subject "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may know, this Act states that official files should generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. We are also unable to offer a general advisory service on this particular topic, owing, I'm afraid, to a lack of resources.

I hope that this is helpful.

Herewith copy of a narrative which I have recently received from a former American Pilot for your consideration and comment.

In the course of my investigations into this matter two suggestions have been made to me, namely:-

That adverse weather conditions caused a "bogus" blip. A.

The witness concerned says the weather conditions were, apart from being cloudy, "tranquil" and calm.

An experiment in "electronic warfare" was taking place by means of a bogus radar pulse being transmitted to create an illusion on the Pilot's radar of a solid moving target and that at the last minute before the Pilot was due to release his salvo of rockets the target was very swiftly removed off his radar screen by some technical means creating the further illusion that the target had outrun the Pilot.

The Pilot concerned concedes that this is possible but does not think it probable for a variety of reasons which were too technical for me to comprehend fully.

Is it possible for you to say whether, in fact, 31 years after the event, such an experiment was taking place using the Pilot as a 'guinea pig' and if it was not whether, in-deed, the technology existed in 1957 to create such radar illusions.

The nature of my interest, and that of the Pilot, is to establish whether or not there was a genuine large Unidentified Flying Object flying at speed and performing maneuvers beyond the capability of any known Aircraft on the other hand if the event was part of what was then part of a Top Secret Military exercise and is still Top Secret perhaps you would simply say so and confirm that whatever was involved it was not an Unidentified Flying Object i.e. that your people know what it was and were in full control of the situation even though you cannot say for security reasons, be it 31 years after the event, what was formy one.

Yours faithfully, ection 40 Met sector (RAF) to have F-86D's stand alert as an operational requirement. The date was May 20, 1957, and our squadrons were considered combat qualified when they committed us to the operational requirement. My recollection seems to indicate that this function was rotated about England between the various RAF and USAF units. This particular night the 514th Fighter Interceptor had the alert duty. Two F-86D's were on 5 minute alert at the end of the runway at RAF Station Manston awaiting the signal to acramble. The hour was late as memory serves me and the weather was IFR. Looking back at the log book, a total of 30 minutes of Night Weather was logged on a 1 hour and 15 minute flight. The details such as exactly what hour the scramble occurred or what we were doing just prior to scramble totally escapes me, however, the Auxiliary Power Units (APU) were on and the power was transmitted to the aircraft. We were ready for an immediate scramble and eager for the flight time.

I can remember the call to scramble quite clearly, however, I cannot remember specifics such as the actual vector to turn to after take off. We were airborne well within the 5 minutes allotted to us and basically scrambled to about flight level 310. Our vector took us out over the North Sea just east of east Anglia. Normally, the other member of the set of two fighters would be the lead ship. I can only suggest that I was leading due to an in place turn of some sort. I remember in quite specific terms talking as lead ship to the GCI site (who's call sign I cannot recall). I was advised of the situation quite clearly. The initial briefing indicated that the ground was observing for a considerable time a blip that was orbiting the East Anglia area. There was very little movement and from my conversation with the GCI all the normal procedures of checking with all the controlling agencies revealed that this was an unidentified flying object with very unusual flight patterns. In the initial briefing it was suggested to us that the bogey actually was motionless for long intervals.

The instructions came to go "gate" to expedite the intercept. Gate was the term used to use maximum power (in the case of the F-86D that meant full afterburner) and to proceed to an Initial Point at about 32,000 feet. By this time my radar was on and I was looking prematurely for the bogey. The instructions came to report any visual observations, to which I replied "I'm in the soup and it is impossible to see anything!" The weather was probably high alto stratus, but between being over the North Sea and in the weather, no frame of reference was available. i.e. no stars, no lights, no silhouettes, in short nothing. GCI continued the vectoring and the dialogue describing the strange antics of the UFO.

The exact turns and maneuvers they gave me were all predicated to reach some theoretical point for a lead collision course type rocket release. I can remember reaching the level off and requesting to come out of afterburner only to be told to stay in afterburner. It wasn't very much later that I noticed my indicated mach number was about .92. This is about as fast as the F-86D could go straight and level.

Then the order came to fire a full salvo of rockets at the UFO. I was only a Lieutenant and very much aware of the gravity of the situation. To be quite candid I almost shit my pants! At any rate I had my hands full trying to fly, search for bogeys, and now selecting a hot load on the switches. I asked for authentication of the order to fire, and I received it. This further complicated my difficulty as the matrix of letters and numbers to find the correct authentication was on a piece of printed paper about 5 by 8 inches, with the print not much bigger than normal type. It was totally black, and the lights were down for night flying. I used my flashlight, still trying to fly and watch my radar. To put it quite candidly I felt very much like a one legged man in an ass kicking contest.

The authentication was valid, and I selected 24 rockets to salvo. I wasn't paying too much attention to but I clearly remember him giving a "Roger" to all the transmissions. I can only suppose he was as busy as I was.

