UNIDENTIFIED PLYING OBJECTS

- 1. Negotiations are underway for the transfer of UFO investigation from DND to NRC. As part and parcel of the transfer, DND will hand over to NRC all files and information on UFOs. Since many of your reports are of a confidential nature they have been removed from our main files.
- 2. Returned for your retention are all RCMP reports that have been received by D Ops since 1966. Appropriate representation will made from NRC should information on a specific report be required some future date.
- 3. The collection of, and possibly investigation into, UFO sightings will still be a function of DND and therefore, all DND messages on UFOs will be directed to CANFORCEHED and NRC, with the latter as the action addressee. RCMP UFO reports in future should be directed to NRC.

The Honourable C. M. Drury, PC, MP, Minister of Industry, Ottawa, Ontario.

My dear Colleague:

I concur in the view, expressed in your letter of 23 October, 1967, that it is unnecessary and wasteful of effort to investigate all reported UFO sightings. However, there are examples of recent sightings that have caused considerable local public concern and therefore required investigation by a government agency.

Most frequently reported, are sightings of aerial phenomena which, in general, cannot be fruitfully investigated after the event. Occasionally, however, there are associated physical phenomena on the ground that require scientific investigation. As examples, reports of investigations into three recent occurrences in this category are attached.

As you say, a judicious sampling procedure is required. It is suggested that all reports of sightings be channeled to the National Research Council, where the decision on the necessity for scientific investigation would be made. It is agreed that participation of field units of other departments, including DND, would be required.

In order to proceed with the development of effective procedures, would you have an appropriate staff member of NRC contact Dr. H. Sheffer, Scientific Assistant to the Vice Chief of the Defence Staff.

UFU REPURT CAMROSE, ALBERTA

On August 8, 1967, a

reported the finding or a number of circular impressions in a pasture in the vicinity of the town of Camrose, Alberta. An investigation was conducted by an officer from Canadian Forces Base, Edmonton, in the company of Dr. G.H. Jones, of the Defence Research Board Experimental Station at Suffield.

All the marks exhibited the same general appearance; a ring six inches in width, with diameter varying from slightly over 31 feet to 36 feet. No evidence of heat was evident, but a definite impression in the ground, which was soft from recent rains, indicated distinct pressure. Some slight evidence of movement in a radial manner along the marks was visible in that the grass had been pressed down in a definite direction.

he physical evidence that would lead to the conclusion of deliberate interference or involvement of any person was found, nor was there any trace of chemical or radio activity in the area.

UFC REPORT LOGIN WOOD HARDOUR, N.S.

An RCMP Corporal and six other witnesses observed what they believed to be an unidentified flying object off the southwest coast of Nova Scotia, Canada on the 4th October 1967. The object was described as approximately 60 feet in length and was flying in an easterly direction when first sighted. During their observation, the JFO descended rapidly to the surface and made a "oright splash" as it struck the water. For some time after the impact a single white light remained on the surface. The RCMF Corporal endeavoured to reach the floating white object, but unfortunately, before he could reach the location the object sank. A search of the area failed to produce any material evidence which could assist in explaining or establishing the identity of the object. An underwater search conducted by divers from the Department of National Defence also railed to locate any tangible evidence which could be used to arrive at an explainable conclusion.

My dear Colleague,

I referred the proposal contained in your letter of 10 October, 1967, to the National Research Council, and the conclusions I have reached are substantially based on the scientific convictions now held in that organization.

In broad outline, the National Research Council is satisfied that good reasons have existed hitherto justifying a substantial effort devoted to the investigation of sightings of unidentified flying objects. The possibility of unexpected military innovations in or above the atmosphere has clearly existed ever since the last war, and the sensitivity of the civil population to the remarkable scientific progress in upper atmosphere and space research clearly required positive action by government agencies to preserve an equable social context to such activities.

After some 15 years of publicity and of conditioning to the acceptance of natural explanations for unusual sightings, the public concern is considered to be no longer sufficiently cogent to warrant the investigation of large numbers of reported UFO sightings. Similarly, as you remark in your letter, the military concern has been almost entirely allayed by the extensive investigations made in the United States and Canada.

With the assumption that these two primary reasons for past investigational activity are no longer matters of serious import, we are left with the possibility that continued investigations may be of scientific value. This is indeed a possibility, but it is one that should preferably arise by the natural extension of scientific work in progress rather than by the intrusion of UFO phenomena seeking explanation.







I am therefore led to conclude that your proposal to transfer the responsibility for UFO investigations might very well be made the occasion to consider a substantial reduction in the government effort, in fact to something rather akin to a judicious sampling procedure.

In the event that you feel disposed to accept this alternative proposition, I have no doubt that the National Research Council could undertake to provide the scientific input required. There is, however, necessity for participation by an agency or department which has personnel well distributed over the area of Canada, such as the RCMP, DoT, or DND. The National Research Council would be glad to consider arrangements which might be made with the Department of National Defence to set up an effective and relatively undemanding procedure.

