

Attached are reports dated June 5th., and 24th., 1969 from St. John's Detachment and copy of memorandum directed to the Detachment on June 17th., 1969 by the Officer Commanding St. John's Sub-Division.

- The explanation offered in paragraph 2 of report dated June 24th., 1969 appears reasonable, however, there is no way of stating for sure that the object observed by the three girls at St. Philips was a minute form of sea life. This correspondence is therefore being forwarded to you for your information and record purposes in the event it may be of interest to you.
- The three girls who made the sighting were not in full agreement as to the size of the object or light but a cross section of their opinions would indicate that it was approximately 15 feet in circumference.

On the above date,

contacted this office via telephone and stated
that his year old daughter 2 accompanied by two other
girls saw a light unter the water in conception Bay near St. Phillips.
Subject stated that his daughter told him the light was travelling
down the Bay and would increase in intensity every so often. Complainant also advised that the girls saw no boats in the area at the
time and no object was noted on the surface of the water.

I patrolled to the complainant's home at which time was interviewed and a statement obtained. Contents of statement are as follows:

STATEMENT OF

This morning, 26 MAY 69 around 1:45 a.m., my girlfriends, and I were leaving (2) nouse to come nome.

Suddenly 2 asked us if we could see a light in the water. 2 and I looked and we could see the light but we thought it must have been from the moon, however, it was cloudy and the moon could not be seen.

The light grew brigther and then dimmer. It started to move and as it did it grew dimmer and then brigther. The light was moving out towards the sea and then edisappeared completely.

We didn't hear any engines running and we could not see any boats in the area. It was clear enough to see Bell Island and there was no fog hanging over the water.

The light was two hundred feet from shore and appeared to be brigther at the part pointing out to sea. The light was not circular in shape but appeared to be more square in shape.

I can't say where the light came from, however, it appeared to come from just slightly below the

We all looked in the water and we could see a light in the water that appeared to be a dim glare. The light appeared to be coming from the shore line and as it did it got brighter. The light appeared to be greenish yellow in color. The light then went out towards the centre of the Bay and then it went out of sight.

The light was slightly circular in shape and opague. We couldn't see any boats or hear any engines running. We couldn't see any formation on the water at all. The light appeared to be under the surface of the water.

The area in question, is in a small ove and well lighted by street lights. The water would be anywhere from fifty to a hundred feet deep and is usually quite clear. It is possible that the street lights would cause a reflection of this nature but this wouldn't explain the movement of the light. All three girls stated that the Weather was cloudy at the time but there was no fog condition prevailing at the time.

The three girls mentioned in the foregoing paragraphs all attended Memorial University this year. The girls stated that they were not drinking at the time and there was no lights in the area that would reflect in the water causing them to appear as if they were moving. All three girls are over years of age, however, their reliability cannot be determined although all three girls are known to be mature, responsible adults.

Since the girls who claimed they witnessed the presence of the unidentified object are considered mature, the possibility of a near seems to be ruled out and it would appear that they did in fact observe some object, creature or phenomenon, the exact nature of which has not been determined. With this in mind it would perhaps be well to check with other technical sources in the event they could offer some explanation and in this regard I muttest that you contact the Department of Fisheries, federal and Provincial, the Department of Transport (Nautical Services Division) and the Marine Science Laboratory at Logy Bay. In recent months, we have had exchanges of correspondence with Canadian Forces Bases at Esquimalt, 5.0. and Greenwood, h.S. concerning UFO sightings in these areas during 1966.

specifically, we are interested in the Nov. 26, 1968 report from Greenwood lealing with an object(s) that was observed by ground personnel as well as being tracked on radar. The initial sighting was made by a vith subsequent reports from Greenwood Ground Control approach optin visual and radar).

lescription of the object he observed would indicate that it has not attributable to aircraft or balloons and Greenwood GCA claim there has no trairle in the vicinity. We would like to know whether or not the slighting was fully investigated and what, if any, conclusion was reached.

The secend case involves a report from Victoria, 3.0. of Sept. 29, 1968 which I'm led to believe was also investigated by the Canadian Forces. We have accumulated a considerable amount of data on the sighting which involved a series of coloured slides that were allowedly taken by the two principal witnesses. At this point, we have been unable to arrive at a solution to the incident in terms of natural phenomena or misinterpretation of aircraft, another balloons, flares and so on. We wrote to the Dase Commander at Esquimalt and a Captain Frewer replied on May 20th to the effect that our letter fated april 15th had been referred to Canadian Forces Headquarters "In accordance with current regulations". Our letter requested information on aircraft activity and cossible radar contact of the objects between Thom and 9:00 p.m. Sept. 29th, 1968.