The final turn was given, and instructions were give to look 30 degrees to the Port for my bogey. I did not have a hard time at all. There it was exactly where I was told it would be at 30 degrees and at 15 miles. The blip was burning a hole in the radar with its incredible intensity. It was similar to a blip I had received from B-52's and seemed to be a magnet of light. These things I remember very clearly. I ran the range gate marker over the blip, and the jizzle band faded as the marker super imposed over the blip. I had a lock on that had the proportions of a flying aircraft carrier. By that I mean the return on the radar was so strong that it could not be overlooked by the fire control system on the F-86D. I use in comparison other fighter aircraft and airliners. The airliner is easy to get a lock on while the fighter not being a good return is very difficult and, on that type aircraft, a lock on was only possible under 10 miles. The larger the airplane the easier the lock on. This blip almost locked itself. I cannot explain to the lay person exactly what I mean, save to say that it was the best target I could ever remember locking on to. I had locked on in just a few seconds, and I locked on exactly 15 miles which was the maximum range for lock on. I called to the GCI "Judy", which signified that I would take all further steering information from my radar computer.

Let me explain visually what I saw on my radar screen. Once lock on is accomplished, two circles of light appear on the screen. One was a complete circle in the center of the radar acreen about an inch in diameter, the other about 3 inches in diameter with a half inch segment darkened to indicate the overtake speed. If the dark segment was at 12 o'clock it meant 0 overtake. If the segment was at 6 o'clock, then we had about 600 knots of overtake. The maximum overtake was in the 9 o'clock position. The overtake I had on this particular intercept was in the 7 or 8 o'clock position which indicate close to 800 knot overtake. I was really hauling coals. To complete the description of the radar scope there were two other significant pieces of data displayed. One is the horizontal indicator which gave a gyro stabilized reference to the horizon enabling the pilot to not have to refer to his flight instruments. The second is a steering dot, which was nothing more than computer data indicating which way the aircraft should fly to accomplish the intercept. i.e. if the dot was above the center, the stick should be pulled back to climb, if it was to the right then turn to the right to center the dot. The idea was to have the dot centered in the smaller circle.

A normal intercept proceeds from the lock on phase with the constant maneuvering to center the dot. When the aircraft is in a position to accomplish its intercept, the dot would be centered. The outer circle will start to shrink at 20 seconds from rocket release. The circle in the center shrinks to about a quarter inch, and keeping the dot centered requires small rapid maneuvers. At about the time the outer circle reaches three quarters of an inch in diameter a small quarter inch line appears in lieu of the inner circle. This is the signal to pull the trigger for rocket release, and to make only up and down corrections as the computer calculates the point of rocket release for the azimuth. With the trigger pulled and the switches set, the rockets are released by the computer.

Now back to the intercept of the UFO. As I said I had an overtake of 800 knots and my radar was rock stable. The dot was centered and only the slightest corrections were necessary. This was a very fast intercept and the circle started to shrink. I called "20 seconds" and the GCI indicated he was standing by. The overtake was still indicating in the 7 or 8 o'clock position. At about 10 seconds to go, I noticed that the overtake position was changing its position. It moved rapidly to the 6 o'clock then 3 o'clock then 12 o'clock and finally rested about the 11 o'clock position. This indicated a negative overtake of 200 knots (the maximum negative overtake displayed). There was no way of knowing of what the actual speed of the UFO was as he could be traveling at very high mach numbers and I would only see the 200 knot negative overtake. The circle, which was down to about an inch and a half in diameter, started to open up rapidly. Within seconds it was back to 3 inches in diameter, and the blip was visible in the blackened jizzle band moving up the scope. This meant that it was going away from me. I reported this to the GCI site and they replied by asking "Do you have a Tally Ho?" I replied that I was still in the soup and could see nothing. By this time the UFO had broke lock and I

saw him leaving my 30 mile range. Again 1 reported that he was gone only to be told that he was now off their scope as well.

With the loss of the blip off their scope the mission was over. We were vectored back to home plate (Manston) and secured our switches. My last instructions were that they would contact me on the ground by land line.

Back in the alert tent I talked to Met sector. They advised me that the blip had gone off the scope in two sweeps at the GCI site and that they had instructions to tell me that the mission was considered classified. They also advised me that I would be contacted by some investigator. It was the next day before anyone showed up.

I had not the foggiest idea what had actually occurred, nor would anyone explain anything to me. In the squadron operations area, one of the sergeants came to me and brought me in to the hall way around the side of the pilots briefing room. He approached a civilian, who appeared from nowhere. The civilian looked like a well dressed IBM salesman, with a dark blue trenchcoat. (I can not remember his facial features, only to say he was in his 30's or early forties). He immediately jumped into asking questions about the previous days mission. I got the impression that he operated out of the states, but I don't know for sure. After my debriefing of the events he advised me that this would be considered highly classified and that I should not discuss it with anybody not even my commander. He threatened me with a national security breach if I breathed a word about it to anyone. He disappeared without so much as a good bye and that was that, as far as I was concerned. I was significantly impressed by the action of the cloak and dagger people and I have not spoke of this to anyone until the recent years.