The american condittee concluded its investigation by stating, "that the evidence presented on the shows no indication that cause management constitute a direct physical threat to national security". - Un 04 Uctober 1967 at 2345 hours local and six other witnesses and six other witnesses signted large flying object. This object, in the time interval of approximately five minutes, flew down to the water surface, floated and sank.
- The flying object was described as being in excess of 60 feet in diameter and carried four white lights spaced horizontally at a distance of 15 feet. The object, flying in an easterly direction when first sighted, descended rapidly to the water and produced a bright flash on impact. One light remained on the surface for considerable time but sank before a boat could reach it.
- The Rescue Co-ordination Centre conducted preliminary investigation and discounted the possibilities that the sighting was produced by an aircraft, flares, floats, or any other known objects.
- maritime Command were asked, on 05 Cct, to conduct an investigation into the sighting. At the present time one Officer and a giving team of three men are on the scene aided by Coast Guard Cutter 101.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS (UFOs) - INVESTIGATION

References: A. Paper prepared by the Director of Operations on UFOs.

- B. Suggested memorandum addressed to National Research Council (NBC) for MND signature.
- Reference A deals with a paper on UFOs prepared by the Director of Operations which recommends that NRC be requested to accept the responsibility for investigating UFOs.
- It has become apparent that CFHQ have neither the ecientific facilities nor the trained personnel to carry out an objective investigation into UFO reports. Investigation by many interested agencies in both the United States and Canada have failed to produce any evidence to suggest UFOs pose a threat to national security. However, it is apparent that a number of UFO investigations exhibit unique scientific or advanced technology which could possibly contribute to scientific or technical research. It would, therefore, appear that the primary interest of UFO investigations lies in the field of scientific research and advanced technology and to a much lesser degree to one associated with national security.
- 3. It is appreciated, should NRC be agreeable to accepting the responsibility for investigating UFO reports, that DND would be required to provide assistance to NRC in such areas as field investigation. However, assistance provided to NRC would be with the understanding that NRC would advise CFHQ on any matter which would suggest an interest to national defence.
- In view of the world wide interest in UFOs being stimulated by many prominent personnel, universities and civilian organisations established for the purpose of investigating UFO reports, it is desmed advisable for DND to initiate action to place the responsibility for investigating these reports with the appropriate governmental agency of primary interest.

- 1. Reference A deals with a paper on UFOs prepared by the Director of Operations which recommends that the National Research Council (NRC) be approached with the view of accepting the responsibility for investigating UFO reports.
- 2. The investigations conducted by CFHQ into UFO reports disclose no evidence to suggest that UFOs pose a threat to national security. Towever, a number of investigations indicate that UFOs may exhibit some unique scientific or advanced technology which could possibly contribute to acientific or technical research. From information available on UFO activity it would appear that the primary interest lies in the field of scientific and technical research and to a lesser degree to one which poses a threat to national security.
- The number of UPO reports being referred to this Headquarters for investigation has continued to increase. Although every attempt has been made to arrive at a satisfactory conclusion it is evident that NRC with their scientific facilities and trained personnel would be the most logical governmental agency to undertake these investigations.
- 1t is appreciated that DND would be required to provide assistance to SRU in such areas as carrying out field investigation in support of these investigations. As DND would be vitally concerned if scientific investigations should produce evidence to suggest UFOs pose a threat to national security, it would be necessary to co-operate with NRC in a spirit of mutual understanding to ensure our respective interests.

UNIDESTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS (UPOs) - INVESTIGATIONS

A study condusted by this Headquarters has recommended that consideration be given to transferring the responsibility for investigating UFOs to the Mational Research Council where scientific research facilities and trained personnel are available for carrying out an objective investigation.

UPO reports which are referred to this Headquarters for investigation are studied by the Operations Staff who endeavour to classify the information into one of two categories, namely:

<u>Category one</u> - Information which would suggest the type of phenomena associated with fireballs and meteorites, or

<u>Gaterory two</u> - Information which does not conform to the physical patterns usually associated with fireballs or meteorite activity.

Reports which are classified under category one are forwarded to the Hatienal Research Council Meteorite Centre for scientific study.

Reports which are classified under category two are either placed on file and associated that no further action is required, or action is initiated to conduct a formal investigation of the report by a military officer. The investigations conducted to date have failed to disclose any evidence which would suggest that UFOs pose a threat to national accurity. However, a number of investigations suggest the possibility of UFOs exhibiting some unique scientific information or advanced technology which could possibly contribute to scientific or technical research. From information available on UFO activity it would appear that the primary interest lies in the field of scientific and technical research and to a lesser degree to one that poses a threat to national security.
