1. Description of unidentified flying object:

- a. The object was ball shaped in appearance.
- b. Color: Bright blue.
- c. Number of objects observed: One (1)
- d. No trail or exhaust was observed.
- e. The object travelled faster than a conventional jet and slower than the average shooting star.
- f. No sound was observed.
- g. The object travelled in a straight course with no deviation from west to east. The altitude estimated at 40,000 feet.
- h. Object appeared on the west horizon and disappeared in the east horizon.

2. Sighting of the object was at 0140 hours PDT, 27 August 1952, aboard the S.S. TOPA TOPA for approximately one (1) minute.

3. Object was visual from the surface.

4. The two (2) observers were located on board ship (position 41-05 north Latitude and 179-30 west Longitude).

5. Observers were [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], S.S. TOPA TOPA Waterman Steam Ship Co. Reliability of observation is unknown. No observing instruments were available.

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6. Weather conditions and wind velocity and direction are unknown.