My impression was that whatever the aircraft (or spacecraft) was it must have been traveling in 2 digit mach numbers to have done what I had witnessed. Perhaps the cloak of secrecy can be lifted in this day of enlightenment and all of us can have all the facts. This is my account to the best of my memory.



Re-entry Sightings

I wrote to you on the 22nd February last regarding a sighting which my crew and I took to be a re-entry of a very large object. It was a most impressive sight, almost frightening at the time. We can understand a little more sympathetically how Orson Welles' listeners felt when he made his famous War of the Worlds broadcast.

I had hoped for an acknowledgement if not an explanation of this phenomenon but have had none so far. In case you did not receive my letter I attach the text below.

The following is a description of a sighting made by four flight deck members, including myself, on the 19th February. The position was taken from the inertial navigation system and the subjective description of the phenomenon is from notes made by me at the time and agreed by the other three crew members.



aircraft heading 290° flight level 310

I looked out of the window and saw on the horizon, bearing 210°M, what appeared to be a planet. It had the colour and magnitude of Venus but clearly could not be Venus. It then became apparent that it was moving towards me and I assumed that it was another aircraft showing landing lights flying along an intersecting airway. The light became too bright to be an aircraft and as it approached one could see trails behind it. (It is possible to see contrails by starlight). These trails however appeared to have yellow sparks in them and as it got closer several red lights, the size and colour



of aircraft navigation lights, which kept station with the bright light and behind it.

The closing speed was greater than that of an aircraft one flight level above and the distribution of the lights much wider and longer than would have been possible had it been another aircraft, but too close for a formation.

It passed overhead and appeared on the starboard side with the bright light unchanged and the red lights still keeping station. In other words it could not have been landing lights on another aircraft because it was far too bright and they do not shine backwards. As it receded to the horizon the "starlight" retained its colour but lost its intensity until, at the horizon, it turned yellow and disappeared. We were not sure if this was because it burned out or because it disappeared into the haze layer.

The total time from horizon to horizon was four minutes. The "trails" were visible only when it passed close overhead.

The descriptions in the press of the space laboratory which came down some years ago in Western Australia tally with what we saw on the night of the 19th.


I hope that this report is of interest and value. My crew and I would very much like to have an explanation if possible.



Thank you for your reply to my letter of May 25th, regarding the Ilkley 'abduction' case of December 1st 1987. It is a shame no other reports were made to you which might add to this all ready intrigueing case.

I appreciate your policy statement, and note that your interest in the phenomenon depends solely on possible defence implications. I also note that because the Ministry believes that rational explanations probably account for most UFO reports, by implication, this must also mean that you appreciate there exists a hardcore of reports which may have exotic explanations.

Like you, I also believe that the vast majority of reports can be explained in terms of known atmospheric phenomena and conventional aircraft. But the growing number of so-called 'abduction' cases - those instances where a witness, usually with the help of hypnotic regression, recounts being in a white room and examined on a central table by small 'entities' - defy talk about weather balloons and satellites. Personally, I think there is a strong psychological component here, although a clinical psychologist I recently worked with has an opposing view.

After listening to the hypnotic testimony of an 'abductee', he has gone on record as stating that in his professional opinion, the witness was recounting an experience which had genuinely happened to him.

Although I accept that the MOD does not carry out any in-depth examination of UFO cases, because of the reasons in your letter, it is inconceivable that research is not being carried out by another government agency. Can you put me, and other serious ufologists (as

opposed to the cultists and publicity seekers which hang onto the subject like cancerous leaches) in touch with the correct department, so that we may work together ?

Another reason for my writing, too. I have not yet received a reply to my previous letter of April 6th. I enclose another copy of this letter for your perusal, and look forward to your reply.



he car engine fades to a spluttering halt. The familiar night sounds cease abruptly on the deserted roadway. And the twinkling lights in the sky begin their slow descent, bringing with them

o dazzling ship from another world.

The romp lowers. A silvery form is silhouetted against the glore. He beckons the car driver, now entranced by the spectacle. She moves in a rhythmic shuffle, to be consumed by the glow. The door slides ponderously shut and traps her inside. Then the ship climbs into the air and is gone, taking with it a cargo of one very frightened human being.

Hundreds of millions of viewers across the world watched in TV-eyed amazement as this climactic scene ended the 1987, and final, series of the American soap opera The Colbys. Fallon (played by Emma Samms) was taken for her ride into the sky, leaving programme makers to decide whether her adventure was for real

or just a Pamela Ewing-style dream.

TV soaps seem cosily divorced from real life. We soak in their glitzy images, knowing all the time they are just make believe. Yet this particular episode from the Hollywood dream machine is not entirely without foundation. In fact it is based on an incredible phenomenon that has swept across the USA and even now threatens the shores of Britain.

People by the saucer-load are claiming to have

been kidnapped by those dazzling ships and carted off to postures new and decidedly extra-terrestrial. They also say that dark and painful things are done to them aboard these UFOs; even maintaining that genetic

aboard mese or Cross; even maintaining that generic experiments are carried out.

Of course this is all very hard to swallow. But scientists are beginning to take these cases seriously.

Take the story of 24-year-old Kathie Davis from Indianapolis. Then a young mother of two small boys, she was living in a house at the edge of the city when, the sixth of 20 lues 1093 act trapel light proposed. on the night of 30 June 1983, a strange light appeared over her backyard. From that point onwards memories flowed stickily into one another, leaving in their wake

many puzzles and much confusion.

The next day a circular burnt patch appeared on Kathie's lawn. No one in the family knew where it had come from. Kathie felt ill and had inexplicable pains in her ear. And then the nightmares began.

The dreams plagued her because they were so real. In them she saw disturbing alien faces, white like a mushroom, with pear-shaped heads and large round eyes, but whose mouths and noses were almost nonexistent. The heads topped bodies of unearthly creatures the size of a young child. More frighteningly still, Kathie's two small sons saw the beings too, claiming that they came into their bedroom at night and placed probes up their noses.

To cope with her terrors Kathie Davis turned to

Budd Hopkins, a celebrated modern artist living in New York City. Together with psychologist, Dr Aphrodite Clamar, he has studied a number of similar complex stories. Often the memories stretch back into the childhood of the witness (frequently a woman in her 20st, forming a lifelong pattern of contact with

other-worldly beings.

Dr Clamar uses hypnosis to regress the troubled person, Reliving the periods of confusion a partial memory is gradually pieced together that seems real. Yet it also sounds impossible. These women tend to claim that they have been "chosen" by small thin creatures for bizarre experiments. They say that ava are extracted, taken in a test tube to an alien laboratory, then replanted back into the human womb until a hybrid faetus is old enough to survive off Earth. These women allegedly give birth to extra-terrestrial babies. Hopkins also has cases where men have reported that sperm samples have been taken. "We know this is sperm samples have been taken. "We know this it fantastic," Budd Hopkins admits. "In most circumstan ces I would not believe it. But when many witnesses who cannot possibly know about the other cases report details that are absolutely identical with those we have already been given, what alternative is there but to believe what they say?"

The staggering implications of Hopkins' cases und his earth-shattering conclusions have generated huge publicity in the USA. TV dramas such as *The Colbysare* to be followed up by two major feature films lone of which will dramatise the terrifying experience of Kathie Davis) due for release later this year.

Could such extraordinary events take place in the rather less excitable British Isles?

Just over an hour after Elsie's experience, four younger women, who were driving to a Women's Institute meeting in Northampton, saw an almost identical UFO in a village only four miles away. Their engine also failed as they tried to make their escape. On this occasion, no evidence was found of any time loss. The two stories were reported completely in-dependently of each other and they do seem amazingly coincidental.

It is tempting to imagine that Elsie Oakensen did not fit the requirements of that particular night's mission and so the aliens went on the lookout for a new victim

They all had an increased fear of social relations, a tendency to keep things to themselves and other symptoms which reminded her of another group of women: "The closest analogy might be the interpersonal alienation of the rape victim," she concluded.

But if you believe you have been kidnapped by a UFO, who do you turn to for comfort and support? It must be one of the loneliest feelings in this world...

The purpose of my letter is to request your expert advice, and assistance.

Skyscan is a national organisation who investigate reports of 'Unidentified Flying Objects' for the purpose of providing material for scientific study.

We do not perpetrate the mythology of 'Flying Saucers' and alien space men.

On the 15 February 1988, at 4.15pm, Section 40 saw a strange object in the sky above her home in Kings Lynn, Norfolk.

- Thank you for your letter of 25 May 1988 asking for any information we may have on possible Unidentified Flying Object (UFO) sightings in the Ilkley area of Yorkshire on 1 December 1987. I have searched through our files but regretably can find nothing which relates to the incident you are interested in.
- However you may find it helpful if I explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the main concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects.
- We have no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full time. This being so we do not have the resources to undertake any further investigation or general survey. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.
- Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.
- Nevertheless it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities which spring to mind include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles amongst others.

- Although we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains, I regret that the release of any material on the subject "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may be aware, this Act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken.
- I hope that you find this helpful.

CASE INTRODUCTION.

This report was first notified to the investigator on the Tuesday following the witness' sighting by the witness himself, after having tried many official and non-official organizations. Finally, having phoned a number of BUFORA addresses, the witness was given the phone number of the investigator. The investigation interview eventually took place on Sunday, 26th June, 1988, at the home of the investigator in Hampstead, London. According to the witness, both he and his girl friend were

taking a mid-evening stroll in Headstone Manor Park when suddenly, the corner of the witness' eye was caught by a bright light low in the sky. When the witness made a full frontal look, he perceived a large, flat charcoal-grey-coloured object moving away in a southerly direction. After only having the object in view for two seconds, it suddenly vanished in an unaccountable way, however, he did manage to draw his girlfriend's attention to the object who, only having only the

briefest glance at the object, did not appear to be very

When asked what it was about his sighting that caused the witness to believe that the object was unusual, he replied that "the rear of the object displayed two large luminous greenish-white concave-shaped "ports". Also, he declared that the dark body of the object was, in some way, "ribbed", and that, despite its bulk and extremely rapid mode of departure, no sound could be detected at all. Strangely, despite the fact that it was still light during this high-summer evening, and that there were other people about, there were no other known witnesses or reports in the local media.

I would like to refer to your recent telephone enquiry on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) when you asked for any information that we might have appertaining to sightings seen in the South East of England in the sixties and seventies.

I think you may find it helpful if I explain that whilst we do receive and co-ordinate some information about UFO sightings, the main concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects.

We have no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full time. This being so we do not have the resources to undertake any further investigation or general survey. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.


Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. I'm sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are already fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.


Nonetheless it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or a host of other things.

I regret that the release of any material on the subject "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may be aware, this Act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken, ie 1958. Although material prior to this date could be available for public viewing I regret that our UFO reports for the period before 1967 were destroyed in line with our policy at the time. Nevertheless we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains. However, due to limited resources, I regret that I can not instigate general searches through our files.

I hope this is helpful.

Unless we judge that they do, and this is normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects.

The Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full time. This being so, we do not have the resources to undertake any further investigation or general survey. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. I am sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.


Nonetheless, it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or a host of other things.

Although we do hold a limited number of report files on this subject, I regret that the release of this material "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments, all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. However, we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains.

Thank you for your letter of 18 January which asked for permission to inspect any of our departmental files which contain reports of unidentified Aerial Phenomena sightings as seen and reported to us by members of the public.

Whilst you are indeed correct in saying that our reports files are not classified and like all other government departmental files are subject to the Publics Records Act, I regret that the Ministry of Defence does not possess any UFO sighting reports prior to 1967. As was mentioned by Viscount Long in the House of Lords on 4 March 1982 all reports sent in prior to 1967 were destroyed after five years of keeping. Since then, however, our policy has been to keep all sighting records of UFOs that we have received but given the provisions of the Public Records Act I regret these will not become available for public viewing "en bloc" until at least 1997. However. as you may already be aware, we are able to answer any specific' question that you might have concerning a particular incident which has occurred recently and if we have a report, let you know what it contains.

You also asked if an applicant could have access to public records prior to reaching the 30 year release point. I have established that, within the MOD there have been certain occasions in the past when individuals have been allowed access to unclassified official documents before their official release date, mainly to known historians but this is exceedingly rare. As you might expect, each case is taken on its merits and all applications are very carefully looked into. The branch within the Air Force Department that deals with such matters is AHB(RAF) & PCB(Air) who can be contacted at Room 413, Lacon House, Theobalds Road, London, WC1X 8RY.

I hope that this proves helpful. I am sorry for the long delay in replying.





I write in connection with a telephoned report to R.A.F. Coningsby by Section 40

Near Chesterfield, Which was made during the week commencing May 18th 1987. The details are as follows.

At 9.45p.m. on Friday, May 9th 1987, Section 40 were travelling by car in a northerly direction along a country lane running parallel to the M1 motorway at a point half a mile south of junction 29, near Chesterfield.

spotted a silver coloured object flying from east to west over the motorway. She immediately drew her husband's attention to it. The object was bullet shaped, with a fluted rear section. It had no wings and showed no sign of exhaust emission. As it crossed the motorway, Section 40 realised that the object was losing height. It cleared the motorway at a height estimated to be no more than twenty feet and continued on a downward trajectory.

Both Section 40 were under the impression that the object was coming down into the fields on their left, although their vision of it was obscured as they negotiated a slight left-hand bend in the road. By the time their car had cleared the bend, the object was out of sight.

The witnesses have stated that this was unlike any aircraft they have ever seen, in fact it bore greater resemblance to a rocket or a guided missile. Furthermore, the terrain in the area is such that no aircraft travelling at such a speed could have pulled out of the steep dive without crashing into the hillside at Stainsby to the west of the motorway.

The story was related to me on Monday, May 12th 1987, when Section 40 me to accompany him on a search of the area.

The search was severely hindered by a tall crop of Rape in the field where it was thought the object may have crashed or landed. It is true to say that an area of vegetation in the middle of the field seemed to have been disturbed, although from the perimeter there was no sign of wreckage or debris. As this was private property it was considered unwise to proceed through the crop therefore the brief search concluded with a visit to the nearby farm in order to inform the landowner that some kind of projectile had possibly landed in his field.

After further consideration of the experience over a period of ten days, realised the possible implications regarding national security and public safety, if for instance the object had been some kind of weapon, accidentally released from an aircraft. It was at this point that Section 40 decided to report the incident to personnel at R.A.F. Coningsby, this being an operational station situated to the east (from which direction the object had travelled) and which would most likely have the appropriate radar coverage to track such an object.

section 40 telephoned R.A.F. Coningsby on or about May 19th 1987. Details of the sighting were taken and Section 40 was told that someone may contact him regarding the matter.

So far no contact has been made and there has been no explanation of this strange event.

In my capacity as a writer I am currently researching this matter and I have been authorised by Section 40 to contact your station on his behalf to make enquiries regarding the processing of his report. A note of authorisation is enclosed with this letter.

I telephoned R.A.F. Coningsby at approximately 3.50p.m. on Monday, April 26th and offered a full explanation regarding my enquiry. My call was immediately diverted to a member of the R.A.F. Police who informed me that there was no-one at R.A.F. Coningsby who could assist me. I doubt that this is the case if Section 40 report was taken seriously and acted upon.

Although I respect the authority of the R.A.F. Police and I understand the need for the most stringent security measures at such a base as Coningsby, I would point out that I am not seeking access to any sensitive information regarding your operations or facilities, I am only asking for information related to an incident of which I have prior knowledge. I would be grateful of any assistance you may be able to give in order to clarify certain relevant points. In particular I would like to know:-

(a) Was Section 40 report logged?

- (b) Was any investigation carried out with regard to aircraft flying over the area at the time or radar reports which could relate to the object described?
- (c) If investigations were carried out were they handled by personnel at Coningsby?
- (d) If investigations were carried out by parties other than R.A.F. Coningsby personnel, to which branch of the Ministry of Defence should enquiries be addressed?
- (e) If your station was directly involved in investigating this report, was the object in question positively identified and if so, what was it?
- (f) If no action was taken on this report, why not, in view of the obvious implications regarding security of British airspace and public safety?

Your assistance in this matter is earnestly sought as the issue begs clarification for various reasons.

There is no doubt that the witnesses concerned are reliable and trustworthy in every respect and Section 40 has recently expressed concern that the object possibly remains undetected and poses a possible threat to the health and well-being of any member of the local community who may eventually uncover it.

I look forward to the possibility of hearing from you. Please find enclosed, a stamped, addressed envelope for this purpose.

I am a Sheffield student and have an interest in observations of unusual aerial phenomena; for around ten years I have been privately investigating instances of "UFO" sightings in the South Yorkshire/Derbyshire area out of scientific interest, and have recently begun to send my case reports to the Secretariat (Air Staff) 2a at the MOD in London.

I was advised to write to you by Pilot Officer Section 40 RAF Binbrook near Lincoln in reference to a number of unidentified aerial phenomena in Sheffield/Rotherham area on the night of Tuesday, February 2nd, 1988, and on several subsequent nights. I have collected a large number of independent sighting reports from this particular night which appear to relate to the passage of a "Vshaped" craft-with a series of red lights over the northern suberbs of Sheffield; it appeared to come from the Blackburn Meadows/Rotherham area and passed over Ecclesfield where it was seen and heard by police officers shortly before 8 p.m.

I have received reports from over 40 independent witnesses in various parts of the northern suberbs of Sheffield corroborating the details given above. I have been in touch with RAF Finningley at Doncaster over this matter and they suggested that a light civilian simple. suggested that a light civilian aircraft may have been responsible; however, subsequent enquiries with Manchester, East Midlands and Leeds/Bradford airports [copies of letters enclosed] as well as with a large number of RAF/military airbases have drawn a blank - no one appears to know anything about what was over Sheffield that night.

I have also received reports from five groups of independent witnesses who saw a very large diamond-shaped object, soundless and covered with many coloured lights flying at very low level in the area between Hoyland (Barnsley) and Penistone on the night of Wednesday, February 10th, 1988. The nights of February 5th and February 18th also produced a number of reports of very large structured craft carrying brilliant lights at low-level from several parts of South Yorkshire.

Are you able to give me any suggestions or information about has been going on in the skies of South Yorkshire recently, i.e. whether any military exercises, refuelling manoeuvres etc could be responsible. I accept that a large percentage of these observations can be explained in conventional terms - i.e. bright planets, unusual meteorological happenings, etc., but there remain many

sightings which cannot be accounted for so easily.

Many of the witnesses above are educated and responsible people - including microbiologists, engineers, police-officers and ex-RAF personnel, some of whom have expressed great concern that these "objects" are flying so low over densely populated areas.

I must add that I am interested in this subject out of scientific curiosity, and feel that reports of such incidents should be recorded and collated in report form in a way that they could be of use to possible scientific investigation in future years.

I am afraid that Thank you for your letter dated 3 March 1988. we are unable to identify any aircraft that might explain your sighting on 2 February 1988, or on the 10th February. The only aircraft controlled by Leeds Bradford Airport at the time you indicated was inbound to LBA from the west having departed from Dublin. Your suggested track from Rotherham to Ecclesfield is not a route likely to be used by aircraft operating to or from this airport. Doncaster or Sandtoft airfields have, in the past, carried out some night flying and may possibly have had traffic in the area you mention.

The only aircraft that would route to Leeds Bradford from the Sheffield area at the times you specify would fly either via the airways system from the South and pass to the West of Sheffield, near Penistone but usually above 4000 feet, or alternatively route Finningley area passing well East of the

Very low-level flights are more likely to be of military origin /my but this would not occur over built up areas. However, it is emphasis not unknown for helicopters and other aircraft to operate at night at fairly low level. In good visibility aircraft a long distance away can seem close and of course you would not hear the noise. However, we have no information about any military activities.

I am sorry I cannot be of any further assistance.



In reply to your letter of the 3rd March 1988 it would seem that the UFO seen on the night of Tuesday, 2nd February 1988 would appear to have been travelling in a westerly direction, in which case it is more than unlikely that it was an aircraft en route between East Midlands Airport and Leeds Airport or vice versa. It would seem more likely, if it was an aircraft, that it might be heading for Manchester Airport or the aerodrome at Woodford, or might be low level military traffic in which case the departure point and destination would be unknown to us. (my emphasis)

I can throw no light on the activities observed on Wednesday, 10th February 1988 in the area between Hoyland and Penistone, except to add that both Hoyland and Penistone lie beneath airway Bravo 1.

I can only add, and I am sure that you will be aware, that lights seen at night can be very deceptive in terms of distance or estimated distance, particularly on nights when there is good visibility.

Thank you for your letter dated 29 February 1988. We have investigated our traffic patterns but are unable to confirm any movements.

You will no doubt be aware that Manchester is responsible for controlling aircraft within Controlled Airspace and the nearest route to the area you indicate would be some 10/15 miles to the North and flying at altitudes in excess of 6,000 feet, mainly in an East/West direction.

I would remind you that aircraft both civil and military have flashing navigation lights both red, white and sometimes strobe lights which give a very strong flash/beam effect. These in conjunction with certain cloud/weather conditions can provide unusual effects.



Thank you for your recent letter which asked about our policy on the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

I think it would be helpful if I explain that the main concern of the Ministry of Defence is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this is not normally the case, no attempt is made by MOD to investigate or identify the objects.

The Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of UFOs and we have no staff who are employed on the subject full time. This being so we do not have the resources to undertake any further investigation or general survey. The sighting reports we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed onto us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments which are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we do not carry out full time studies into the UFO phenomenon nor do we have the resources to undertake any indepth investigations. I'm sure that you will appreciate that defence funds are fully committed to the continuing security of the UK against, primarily, aggression from the Warsaw Pact countries. This being so we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a clear threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

Nonetheless it is clear from the reports that we receive that many strange things have been observed in the sky, although we believe that rational explanations could probably be found for most of them. Possibilities include satellite debris re-entering the earth's atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or a host of other things.

 $\sqrt{1}$ would like to confirm that we received approximately 150 reported sightings of UFOs from members of the public during 1987.

I regret that the release of these reports "en bloc" is not possible as, like other government departments all MOD files are subject to the Public Records Act. As you may be aware, this Act states that official files generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. However, we are able to answer any specific queries you may have about particular incidents which have occurred recently and can let you know whether we have a report on the incident and if so what it contains.

I hope this proves helpful.



Thankyou for your letter dated 23 March and for the very helpful information enclosed, for which I am very grateful to you. Thanks also for the comments on the sighting reports I passed on to you, I will continue to send you the most interesting of the sighting reports I receive, as I feel it my duty to keep you informed about such happenings. Are you able to give any comments specifically regarding the series of photographs taken in Barnsley in August 1987? Does the object in the photograph resemble any kind of aircraft/helicopter that the MOD are familiar with, for example?

I have been continuing my enquiries into sightings of aerial phenomena in the South Yorkshire area during January/February of this year. As you probably will know, on the evening of Tuesday, February 2nd, a large number of independent witnesses in the northern suburbs of Sheffield and Rotherham saw a very large object carrying a number of red and white lights flying in an easterly to westerly direction, at very low altitude.

Following these reports I made enquiries with RAF Finningley and was told that the object involved was probably a light civilian turboprop aircraft flying between Leeds/Bradford and East Midlands airports. On making enquiries with both these airports, as well as with Manchester Airport and the RAF bases at Church Fenton, Binbrook, Leeming and Linton-on-Ouse, I was told that it definately was not an aircraft connected with any of these places.

In a letter of March 27 I informed Flight Lieutenant of RAF Finningley of the above, as well as sending him copies of statements from witnesses who had observed the object on February 2nd and positively identified it as a low-flying military aircraft. He told me he has "sent a copy of [my] letter and of the enclosed sighting account forms to the MOD department responsible for dealing with such reports".

Assuming you have received the above are you able to identify the "UFO" reported by amongst others the policeofficers at Ecclesfield as a military aircraft? May I draw your attention to remarks made by the Airport Director of Leeds/Bradford airport viz "very low-level flights are more likely to be of military origin". Also written at the bottom of your report form relating to the Ecclesfield sighting are the words "low-flying aircraft/helicopter/piston-engined aircraft"; how was this ascertained as when I spoke to PCs Section 40 & Section 40 they were emphatic that what they saw was definately not a

conventional aircraft?

Also, in paragraph 2 of your letter you mention that it is "highly unlikely" that an intruder of conventional origin would be able to travel to the UK without being spotted. In view of this statement could I draw your attention to your statement to my colleague Section 40 dated March 15th that "the RAF are not aware of any air defence activity on the dates and times in question in the South Yorkshire area" [referring to Feb 2 and Feb 10].

As no airfield in the north of England has admitted having these objects on radar and also that they were not flown from any northern airfield it follows that, given your rationale, the craft seen on Feb 2nd was in fact an unidentified flying object as by your own definition it was not registered on radar. I would like to hear your comments on the above.


I do of course understand your reasons for declining my offer of assistance to investigate UFO reports in the north of England. However, may I ask if it is possible for you to keep a record of our 24-hour answerphone service (Telephone: Section 40 and to let witnesses who contact you know about this service. Therefore, if they wish to speak to someone who is able to spend time looking into their sighting (which you make clear in your letter that you have no time or resources to do this yourself), it can then be left up to them to get in touch with us if they so wish (thus there is no problem about confidentiality). I must point out that all of our small group of investigators each have many years of experience in the investigation of aerial phenomena, and we like to set high standards in our research.

Thankyou also for your information about the whereabouts of the sightings reports from 1973-1974 which I asked about. Are these "central archives" open to the public, and if not would it be possible for my MP to view the information on my behalf? The sightings I am referring to (of a "phantom helicopter" repeatedly chased by police-cars in January 1974) I am interested in due to their scientific interest from a perceptual/sociological viewpoint.

I look forward to seeing your reply to the above [SAE enclosed], and I would like to thankyou once again for your invaluable help and co-operation.

Dear sir/madam,

I am writing to you on behalf of an organisation called 'Skyscan'. This was formed in 1972, and is a nationwide network of people who investigate reported sightings of unidentified flying objects (UFO's). I realise that you may regard UFO 'groups' as cranks in the main, but let me assure you that Skyscan is a serious team of people who work to very high standards. We know from experience that the overwhelming majority of reports can be explained as known phenomena (aircraft, meteors etc.), but there remains a small number that cannot be explained (at least by us - and we also refer these unexplained reports to a panel of consultants to see if they can find an explanation).

The reason for this letter is an enquiry. We have a number of reports stretching from Castle Donnington over to Spalding in Linc's for the date of the 9th /IOth December, I987. We know of many witnesses who reported seeing two - three large objects with accompanying 'humming' noise. When there are a large number of witnesses, it usually suggests a simple explanation. We think that they all saw a group of large aircraft, probably military. While we realise that you may not be able to be specific, we would like some form of confirmation of our suspicions. If you cannot help, perhaps you can suggest an alternative?





I am at the moment investigating a most intrigueing case. A man who lives in Ilkley has made certain claims concerning an alleged UFO experience of the 4th Kind. These claims are currently being examined by specialists in various scientific fields. However, it is an incident which the witness has reported as occuring after the UFO event which concerns me here.

According to the witness and his wife, two men arrived at his house at approximately 8.50pm on January 15th, 1988. Because of the calibre of this witness we are carrying out a thorough examination of his claims, and would welcome your help in throwing some light on the above incident.







Thank you for your letter of 28 January. I am sorry for the delay in replying.

The Ministry of Defence is very grateful for your kind offer of voluntary assistance with the investigation and collation of information on the UFO phenomenon. As you rightly say we do not have the manpower or resources available to conduct in-depth studies or investigations ourselves.

However, as you may already know, the MOD's involvement with the UFO subject is extremely limited in that our main concern is to determine whether or not UFOs present a threat to the security and defence of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that an unidentified sighting does represent a threat, and this is not normally the case, the MOD does not attempt, as we feel there is no need, to identify or investigate the object or objects further. The sighting reports that we receive, which usually are limited to the brief details of the incident passed on to us by those who witnessed them, are referred to our staff in the departments responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties. Those rare sighting reports which are considered to warrant further attention from the point of view of being a possible threat to our continuing security are also investigated in-house.

In essence, despite the merit in your suggestion, we feel that there is little need from our point of view of an outside agency investigating UFO sightings on behalf of the Department, and therefore must decline your offer of help.

I am sorry to have to give you a disappointing reply and wish you luck with your future endeavours with the investigation of the UFO phenomenon.
